Computer Classes

The library offers two cycles of computer classes: beginner and intermediate beginner.
Beginner classes are basic, introductory level material.
Intermediate classes go a little further in depth.

The Introductory Cycle consists of the following 3 classes: Introduction to Computers I and II, How to search the Library Catalog, and Introduction to the Internet.

The Intermediate cycle will consist of the following classes: Review of Computer Basics, Word Processing using Microsoft Word, and Searching the Internet.

The classes are offered for 3

weeks on Tuesdays at 6:30 p.m. OR Fridays at 11:00 a.m. Call for the schedule of classes.

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Commander Isaac Schlossbach, World Explorer

Isaac "Ike" Schlossbach was a celebrated twentieth century polar explorer who was born and raised in Neptune. Ike graduated from Neptune High School and then, in 1915, graduated from the Naval Academy. He volunteered to go to the first submarine school. Then in 1921, he joined the aviation branch of the Navy and refined the art of aerial gunnery, "dog fighting", and dive bombing. During this time, Ike began having trouble with his left eye, and the Navy assigned him to the Naval Academy teaching engineering and aviation and training the football team. Finally, he was force to retire from the Navy in 1930 when he lost his eye. He was 38 years old. Schlossbach was asked to help with the proposed submarine polar expedition to go under the North Pole ice pack. Although a failure, this was Ike's first exploration. Later he was to go on twelve expeditions to the Arctic and Antarctic, and one trip to the jungles of Central America. His last trip was to Antarctica in 1961 when he was 70 years old. The Schlossbach family moved to

Bradley Beach while Ike was attending the Naval Academy. When World War II broke out, Ike came out of retirement and was assigned to Guadalcanal. At that time he and his three brothers, Edgar, Theodore and Harry were all in the service, and each of the brother's name was displayed on the Honor Roll in Railroad Square Park. Ike never married, saying that it would have been unfair to subject anyone to wait for him to occasionally come home. When he died in 1984 at the age of 93, he left a legacy of which few are now aware. Commander Isaac Schlossbach was an explorer and a pioneer who left us a legend to which few could or ever will equal.
