
Tonight we open a new chapter in London's rich sporting history.

Key points

Tonight we'll take you on a journey of discovery inspired by the wonder of science and its power to transform perceptions. Our guide will be the world's most celebrated scientist, Professor Stephen Hawking, with whom we'll be looking out into deepest space before encountering a Stadium-sized library, voyaging across a sea of ideas and pausing to reflect under the apple tree in Isaac Newton's garden, before finally ending up in the dynamic world of contemporary London.

The Ceremony explores the twin themes of reason and rights.

Spectators will be taken on a journey of discovery, inspired by the wonder of science and its power to transform perceptions, led by the character Miranda, as featured in Shakespeare's *The Tempest*.

The Ceremony features the use of umbrellas as a motif – the designer describes the umbrella as quintessentially British and full of comic potential.

The origins of the Paralympic Movement can be traced back to the 1948 Stoke Mandeville Games, in a small village in Buckinghamshire. So the Opening Ceremony also marks an emotional homecoming as the Paralympic Games return to Britain.

The Age of Enlightenment

During the 18th century, an intellectual, philosophical, cultural and social movement took hold and the amount of new knowledge that emerged was phenomenal. The Age of Enlightenment saw a period of unprecedented independent thought, when the fields of mathematics, astronomy, physics, political theory, economics, philosophy and medicine all saw accepted orthodoxies challenged and overturned.

Key performers

The professional cast includes 73 Deaf and disabled performers.

The volunteer cast of 3,250 hails from all over the world (every continent is represented). They range in age from 10 to 80 years old.

The 75 child volunteers were drawn from three schools in the six east London Host Boroughs.

As a child Roger Winfield, one of the volunteer marshalls, was a Flagbearer at the 1984 Summer Paralympic Games in Stoke Mandeville.

The audition process included skating, cycling and dancing.

The volunteers gave up their evenings and weekends to take part in a total of 106 rehearsals at two east London sites. On average, adult volunteers rehearsed for 85 hours each.

Olympic Opening Ceremony Friday 27 July

'This is for everyone' was the theme of the Opening Ceremony. The Ceremony captured the great revolutions in British society – the Industrial Revolution, the revolution of social attitudes that began in the 1960s and the digital revolution through which we're living now. Artistic Director Danny Boyle celebrated the achievements of key figures from British history and the creativity, exuberance and generosity of the British people. Performers included Rowan Atkinson in a comedy sequence with the London Symphony Orchestra, Sir Tim Berners-Lee (inventor of the World Wide Web), Sir Paul McCartney, Kenneth Branagh as Isambard Kingdom Brunel, and Her Majesty the Queen, as herself, in a scene with James Bond (Daniel Craig) shot at Buckingham Palace.

Olympic Closing Ceremony

Sunday 12 August

A celebration of all that's good about London, British people, our music and culture, the Closing Ceremony of the Olympic Games captured the spirit that's inspired so much global creativity over the past 50 years. Artistic Director Kim Gavin called on some of the UK's most successful musicians – and a cast of more than 3,500 volunteers – to help celebrate the achievements of the 10,490 Olympic athletes. Performers included Beady Eye, Russell Brand, Darcey Bussell, Taio Cruz, Ray Davies, Elbow, Eric Idle, Jessie J, George Michael, Kate Moss, Muse, Queen, Timothy Spall, The Spice Girls, Take That, Tinie Tempah and The Who.

Paralympic Closing Ceremony

Sunday 9 September

Artistic Director Kim Gavin's 'Festival of the Flame' will see Coldplay, one of the world's best-selling music acts, perform a live and one-off concert. They'll play a set of their most iconic music in celebration of Britain's rich culture of festivals – from the ancient to the modern day – alongside a cast of almost 2,000. The Ceremony will also celebrate the achievements of amazing Paralympian endeavour over the previous 11 days and mark the last night of the London 2012 Games.

The Olympic Park

Facts and stats

When Seb Coe, then Chair of the London 2012 Bid Committee, presented the bid in Singapore in 2005, he pledged to make London 2012 the most sustainable Games ever.

This meant the complete transformation of a former, under-developed part of the Lower Lea Valley here in east London; much of it was a large, polluted industrial wasteland, difficult to access and visually blighted with overhead power lines, derelict buildings and piles of rubbish.

In less than seven years, London 2012 has created the Olympic Park and venues, new infrastructure for transport, energy, water and telecoms, and established a blueprint for a sustainable new community in east London based on the principles of 'One Planet Living'. After the Games, it will become the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park.

All the sports venues and other buildings and infrastructure have been planned and designed with legacy in mind. If they had a potential future use they were built as permanent structures, but sized only according to their future requirements. All other structures – from additional seating stands to whole sports venues, and even parts of many of the bridges spanning the railways, roads, rivers and canals that pass through and around the site – have been installed on a temporary basis.

The Olympic Park has been the spark for wider regeneration in east London. New housing, businesses and amenities are already springing up in the areas around the Olympic Park.

The vision was also about inspiring change, having a lasting influence on the way people think and behave, and setting new sustainability standards for the event industry.

Far more than just a 'green Games', London 2012 has been the catalyst for demonstrating sustainability at an unprecedented scale.

Miranda

The Ceremony's opening section introduces us to our central character, Miranda who encourages us to look at the world with a sense of wonder and curiosity. Professor Stephen Hawking – perhaps the world's most brilliant physicist – appears on the 'moon stage' and speaks of the quest for understanding the origins of the universe.

A glowing, celestial sphere descends into the middle of a giant central umbrella structure, igniting the 'big bang', of which Hawking has written extensively. Some 600 volunteer performers surround the main umbrella, each one carrying an umbrella that lights up as they radiate out from the centre. Fireworks explode in a starry burst which, in turn, expands onto the pixel screen transporting us into deepest space.

We're then brought back to contemporary London, as shooting stars on the pixel screen transform into rain drops. The umbrellas become the focus for a street dance by Flawless, accompanied by sway pole and aerial choreography.

Miranda's eyes become our eyes as the cast reforms to create the image of a giant eye staring out of the Stadium. Stephen Hawking encourages her to be curious and she looks out to see mechanical objects entering the Stadium. She sees Newton's apple, a revolving book showing the text of *The Universal Declaration of Human Rights*, both seemingly powered by wheelchairs, and a pulsating ball of energy representing the Higgs particle.

'We live in a universe governed by rational laws that we can discover and understand. Look up at the stars, and not down at your feet. Try to make sense of what you see, and wonder about what makes the universe exist. Be curious.'

Cast and creatives

- Professor Stephen Hawking is a British theoretical physicist and author. Throughout his distinguished career he's carried out groundbreaking work in the fields of quantum gravity and general relativity. He was diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease at the age of 21. See biography p36
- Discovered on the TV show, Britain's Got Talent, Flawless are one of the UK's top professional dance acts. See biography p36
- The cast includes 42 Deaf and disabled people who took part in an eightweek training programme at Circus Space in London, funded by Arts Council England. The performers, from all walks of life (including artists, sports people and ex-servicemen), learnt circus, aerial and other performance skills in preparation for the Ceremony. This investment also means that the legacy of tonight's Ceremony will live on into 2013 and beyond.
- 600 volunteer performers and a choir of 430 volunteer singers.
- Nicola Miles-Wildin, who plays 'Miranda' is a professional actress and Assistant Director of Graeae Theatre Company's power-wheelchair dancing troupe Rhinestone Rollers. See biography p37
- Grant Mouldey, founder member of Strange Fruit sway pole performance company, leads the choreography.

- The choral performance 'Principia' was specially composed by Greenwichbased Errollyn Wallen, who has been described by the Observer newspaper as a 'renaissance woman of contemporary British music'.
- 'Principia' is conducted by David Charles Abell whose repertoire encompasses symphonic music, opera and musical theatre.
- The choirs are made up of six London-based choirs Hackney Singers, London Gay Men's Chorus, The London Chorus, Lewisham Choral Society, Barts' Choir and Hackney Empire Community Choir.

The Big Bang

A glowing, celestial sphere descends into the middle of the central umbrella structure, igniting the 'big bang', which transforms the Stadium into a giant nebula in space. Flawless perform to the track 'Umbrella' by Rihanna – see p42 for lyrics.




Miranda

The cast creates the image of a giant blinking eye, using their umbrellas to form the iris, while sway pole performers suggest eyelashes. Out of this blink we meet our central heroine, Miranda, who is encouraged by Professor Hawking to 'be curious'.

Principia

As three mechanical objects enter the field of play a 430-strong choir performs 'Principia', a new choral piece by Errollyn Wallen that celebrates science and human endeavour. The silk covering on the central umbrella is whisked off to reveal the northern hemisphere with Miranda on top of the world.

Background notes

- Umbrellas are a motif running throughout the Ceremony. Designer Jon Bausor says, 'The umbrella, or brolly, is a guintessentially British object that protects us from the rain. The steel-framed version was invented in 1852 by the British industrialist, Samuel Fox. It's a triumph of design and transformation and full of comic potential!'
- Sway poles appear for the first time in this segment. They're 4.5m high and provided by Strange Fruit, an Australia-based performing arts company.
- A nebula is an interstellar cloud of dust, hydrogen, helium and other ionized gases. Formations of gas, dust, and other materials clump together to form larger masses, which attract further matter, and eventually become big enough to form stars.
- The title of Errollyn Wallen's 'Principia' is taken from Sir Isaac Newton's mathematical treatise Principia Mathematica. The lyrics celebrate science and human endeavour referencing Newton, Hawking, Einstein, the recently discovered Higgs particle and the Paralympic Games. For lyrics see p42

Majesty

As the choral performance ends, the ensemble cast position themselves around the central umbrella and switch on their umbrella lights once more for the entrance of Her Majesty The Queen. This is the first time our monarch has officiated at the openings of both the Olympic Games and the Paralympic Games.

A fanfare is heard and Her Majesty is welcomed into the Presidential Box by Sir Philip Craven, President of the International Paralympic Committee.

After The Queen is seated, nine servicemen and women from the Army, Royal Navy and Royal Air Force are discovered holding the Union Flag. They process the Union Flag past the Queen to the accompaniment of William Walton's 'A Wartime Sketchbook'.

The flag is then raised to the accompaniment of Benjamin Britten's arrangement of the National Anthem, performed by the 430-strong choir. A section of the choir sings the first verse, quietly, and then the mass choir join in on the second verse. A 'signing choir' of 12 signs the lyrics and the words are displayed on the Stadium screens. During the National Anthem the cast switch on their lights to create a stylised representation of the Union Flag.

- The signing choir is made up of Deaf people based in London and Liverpool.
- Eve Stephens, a member of the choir, now aged 77, attended every day of the athletics at Wembley at the 1948 Olympics.
- Benjamin Britten's arrangement of the National Anthem was written for the Leeds Festival in 1951 and set to two verses. It is an unusually majestic version and is sometimes performed at The Proms. The first verse is heard unaccompanied, before a crescendo and key change announce a triumphant second verse. This is the National Anthem as you've never heard it before – another way in which this Ceremony transforms perceptions.
- The music is recorded by the London Symphony Orchestra (LSO). The Orchestra was founded in 1904 and since 1982 has been based in the Barbican Centre in the City of London. They're widely regarded as one of the world's leading orchestras.

The Union Flag

The Union Flag is processed past the Queen by servicemen and women from the Army, Royal Navy and Royal Air Force. After the choral performance, the lights on the umbrellas create the Union Flag around the central umbrella during the National Anthem.

Background notes

- Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II is celebrating her Diamond Jubilee this year, the 60th year of her reign. She's the second-longest serving monarch in British history. This is the first time our monarch has officiated at the openings of both the Olympic and Paralympic Games.
- Audio-description throughout the Ceremony is provided by Channel 4, who have worked closely with the audio-describers – William Elliot and Hannah McBride – and the Ceremony Artistic Directors.

Her Majesty The Queen enters the Stadium and is met by the President of the International Paralympic Committee, Sir Philip Craven.



Spirit in Motion

Duration: 01:15:00

'Spirit in Motion' is the motto of the Paralympic Movement and as athletes from across the world enter the Stadium, they receive a suitably energising welcome with a global music mash-up created by three London DJs.

Teams from 166 nations, the largest ever number in the history of the Paralympic Games, enter the Stadium in alphabetical order – except for the host country, ParalympicsGB who, following tradition, enter last.

Each delegation is dressed in its official uniform and is preceded by a placard bearer announcing the country name in English. Once again, umbrellas feature – providing the placards and the deconstructed skirts echoing umbrella ribs. The costumes have been finished by aerosol artists, which gives an edgy, urban feel. The teams parade around the Stadium before moving to their designated seating areas.

Cast and creatives

- Deaf actor Deepa Shastri was nominated for a Children's BAFTA for her work with Gamelab as a children's storyteller. She also works for Stagetext, campaigning for theatres to make their shows more accessible to Deaf and hard of hearing people.
- More than 650 volunteer performers.
- The dance performances in tonight's Ceremony have been facilitated by 10 dance captains. One of them, Laura Jones, has been a dancer with StopGAP Dance Company since 2001, she was the first wheelchair user to complete A-Level Dance. Mark Smith, another of the dance captains, is the founder and Artistic Director of Deaf Men Dancing.

Music

- Music mixed and played by three local DJs DJ Walde, DJ Excalibah and Goldierocks. See biography p38
- 'Spirit in Motion' is an original composition written by Errollyn Wallen, with orchestral accompaniment by the London Symphony Orchestra.
- Blind soprano Denise Leigh won Channel 4's Operatunity. Since her operatic debut in 2003 she's sung all over the world. See biography p37

Athletes' Parade

Athletes from across the world enter the Stadium. Each team is dressed in its official uniform and is preceded by a placard bearer announcing the country name, in its official language and English.



Global mash-up

The athletes are welcomed by a global music mash-up created by local DJs Goldierocks, DJ Walde and DJ Excalibah.



Spirit in Motion

When all the athletes are in place, soprano Denise Leigh sings the athlete tribute song, 'Spirit in Motion'. The words are signed by Deaf actor Deepa Shastri. See p43 for 'Spirit in Motion' lyrics.

Background notes

- As part of the bid to host the 2012 Games in London, a UK-wide request was made for babies who were born on the 20th day of the 12th month of 2004 to be registered with 'The Children's Promise'. A pledge was made to involve these 20/12 babies in events surrounding the Games. Around 750 children were registered and now they're 7 years, 8 months and 10 days old. They've already played an important role in the Olympic Torch Relay, welcoming the Olympic Flame to their local evening celebrations. And tonight they are here in the audience and were introduced before the show.

Homecoming

Duration: 00:08:00

The UK is the spiritual birthplace of the Paralympic Games and the official opening of the London 2012 Paralympic Games therefore represents a homecoming. The Chair of the London Organising Committee of the Olympic and Paralympic Games, Lord Sebastian Coe, and the President of the International Paralympic Committee, Sir Philip Craven MBE, both make speeches.

At the end of Sir Philip Craven's speech, he invites Her Majesty The Queen to officially declare the Games open. She does so from the Presidential Box, accompanied by a film of Stoke Mandeville on the screens behind the lecterns.

An athlete, official and coach each pledge their commitment to the ideals of the Paralympic Movement, sportsmanship and impartiality.

Cast and creatives

- The sculptures on the lecterns for tonight's speeches have been created by artist Tony Heaton, a former England Wheelchair Basketball player. Representing a stylised map of the British Isles, they're formed from the parts of sports wheelchairs and Paralympic runners' blades. They're mounted on lecterns created by Paralympic Opening Ceremony designer, Jon Bausor.
- Lou Birks is a writer/director, her film, Paralympia, was commissioned specially for the Ceremony. She founded the not-for-profit production company, Pie Films, in 2000.
- Eight members of the Great Britain U22 Wheelchair Basketball team carry the Paralympic Flag: Billy Bridge, Harry Brown, Emmanuel Filson, James MacSorley, Philip Pratt, Richard Sargent, Gregg Warburton and Joseph Williams.
- The team of Royal Navy, Army and Royal Air Force personnel raise the Flag: Able Seaman Lismore, Lance Corporal Peelo, Corporal Penman.
- The Queen's words are sign-language interpreted by Zane Hema.
- The oath takers are: athlete Liz Johnson, 2008 Paralympic Swimming medallist; official Richard Allcroft, Wheelchair Rugby technical delegate and judge; and coach David Hunter, Paralympic equestrian coach.

Music


- The Paralympic Flag is processed past the Presidential Box to music from Gustav Holst's 'The Planet' suite, Jupiter.
- The Paralympic Anthem ,'Hymn de l'Avenir' (Hymn to the Future), was composed by Thierry Darnis and is here heard in a new arrangement by Martin Koch recorded by the LSO.

Speeches

Speeches are made by Sebastian Coe, Chair of the London Organising Committee, and Sir Philip Craven MBE, President of the International Paralympic Committee. Both speeches are signlanguage interpreted.

Raising the Paralympic Flag

Eight members of the Great Britain U22 Wheelchair Basketball team enter the Stadium carrying the Paralympic Flag. The Flag is raised by Royal Navy, Army and Royal Air Force personnel.



Paralympia

As the Paralympic Anthem is played Paralympia, a short film by Lou Birks, a disabled film-maker, is played on the Stadium screens.

Background notes

- Sebastian Coe Chair of the London 2012 Organising Committee won two gold and two silver medals over successive Olympic Games – 1980 and 1984. In 1979 he broke three different world records in 41 days and his rivalry with fellow middle-distance runner Steve Ovett is one of the great Olympic stories.
- Sir Philip Craven, MBE President of the International Paralympic Committee – represented Great Britain at Wheelchair Basketball at five Games, 1972–88. Vastly experienced, both as an athlete and progressive administrator, he received a knighthood in 2005. This is his third Summer Games since becoming President of the IPC in 2001.
- The Paralympic Flag is created from three asymmetrical crescents (Agitos, meaning 'I move' in Latin). The crescents are red, green and blue the most popular colours of nations' flags and are arranged in a circular formation as a symbol of the IPC's role in bringing the athletes of the world together. The Paralympic Flag was first seen at Athens 2004.
- An athlete first swore an oath on behalf of his peers in 1964. An official has also taken an oath since 1980. These are the first Games at which a coach will join them in pledging their commitment to the ideals of the Paralympic Movement, sportsmanship and impartiality.

Brave New World

Duration: 00:05:35

Miranda returns in a scene which starts in a Stadium-sized library as she investigates the twin themes of the Ceremony: reason and rights. They are brought together through images of learning and empowerment, alongside Paralympian aerial performances.

An explosion activates the central umbrella/northern hemisphere, which begins to lift and transform, while the celestial sphere becomes an overhead reading light. It reveals a large open book, displaying the text of *The Universal Declaration of Human Rights*. Miranda and the volunteer cast are reading books, while the Stadium screens show images of people engaged in reading in various locations across the UK.

Stephen Hawking reminds us of the importance of knowledge: 'The greatest enemy of knowledge is not ignorance, it is the illusion of knowledge.'

Soprano Elin Manahan Thomas performs Handel's 'Eternal Source of Light Divine'. As she sings, a Stadium-wide sunrise is created by the overhead hemisphere splitting into seven fragments, reflecting light across the seated athletes and audience.

Encapsulating the Enlightenment theme, six Paralympians fly towards the celestial sphere. They each represent their individual sports. Meanwhile, the pixel screen shows an expanding vision of sunlight. Seeing the Paralympians both above her and surrounding the field of play, Miranda recites the 'brave new world' speech from Shakespeare's *The Tempest*, marvelling at 'how beauteous mankind is'.

Cast and creatives

- The volunteer cast of 150 includes 46 children from three schools in the six east London Host Boroughs. One of these is Trinity School, the only special school in Barking and Dagenham, they serve the special educational needs of over 265 disabled children and young people aged 3–19.
- 74-year-old volunteer reader Maureen Ryan didn't have a television in 1948 but managed to watch the Olympics on film.
- Dee Wilson, a reader in this section, encouraged her daughter Kathryn Matthews and son William Wilson to audition for the Ceremony, all made it through and are performing tonight.

Music

- 'Eternal Source of Light Divine', by George Frideric Handel, was written to commemorate the birthday of Queen Anne in 1713. It encapsulates the spirit of the Enlightenment and is performed here by Welsh soprano Elin Manahan Thomas with LSO trumpeter Phil Cobb. See p43 for lyrics.
- Handel was a German-born British Baroque composer, famous for his operas, oratorios, anthems and organ concertos. Born in 1685, he's regarded as one of the greatest composers of all time, with works such as 'Water Music', 'Music for the Royal Fireworks' and 'Messiah' remaining popular.

Readers

The central umbrella lifts with papers and smoke bursting out, transforming into a reading light over an open 'book stage' that displays text from *The Universal Declaration of Human Rights*. The screens show images of people reading in various locations across the UK.

Sunrise moment

During the soprano performance by Elin Manahan Thomas a Stadium-wide sunrise takes place as the overhead structure is split into seven fragments, each reflecting light across the Stadium. This is echoed on the audience pixel screen.

Paralympians take flight

Six Paralympians, bathed in gold and each representing their individual sport, fly in above the seated athletes towards the celestial sphere. The Paralympians are: Robert Barrett – Athletics; Kay Forshaw – Wheelchair Tennis; Tanni Grey-Thompson – Athletics; Tony Griffin – Javelin; Ian Rose – Judo; Marc Woods – Swimming.





Background notes

- The most influential writer in English literature, William Shakespeare was born in 1564 in Stratford-upon-Avon. *The Tempest* was probably written in 1610–11, and is most likely the last play written entirely by Shakespeare.
- The main stage exactly represents the text of *The Universal Declaration of Human Rights*, used here with kind permission of the United Nations.
- The Universal Declaration of Human Rights is a milestone document in the history of human rights. It was proclaimed by the UN General Assembly in 1948 as a common standard of achievements for all people and all nations. It has been translated into more than 300 languages and dialects.
- Works scattered around the book stage include: Stephen Hawking's The Grand Design, Broken Symmetries and the Mass of Gauge Vector Mesons by British theoretical physicist Peter Higgs, Dialogo di Galileo Galilei, Longitude, an imaginary title by John Harrison (included as Harrison is a constant reference in this sequence), Micrographia by Robert Hooke and Newton's Principia Mathematica.

Navigation

Duration: 00:10:00

Miranda boards an upturned umbrella boat and embarks on her voyage of discovery. As she departs, a page opens on the book stage propelling the little boat out to sea.

Stephen Hawking reminds Miranda that there are no boundaries to human endeavour and, as she sets sail, she encounters a whale, a flock of seagull books and an orrery (mechanical model of the solar system) to help her find her way.

She gets caught up in a 'storm of ideas', which are picked up and illustrated in the pixel screen as words and text from *The Universal Declaration of Human Rights*.

Ziya Azazi, a contemporary whirling dervish dancer, becomes the eye of the storm on top of the orrery. The choreography is echoed by the cast, who create a whirling storm of movement around the field of play in a giant geometric formation.

As the storm dies down, our attention is directed towards Birdy, a young and emerging singer-songwriter. She sings 'Bird Gerhl', written and composed by Antony Hegarty. Twenty sway pole performers sign the song. The song communicates a universal desire for flight and self-realisation that is echoed in live performance and screen imagery by Deaf and disabled professional aerial performers.

A solo dance performance by David Toole begins at ground level. An aerial ballet by 20 Deaf and disabled professional cast members, on four structures reminiscent of bird cages, takes place overhead. David takes flight across the Stadium and, as he reaches the south of the Stadium, Miranda also takes flight from the boat as she too becomes a bird, flying back to the central book stage.

The pixel screen projections in this sequence include references to Greenwich, and images from cartography and navigation at sea.

Cast and creatives

- Ziya Azazi is a contemporary whirling dervish dancer. Dervish turning is a potent method for experiencing inner stillness and the opening of the heart. In the Middle Ages, Dervish communities served a central role in social, religious and political life throughout central Islamic lands. See biography p36
- David Toole is a leading disabled dancer and performer. He's appeared with companies such as Candoco, DV8, National Theatre of Wales and Graeae. See biography p38
- 370 volunteer performers. One of these is Sharon O'Callaghan-Evans, who lives and works a stone's throw from the Stadium. Having lost much of her sight in September last year she auditioned for the Ceremony and at every rehearsal felt an unbelievable sense of community and inclusion. She is extremely proud to be performing tonight.
- The orrery is driven by David Butler, who found an unexploded bomb when 11 years old and lost both legs and a hand. David is the only disabled driver worldwide to have qualified for both an international race and an International Rally Licence and has competed in over 600 motorsport events, including World Championship rallies. He's Chairman of the British Motor Sports Association for the Disabled.

Music

- Known by her stage name 'Birdy', Jasmine van den Bogaerde is a 16-yearold emerging singer-songwriter. Last year she had a UK top 20 hit with her version of Bon Iver's 'Skinny Love'. See biography p36
- 'Bird Gerhl' was written by Antony Hegarty of Antony & The Johnsons.

Upturned umbrella

An upturned umbrella boat, reminiscent of the one used by the famous children's book character Winnie-the-Pooh, takes Miranda on a voyage of discovery in which she encounters seagull books, a whale and an orrery (mechanical model of the solar system). As the boat departs, a page of the book stage unfolds in wave-like form.



Storm/Whirlers

A storm of ideas develops with the pixel screen showing text from *The Universal Declaration of Human Rights*. Contemporary whirling dervish, Ziya Azazi, becomes the eye of the storm as the cast and pyro effects accompany Ziya's performance to create a whirling storm.

Birdy/David Toole

The whirling dancers lie down around the umbrella boat in a crescent formation as the storm calms. Birdy begins to sing 'Bird Gerhl', accompanied by a solo dance performance from David Toole, on the 'moon stage', and an aerial ballet presented on four bird cage structures with Deaf and disabled aerial performers appearing to activate the movement.

Background notes

- This segment takes various ideas from navigation, reminding us that for thousands of years scientists, mathematicians and astronomers have used their creativity and imagination to reach beyond the boundaries of the known world.
- The Prime Meridian of the world, or zero degrees of longitude, is located a few miles away in Greenwich. At the Royal Observatory it's possible to stand with a foot in both eastern and western hemispheres – everywhere on earth can be measured by its distance east or west of this line.
- An orrery is a mechanical device that illustrates the relative positions and motions of the planets and moons in the solar system.

Gravity

Duration: 00:07:15

Miranda lands in the middle of a maze of books in a formal 17th-century garden and learns about British scientist and mathematician Sir Isaac Newton's discoveries concerning gravity and his three laws of motion. Performers enter dressed in stylised grassy costumes to create the garden and maze.

Miranda finds an apple in the maze and, when she bites into it, all 62,000 spectators do so with her – creating one enormous, simultaneous apple crunch.

A huge golden apple drops from above and we enter a world of gravitational choreography played out by dancers, jugglers, skaters, tandem riders and performers with wheelbarrows containing giant helium-filled apples that rise up to create an orbit of planetary objects. The riders on the back of each tandem are visually impaired volunteer performers.

There's a large Newton's cradle in which three disabled professional cast members perform, as well as a giant telescope connecting us to Newton's observation of the solar system. The telescope shines out as a revolving spotlight and we're transported into a contemporary urban environment in London.

'When Isaac Newton saw an apple fall to the ground, he suddenly realised that it must be the same force that holds together the beautiful system of the sun, the planets and the comets. This gravity is the same force that can draw us into a black hole, never to return!' **Stephen Hawking**

Construction of the maze

The performers, in their stylised grassy costumes, create a maze which Miranda explores.



Apple crunch

At the centre of the maze Miranda finds an apple. As she takes a bite, all 62,000 spectators do so with her, creating one enormous, simultaneous apple crunch.

A huge golden apple

A huge golden apple drops and we enter a world of gravitational choreography. We see jugglers, skaters, tandem riders and performers with wheelbarrows containing giant helium-filled apples.

Background notes

- Newton's law of universal gravitation was famously inspired by watching an apple dropping in his garden at Woolsthorpe Manor, Lincolnshire. Sir Isaac Newton (1642–1727) was an English physicist, mathematician, astronomer, natural philosopher, alchemist and theologian. His monograph *Principia Mathematica*, published in 1687, describes universal gravitation and the three laws of motion that dominated the scientific view of the physical universe for the next three centuries.
- A Newton's cradle named after Sir Isaac Newton consists of identical spheres hung in a frame whose motion demonstrates transferral of energy and the conservation of momentum.
- Miranda is wearing a shirt printed with words from The Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

Collision

Duration: 00:03:30

Ian McKellen looks up at the Celestial Sphere and speaks Prospero's words from *The Tempest*, 'I find my zenith doth depend on a most auspicious star.'

Up to this point, the Ceremony has focused on historic journeys of discovery. Now, Ian McKellen and Miranda walk together towards an exciting future and current scientific endeavours, such as the Large Hadron Collider.

We're back in 2012, and Stephen Hawking explains that British scientists have been transforming our perception of the universe through the experimental work taking place on the Large Hadron Collider at CERN. He's joined by musicians Orbital.

A surge of red tents and protestors with loudhailers and protest banners enter, in anticipation of the next segment.

'The Large Hadron Collider at CERN is the largest most complex machine in the world, possibly the universe. By smashing particles together at enormous energies, it recreates the conditions of the Big Bang. The recent discovery of what looks like the "Higgs particle" is a triumph of human endeavour and international collaboration. It will change our perception of the world and has the potential to offer insights into a complete theory of everything.'

Music

Background notes

British scientists and engineers have made a leading contribution to the Large Hadron Collider, the world's largest particle accelerator. It was built by the European Organisation for Nuclear Research (CERN), with the aim of allowing physicists to test different high-energy theories, in particular the existence of the Higgs particle, named after the British physicist Peter Higgs. These tests and the results they obtain tell us about the fundamental structure of matter, the forces holding it together and the origins of the universe.

Empowerment

Duration: 00:03:35

Miranda's journey of Enlightenment is nearing completion. She uses the lessons she's learned en route to become a human rights protestor.

lan Dury's 'Spasticus Autisticus' is performed by Graeae Theatre Company, accompanied by energised protest-style mass choreography. It's followed by more music from Orbital.

This energy drives the emergence of a large-scale reproduction of Marc Quinn's celebrated sculpture, 'Alison Lapper Pregnant'.

Miranda rises up towards the celestial sphere with it in order to 'break her glass ceiling'. As she raises her walking stick, images of shattering glass appear on the pixel screen. She has reached her destination.

- Graeae Theatre Company is the UK's flagship disabled-led theatre company. See biography p36
- 275 volunteer performers.

Music

- 'Spasticus Autisticus' is a disability anthem written by the late lan Dury and Chaz Jankal, and originally performed by lan Dury and The Blockheads. It was written in 1981 for the International Year of Disabled People as a celebratory punk anthem and plea for understanding. The song also features in Graeae's production of *Reasons to be Cheerful*, which will be presented at the Southbank Centre during the Paralympic Games as part of 'Unlimited: the Revelation Starts Here', a national programme of artistic performances led by Deaf and disabled artists for the London 2012 Festival.
- The lead singer of the band singing 'Spasticus Autisticus' is John Kelly.

'Spasticus Autisticus'

Protest banners, mass choreography, sway pole choreography and musical performance by actors from Graeae Theatre Company creates a moment of celebratory protest in the Stadium.

'Alison Lapper Pregnant'

A large-scale reproduction of Marc Quinn's celebrated sculpture, 'Alison Lapper Pregnant', emerges from the book stage.

Breaking the glass ceiling

Miranda 'breaks the glass ceiling' with her walking stick and we see shattering glass on the pixel screen around the Stadium.

Background notes

- Marc Quinn's 3.5m-high marble sculpture of disabled artist Alison Lapper occupied the fourth plinth in London's Trafalgar Square, 2005–7. British artist Marc's work displays a preoccupation with the mutability of the body and the dualisms that define human life: spiritual and physical, surface and depth, cerebral and sexual.
- Alison Lapper MBE was born in Burton-on-Trent, Staffordshire. She uses photography, digital imaging and painting to, as she says, question physical normality and beauty, using herself as a subject. She paints with her mouth.

Enlightenment

Duration: 00:08:15

A short, emotionally charged film shows the journey of the Paralympic Torch to the Stadium.

Stephen Hawking sets the Paralympic Games in a wider context of human endeavour and achievement. And pyrotechnics in the colours of the Paralympic logo are set off around the Stadium roof.

At the end of the film, Royal Marine Commando Joe Townsend – an aspiring Paralympic triathlete – is revealed with the Torch at the top of the ArcelorMittal Orbit, just outside the Stadium, and descends on a zip wire onto the field of play.

Joe Townsend hands the Torch to David Clarke – a visually impaired athlete competing in the ParalympicsGB 5-a-side Football team – who takes the Flame towards the Cauldron. He passes it to the final Torchbearer, Margaret Maughan – Britain's first gold medallist at the first Paralympic Games at Rome 1960 – who lights a single tiny flame within one of the copper petals, triggering the ignition of all the other petals.

The elegant stems gently rise towards each other and converge to create one great Flame of unity. Meanwhile, golden dandelion seeds spread around the audience pixel screen, echoing the imagery from the natural world that inspired Thomas Heatherwick's Cauldron design.

Cast and creatives

– The three Torchbearers:

Royal Marine Joe Townsend is a member of the British Paralympic Association's Paralympic Inspiration Programme for Rio 2016, the programme designed to help aspiring Paralympians understand the unique environment of a Games. Joe joined the Marines at 17 and was five months into his first tour of Afghanistan when he lost both his legs after treading on an IED. During his rehabilitation at Headley Court, he tried Triathlon and showed immense talent. He's now aiming for Rio 2016, where Triathlon will feature for the first time.

David Clarke is the longest-serving member of the of the visually impaired ParalympicsGB 5-a-side Football team and was part of the team that finished fifth at the 2008 Beijing Paralympic Games.

Margaret Maughan holds the distinction of being Britain's first gold medallist at the first Paralympic Games at Rome 1960. She won gold in women's Archery and also took part in 50m Backstroke Swimming.

'The Paralympic Games is about transforming our perception of the world. We are all different, there is no such thing as a standard or run-of-the-mill human being, but we share the same human spirit. What is important is that we have the ability to create. This creativity can take many forms, from physical achievement to theoretical physics. However difficult life may seem there is always something you can do, and succeed at.

Lighting the Cauldron

The Flame is passed from Joe Townsend (who's hoping to compete in the Rio 2016 Games) to David Clarke (who's competing this year) to Margaret Maughan (winner of a gold medal at Rome 1960), who lights the Cauldron.



Background notes

- Last Wednesday, four Flames were lit at the summit of the highest peaks in the four UK nations – Scafell Pike (England), Slieve Donard (Northern Ireland), Ben Nevis (Scotland) and Snowdon/Yr Wyddfa (Wales). Yesterday, the Flames were united in Stoke Mandeville – spiritual birthplace of the Paralympic Movement – to create the London 2012 Paralympic Flame. As the Torch enters the Stadium this evening, it will carry the spirit of Paralympic Enlightenment and bring the nations of the world together.
- The Cauldron was created by Thomas Heatherwick, one of Britain's most creative designers. His work includes the internationally renowned UK Pavilion at the Shanghai World Expo 2010, the Rolling Bridge in Paddington and London's new red double-decker bus. His studio's projects are characterised by a focus on innovative architectural solutions for cities and a dedication to craftsmanship and materials.
- The Cauldron is made up of more than 200 petals, 166 of which are inscribed with the names of competing nations. After the Games, each competing team will take home one of the petals that makes up the Cauldron, and the Cauldron will cease to exist. Like a flower that blooms for the duration of the competition, it's a temporary representation of the extraordinary transitory community that is the Paralympic Games.
- The ArcelorMittal Orbit is a 115m-high sculpture and observation tower in the Olympic Park. Designed by Anish Kapoor, it's Britain's largest piece of public art and is intended to be a permanent lasting legacy of London 2012.

The dandelion seeds shown on the audience pixel screen moving around the Stadium from the Cauldron create a transition into the final segment – a special performance of the inspirational song 'I Am What I Am'.

It's performed by Beverley Knight, Lizzie Emeh from Heart n Soul, song signing diva Caroline Parker, and six backing vocalists. Before the show, the audience was taught to sign, 'I am somebody, I am what I am'.

During the song, the entire cast form the shape of an Agitos (the crescent shape seen on the IPC flag) around the central stage.

In a triumphant finale, the audience and cast join in with the singing and signing learnt in the pre-show of 'I am somebody, I am what I am' as a pyrotechnic display erupts from the roof of the Stadium and across the Olympic Park.

Beverley has been one of the UK's most consistent artists over the past 15 years, with several top 10 gold and platinum selling albums. Her latest album, *Soul UK*, pays tribute to British soul artists who inspire her. She's won three MOBO Awards and has an MBE for services to British music and charity.

Denise Leigh
