Thank you for your interest in joining GPI Board. In the following pages, we have provided an overview of GPI's structure as well as descriptions of each position. We are looking for dedicated and enthusiastic individuals with creative ideas who are first and foremost passionate about poverty alleviation.

Since its initiation in 2007, GPI has worked hard to fill the need we perceived for a broad international development (ID) student group on campus. We have organized a conference, an annual Poverty Action Week, numerous lectures, student projects, and now have field project in Mexico and India. GPI has a much broader role than a student group, however. We have brought the larger ID community on campus into closer collaboration and communication with each other, and serve as a starting point for students interested in international development to discover the growing range of ID resources at MIT.

If you are at all interested in getting involved with GPI this year, you are highly encouraged to come to our board meetings and get in touch with current officers. In GPI we particularly value new ideas and new perspectives, so if you have not been involved with GPI before, we welcome you to apply and hope you will be able to help us further strengthen the ID movement at MIT.

May 5th-May 18th: Shadowing/Transition

The Structure of GPI

GPI Board is structured to correspond to the organization's three main aims:

- **Education Team:** Works to inform the MIT community of issues relating to poverty and what people are doing to fight it by bringing in speakers and presenters.
- **Outreach Team:** Connects students, faculty, and organizations in order to share the resources and knowledge that each group specializes in. Reaches out to non-profit organizations and other colleges across the globe.
- Action Team: Works to give MIT students tangible opportunities to work on and create international development projects while still at MIT.
- Komaza Team: Produces a16-page, full-color magazine 1-2 times each semester featuring the international development work of MIT students

Detailed descriptions of each board position are on the following page.

NOTE - while GPI board does have separate positions, we operate very much as a large group where anyone can contribute in any way they want. For example, if you are not on the education team, you can still plan events if you're excited about something. If you're not on the action team, you can still travel abroad if you hear about opportunities!
