### FSU In The College World Series

- Florida State is making its 21st trip to the College World Series in 2012 - the most of any other school in this year's field - and third in the last five years. FSU is seeking its first national title.
- The Seminoles own an all-time record of 26-40 at the CWS. The 26 wins are the 11th most in NCAA history.
- Fifteen of the 21 trips made by Florida State out to Omaha have been under the direction of head coach Mike Martin.
- Under Martin, the Seminoles have posted a record of 18-28.
- Since expanding the bracket to 64 teams and naming national seeds beginning in 1999, this year marks the fourth time that FSU has advanced to the CWS as a national seed and the first as the No. 3 overall seed.
- Florida State owns a record of 8-12 in opening round games of the College World Series. The Seminoles have dropped three straight and five of their last six opening round games of the CWS - last win vs. Texas A&M in 1999.
- Friday will mark the fourth time FSU will play an opening round game against a current member of the Pac-12 Conference and second time the Seminoles will face Arizona to open the CWS. FSU is 1-2 in opening round games against the Pac-12 with its lone win coming against Arizona back in 1970 (W, 4-0).
- FSU opened the 2008 series against Stanford. The Cardinal broke up a tied game in the ninth scoring 11 runs en route to a 16-5 victory.

### FSU IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

- Florida State made its 35th consecutive trip to NCAA Regionals, which is the second longest streak in the nation behind only Miami (40).
- Overall, this is Florida State now has 50 NCAA Regional appearances, which is the second-most ever trailing only Texas. The Seminoles and Longhorns are the only two schools to make 45 or more tournament appearances.
- The Seminoles are 172-111 all-time in NCAA Tournament play, a record that includes 20 previous trips to the College World Series (26-40).
- Florida State entered the 2012 NCAA Tournament as a top eight national seed for the eighth time since 1999.
- The Seminoles have posted a record of 96-35 (.733) while playing at home during NCAA Regional and Super Regional action including a mark of 44-17 in the 21st century. FSU is 76-76 on the road in the NCAA Tournament.
- Only two teams (Texas and Miami) have more wins all-time in NCAA Tournament play and the College World Series than Florida State. The Longhorns lead all schools with 225 wins followed by Miami (177) and then FSU (172).

## NOTING FSU IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

\* Head Coach Mike Martin has led his team to the NCAA's in each of his 33 years on the bench at Florida State. He has also led FSU to 15 College World Series appearances including three trips in the last five years.

\* Florida State is making a trip to Omaha to play in the College World Series for the 21st time in school history and for the 15th time under head coach Mike Martin.

\* Thirteen of FSU's 21 trips to the College World Series have started in a regional played in its back yard including 2012 where the Seminoles were a perfect 5-0 through the first two rounds of the tournament. In 2008, the Seminoles went 6-2 at home during both regional and super regional competition, while FSU advanced to the CWS in 2010 after sweeping through the Norwich, Conn. Regional and then defeating Vanderbilt in the Super Regionals in Tallahassee.

\* Florida State earned a spot in the Super Regionals for the 12th time in school history in 2012. The Seminoles are 5-7 in series victories during super regional action defeating Auburn (2-0) in 1999, Miami (2-1) in 2000, Wichita State (2-1) in 2008, Vanderbilt (2-1) in 2010 and Stanford (2-0) in 2012.

\* Florida State trails only Texas for the most NCAA Tournament appearances. The Longhorns have made 55 appearances all-time to lead the nation followed by FSU with 50.

\* Since the NCAA began selecting 16 host sites in 1999, the home team has won the Regional 155 times in 224 opportunities (69.2%) including 10 of the 16 host sites in 2012.

\* Florida State ranks first all-time in NCAA Regional and Super Regional play with 147 wins, surpassing Texas (143) who led the nation heading into the 2012 NCAA Tournament.

\* No team has played more NCAA Tournament games than FSU with 218 in program history.

\* Since the bracket expanded to 64 teams in 1999, the top eight national seeds have advanced to the College World Series 69 times out of 112 opportunities. Six of the last eight CWS champions (2004-08, 2010) have been unseeded in the tournament. South Carolina (2011) was the last seeded school to win the title. The CWS features four seeded teams in 2012 including #1 Florida, #2 UCLA, #3 Florida State and #8 South Carolina.

\* Florida State enters the 2012 NCAA Tournament as a top eight national seed for the eighth time since 1999. The Seminoles earned the No. 3 national seed this year for the first time in school history. FSU has advanced to the CWS as a national seed four times in 1999 (#2), 2000 (#6), 2008 (#4) and 2012 (#3). The Seminoles were unseeded when advancing for the CWS in 2010.

\* FSU's all-time national seeds include:

- #1 - 2 (2002 - Super Regionals; 2003 - Super Regionals)
- #2 - 1 (1999 - CWS)
- #3 - 1 (2012 - CWS)
- #4 - 1 (2008 - CWS)
- #5 - 1 (2011 - Super Regionals)
- #6 - 2 (2000 - CWS; 2007 - Regionals)

\* All eight top seeds have never advanced to the CWS. Seven of the eight top seeds have advanced twice in 1999 and 2001. Six national seeds advanced to the CWS in 2011 and only four in 2012.

\* Florida State has faced 10 schools that were selected to this year's field of 64. The Seminoles have posted a 19-9 record claiming six series victories. FSU played four No. 1 seeds - Miami (3-0), Stanford (2-0), Virginia (3-1), NC State (2-1) and Florida (0-3); three No. 2 seeds - Georgia Tech (3-1), UCF (2-0) and Clemson (1-3); one No. 3 seed - Samford (2-0); one No. 4 seed - UAB (1-0).

\* The last time Florida State opened the CWS with a win was 1999 when the Garnet & Gold defeated Texas A&M 7-3. FSU has dropped three straight CWS openers.

\* Florida State and Arizona are no strangers when it comes to playing in Omaha as the two teams will square-off on Friday night in game two of the CWS for the sixth time in the history of the series. It also marks the second time the two schools will meet in an opening game of the CWS as FSU defeated Arizona 4-0 in 1970.

\* Arizona leads the all-time series at 6-5, but has held the upper hand in Omaha winning four of the five previous meetings including three straight.

\* The last time these two schools met in Omaha was in the 1986 championship game as the Wildcats came away with a 10-2 victory to claim their third national title.

\* FSU and Arizona last met in 1991 for a three-game series in Tucson. The Seminoles won game one (15-8) before the Wildcats captured the series with wins in games two (7-3) and three (3-2).

\* Florida State and UCLA have never faced each other. Although in 2010, the two schools were in the same bracket in the CWS paired with TCU and Florida. The Bruins emerged from that side of the bracket that year playing South Carolina for the national title.

\* The Seminoles own a record of 46-32 all-time against current schools from the Pac-12 Conference.

\* FSU has faced seven of the 11 member schools that play baseball from the Pac-12 including six in the postseason. The Seminoles own a record of 12-11 all-time against the Pac-12 in the NCAA Tournament with 17 of those games coming in the College World Series.

\* The last Pac-12 school FSU faced in the College World Series was Stanford in 2008, a game the Cardinal won 16-5 thanks to an 11-run ninth inning.

\* The Seminoles are familiar with the America East Conference having faced Maine five times over the last two years with FSU winning all five games. In fact, Florida State is a perfect 9-0 against the Black Bears all-time.

\* Florida State outscored Maine 34-2 following its three-game series back in March as the Seminoles posted two shutouts. Stony Brook went 6-0 against Maine as two of those wins came in the America East Tournament including the championship game. The Seawolves outscored the Black Bears 54-28.

\* Stony Brook and Florida State have faced four common opponents this year in Rhode Island, Maine, Miami and UCF. FSU went a combined 11-0 against those teams, while SBU was 10-1.

### Nice To Meet You

- FSU has fared well when facing a team for the first time posting an all-time record of 180-47 (.793).
- The Seminoles have never faced two of the three teams in their side of the 2012 CWS bracket in UCLA and Stony Brook.
- FSU faced two schools for the first time in 2012 and posted victories in each game defeating North Georgia College (6-0) and Rhode Island (17-6).
- FSU is 31-17 all-time when facing a team for the first time in the postseason including a mark of 9-9 when meeting for the first time in the CWS.
- The last first-time opponent FSU faced in the CWS was TCU in the opening round game of the 2010 series. The Horned Frogs went on to win that game 8-1.

### Familiar Faces

- Even though Florida State and Arizona have not faced each other since 1991, the coaches manning the dugouts for both schools are quite familiar with each other.
- Florida State head coach Mike Martin and Arizona head coach Andy Lopez used to meet on a regular basis when Lopez was the head coach of Florida from 1995 to 2001.
- Martin led the Seminoles to a 15-13 mark against the Gators with Lopez at the helm in those seven years in Gainesville. But Lopez won the only two meetings against Martin in the NCAA Tournament as the former Gator coach led Florida to a pair of victories over FSU in the 1996 College World Series.

### Déjà Vu

- Florida State wrapped up the Regional and Super Regional rounds of the 2012 NCAA Tournament without a loss as the Seminoles posted a perfect 5-0 record outscoring the competition 50-12.
- It marked only the second time that Florida State had gone through the first two rounds undefeated since the NCAA went to the Super Regional format in 1999.
- In 1999, FSU defeated The Citadel, Jacksonville and Providence in regional play followed by a two-game sweep of Auburn in the Super Regional.
- Ironically enough 1999 was the last time FSU played for the national title as the Seminoles fell to Miami 6-5.
- In the CWS that year, Florida State opened the series with a victory over Texas A&M and then dropped game two against Stanford. The Seminoles proceeded to win their next three games including a dramatic 14-11 victory over the Cardinal in 13 innings leaving FSU and Miami in the finals.

### Super Regional Recap

- With the two-game sweep over Stanford in the Tallahassee Super Regional, Florida State improved to 13-17 in the Super Regionals including a mark of 12-11 on its home turf.
- The Seminoles won the first game of a Super Regional for just the fourth time in 12 all-time appearances and are now 4-0 in advancing to the CWS when winning game one.
- The 35 runs scored in the two games against the Cardinal were the most runs scored by Florida State in the Super Regionals. The eight runs allowed were the second fewest.
- Devon Travis had a career-night in game one against Stanford finishing 3-for-5 with two home runs, a single, three runs scored and six RBI. He tallied a career-high with six RBI (tied a team season-high and tied another with three runs scored. It also marked the first multi-home run game of his career.
- Jayce Boyd and Sherman Johnson each left the yard in game two against Stanford and both have six career postseason home runs to their credit.

- Leibrandt is 2-0 this postseason with wins over Samford and Stanford. Compton is 1-0.
- The 22 victories stand as the second most combined wins by a freshmen class in Florida State history. The record sits at 25 set in 2009 by Sean Gilmartin (12), Brian Busch (6), Hunter Scantling (3), Kris Castellanos (3) and Mark Peterson (1).

## **NCAA TALLAHASSEE REGIONAL NOTABLES**

\* Florida State went a perfect 3-0 in the 2012 Tallahassee Regional to extend its regional win streak to 16 victories in a row. The Seminoles' last loss in regional play dates back to the opening game of the 2008 Tallahassee Regional as Bucknell defeated FSU 7-0.

\* During FSU's 16-game regional win streak, the Seminoles have outscored the competition 198-67 reaching double-digit runs eight times and winning by nine or more runs six times, while holding the opposition under six runs over the last 12 games.

\* The Seminoles claimed their 28th Regional (or District) title in 50 all-time appearances.

\* FSU allowed just four runs, three earned, in its three tournament victories over UAB and Samford. It marked the fewest runs allowed in any Seminole postseason tournament (Regional/Super Regional/CWS).

\* Since the inception of Super Regional play in 1999, Florida State has advanced to the regional final every year - a streak that spans 14 years.

\* Since 1999, Florida State is 15-5 in the regional championship game and with the victory over Samford became the only school in the nation to advance to the Super Regionals the last five years in a row.

\* With a single-game, regional-high crowd of 3,736 in attendance at the regional championship game against Samford, the NCAA Tallahassee Regional drew 21,143 over six games, an average of 3,524 per game.

### **OPENING NCAA TOURNAMENT PLAY**

\* Florida State improved to 39-11 all-time in the opening round of the NCAA Tournament following the Seminoles' 2-1 victory over UAB.

\* FSU defeated Bethune-Cookman 6-5 in the opening round game in 2011. The Seminoles have won their last three regional openers.

\* Under head coach Mike Martin, FSU is 29-4 in the opening game of a regional. Prior to Martin's arrival, the Seminoles were 10-7.

### **RAMSEY HONORED AS REGIONAL MOP**

\* For the second year in a row, James Ramsey walked away from the Tallahassee Regional as the Most Outstanding Player. The senior captain finished the tournament hitting a team-best .444 (4-for-9) with three runs, a double, home run, six RBI and four walks.

\* Ramsey drove in both runs in FSU's 2-1 victory over UAB in the opening round of the 2012 Tallahassee Regional. It marked the third time this year that Ramsey has knocked in all of FSU's runs in a game - FIU (Feb. 25 - W, 3-1) & Florida (March 27 - L, 1-4).

\* The Alpharetta, Ga., native drove in half of FSU's runs in an 8-1 victory over Samford when he connected on his first career grand slam in the top of the seventh. It was Ramsey's team leading 13th home run of the season, 34th over his career and the sixth grand slam hit by a Seminole this year.

### **TALLAHASSEE REGIONAL ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAM**

\* FSU placed four student-athletes on the Tallahassee Regional All-Tournament team including Sherman Johnson (3B - .250), James Ramsey (OF - .444), Josh Delp (OF - .400) and Brandon Leibrandt (P - 1-0, 0.00 ERA).

## **LEIBRANDT & COMPTON THROW GEMS**

\* FSU freshman Brandon Leibrandt established new career-highs for strikeouts (10) and innings pitched (8.0) in FSU's 8-1 victory over Samford.

\* The southpaw from Alpharetta, Ga., retired 23 of the last 24 batters that he faced and closed the game by retiring 15 consecutive Samford hitters.

\* Leibrandt's 10 strikeouts were the most by an FSU pitcher since Sean Gilmartin fanned 11 vs. UCF on May 6, 2011 in an 8-0 victory. It also marked the longest outing by an FSU starter this year.

\* Compton earned the win in the regional championship game against Samford and improved to 11-2 on the year. It marks the most wins by an FSU freshman since Sean Gilmartin posted 12 in 2009.

\* The right hander from Branson, Mo., has allowed two earned runs or fewer in 14 of his 16 starts, while yielding no runs three times.

\* Compton leads all freshmen nationally with 11 wins on the year and is tied for the fifth most wins in the nation. He is the only pitcher in the ACC to reach double-digit wins this year.

\* Both Leibrandt and Compton did not issue a walk in their start.

## **CLOSING MARK**

\* Florida State closer Robert Benincasa picked up saves in two of the Seminoles' three victories in the Tallahassee Regional. He worked a combined 2.0 shutout innings allowing one hit and no walks while striking out one.

\* The Tampa, Fla., native worked a 1-2-3 ninth inning in the regional championship game against Samford for his 15th saves of the season, which moved him into a tie for second on FSU's single-season list and tied for eighth on the career list.

\* Benincasa is 15-for-18 in save situations this year. Of his 15 saves, eight have come in one-run games, four in two-run games and three in three-run games.

## **GAGED ANIMAL**

\* Florida State's Gage Smith had an impressive run in the Tallahassee Regional working 5.2 shutout innings in two games. He allowed just three hits and two walks while striking out four.

\* Smith, who received nine stitches to his lower lip after being hit by a bat in pre-game of the Tallahassee Regional opener against UAB, came on in relief of FSU starter Scott Sitz and threw 3.2 shutout innings against the Blazers to pick-up the win.

\* The Tallahassee, Fla., native faced the minimum in 2.0 innings of work in the regional championship game against Samford.

**FSU By The Numbers**

- **1** - Florida State was ranked No. 1 for seven consecutive weeks by Baseball America. The Seminoles were ranked No. 1 by the USA Today/ESPN Coaches poll for six weeks, the NCBWA top 30 poll for five weeks and one week by Collegiate Baseball.
- **1** - FSU entered the ACC Tournament in Greensboro, N.C., as the No. 1 seed for the ninth time in school history.
- **3** - Florida State ranks third in the latest RPI rankings released by the NCAA on May 29. The Seminoles played the fifth toughest schedule according to WarrenNolan.com.
- **5** - The Seminoles placed a league-high five players on the All-ACC first and second teams including a league-best four on the first team.
- **5** - James Ramsey became the fifth player in Florida State history to win ACC Player of the Year accolades.
- **6** - For the sixth year in a row, FSU captured at least a share of the ACC Atlantic Division title.
- **7** - FSU has record seven shutouts this year.
- **7** - Head coach Mike Martin garnered ACC Coach of the Year accolades for the seventh time in his career.

- **12** - The Florida State outfield has registered 12 outfield assists through 63 games. Senior James Ramsey leads all players with four outfield assists on the year.
- **13** - FSU is 13-2 in one-run games this year.
- **13** - The Seminoles drew a season-high 13 walks in back-to-back games this year - 13-6 win over Hofstra and 16-9 victory over Jacksonville. FSU has reached double-digit walks seven times this season.
- **15** - Robert Benincasa has registered 15 saves as the Seminoles' closer. in 2012.
- **16** - Stephen McGee has been hit by a pitch a team-high 16 times in 2012. It stands as the fourth most HBP's in a single-season at FSU.
- **24** - Florida State tied the league record with 24 wins in ACC play this year. The Seminoles matched the record set by Clemson (2006) and FSU (2008).

- **28** - Jayce Boyd leads the Seminoles with 28 multi-hit games on the year. The junior first baseman is the only player with a five-hit game on the year and multiple four-hit games (3).
- **29** - Senior Sherman Johnson opened the season reaching base in 29 consecutive games. The streak ended Friday, April 6 at Georgia Tech.
- **40** - Florida State reached the 40-win plateau for the 35th year in a row.
- **50** - FSU is making its 50th NCAA Tournament appearance in 2012. The Seminoles join the Texas Longhorns as the only two schools with 50 or more postseason appearances all-time.
- **93** - Senior Brian Busch ranks 10th all-time at Florida State for career appearances with 93.
- **105** - Junior Justin Gonzalez did not start any of the three games against Rhode Island snapping his streak of consecutive starts at shortstop at 105 dating back to the start of the 2011 season.
- **111** - Junior Jayce Boyd did not start against North Georgia bringing to a close his consecutive games start streak at first base at 111 games.
- **128** - The Florida State offense has produced 128 doubles on the year including 94 in the last 46 games. The Seminoles are averaging 2.03 doubles per game in 2012.
- **183** - James Ramsey, Sherman Johnson and Stephen McGee have combined to draw 183 walks this year. It is the most walks of any trio in the ACC, while all three rank in the top four in the league. Johnson led the ACC in walks last year drawing 59 in 65 games.
- **196** - Seniors Sherman Johnson and James Ramsey are currently riding a streak of 196 consecutive starts in a Seminole uniform.
- **367** - Florida State leads the ACC with 367 walks through 63 games. That is 63 more than North Carolina who is second in the ACC with 304 walks.
- **600** - Florida State captured its 600th win since 2000 following a 6-0 victory over Maine on March 2. The Seminoles are the first school at the Division I level to eclipse 600 wins since 2000. FSU currently sits with 620 wins since 2000.
- **1700** - Head coach Mike Martin became just the third Division I coach and fourth overall to reach 1,700 career victories when the Seminoles defeated Georgia Tech 8-4 on Sunday, April 8.
- **4583** - Florida State entered the postseason averaging the seventh highest home attendance in the nation at 4,583 through 38 games.

## DIVISIONAL CROWN

- For the sixth year in a row, Florida State finished atop the ACC Atlantic Division claiming at least a share of the division title.
- Since the move to divisional play in 2006, FSU has captured at least a share of the division title in six of the seven years.
- Florida State has won the divisional title outright five times (2007-09, 2011-12), while sharing the title with Clemson in 2010.
- The Seminoles finished the season with a league record of 24-6 tying the ACC mark for victories. FSU joined the 2006 Clemson Tigers and 2008 Florida State Seminoles for the most wins in league history.
- FSU was picked to finish second in the division behind Clemson at the start of the season.

## ALL-ACC HONORS

- Florida State was honored with five student-athletes on the All-ACC first and second teams in 2012.
- James Ramsey, who was named an All-ACC first team honoree for the second year in a row, became the fifth Seminole in school history to garner Player of the Year accolades.
- The senior captain is the first Seminole to win the award since Buster Posey took home the individual honor in 2008. He becomes just the third Seminole outfielder to win the award joining J.D. Drew (1997) and John Ford-Griffin (2001).
- Jayce Boyd (1B), Devon Travis (2B) and Robert Benincasa (RP) joined Ramsey on the All-ACC first team as the Seminoles led all schools with


four first-team honorees.

- Freshman right hander Mike Compton (SP) was named to the second team.
- It marks the second year in a row in which the Seminoles were honored with four first-team honorees.
- Head coach Mike Martin was named the league's top coach for the seventh time in his career. He led the Seminoles to the top seed in the ACC tournament for the ninth time in school history, while tying the league record for wins with 24.

- The seven Seminole student-athletes taken in this year's draft marks FSU's largest draft class since 2008. The same year that Buster Posey was drafted with the fifth overall pick by the San Francisco Giants.

**GREAT ACC SEASON**

- Florida State finished ACC play with a record of 24-6, matching the league record held by two teams - Clemson (2006) & FSU (2008).
- FSU posted its best winning percentage in the ACC following the 1999 season when the Seminoles finished with a record of 22-2 (.917).
- Since the move to a 30-game league schedule in 2006, the Seminoles recorded its best finish in 2008 finishing atop the Atlantic Division with a school record mark of 24-6 tying the record for the most wins in the ACC. The record was matched once again in 2012.
- This season marked the fifth time in school history that Florida State recorded 20 or more league wins since joining the ACC in 1992.

**FSU AS THE NO. 1 SEED**

- For the ninth time in school history, Florida State entered the ACC Baseball Championship as the No. 1 seed.
- The Seminoles are 24-17 as the top seed in the ACC Tournament including a mark of 1-3 in the finals.
- This year marked the fourth time Florida State played the ACC Tournament in the state of North Carolina as the No. 1 seed.

**RAMSEY AMONG NATION'S ELITE**

- Entering the College World Series, Florida State senior captain is making a strong case to be a first team All-American
- Ramsey ranks in the top 10 in 10 offensive categories in the ACC - leading in four - runs, total bases, on-base pct and slugging pct.
- The Alpharetta, Ga., native ranks in the top 50 nationally in 12 categories.
- Ramsey is the only player in the country to rank in the top 11 in on-base pct. (3rd), runs (3rd), walks (4th), runs per game (5th), and slugging percentage (11th).
- In fact, Ramsey is the only player from the 'Big

Six' conferences to rank in the top 10 in each of the five offensive categories listed above.

**SHUTOUTS ON THE YEAR**

- Florida State registered its seventh shutout of the season on May 2 in Jacksonville when the Seminoles blanked the Dolphins 3-0 to sweep the regular season series from JU.
- The seven shutouts are the most since equaling that total in 2006.
- The Seminoles posted four shutouts through the first 15 games to start the season marking the most by a Seminole pitching staff since 1980.
- Since head coach Mike Martin took over as head coach in 1980, the Seminole pitching staff had recorded three shutouts through the first 15 games a total of five times - 1995, 1998, 2006, 2011 and 2012.

**OUCH! THAT HURTS**

- The Seminoles have reached base a total of 95 times courtesy of a hit-by-pitch through 63 games this year.
- FSU ranks second in the ACC to Virginia, who has been hit a league-best 98 times.
- Five Seminoles have been hit by a pitch at least nine times this year. Stephen McGee leads all Seminoles with 16 followed by Stephen Spradling with 12. Justin Gonzalez has 11, Seth Miller with 10 and James Ramsey has been hit nine times.
- The Seminoles registered a season-high six HBP in a 2-0 win over Rhode Island (4/28). It was the most HBPs in a game since FSU was hit six times against UCF in the NCAA Tallahassee Regional on June 6, 2004.
- James Ramsey moved into a tie for seventh place on the career hit-by-pitch list this year with 31.
- Stephen McGee's 16 HBP in 2012 are the fourth most in a single-season in school history.
- The 95 HBP this year are the second most in a season in the FSU record books. The school record for hit-by-pitches in a season is 97.

**2012 ACC PRESEASON POLL**

If the Florida State baseball team wants to capture their sixth consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference Atlantic Division title in 2012 they will have to do so as the underdog. For the second year in a row, the Seminoles are tabbed to finish second in the ACC Atlantic Division as voted on by the league's 12 head coaches.

Florida State tallied 64 total points and received five first-place votes to win the Atlantic Division. Clemson received the nod as the favorite to win the division with 67 total points and seven first-place votes. Since the league moved to divisional play in 2006, Florida State has either won the title outright or claimed a share of the top spot the last five years (2007-11).

• Martin became just the fourth coach in all divisions and the third coach in Division I history to reach the historic milestone.

• The elusive group among all divisions includes Gordie Gillespie (1,893), Augie Garrido - Texas (1,847), Gene Stephenson - Wichita State (1,798) and **Mike Martin (1,721)**. Gillespie is the only non-active coach on the list as he retired from St. Francis, Ill., (NAIA) in 2011.

• When Mike Martin secured career win No. 1,700 on April 8 at Georgia Tech, it wasn't the only milestone reached on that day.

• The victory over the Yellow Jackets marked the 2,600th career win in school history.

• The Seminoles reached the mark in only their 65th year of college baseball making Florida State the fastest school to reach that mark in NCAA Division I history.

• FSU joins the likes of Fordham, Texas, Southern California, Michigan, Stanford, Arizona State and Arizona to reach 2,600 career victories in school history.

## CARDIAC NOLES

• The Seminoles have had success this year in recording wins when trailing at any point during a game.

• Of the 48 wins posted this year, 18 have come with Florida State trailing during a game.

**NINE-RUN INNING**

- The Seminoles put together their biggest scoring inning of the season in game two at Georgia Tech plating nine runs all on two outs in the top of the fifth inning in a 12-7 victory.
- The previous high for runs in an inning this

year came against Stetson as the Seminoles scored eight times in the bottom of the seventh inning to break open a one-run ball game winning 17-8.

- Florida State has scored five or runs in an inning 18 times in 2012 including twice in the Super Regional against Stanford. The Seminoles scored seven runs in the fourth inning in game one and eight runs in the eighth inning in game two.

**Vs. NON-CONFERENCE OPPONENTS**

- Florida State finished the regular season posting a record of 19-6 against non-conference competition this year.
- That record improved to 24-6 after sweeping through the Tallahassee Regional and Super Regionals with a 5-0 record posting wins over UAB, Samford (twice) and Stanford (twice).
- The Seminoles have registered a mark of 15-0 against non-conference schools outside the state of Florida posting series sweeps against Hofstra, Maine and Rhode Island, while shutting out North Georgia College in their only meeting against the Saints.
- FSU is 10-4 in games decided by three runs or less against non-conference foes this year.

**BENNY & THE SAVES**

- Robert Benincasa has thrived in his new role as the Seminole closer this year.
- Benincasa is 15-for-18 in save situations this year as he ranks second in the ACC and ninth nationally.
- Despite suffering his first blown save of the season at Georgia Tech on April 6, Benincasa bounced back to pick up the victory as FSU defeated the Yellow Jackets 2-1 in 10 innings.
- The Tampa, Fla., native has allowed just five earned runs this year in 36.0 innings of work spanning 30 appearances.
- He has recorded 51 strikeouts and has struck out the side in an inning of work four times including the clinching game of the Super Regional against Stanford.
- Benincasa is holding opponents to a .169 batting average as he has allowed 22 hits all year.
- Of his 15 saves, eight have come in one-run ball games, four in two-run games and three in three-run games.
- Benincasa is a perfect 2-for-2 in save situations in the NCAA Tournament picking up saves against UAB and Samford. He worked a shutout inning in game two of the Super Regional against Stanford and recorded three strikeouts.
- This year alone, Benincasa has surpassed career season-highs for wins, appearances, saves and strikeouts.
- Benincasa entered the season with 40 career strikeouts in his first two years - 33 appearances. He has accumulated 51 strikeouts in 30 games this year alone.

**NATIONAL LEADERS**

- Senior James Ramsey enters the NCAA Tournament ranked in the top 50 nationally in 12 offensive categories.
- Ramsey ranks in the top 11 in five categories including on-base pct (.519 - 3rd); runs (76 - 3rd); walks (60 - 4th); runs per game (1.21 - 5th); and slugging pct (.673 - 11th).
- The other top 50 categories include: base on balls per game (0.95 - 12th); sacrifice flies (7.0 - 26th); total bases (146 - 21st); batting average (.382 - 30th); triples (6.0 - 34th); home runs (13 - 36th); and RBI (57 - 47th).
- Jayce Boyd ranks in the top 50 in four offensive categories including hits (93 - 13th); batting average (.389 - 23rd); doubles (21 - 25th); RBI (59 - 37th).
- Sherman Johnson ranks second in walks with 65 and fourth in walks per game (1.03).
- Stephen McGee also ranks nationally in walks (58 - 5th) and walks per game (0.92 - 13th). He also ranks in the top 60 in sac-flies with 8.0 (11th) and hit-by-pitches (16 - 59th).
- Devon Travis ranks 18th nationally with 22 doubles and 60th in doubles per game at 0.35.
- Robert Benincasa ranks ninth in saves with 15.
- Mike Compton is the only freshman nationally with 11 wins on the year, two more than fellow league foe, NC State's Carlos Rodon. Compton is tied for seventh nationally with 11 wins.

### GRAND SLAM

• Seth Miller has taken advantage of his opportunities at the plate with the bases loaded this year connecting on three grand slams to tie a school record for grand slams hit in one year.

• Miller joined the elusive group after hitting his third of the season in game two of the Super Regional against Stanford. The junior right fielder in the fifth Seminole to perform the feat as he joins J.D. Drew (1997), Jeremy Morris (1997), Dennis Guinn (2006) and Buster Posey (2008).

• All three of Miller's home runs this year have been grand slams. His first came on opening day against Hofstra and his second vs. Stetson on March 20.

• Justin Gonzalez joined the grand slam mix belting the first of his career in the first inning of game three against Virginia Tech on April 1.

• He added his second of the season in game two at home against Maryland hammering a shot off the shed in left center field in the third inning.

• Miller and Gonzalez join Mike McGee (2011) and Buster Posey (2008) as the only four Seminoles to hit more than one grand slam in a season over the last five years. Posey hit three in 2008.

• Jose Brizuela connected on his first career grand slam in game two against Georgia Tech. The freshman left fielder cleared the bases with two outs in the fifth inning to give FSU its first lead of the game - one they would not relinquish.

• James Ramsey connected on his first career grand slam in the seventh inning of the winner's bracket game against Samford to help put the game out of reach in favor of the 'Noles at 8-1.

• The seven grand slams hit by FSU surpasses the amount hit in 65 games in 2011, while it is the most grand slams hit in a season dating back to 2003.

### WALK IT OUT

• Sherman Johnson is getting on base and doing it consistently this season.

• The senior third baseman has registered an ACC best 65 walks through 63 games, good for an average of 1.03 walks per game. He and Richie Shaffer from Clemson are the only players in the ACC averaging a walk or more a game.

• Johnson has drawn at least one walk in 41 of 63 games this year and has multiple walks in a game 18 times including six, three-walk games.

• James Ramsey and Stephen McGee rank second and third on the team and third and fourth in the league with 60 and 58 walks, respectively.

• McGee, Ramsey and Johnson finished with a combined 87 walks in league play as the three Seminoles finished 1-2-3, respectively. McGee drew 32

walks in 30 games.

• J.D. Drew owns the school record with 84 walks which he set in 67 games in 1997. That year Drew averaged 1.25 walks per game.

• Johnson led the ACC in base-on-balls last year posting 59 walks in 65 games.

### STREAKING INTO 2012

• Sherman Johnson had reached base in 29 straight games to start 2012 before the streak came to an end in game one at Georgia Tech.

• Jayce Boyd currently holds the active streak of reaching base in consecutive games at 24.

• James Ramsey saw his hitting streak of 15 games comes to an end in game two against Georgia Tech. The streak was the longest by a Seminole this year.

• Boyd and Stephen McGee own the longest current hit streak on the team at four heading into the College World Series.

### CONSECUTIVE STARTS

• James Ramsey made his first collegiate start in center field on opening weekend against Hofstra. The senior captain started in center in all three games and finished the weekend perfect from the field making all four putouts.

• Ramsey pushed his consecutive starts streak to 196 games following the Seminoles' two-game sweep over Stanford.

• The Alpharetta, Ga., started every game in right field the last two seasons.

• Senior Sherman Johnson has also started in 196 straight games with his starts coming at third, second and shortstop over the last three years. During the streak, Johnson has started 181 games at third base, 10 at second base and five at shortstop.

• Johnson made his first career start at shortstop in the series finale against Rhode Island (4/29) as junior Justin Gonzalez sat out with a sore right hamstring. He started at short in both games of the doubleheader at Clemson (5/14).

• Gonzalez' streak of consecutive starts at shortstop came to an end at 105 straight games as he did not start any of the three games against URI.

• Jayce Boyd saw his streak of consecutive starts come to an end on April 18 as he missed the North Georgia contest due to flu-like symptoms. Dating back to the ACC Championship game in 2010, Boyd had started 111 consecutive games at first base.

### TRIPLE IT UP

• Senior James Ramsey tied the school record for triples in a game when he hit two off Marcus Stroman in game one against Duke on March 9.

• A player hitting two triples in a game has happened seven times in school history, while Ramsey has performed the feat twice.

• Ramsey was the last Seminole to hit two triples in a game as he hit two against Georgia State on February 21, 2010.

• As a team, the Seminoles have recorded 10 triples with six coming off the bat of Ramsey. Seth

Miller and Jose Brizuela are tied with two each.

- FSU registered nine triples a season ago.

#### **FIVE FOR FIVE**

- Florida State finished its second stretch of five games in five days with a 3-2 record posting a series victory over Maryland (2-1) and splitting a pair at Stetson.
- FSU completed its first stretch of five games in five days back in March with a perfect 5-0 record posting sweeps over Virginia and Stetson at home.
- The Seminoles outscored the opposition 49-20 during the five-game sweep, while the second series of five games in five days saw FSU outscore Maryland and Stetson by a combined margin of 38-20.
- In the first round, FSU posted a .331 batting average, while the pitching staff was equally impressive posting a 2.80 ERA in 45.0 innings of work.
- In the second round, FSU posted a .297 batting average, while the team ERA was 2.66.

#### **DIVISIONAL CONFERENCE BREAKDOWN**

- Since the ACC adopted divisional play in 2006, the Seminoles have posted a league record of 141-63 (.691) and have captured at least a share of six straight Atlantic Division titles.
- In seven seasons of playing in divisions, FSU has posted a record of 74-29 against teams in the Atlantic Division including a mark of 37-13 at home and 37-16 on the road.
- Against Coastal Division teams, the 'Noles are 67-34 overall, 37-16 at home and 30-18 on the road.
- In the six seasons (2007-12) that FSU has won the divisional crown, the Seminoles are averaging over 20 wins in the ACC. This includes a school record 24 wins in league action in 2008 - tied for the most league wins with Clemson (24 - 2006). FSU tied that record once again with 24 wins in 2012.

#### **COASTAL DOMINANCE**

- Florida State finished the regular season at 24-6 in league play with five of those 10 series coming against Coastal Division foes.
- FSU finished the regular season with a perfect 15-0 record against teams from the Coastal Division recording sweeps of Virginia, Virginia Tech and Miami at home and Duke and Georgia Tech on the road.
- This year marks the first time in school history the Seminoles swept all five series against teams from the Coastal Division since the ACC moved to divisional play beginning in 2006.
- In fact, this year marked just the second time that FSU swept the first three series against their Coastal Division rivals. In 2008, the Seminoles won all three games against Georgia Tech, Virginia Tech and Virginia en route to finishing the year 11-4 against the Coastal Division.
- FSU owns an all-time record of 67-34 against the Coastal Division.

#### **FIVE-HIT PARADE**

- In game one of a three-game series against Rhode Island, Jayce Boyd tied a career-high with five hits.
- The junior first baseman finished the game a triple shy of hitting for the cycle collecting three singles, a double and a home run.
- He recorded hits in his first four at-bats with an RBI double in the first, a two-run home in the second and singles in the fourth and sixth innings.
- It marked the first five-hit game of the season and the first since Boyd went 5-for-5 at Virginia Tech last year (April 17) in an 18-12 Nole victory.

#### **BOMB SHELLED**

- The Maryland pitching staff entered the weekend series against Florida State allowing a league-low eight home runs in 427.1 innings of work.
- The Seminoles finished the series hitting six home runs against the Terrapins as Jimmy Reed, Jamie Pashuck and Michael Boyden all gave up their first round trippers of the season.
- In fact, FSU hit three home runs off Reed in three innings of work.
- Justin Gonzalez and Sherman Johnson paced the Seminoles with two home runs apiece, while Devon Travis and James Ramsey each hit one.
- It marked the most home runs hit in a series (of at least two games or more in succession) by the Seminoles this year.

#### **HURRICANE SWEEP**

- Florida State completed the regular-season sweep of its intra-state rival Miami with a walk-off victory in the 10th inning of the series finale.
- It marked FSU's first sweep of the Hurricanes since 2002 and the first sweep in Tallahassee since 2000.
- Florida State outscored Miami 25-10 in the series holding the Hurricanes to runs in just four of the 28 innings that they played.
- The Seminoles hit .305 as a team, while the pitching staff posted a team ERA of 2.89.
- Florida State has now won the last three regular-season series over Miami.

#### **WALK-OFF VICTORY**

- Sherman Johnson's walk-off single in the 10th inning scored Giovanni Alfonzo from second base to give FSU an 8-7 victory over Miami in the series finale to complete the series sweep.
- It marked the first walk-off victory for the Seminoles since Rafael Lopez' sac-fly in the bottom of the ninth of the series finale against Boston College back on March 13, 2011.
- Johnson's hit also marked the second consecutive walk-off victory over Miami on a Sunday in Tallahassee. In 2010, Mike McGee hit a walk-off, two-run home run over the fence in right center to give the Seminoles a 7-6 victory.
- The walk-offs continued to mount in the series finale against Rhode Island. With the Seminoles trailing by one in the bottom of the ninth with two outs and the bases loaded, Jayce Boyd drilled a two-run double off the screen in right center

field for his first career walk-off hit.

#### **NATIONAL RANKING**

- Florida State enters the College World Series ranked in the top 10 in all four major polls including a high of No. 2 by the NCBWA and No. 3 by the ESPN/USA Today Coaches poll.
- The Seminoles were ranked No. 1 by Baseball America for seven consecutive weeks before falling to No. 5 following the ACC Tournament.
- FSU was ranked No. 1 by ESPN/USA Today Coaches' poll for five straight weeks and six times in seven weeks.
- FSU returned to No. 1 in the NCBWA poll in week 15 for the fifth time in 2012.
- Florida State found themselves as the consensus No. 1 team in the nation for the first time all year back in week 13.
- FSU was first ranked No. 1 in the NCBWA and Coaches' polls in week 9 surpassing the previous high ranking of No. 2 which was achieved by the Garnet & Gold in week 8.
- The Seminoles broke through at No. 1 in Collegiate Baseball's top 30 poll in week 13 for the first time all year.
- Florida State's move to No. 1 in week 9 marked the first time the Seminoles held the top spot in any poll since 2008 when Collegiate Baseball had the Noles ranked No. 1 for two consecutive weeks on April 7 and 14.
- The Seminoles were the first team other than the University of Florida to hold the top ranking this year in the Baseball America poll. The Gators had held the top spot since the start of the 2012 season, a span of eight consecutive weeks at No. 1.
- Florida State was last ranked No. 1 in the USA Today/ESPN Coaches Poll and the NCBWA Poll on March 26, 2007.
- The last time Baseball America ranked the Seminoles No. 1 was during a five-week span in 2003 beginning May 5 - June 2.

#### **SUNSHINE STATE SUCCESS**

- The Seminoles opened the 2012 campaign with 20 games against schools from the state of Florida.
- Over the past two seasons, FSU is 24-9 against their in-state rivals.
- FSU finished the 2012 regular season with a record of 12-6 against Florida schools posting series victories over FIU, UCF, Miami, Jacksonville and Stetson.

## FACED 28

- In a game that lasted just one hour and 56 minutes, Florida State defeated North Georgia College 6-0 on April 18.
- Eight Seminole pitchers combined to throw a three-hit shutout.
- What's even more impressive is that the Seminole pitchers faced just one batter over the minimum in a nine inning contest.

## 40 AND COUNTING

- Devon Travis is coming off a sophomore season in 2011 in which he lead the ACC with 26 doubles - tied for the eighth most in a single season in Florida State history.
- He accumulated his 40th career double in the opening game of a three-game series against Maine on March 2.
- Travis once again leads the team and is tied for fourth in the ACC with 22 doubles in 2012. The junior second baseman currently has 56 career doubles. He is just one shy of entering the top 10 career list at FSU.
- Jayce Boyd, who ranks second on the team with 21 doubles and is tied for sixth in the ACC, has 53 career doubles.
- Sherman Johnson and James Ramsey also surpassed 40 career doubles this year with 50 and 47, respectively.
- Jeremy Morris (1994-97) and John-Ford Griffin (1999-01) are the career leaders in doubles at Florida State with 78.

## RAMSEY HONORED NATIONALLY

- James Ramsey earned ACC Player of the Week and Collegiate Baseball National Player of the Week accolades after leading FSU to a 3-1 record in week 2 against Jacksonville and FIU.
- Ramsey hit .545 (6-for-11), drew seven walks and reached base on 15 of his 19 plate appearances. At one point over those four games, Ramsey reached base in nine consecutive at-bats.
- The Alpharetta, Ga., native drove in all three runs in a 3-1 win over FIU and broke a scoreless tie against the Panthers in the fourth blasting a solo home run to right.
- For the week, Ramsey posted a .737 on-base percentage and slugged 1.091.

## GONZO EARNS ACC POW

- Justin Gonzalez was named ACC Player of the Week for the first time in his career after leading the Seminoles to a 3-0 week including two wins over Maryland to help the Seminoles secure their eighth ACC series victory of the season.
- Against Maryland, Gonzalez paced the Seminole offense hitting .600 (3-for-5) as two of his three hits left the yard. He crushed a two-run, opposite field shot in game one and connected on his second grand slam of the season in game two.
- For the week, the Miami, Fla., native slugged 1.111, while posting an on-base percentage of .545.

## SCORELESS INNINGS STREAK

- Not a bad way to start your collegiate career by putting together a scoreless innings streak. That is exactly what freshman right hander Mike Compton did in his first three starts.
- After giving up two runs in the first inning in his first career start against Hofstra, Compton did not give up another run until Maine plated one with one out in the sixth in his third career start. The Branson, Mo., native went a stretch of 15.2 consecutive scoreless innings.
- Sophomore right hander Peter Miller was also on a streak of his own as he had not allowed a run between his second and third starts - a span covering 10.0 consecutive innings. The streak came to an end after a 1.2 innings against Duke.
- Friday night starter Brandon Leibrandt also had a scoreless innings streak that reached 15.0 innings as the freshman southpaw put together back-to-back scoreless starts against Virginia Tech (7.0) and Georgia Tech (7.1). The streak came to an end with two outs in the first inning at BC on a solo home run to right.

## IN OPENING ACC PLAY

- Florida State is 19-2 all-time in series victories when opening ACC play. The Seminoles have now played Duke three times to begin league play and have won all three series.
- The Seminoles had never lost an opening series in the ACC, a string of 17 consecutive series victories, until 2009 when the Seminoles dropped two of three from Boston College.
- A year later FSU suffered its second straight ACC opening weekend loss when the Seminoles dropped two of three from Virginia in Tallahassee.
- Since joining the ACC back in 1992, FSU has posted an all-time record of 51-9 on opening weekend in league play.
- Before the series loss to BC, the last time the Garnet and Gold lost a game in an opening series was on March 15, 2002 at Virginia.
- Florida State will open league play on the road for just the second time since joining the league back in 1992. The Seminoles played at Virginia in 2002 and took two of three from the Cavaliers. With the sweep of Duke in 2012, FSU is now 5-1 when opening a league series on the road.

## 1-0 VICTORY

- Florida State recorded its first 1-0 victory on Wednesday night at UCF (3/7) since 2008 when Elih Villanueva, Jimmy Marshall and Buster Posey combined to throw a four-hit shutout against NC State in Tallahassee.
- Since Mike Martin took over as head coach in 1980, the Seminoles have posted a 1-0 victory 10 times including four against ACC foes and two against Miami.
- The last time FSU registered two 1-0 victories in one season was in 1992 when the Seminoles defeated Duke (2/23) and NC State (5/12) in the ACC Tournament.

## NOLES ON ST. PATTY'S DAY

- FSU and Virginia opened its three-game series on St. Patrick's Day.
- Playing on St. Patty's Day is nothing new for the Seminoles as the Garnet & Gold improved to 29-9 all-time including 18-5 under head coach Mike Martin following their 12-3 victory over the Cavaliers. FSU is now 6-2 against the ACC including a perfect 5-0 at home.
- The last time FSU played on March 17 was in 2009 when the Seminoles fell at Florida, 5-4.
- Florida State is 27-4 all-time when playing at home on St. Patrick's Day.
- The last home game and victory for FSU on St. Patrick's Day came in 2007 when the Noles defeated Wake Forest, 4-3.
- The Seminoles won 11 straight games on St. Patrick's Day between 1986 and 1999.
- FSU & UVa met once before on St. Patrick's Day as the Noles defeated the Cavs 11-0 in 1993.

## A DAY TO REMEMBER

- On Wednesday, February 29, Florida State shared the field with the likes of Jimmy Rollins, Shane Victorino and Jim Thome as the Seminoles traveled to Clearwater to face the Phillies to kick off the 2012 MLB spring training season.
- The Seminoles fell to the defending NL East Division champions 6-1, but not before both teams played to a scoreless tie into the sixth.
- Six different recorded a hit, while Jayce Boyd scored the Noles only run of the game in the top of the seventh.
- Nine pitchers saw action off the mound each throwing an inning apiece.

## OPENING DAY SUCCESS

- With a series sweep of Hofstra to begin the 2012 campaign, Florida State collected its 43rd opening weekend series sweep in school history and 26th all-time under head coach Mike Martin.
- The Seminoles have now won 14 in a row on opening day, while posting an all-time record of 57-7-1 (.885).
- The Seminoles have suffered a loss on opening day just seven times in 64 previous seasons with two of those losses coming in Tallahassee.
- In 1998, the Garnet and Gold fell to Notre Dame at a neutral site marking the last time FSU has dropped a season opener.
- The last time FSU lost a season opener at home was 1981 when Georgia Southern defeated the Seminoles 3-2. Auburn handed Florida State its only other opening day loss at home back on March 20, 1958 as the Tigers swept the opening day doubleheader (4-3, 10-7).
- When it comes to home openers all-time, FSU improved to 61-4 (.938) with only one loss coming in the last 31 years.
- Under Hall of Fame head coach Mike Martin, FSU Baseball moved to 30-3 on opening day.

### FIRST SERIES OF THE SEASON

- Thanks to a three-game sweep of Hofstra to open the 2012 season, Florida State has not lost the first series of the season since 1981 - a streak of 31 consecutive series victories to open a season.
- In 65 years of FSU baseball, the Seminoles have only lost a season opening series twice. The last time the Seminoles lost a series to open the season came in 1981 when Georgia Southern took two of three games from Florida State.
- Overall, Florida State improved to 54-2-9 in season opening series.

### LEIBRANDT GETS OPENING DAY START

- Brandon Leibrandt made his collegiate debut Friday, February 17 against Hofstra as the Seminoles opening day starter.
- Son of former major leaguer Charlie Leibrandt, Brandon made Florida State history with the Friday start as the first freshman to start an opening day game in the program's 65-year history.
- Dating back to 1966, 10 sophomores have been given the ball on opening day with former Seminole All-American Sean Gilmartin being the last sophomore pitcher to do so in 2010.
- Here is a look at the last opening starter by class:
  - Freshman.....Brandon Leibrandt, 2012
  - Redshirt Freshman.....never
  - Sophomore.....Sean Gilmartin, 2010
  - Redshirt Sophomore Jon McDonald, 1999
  - Junior.....Sean Gilmartin, 2011

  - Senior.....Bryan Henry, 2007
  - Redshirt Senior.....Blair Varnes, 2002
- Leibrandt earned the win in his collegiate debut working 5.0 solid innings allowing just one run on three hits as walked four and struck out two.

### FRESH START

- Florida State took the field on opening weekend against Hofstra with a trio of new starters on the mound.
- Prior to the Hofstra series, the Seminole weekend rotation of freshman Brandon Leibrandt (LHP), sophomore Peter Miller (RHP) and freshman Mike Compton (RHP) had a combined 3.1 innings of collegiate pitching experience under their belt and all those innings were compiled by Miller over four appearances last year.
- While Leibrandt became the first freshman to start an opening day game in school history, he added another first to his young career joining Compton as the first two freshmen to start a game on opening weekend in school history.
- Sean Gilmartin was the last freshman to earn a start on opening weekend pitching on Saturday in the second game of a doubleheader against Hofstra.
- Gilmartin earned the win working 6.0 innings allowing just one run on seven hits as he walked three and struck out four in a 3-2 FSU victory.
- The trio of Leibrandt, Miller and Compton marked the youngest starting rotation to open a season since 2009 when head coach Mike Martin

sent out three sophomores (Geoff Parker, John Gast and Mike McGee) and one freshman (Sean Gilmartin). Ironically enough, the Seminoles opened the 2009 season against Hofstra.

- Since taking over the reigns as head coach in 1980, there have only been three times that Mike Martin has opened a weekend series with a rotation consisting only of sophomores or freshmen.
  - 2012.. Leibrandt(FR), Miller(SO), Compton(FR)
  - 2009.....Parker(SO), Gast(SO), .....Gilmartin(FR), McGee (SO)
  - 1999. McDonald(rSO), Stocks (rSO), Varnes(rFr)
- Leibrandt, Miller and Compton combined to go 2-0 against Hofstra with a 3.09 ERA. The trio worked 11.2 innings allowing just four earned runs on 10 hits as they walked eight and struck out nine.

### EL CAPITAN

- The decision to return to Tallahassee was not an easy one for outfielder James Ramsey, whose lifelong dream has been and will continue to be to play professional baseball. But the idea to come back to Florida State for his senior season, earn his degree and help lead the Seminoles back to the College World Series for the third time in the last five years was paramount.
- Ramsey has made 196 consecutive starts for Florida State with each one of those starts coming in the outfield (133 in right field, 63 in center) dating back to the start of the 2010 season.
- Ramsey graduated this spring, magna cum laude, with a degree in finance from the prestigious College of Business and is an active participant in the community.
- Ramsey was named team captain in 2012 by head coach Mike Martin and will do so by wearing a 'C' on his jersey. A first for a baseball player at Florida State.

### IT'S MILLER TIME

- Junior Seth Miller had an opening weekend to remember as he finished the Hofstra series hitting .500 (5-for-10) with a double and a home run, one run scored and six RBI.
- He matched his home run total from last year on opening day recording a grand slam in the sixth inning.
- Miller has fared well on opening weekend in his career as he hit .400 (2-for-5) last year against VMI with four RBI, two runs scored and a home run.
- Miller is a .468 career hitter on opening weekend with two home runs, a double, 10 RBI and three runs scored.

### YOUNG GUNS MAKE A STATEMENT

- Freshmen Jose Brizuela and John Nogowski kicked started their Seminole careers on the right foot in FSU's three-game series sweep of Hofstra.
- Brizuela was the starter in left field for all three games and finished the weekend hitting .400 (4-for-10) with a team-high eight RBI. He collected a double, a two-run home run and scored four times. He was also perfect from the field in all five fielding chances.

- Nogowski started at DH in all three games and hit .364 (4-for-11) for the series connecting on his first collegiate home run in game three. Nogo tallied three RBI and scored four times.

### MAKING THE CONNECTION

- If you're a movie buff and can't get enough 'Six Degrees of Kevin Bacon,' then you're going to love a little 'Six Degrees of Seminole Baseball.'
- So I know you're asking yourself what's the FSU baseball connection between Friday's opening day starter Brandon Leibrandt and his dad, former major leaguer, Charlie Leibrandt...
- No, Charlie did not go to school at Florida State, but he was managed by former FSU head coach Dick Howser for three years with the Kansas City Royals (1985-86). In fact, Charlie was in the starting rotation the year the Royals defeated the St. Louis Cardinals to capture the 1985 World Series Championship.
- The rest of the connection is pretty easy. Howser was head coach at FSU in 1979 before leaving to take the managerial job with the New York Yankees in 1980. One of Howser's assistants in 1979 was Mike Martin, who succeeded Howser as head coach at FSU. And of course Martin will coach Brandon in 2012. So there is your 'Six Degrees of Seminole Baseball' or perhaps it should be 'Four Degrees.'

### FOR WHOM THE BELL TOLLS

- This year marks the first time since 1997 that head coach Mike Martin had a change in his coaching staff with the addition of Mike Bell as associate head coach and the Seminoles new pitching coach.
- Bell returns to Tallahassee after spending a combined seven years with Tennessee (2005-07) and Oklahoma (2008-11).
- The FSU graduate played for the Seminoles in 1994 and 1995 compiling a 14-4 record with a 3.01 ERA in 26 appearances recording 120 strikeouts in over 137 innings of work.
- In addition to coaching Oklahoma to the 2010 College World Series and Tennessee in 2005, Bell also played with the Seminoles in back-to-back years in 1994 and 1995.
- In his seven prior seasons as a pitching coach, Bell has coached three pitchers that have been drafted in the first round of the MLB Draft including Luke Hochevar, who was selected as the first overall pick in 2006.

### #11 MIKE MARTIN • HEAD COACH

### 33RD SEASON • FSU (1966)

#### 2012 HIGHLIGHTS

Now in his 33rd season as head coach at Florida State University, Mike Martin continues to redefine success by any standard of measure. With 1,721 career victories, a .744 winning percentage that sits second among active NCAA Division I coaches, 33 consecutive regional tournament appearances and 15 trips to the College World Series, Martin's place in college baseball history is secure.

Martin was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2007. Since then he has eclipsed the 1,500-, 1,600- and 1,700-win milestones and returned to the College World Series three times in the last five seasons, while continuing to turn out All-Americans, Major League Draft choices and postseason participants.

The FSU alum has become the face of Florida State baseball having been associated with the Seminoles for 40 of FSU's 65 seasons. Of the 3,594 baseball games played in program history, Martin has been involved in 2,701 as a player, assistant coach and head coach. What is even more impressive is Martin's involvement in 1,988 of the 2,621 all-time victories at Florida State. In one way or another, Martin has been a part of more than 75.8% of FSU's victories.

Martin has won 16 conference championships since taking over as head coach in 1980 with 11 from the Metro Conference and five in the ACC. Since moving to divisional play in 2006, Martin has led the Seminoles to at least a share of the ACC Atlantic Division title six years in a row from 2007-2012. Florida State captured the ACC Championship in 2010 defeating NC State in Greensboro, N.C., and has played in the conference title game in three of the last four years. FSU's run to a division title in 2008 was accomplished after Martin led the Noles to a league mark of 24-6, a school record for the most conference wins in team history. Martin and the Seminoles matched that total with 24 wins in 2012. He is a six-time Metro Conference Coach of the Year and has been recognized as the top coach in the ACC seven times as well.

Eighty-four Florida State players have earned All-America honors under Martin, while 109 players have garnered first and second team All-ACC recognition. He has coached six players, Mike Fuentes, Mike Loynd, J.D. Drew, Shane Robinson, Tony Thomas, Jr. and Buster Posey, who were named National Players of the Year.

In 2010, Martin was named to Florida State University's list of 100 Distinguished Graduates in celebration of the FSU Alumni Association Centennial.





# Florida State's freshman pitchers poised for postseason

Before the season began neither one had any idea they would be in this position.

Sure, Brandon Leibrandt and Mike Compton hoped to be contributors for the 2012 Florida State baseball team, but the freshmen couldn't have assumed they'd be the top two starters on one of the best teams in the nation.

And that they would be taking the mound this weekend as starting pitchers in the NCAA Regionals.

"It's definitely something I never envisioned going into the season," Compton said. "But I'm so grateful it's going to happen. This place is going to be packed and we're going to have a lot of fans on our side."

Said Leibrandt: "It's hard to think something like this would happen. You're a freshman. You don't really know what to expect. You just go along for the ride the best you can."

It's been a fun ride so far for the two newcomers, who have combined for 16 wins and over 155 innings pitched in their debut seasons.

Both said they planned on approaching this weekend like it was any other this season. Take the ball. Make pitches. Get outs. And hopefully get the victory.

But they also understand everything is just a bit different this time of year — the stakes are higher and the pressure is most certainly heightened.

"Coach (Mike) Bell stressed to keep doing what we've been doing all year long and everything is going to be fine," Compton said. "Don't try to change anything, keep making pitches and let the defense work."

If they keep doing what they've been doing FSU will have a very good shot at advancing into next weekend's Super Regionals.

Leibrandt is currently 6-2 on the season with a 2.91 ERA in 80 1/3 innings pitched. He has been the No. 1 starter for the Seminoles all year and proved to be a consistent arm throughout the regular season.

Compton has been a bit more up and down — he worked just 21 1/3 innings at Boston College and 11 1/3 at Clemson — but has been at his best the last two starts. He gave up just two earned runs in six innings against N.C. State and allowed just one earned run to Virginia in five innings in the ACC Tournament. He is currently 10-2 on the season with a 2.88 ERA in 75 innings pitched.

"Both of those guys have got 'it,'" Martin said. "That's the only way I can say it. They've handled failure. They've handled success. To be a good pitcher you have to be able to handle both. I'm very, very pleased with how they've developed and a lot of credit goes to Bell. He's done a great job with both of them."

And the head coach has no doubts his freshmen pitchers will be able to handle the bright lights and intense glare that comes with the NCAA Tournament.

"I honestly don't think that either one of them will be out of themselves," Martin said. "I'm confident of that. ... They understand what to do with the ball in their hands."

Martin has yet to decide his rotation for the weekend regional, so on Tuesday neither Leibrandt nor Compton were sure when they would take the mound.

They just know that they will at some point.

"I'm sure when I get out there I'll feel it a little bit," Leibrandt said. "But with the first pitch I'll settle in and feel ready to go."

FSU duo honored

Florida State senior James Ramsey and junior Jayce Boyd were two of 30 players from around the nation named to the Golden Spikes Award semifinal list on Tuesday.

Ramsey is currently hitting .382 with 12 homers and leads the ACC in both on-base percentage (.515) and slugging percentage (.673).

Boyd has also been one of the top hitters in the country, with a conference-best batting average of .395 and 55 RBIs. He leads the ACC in hits (87) and is in the Top 10 in doubles (20) and on-base percentage (.465).

The three finalists will be announced on June 5 and the winner will be named on July 6.

# Martin, Fox chasing elusive CWS title

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. -- In 2007, the morning after North Carolina lost in the College World Series championship for the second straight season, Florida State coach Mike Martin called Tar Heels coach Mike Fox in Omaha.

"I know what it's like to lose in a national championship game," Martin, who has led the Seminoles to the CWS 14 times without winning an NCAA title, said recently. "And when you play for a national championship, you know that you might not get that many opportunities. ... I wanted to be sure that I was able to say to him what others had said to me: It's not fair to beat yourself up. You can't beat yourself up for finishing second. ...

"You appreciate what your team has accomplished. And then you go out there and try to do it again."

That's exactly what both Fox and Martin -- who boast the top two active career winning percentages, respectively, in the nation -- will do when their teams open NCAA regional play Friday in their respective home stadiums.

The Tar Heels (44-14), who have been to the College World Series three more times since Martin made that phone call (and five times, total, under Fox), earned the No. 6 national seed on the strength of their pitching and a late-season 14-game winning streak.

The Seminoles (43-15), who have made it to Omaha twice more since 2007, boast the No. 3 national seed in a year that began with a No. 20 ranking by Baseball America and with some wondering whether they would be a contender after losing multiple stars.

"There's no doubt that both of these teams have what it takes to go back to Omaha, and I don't know if I'd bet against either one of them," said Baseball America national writer Aaron Fitt. "Is this the season we see Mike Martin or Mike Fox win it all? I think that's a question -- especially when it comes to Mike Martin -- that we all have in the back of our minds every time they make it to the College World Series."

Indeed, Martin, a sentimental favorite after winning more than 1,700 games (.743 percentage) and making the NCAA tournament in each of his 33 seasons at FSU, admits that he occasionally thinks about what it would be like to finish the season with a victory. Not just for himself, he said, but for his players.

Twice he's coached in the final game of the CWS, an accomplishment in its own right considering eight teams make it to Omaha and almost anything can happen in the double-elimination marathon to the final two.

But 1999 -- when Miami beat FSU 6-5 thanks in part to a five-run fifth inning -- was Martin's closest brush with the title. Ironically, that game marked Hurricanes coach Jim Morris' first national crown after six trips to the CWS.

"To say that I'm not disappointed is a lie," said Martin, now 68. "Disappointment reigns heavy. But I can't go around constantly being disappointed when the teams accomplished what they did. You want the national championship more for the players than you do for yourself. Sure, I want to win the last game of the year, but I know how tough it is.

"I tell people -- and this is not an original statement -- that the only thing predictable about baseball is the unpredictability."

Fox -- who was named to the CWS all-tournament team when he helped lead the Tar Heels there as a second baseman in 1978 -- has felt that in haunting fashion, too.

After returning to Chapel Hill in 1999, he coached UNC to the first of four straight trips to Omaha in 2006. In the deciding game of the '06 championship series with Oregon State, the score was knotted at 2 in the eighth inning when a throwing error by the Tar Heels' Bryan Steed resulted in the Beavers' go-ahead (and title-winning) run.

Fox, whose .745 winning percentage also includes his time at Division III North Carolina Wesleyan, said he refuses to let the lack of a Division I championship bother him. But that particular game was difficult to swallow.

"I've thought, several times, I wish we would have just gotten beat 11-0 or whatever," he said. "Because I hate the way that it played out, the last game. It's like [Chris] Webber and the timeout. The other 39 minutes of that game and how well the team played didn't matter. ... If anybody talks about that one game, that's what comes up. So if anybody talks about the national [baseball] championship in '06, that's what they talk about: the ball that was thrown away. That part bugs me."

Not much else, though, does. Fox, who said he tries to focus on the present more than he did earlier in his career, refuses to let it.

"Of course I want to win a championship; I want this team to win a championship," he said. "But it's like with Mike Martin. I don't talk to him about how many times he's been there and not won it. But if there's a coach that deserves to win it, it's him. And I hope he does it before he retires. But if he doesn't -- if he doesn't -- it won't take away from the career that that guy's had. It's unparalleled.

"And for me, if we win it, nothing's going to change for me. Nothing's going to change."

Like Martin advised him during that '07 phone call: Win or lose, he'll appreciate his teams. And keep trying to find ways to win.

And then try again, if necessary.

"Anybody in their right mind that's ever coached dreams of winning the last game," Martin said. "But this game, more than any other, can be like a roller coaster, too ... so you better enjoy the ride."

# FSU's Boyd dreaming of Omaha

Maybe this chase at a .400 batting average, and being among the centerpiece players of another serious College World Series bid by the Florida State baseball team, should have been predicted for Jayce Boyd the moment he stepped into the batter's box for the Seminoles.

Feb. 19, 2010. Georgia State. Dick Howser Stadium.

In his first collegiate at-bat during the 2010 season-opener, the pride of Tate High slapped a single up the middle. He hasn't stopped hitting since.

"Everything that has happened since I've arrived at Florida State, they are things that I'm definitely proud of," Boyd said Wednesday, as FSU was making final preparations for today's opening game of the Tallahassee Regional. "But to be honest, while I'm proud of everything, these are all things I expect of myself.

"I put very high expectations on myself, so these are things I totally expected to be doing. Again, I'm very proud of my career here, but it also was expected."

Entering today's regional opener at 5 p.m. between FSU (43-15) and UAB (32-28), Boyd has taken a marvelous career to a new level during his junior season, and is reaping the rewards.

A career .443 hitter in 15 NCAA Tournament games, Boyd currently leads the Atlantic Coast Conference in batting with a .395 average. FSU's first baseman was a first-team All-ACC selection and, on Thursday, named a second-team All-American by Louisville Slugger.

"A lot of it has to do with your teammates and the situation you get put in," said Boyd, who is gunning to become just the 11th FSU player to bat .400 (with more than 200 at-bats) in a season. "I have always been surrounded by outstanding teammates, so I find myself in a lot of positive situations to hit in.

"It's just always been that way here. The key is being consistent, and I've been able to do that pretty well."

But, while Boyd currently finds himself in the most productive of his three seasons in garnet and gold, there's a major weight that FSU is dragging, again, into the NCAA Tournament. Celebrated for hosting a record 29th regional, the Seminoles also hold the distinction as the program with the most College World Series appearances (20) without winning a title.

The CWS worry is still a few weeks down the road, but as the No. 3 overall national seed, it's not hard to project FSU back in Omaha. Complicating that, however, was the program's first 0-3 showing at the ACC Tournament last week and entering NCAA play by losing eight of its last 12 games.

"The one thing you can't do in this game is dwell on the past," Boyd said. "Of course, we hear about (the non-CWS title record), but there isn't one thing that this team can do about what has happened before. What we are focused on is what can happen, and the first step is in this regional tournament."

Another big target on his radar is the start of the MLB Draft on Monday. A 19th-round pick by the Texas Rangers in 2009 out of Tate, Boyd is projected to go early.

Among the notable projections: [minorleagueball.com](http://minorleagueball.com) has Boyd going between the second and sixth rounds; [baseballdraftreport.com](http://baseballdraftreport.com) has a similar rating, projecting him as the No. 1 first baseman on the board; a mock draft by [allamericanbaseballacademy.com](http://allamericanbaseballacademy.com), projects Boyd going No. 33 overall to the San Diego Padres — one spot behind the Minnesota Twins selecting Pace High shortstop Addison Russell.

So how special could these next few days be for Boyd?

“It’s obviously a big thing to think about. Being honest, that is pretty important to me; one of my main goals is to play pro baseball,” Boyd said. “Where will I go? I have no idea. I’ve talked to all the teams, and they’ve all told me to keep doing what I’m doing and we’ll talk the day of the draft.

“That’s how I’m looking at it, because right now, we have much bigger things to focus on. It all starts (today) ... one at-bat at a time, one out at a time, one inning at a time. (The draft) is going to happen; getting where we want to go, we have to make that happen.”

# FSU's James Ramsey named "Most Outstanding Player"

TALLAHASSEE — Florida State senior outfielder James Ramsey knows how bright the glare of the college baseball's biggest stages can be.

Since arriving in Tallahassee in 2009, he has been to the Regionals in each of his four seasons, and has never seen the Seminoles suffer a loss in that round.

After defeating Samford 5-2 on Sunday to advance to their fifth straight NCAA Super Regionals, the Seminoles saw their Regional winning streak grow to 16 games.

Not surprisingly, thanks in large part to his strong offensive play this weekend, after Sunday's Regional championship game, Ramsey was named most outstanding player of the tournament for a second consecutive year. He finished the weekend with a .444 batting average and 6 RBI. Four of those runs were driven in on a seventh-inning grand slam that propelled the Seminoles to an 8-1 win in the game that clinched their Regional title game berth.

"Ramsey has obviously been our leader all year long," Florida State coach Mike Martin said. "He was the most valuable player in the tournament unquestionably, and he will tell you that he could not have done it without his teammates.

"I'm sure he'd say that he'd like to have that thing split up into 27 pieces. ... That's what makes us a team."

Earlier this season, Martin named Ramsey team captain. In Martin's 33 seasons as head coach, the outfielder has been the only person to wear a captain's "C" on his jersey.

Teams tend to take on the character of their leader, especially in times of crisis.

Coming home from going 0-3 in the ACC tournament, FSU had their first small taste of a crisis this past week faced with a quick turnaround and some stiff competition on its way.

"We really had to prove this to everybody else. We really felt comfortable with where we were at," Ramsey said of the team's approach entering this week's Regional. "We felt at peace with the ACC Tournament on the bus ride home. We buried it and left it there. We came back ... ready to go."

With the major league baseball first-year player draft occurring Monday night, it could be easy to assume some big-name prospects like Ramsey could lose focus on the end of a season. Dollar signs and fame could begin sounding off inside their heads.

Ramsey doesn't appear to be thinking that way.

"The reason you came to this program is to be a big-leaguer and to start that dream," Ramsey said. "But we're focused on Omaha (Nebraska, and the College World Series) all the way, and that's definitely been the message from all our players."

# A Super sweep for FSU baseball team

FSU advances past regional round for fifth consecutive year with win over Samford

In the week leading up to the Tallahassee Regional, Florida State head coach Mike Martin continually said he wasn't worried about his team's late-season skid and wasn't concerned about the 0-3 showing in the ACC Tournament.

Good call.

With their 5-2 win over Samford in the championship game, the Seminoles swept through the regional undefeated and advanced to the Super Regionals for the fifth straight season.

"They are very mature," Martin said of his players. "They did not panic. We did not play poorly every one of those games (we lost), we just got beat in a couple of them. But their understanding of the game, their knowledge, their grasp of the game, is evident. They went out there and did what they needed to do."

Especially on the mound.

One day after Brandon Leibrandt shut down the Bulldogs in a masterful eight-inning performance, fellow freshman Mike Compton was almost as good on Sunday night.

The right-hander allowed two runs (one earned) and just five hits in six innings pitched to lead FSU to its 16th straight regional win overall.

"He did what he did and I knew I had to go out there and do what I could," Compton said of matching Leibrandt. "It definitely is (a healthy competition)."

Thanks to a sensational relief performance by Samford's Michael Gunter (5 2/3 innings without allowing a hit), Florida State didn't have a basehit after the third inning of Sunday's championship game.

Thanks to the Seminoles' strong pitching and defense, it didn't matter.

Florida State (46-15) turned two critical inning-ending double plays behind Compton, including one on leadoff hitter Zeth Stone in the fifth, in which third baseman Sherman Johnson gloved a hard shot to his left and second baseman Devon Travis made his typical lightning-quick turn at second base.

"It's so much fun (to watch), it really is," Compton said. "When you do miss and you do get a groundball like that, that's hit really hard like that, and he's able to turn it so smoothly I think it gets the whole team pumped up.

"It definitely got me pumped up."

Said Samford head coach Casey Dunn: “They had their dang third baseman practically playing shortstop. And what should have been a sure single ends up being an easy double play. Give them credit for good scouting, good alignment there.”

Reliever Gage Smith pitched two scoreless innings in relief and junior Robert Benincasa pitched a 1-2-3 ninth for his 15th save.

Early on it didn’t look like the Seminoles would even need their closer.

With Samford completely out of regular starting pitching, head coach Casey Dunn elected to go with C.K. Irby to start off against the Seminoles. But he allowed three runs in the second inning – including a two-run single from Josh Delph on a 0-2 pitch – as FSU built an early lead.

“I was just trying to let the ball get as deep as possible,” said Delph, who was named to the All-Regional team. “And if it was a fastball I was just going to foul it off to the left side. I struck out twice (Saturday night) on curveballs, so I wanted to make sure it got deep. And I saw it well and just used my hands well.”

Tyler Vanderheiden started the third inning for the Bulldogs and he actually fared worse than Irby did, allowing all six batters he faced to reach base.

Stephen McGee had a two-run single to center to make the score 5-0 in the third.

“They punched us in the mouth right out of the gate,” Dunn said.

All five runs on Sunday were driven in by the bottom part of the FSU lineup.

“It was huge,” Delph said of the production. “Me and (shortstop Justin Gonzalez) joked around in the locker room after the game (Saturday) night that the bottom of the order is going to take over because we haven’t been doing so hot early in the regionals.

“It felt great.”

Gunter came on in relief of Vanderheiden with the bases loaded in the third and was basically unhittable – allowing just two hard-hit balls for the rest of the game.

But Compton and Co. shut the door on yet another regional win for the Seminoles, who will play the winner of the Palo Alto (Calif.) Regional this weekend at Dick Howser Stadium.

“I’m overjoyed,” Martin said. “To see guys get better and have success is what every coach enjoys. This was a great win for our program. Our young men played and worked hard all year and it’s great to see them get what they deserve.”

# FSU's pitching thrives in the spotlight of regionals

While much of the talk heading into the 2012 NCAA Tallahassee Regional was about Mississippi State's arms and Samford's bats, the real standout segment ended up being a Florida State pitching staff that simply chewed up everything in its way.

In three games – two against Samford and one against UAB – the Seminoles gave up a grand total of three earned runs. That's a 1.00 ERA for the entire tournament. They also struck out 30 batters while walking just four.

And perhaps most impressive was the fact that two of those wins came against Samford, which entered the weekend with one of the nation's most potent offensive attacks. The Bulldogs rank among the national leaders in home runs, slugging percentage and runs scored, but they were unable to get anything to go against Florida State.

One day after freshman Brandon Leibrandt set the tone with eight super innings in an 8-1 victory, fellow freshman Mike Compton pitched six strong frames in Sunday's 5-2 win.

"That says a lot about our pitching staff," sophomore reliever Gage Smith said. "For two freshmen to come in and do that ... they've got to be one of the better hitting teams in the nation, and to shut 'em down like that is huge. They had three runs total? That's pretty strong."

Smith, of course, played a major role as well.

As the "bridge" between the starters and closer Robert Benincasa, Smith was fantastic in his two appearances. In a combined 5 2/3 innings, Smith held Samford to three hits and no runs.

And the combination of Leibrandt, Smith, Compton, Benincasa and Hunter Scantling struck out 19 Samford batters while walking just one in the two games.

"I felt their staff both nights had a really good plan as far as how to pitch us," Samford coach Casey Dunn said. "They made more adjustments against our hitters than we made against their pitchers. I think that was the difference from the mental side of the approach."

Samford's players said FSU's pitchers kept them off-balance all weekend by working both sides of the plate, changing "eye levels" frequently and also pitching inside more than most of their opponents during the regular season.

And Smith, a side-armed, was effective by keeping the ball down in the strike zone and not letting Samford's sluggers get any pitches to drive.

"I just wanted to get ground balls and let them get themselves out," Smith said.

The Seminoles' pitching staff also received a great deal of help from a defense that turned two crucial double plays on Sunday, and FSU assistant coach Mike Martin Jr. said catcher Stephen McGee again was invaluable with his ability to frame pitches.

"People don't realize how many pitches he gets us in a game," Martin Jr. said. "I guarantee you he gets us seven critical pitches every single night that most catchers don't get. And those pitches can flip the count in your favor. He works his tail off every single pitch."

And to top it off, Benincasa was nearly flawless in his two appearances. He allowed just one batter to reach base and recorded a pair of saves.

# Seminoles head back to Omaha

FSU sweeps Stanford to earn College World Series berth

Every year the Florida State Seminoles start the baseball season with one goal.

On Sunday night, in front of another raucous, rowdy crowd at Dick Howser Stadium, they got there. Again.

With an offensive barrage that surpassed Friday night's 17-1 win, FSU slammed Stanford 18-7 in Game 2 of the Super Regionals to punch its ticket to the College World Series for the 21st time in program history.

"I'm a happy camper because this group deserves what they got," said Florida State head coach Mike Martin, who will be heading to Omaha for the 15th time as head coach. "They worked hard all year long. That was a great win. I'm just so proud to be a part of it."

When the season began many thought it would be a rebuilding year for the Seminoles, who were ranked as low as 20th in the preseason by one publication.

Now they're one of eight teams left in the country, vying for a possible national championship.

"What an incredible year," junior second baseman Devon Travis said. "From where we started. And maybe on the outside the expectations weren't as high, but this team believed from day one."

Despite the final score, Sunday's game was actually still very much in doubt in the seventh inning.

Florida State started the frame with a 10-2 lead, but Stanford scored four runs and had the bases loaded with two outs for No. 3 hitter Stephen Piscotty, who was 4 for 4 on the day already.

But FSU senior Hunter Scantling recorded perhaps his biggest out of the season when he induced a groundball to third that Sherman Johnson handled easily to end the threat.

"Hunter has worked very hard and to see him come in and get us a big out was crucial," Martin said. "They had on us the ropes, so to speak. Things I thought were pretty comfortable going into that inning and all of the sudden, bases loaded, four runs down and Piscotty's at the plate.

"Hunter went in there and did a great job. That was a big, important part of the ball game."

The Seminoles then broke it wide open with an eight-run eighth, capped by Seth Miller's one-out grand slam that set off a wild celebration in the stands and in the FSU dugout.

Johnson, who had five RBIs himself on the night, was in the batter's box when the ball left Miller's bat.

"I just started yelling," said Johnson, who had three hits on the night, including a three-run homer in the second inning. "I hadn't even put on my second batting glove yet. I just started yelling and jumping around.

"When he hit that I think everyone understood the game really was over. It was a big lift."

After Miller's blast it was just a matter of counting down the outs.

Scantling recorded the next three and Benincasa, who became one of the best closers in college baseball this season after largely being a non-factor his first years, shut the door in the ninth.

When his 3-2 pitch to pinch-hitter Austin Slater was called strike 3, Benincasa pumped his fist and let out a scream. Veteran infielders Justin Gonzalez, Travis and Johnson celebrated with each other around second base before joining their teammates, who had encompassed Benincasa to the right of the mound.

Said Travis: "I looked at Justin and Sherman before that pitch and said, 'I want to meet with ya'll first. We'll let the dog-pile get going first and then we'll go jump on it after.'

While the infielders embraced, the senior captain dropped to his knees in centerfield.

"I was overwhelmed," James Ramsey said afterwards, choked up with emotion. "On Senior Day I almost lost it because it's been such a great year. These fans have done so much. My family, my teammates have stood by. It kind of hit me all at once.

"I was very overwhelmed."

So was the Stanford pitching staff.

The Cardinal came into the weekend with a team ERA of 3.43. It left Tallahassee after allowing a total of 35 runs in two games.

Johnson and Josh Delph each had three hits on Sunday night and Jayce Boyd and Justin Gonzalez each had two hits and two RBIs. In fact, Boyd started the scoring with a two-run homer to right field in the first inning of Stanford starter Brett Mooneyham, who allowed five earned runs in one inning of work.

"They really earned it," Stanford head coach Mark Marquess said. "They just really hit the ball throughout the lineup. They got some big hits and some clutch hits. That's what you need to do. They're a great team."

A great team that allowed Martin to utter four of his favorite words in the English language as he stood up to leave the press conference on Sunday night: "See you in Omaha."

FSU will play Arizona in the opening round of the CWS; the game time had not been announced as of press time.

# Johnson comes up big for Seminoles with the bat

Sherman Johnson doesn't have an explanation for his postseason power surge.

This much is certain, however — and let's not forget its importance, either. Johnson doesn't plan to change his approach at the plate.

It's one he has employed the entire season.

Florida State's senior third baseman drilled a three-run home run in the second inning and finished with five RBIs to help lead the No. 3 seeded Seminoles past Stanford 18-7 Sunday night and into the College World Series.

Johnson's blast over the right-center field fence was his fourth of the year. Yet, even more impressively, it was Johnson's sixth career postseason home run.

"I don't know," Johnson said and smiled when asked about his postseason muscle.

'It's like a regular season game. I try to put good swings on pitches that I can handle. I just try to get on base for these big boppers behind me.

The Seminoles outscored the Cardinal 35-8 in the NCAA Super Regional to sweep the best-of-three series.

Jayce Boyd's two-run home run in the first inning and Johnson's blast in the second helped stake FSU to an early 6-0 advantage. Seth Miller's grand slam in the eighth ended any suspense.

FSU went undefeated (5-0) in Regional and Super Regional play for just the second time heading into the CWS.

"We didn't slow them down at all," Stanford coach Mark Marquess said.

"They just really hit the ball throughout the lineup. They got some big hits and they got some clutch hits. That's what you need to do."

Johnson admitted he got chills late in the game as he looked up into the Dick Howser Stadium crowd of 4,673. The Seminoles were mere outs away from advancing to the CWS for the third time in five seasons. It also represented Johnson's final game at home.

"A couple of points I looked up in the crowd and it was like, 'Wow, this is crazy. This the last time I am going to be on this field,' " Johnson said. "It was like, 'I want another year.' I got chills.

# James Ramsey wants proper finish to FSU career before meeting Cards in St. Louis

Seminoles senior outfielder claimed by Cardinals in first round of MLB Draft

TALLAHASSEE — One summer about nine or 10 years ago, a young James Ramsey found himself in the enviable position of patting the back of one of his boyhood baseball idols.

Little did young Ramsey know at the time, but the city that had once embraced former major leaguer Jim Edmonds with open arms might eventually do the same for him.

On Monday night, the kid who stood on old Busch Stadium's scorching turf and confidently told Edmonds to "go get em today," took one big, bold step toward turning a dream into reality.

During Monday's first round of the MLB Draft, the St. Louis Cardinals announced they were selecting the current Florida State senior captain with their 23rd overall pick. The move stunned some at baseball's periphery who felt Ramsey's talents were less deserving of the opening round. He wasn't much perturbed by that chatter, though. What had once appeared to be a far off, unseen hope, had finally begun convincing the world that Ramsey would fulfill the purposeful calling he long believed he had.

He's about to be a professional baseball player.

"The Cardinal Nation has already reached out to me and I'm excited about it," Ramsey said during a news conference at FSU on Tuesday. "That's the reason they picked me. Because I'm a winner and I'm a leader that's very committed and passionate about what I want to do."

To those who thought Ramsey was taken too soon, FSU coach Mike Martin had some choice words.

"I'm wanting everybody here to know that the guy got what he deserved," Martin said, opening his news conference comments. "This guy worked extremely hard for four years to be the best he could be in the classroom, on the field, in the clubhouse.

"First guy in the history of the program to wear a 'C' on his chest. ... it's deserved."

Although Ramsey remains encouraged and enthusiastic about his forthcoming move into the Cardinals' farm system, he was adamant in saying his current commitments and passions rest with the Seminoles.

He's so focused on his immediate future at FSU, that he dares not even put on a bright red Cardinals baseball cap until the final out of his collegiate career is recorded.

"There's a reason I've got a Florida State shirt on right now. There's a reason that hat's not on my head yet," Ramsey said. "It's because there's so much left to do, and my teammates know my commitment to them."

If all goes according to plan, Ramsey will be wearing garnet and gold for another three weeks.

This weekend, the Seminoles (46-15) are hosting Stanford (41-16) in a best-of-three Super Regional series in Tallahassee. Win it, they will reach the College World Series for the first time since Ramsey's sophomore season.

Going for the Cardinal — not to be confused with the Cardinals — will be three pitchers who were all drafted in the first three rounds this week. One of them, Stanford pitcher and designated hitter Stephen Priscotty, was also claimed by St. Louis with the 36th overall pick. He and Ramsey played together in the Cape Cod League last summer.

"The Cape was huge," Ramsey said. "I wasn't going up there to prove anybody wrong. I wasn't going up there to make a statement. I wasn't necessarily against anyone. I was going up there intrinsically motivated knowing that was the step I needed to take for my career."

While his career had already been trending upward, it took an even more dramatic climb this season. It was a season that almost didn't happen. After being drafted by the Minnesota Twins in the 22nd round of last June's draft, Ramsey decided last August to return to FSU. It was clearly the right choice.

"I told him when he was trying to make the decision, I told him just do it with no regrets," Ramsey's mom, Mary, said. "Even if you don't have a great year, but it'll still be OK to be there and just get your degree and finish up."

Mom may have thought the decision was the right one, but not everyone did.

"I was called every name in the book. Fool, idiot, stupid. I'll leave some of them out," Ramsey said. "But ultimately, that's going to happen in my career. That's going to happen in all my walks of life; in my faith life. That's something else that people kind of call me irrational about and crazy."

Entering the Super Regional, Ramsey is hitting .385 and leads the team with 13 home runs. A former shortstop, he played right field last year before being moved to center field this season. There, he hasn't committed an error.

"He didn't come back and mope ... he came back committed to being better the next year, and in so doing, he made those around him better," Martin said.

Martin added that he believed Ramsey was a good ballplayer when he recruited him, but didn't think he'd become a first-round talent.

"Ain't no way I was going to project him to be a No. 1 (round) draft choice today. Ain't no way," Martin said. "But he made himself into what he is. All we did was give him the goods through facilities and encouragement. He did the rest. And that's what college athletics is about."

Ramsey spent draft Monday with family in Tallahassee. During the MLB Network's live telecast of the event, he texted former teammate Sean Gilmartin — FSU's last first-rounder, taken 28th overall by the Atlanta Braves last season — and current teammate Devon Travis.

Gilmartin was working the radar gun during a minor league game with the Mississippi Braves. Travis was with other teammates when the announcement was made. Quickly, they jumped into cars and rushed to Ramsey, honking their car horns loudly upon their arrival.

“He shocked the world, man,” Travis said. “Almost brings tears to your eyes.

“He just brings it every day. And it’s not for show. A lot of people may think it’s for show. It’s serious everyday. Whether the camera’s on or the camera’s off, he brings everything he’s got.”

For the present, “everything” will be brought to Dick Howser Stadium, and, Ramsey hopes, to TD Ameritrade Park in Omaha, Neb. next week.

## Compton perfect for Seminoles

Mike Compton has embraced his transformation from thrower to pitcher during his transition from Branson to Florida State.

“I definitely think location is more important than velocity,” Compton said. “That’s been part of the learning curve for me. I’ve learned it doesn’t matter how hard you throw the ball. My velocity is about the same as it was in high school (88-90 mph). But in college, you’re not going to blow the ball by hitters. You have to put the ball where it’s supposed to be to get guys out.

“My location on both the inside and outside corners with my fastball has been pretty solid.”

Compton has exceeded his own expectations. The freshman right-hander enters his start today at Boston College with a 6-0 record and 2.84 ERA.

“I didn’t expect this,” he said. “It’s hard to know what will happen as a freshman when you’re one of 15-20 guys fighting for a spot. I worked hard every day, hoping to get a chance. When I got my chance, I made the most of it.

“When I was facing some of the best hitters in the nation (in pre-season intra-squad scrimmages) and getting them out, that gave me a lot of confidence.”

Compton has picked up right where he left off at Branson, where he posted 21 wins and a 1.40 ERA the last four seasons. But he’s going about things in a different manner.

Compton had 243 strikeouts in 195 innings for the Pirates. He has 30 strikeouts, or an average of 0.7 an inning, for the No. 1-ranked Seminoles.

“My strikeout ratio is not as high as it was in high school. But that’s OK, as long as you’re making good pitches,” Compton said. “You can make some of your best pitches and college hitters are still going to hit the ball. So, you’ve got to keep them off balance and keep your pitches low. If you can do that, you’re going to get a lot of groundouts.”

Compton’s sudden emergence at the college level seemingly has caught MLB scouts by surprise. His name was not called during the 50 rounds of last summer’s MLB First-Year Player Draft. He’ll next be eligible to be drafted after his junior season.

Compton didn’t take it as a slight that he was not drafted. Nor does he hold a grudge.

“I wasn’t disappointed when I didn’t get drafted and haven’t had a chip on my shoulder,” he said. “I think the (elbow) injury I had my senior year raised some questions. I had my mind made up I wanted to get an education, anyway.”

# Bartow Standout Josh Delph Settles in At FSU

"A lot of people back home said, 'He's a freshman at Florida State, and he's probably not going to get that many opportunities,'" Delph said. "I always kept that in mind and used that as motivation to work harder. I've always been pretty confident and felt that I could make an impact right away."

Delph has made the most of his opportunities this season, hitting .250 in 12 starts for the Seminoles (eight in right field, where he has not made an error, and four at designated hitter). Five of his 11 hits are doubles, and he's scored 10 runs and produced seven RBIs.

He scored three runs in his first four college games, doing it without getting on base by virtue of a hit.

"I've always been a scrappy player," Delph said. "That's just who I am."

Delph's first college hit came a few weeks later when he smacked a two-run double in a victory at Duke. He later strung together a six-game hitting streak.

One of the keys to Delph's progress has been his work with assistant coach Mike Martin Jr. Delph was recruited by former pitching coach Jamey Shouppe. Martin Jr. had never seen Delph play until he arrived on campus.

Delph admits that he was often changing his stance in the batter's box in high school, where he hit .428 with three home runs and had 20 stolen bases as a senior at Bartow. Martin Jr. was able to help him find a comfortable, consistent stance. And Martin Jr. has also seen Delph develop a strong and selective eye at the plate.

"The first thing I saw him do was move and throw and run," Martin Jr. said. "The intangibles were there. He's getting better offensively. He's going to be a real good player. He'll be a high doubles guy."

Delph said he doesn't consider himself a freshman anymore. He can already see the difference in the short time he has been on campus.

"I knew I had the tools to get better," Delph said. "I wasn't prepared when I first got here. But since then I've worked pretty hard and I've improved."

Delph is part of a group of freshman that has made an impact at FSU. Two starting pitchers, Brandon Leibrandt and Mike Compton, have combined for 11 wins. And Delph, John Holland, Jose Brizuela and John Nogowski have all started games for FSU.

"We came in pretty mature, ready to make a difference right away," Delph said.

Delph followed FSU football and baseball his entire life. His mom, Patricia, graduated from FSU, and he has aunts and uncles who live in Tallahassee. His dad, Tim, played baseball at Western Kentucky, just as Josh's grandfather did, too. Delph also had a chance to play at WKU but opted to stay closer to home.

"I couldn't turn down Florida State," Delph said.

There are few, if any, players on the Florida State roster who will enjoy the four days off this week more than catcher Stephen McGee.

Each morning when the redshirt sophomore gets out of bed he hears a symphony of creaks and cracks from his knees. He then takes around 30 minutes to get stretched out and ready for the day.

"Mornings are rough," he said. "It takes me a good half hour to get stretched and be able to get moving."

The soreness is a product of catching 346 of a possible 358 innings for the top-ranked Seminoles (33-7, 19-2 ACC) while starting every game this season. During a three-game sweep of Miami over the weekend, McGee caught 27 of 28 innings, and the lone inning he wasn't behind the plate he was at first base.

After the four-day break for final exams this week, McGee is expected back in the lineup as the Seminoles host Rhode Island this weekend.

"He's caught as many innings as any catcher I've had," FSU head coach Mike Martin said. "And that includes (former All-American catcher Buster) Posey? and the guy needs some time off."

McGee came into the season expecting to battle freshman Mario Amaral for the starting job behind the plate. But Amaral has seen action in just three games, starting none, and hasn't been able to play since Feb. 21 due to a back injury.

McGee dealt with his own injury last season as a right shoulder injury forced him to take a medical redshirt after appearing in 10 games. Because of the time he spent in the training room last season, the Port St. Lucie, Fla. native has made sure to take the necessary precautions to stay healthy this season.

"My body has been going through ups and downs," he said. "But still getting in (the training room) with (trainer) Corey Couture before and after. Just working on everything trying to keep my body healthy?just really trying to stay on top of things and make sure I am healthy. As the season goes on it gets tougher and tougher."

What hasn't gotten tougher for McGee as the season has gone on is getting on base. Though he entered the year with just 21 career at-bats, McGee is second on the team with a .474 on-base percentage to go along with a .263 batting average.

At the start of the season, McGee was penciled in the lineup in the No. 9 hole, but due to his ability to get on base (his 39 walks is second on the team to Sherman Johnson and is the ninth most in the country) he now bats fifth for FSU..

"He has a very good eye at the plate," Martin said. "He's got a good head on his shoulders, and he doesn't get frustrated if things don't go right. Doesn't carry his at bat back up to the plate the next time, and certainly never takes his at bat behind the plate."

His production at the plate is a mere bonus for the Seminoles, his true value is in how he has handled a young pitching staff this season.

FSU has a team earned run average of 3.44 this season, and reliever Gage Smith said that McGee is huge reason for the success on the mound by the young staff.

"I have never thrown to someone better," Smith said of McGee. "I love throwing to Steve better than any catcher I've ever thrown to. He's great back there and it's good to have him back there every time I throw and I know he's going to get me strikes that might not even be strikes. The way he catches the ball, and now he's hitting the ball too, he's big for us."

Last week Martin joked he would like to give his backstop the day off against D-II North Georgia, but didn't want to upset the 6-foot-3, 220-pound McGee.

"He would probably get mad," Martin joked. "I don't want to make him mad. He's bigger than I am."

# McGee becomes FSU's iron man

Catcher has started every game

He hasn't missed a game all season. And if the Florida State baseball team had been scheduled to play a game on Tuesday, coach Mike Martin admitted catcher Stephen McGee wouldn't have started.

"He could not have caught tonight," Martin said on Tuesday afternoon. "He's tired. It's only reasonable to understand that. He's caught as many innings as any catcher I've had, and that includes (Buster) Posey."

McGee has started every game and caught 310 of a possible 321 innings for the No. 2 Seminoles, who take on North Georgia today before hosting rival Miami in a three-game series this weekend.

McGee is hitting .248 on the season with no home runs and 18 RBIs, but he has an on-base percentage of .468 – second-highest on the team to James Ramsey's .500. He has walked 36 times and been hit another 10.

"He has a very good eye at the plate," Martin said. "He's got a good head on his shoulders, and he doesn't get frustrated if things don't go his way ... and he never takes his at-bat behind the plate with him."

And behind the plate is where Martin expects the redshirt sophomore to be tonight.

Big surprise.

"I would really like to give him (today) off," Martin said. "But he would probably get mad. I don't want to make him mad. He's bigger than I am."

Sitz starts tonight, Sunday

Junior right-hander Scott Sitz (1-2, 3.03 ERA) will get a controlled start tonight against North Georgia — "40 to 50 pitches," Martin said — and will also start again on Sunday afternoon against the Hurricanes.

The FSU coaches decided to give sophomore Peter Miller (5-1, 4.05 ERA) the weekend off due to shoulder soreness. Miller pitched just 2/3 of an inning on Sunday in the Seminoles' 17-6 loss to Boston College.

"We want him to have the entire week to rest it," Martin said.

Come rain or shine

Before his interview with the media on Tuesday, Martin made sure to talk to one of the members of the Florida State grounds crew and let him know that he wanted the field covered Tuesday night in case of rain. He didn't want to take any chances that today's game would be called due to inclement weather or an unplayable field.

Martin said it was for the sake of his team and the opponents.

"It's their biggest game of the year," Martin said of the North Georgia Saints. "You don't want anything to happen. They're nice enough to come down here. We needed one game. And we had to cancel it last year."

# FSU pitcher Gage Smith back on track after career performance

Former North Florida Christian standout rebounds from shaky outing

It had been exactly one week since he walked off that mound in Chestnut Hill, Mass., almost in a daze from what had just happened.

Gage Smith hadn't just been ineffective in Florida State's 17-6 loss to Boston College that day. He had been obliterated.

Smith, a former North Florida Christian standout, faced six batters. He gave up six hits. And four earned runs. When it was over the sophomore reliever's ERA had shot up a full two runs to 5.00.

"I had probably the worst outing I've ever had in my entire life," Smith said.

Seven days later he had the best outing of his college career, pitching a career-high 4 1/3 innings and allowing two hits and no earned runs in helping the Seminoles come back to defeat the Miami Hurricanes 8-7 in 10 innings Sunday afternoon.

The lowest of the lows. The highest of the highs. In the span of seven days.

"It was obviously really big for me," said Smith, who lowered his ERA back down to 3.75. "I'm just glad I was able to throw well. The slider felt really good. ... I'm feeling really good right now. So it was big to get the confidence back."

And he said it was big for his coaches to show confidence in him as well.

The righty sidearmer had escaped a two-on, two-out jam in the seventh inning against the Hurricanes and had already thrown a career-high in innings pitched. But coach Mike Martin and pitching coach Mike Bell sent Smith back out for the eighth inning — which included two left-handers — and he responded with a 1-2-3 inning, making sure the Seminoles didn't have to use closer Robert Benincasa until the ninth.

"I wasn't expecting it, to be honest with you," Smith said about going out for the eighth inning. "But I was getting outs, getting groundballs, which is all they ask of me. I'm glad they left me in because I felt really good and I knew I was going to get outs. I'm glad they showed confidence in me, too."

Smith, like he has been for much of the year, figures to be a critical part of the FSU bullpen moving forward. He will likely play a key role in the late innings, trying to bridge the gap from the starters to Benincasa, who has been one of the best closers in college baseball.

Which is why Sunday's outing was so crucial.

“That’s the way Gage can pitch and that’s the way Gage has pitched for most of the season,” Benincasa said. “He had one little hiccup at B.C., but that’s not the pitcher Gage is. He came out (on Sunday) and dominated righties and dominated lefties. He was huge for us.”

# Gage Smith battles injury, helps lift FSU baseball to win

It only hurt when he smiled. But on this night, how could Gage Smith do anything else?

With nine stitches covering two lacerations to his mouth, the sophomore turned in the most important — and perhaps impressive — outing of his Florida State career in a 2-1 NCAA regional victory Friday night against UAB.

After coming in for starter Scott Sitz in the top of the fifth inning, Smith allowed just three hits and no runs in 32/3 innings to pick up the win and help the Seminoles advance to a winner's bracket game tonight against Samford.

The performance was even more impressive considering the fact that Smith's mouth was sliced open in a freak clubhouse accident before the game.

"He won't say anything about it, but ... he had a few stitches in his mouth before the ballgame," FSU coach Mike Martin said. "And he goes out there and throws right at 60 pitches to keep his ballclub in the game."

Though he couldn't really smile, Smith (4-0) saw humor in the accident. He said FSU catcher Stephen McGee was taking some soft practice swings during a lightning delay between games, when Smith walked behind him and took the barrel of the bat to his mouth.

"It was my fault," Smith said. "I'm gonna take 90 percent of the blame."

At first, Smith said, he didn't think the injury was too severe. Then he saw the blood and went to see team trainer Cory Couture.

"Cory was like, 'That's terrible. You've got to get stitches,'" Smith said. "It was gushing (blood). It looks a lot worse than it feels."

With the help of Dr. David Bellamy and Dr. Steve Jordan of Tallahassee Orthopedic Clinic, Smith was cleared to play before the game, and the former North Florida Christian standout came through in a big way.

Though he wasn't dominant — he allowed UAB's first two batters in the sixth inning to reach on hits and faced a bases-loaded, two-out situation in the seventh — Smith never gave in to the Blazers.

After shortstop Justin Gonzalez turned a nifty double play to end the sixth, Smith got UAB center fielder Ryan Ussery to ground into a fielder's choice to end the seventh.

Making the second-longest appearance of his career, Smith then set the Blazers down in order in the eighth inning before turning it over to closer Robert Benincasa, who recorded his 14th save.

"The only times I really felt it was when we made big defensive plays and got out of the innings," Smith said. "I got excited and opened my mouth a little too much."

# Coach Keeps Focus on Winning, Without Losing Sight of Everything Else

For 33 consecutive seasons, Mike Martin has coached the Florida State baseball team into the N.C.A.A. tournament.

During that time, he has won 1,716 games, a total that ranks third on the Division I career list. His teams have made the College World Series 14 times.

But Martin has never won a national championship.

The drive for a title so consumed Martin early in his career that he compared himself to Captain Ahab. On Friday, the third-seeded Seminoles (43-15) begin a new voyage to capture college baseball's white whale, when they host Alabama-Birmingham in the Tallahassee regional.

Success came quickly for Martin; he led Florida State to the College World Series in his first season, in 1980, which ignited his obsession.

This week, Martin, 68, reflecting on his coaching career, said he would no longer allow titles to define his legacy.

"I was in my mid-30s, wanting to be viewed as the best, and I strived to win a national championship," Martin said. "I thought that would make me be perceived in a different light.

"I still want to win as bad; it just doesn't mean I want to be perceived as the best. I answer to myself by asking: 'Have I worked hard? Have I done everything I can to make our team better?' At the end of the day, I think that's all you can expect from yourself."

Martin has been a part of Florida State baseball for 40 years, also having spent time as a player and an assistant. He has coached some of the game's best athletes, including Deion Sanders and San Francisco Giants catcher Buster Posey.

"Putting on the garnet and gold is a blessing," said the senior outfielder James Ramsey, whose father, Craig, was captain of the 1980 Seminoles. "Coach has one of the best traditions of getting players to the big leagues."

Posey, the 2010 National League rookie of the year, said: "I think he does as good a job as anybody

I've been around in preparing his players mentally. Whether it's a game or practice, he brings the same intensity. He doesn't let guys take a pitch off."

Martin had his own dreams of playing professionally. In 1965, he was a star outfielder, helping lead the Seminoles to the College World Series. But all did not go smoothly.

"That was one of my first plane rides," Martin said. "It wasn't on a jet, neither, but a twin-engine. At first, we thought we were hot stuff, boy, flying to Omaha. That I remember well because I lost my cookies as we landed."

Martin never played in the famed Rosenblatt Stadium, the site of the College World Series from 1950 to 2010. Before the Seminoles' first game, he broke his arm, just hours after he had mailed a letter informing major league teams that he would sign if he were drafted.

Martin eventually played minor league baseball for three seasons before coaching basketball at Tallahassee Community College and Godby High School. In 1975, the Seminoles' baseball coach, Woody Woodward, hired Martin as an assistant. One year later, another coach destined to be a legend arrived, as Bobby Bowden took over the struggling football program.

Bowden said he and Martin would help each other recruit two-sport athletes like Sanders.

"The thing that's amazing to me is his record year in and year out," Bowden said. "He loses great players every year to the draft." Like Martin's, Bowden's teams were consistently at or near the top of the rankings during the regular season, only to finish short of the title. Finally, in 1993, Bowden won the first of his two national championships.

"I used to make this statement when I was coaching: it's just like putting in golf," Bowden said. "You lip out here and there, and you finally get one in there. If Mike stays with it, and I don't know why he wouldn't, I think the putts will eventually fall.

"Plus, he's an excellent golfer, and I'm not."

Over all, Florida State has made the College World Series 20 times without a championship, the longest such streak in college baseball.

"I think when every guy signs here, that's something on your mind," said Devon Travis, a junior second baseman who helped the Seminoles achieve a No. 1 ranking for seven weeks this season. "Honestly, there'd be no better feeling in the world than to bring one back to Tallahassee for him, no guy that deserves it more."

On April 8, Martin won his 1,700th game. He trails only Wichita State's Gene Stephenson and Augie Garrido of Texas in wins among Division I coaches.

“Having the trophy is not the true measure of a person’s success,” said Garrido, who has won five national titles and has known Martin for more than 30 years. “It doesn’t affect the champion that he is in the minds of all of us that know the truth about this business. We’re in the teaching-life-skills business. He’s won championships there several hundred times.”

Martin said that he planned to continue coaching after this season, but that he would not hang around simply to try to win the elusive championship.

“I’m not going to coach my grandson — he’s 10 — I assure you of that,” Martin said. “I’m going to go a few more if the university wants me to, but I’m not going to go 10 more years.

“I’m so blessed to be able to do what I do. There’s just no game that affects me like baseball. It’s a game that challenges you every single day, just like life. I’m just trying to get home safely.”
