Fiji hosts the X11th South Pacific Games Basketball Competition.

The X11th South Pacific Games were staged in Suva, Fiji between 5th and 12th July 2003. The Fiji Basketball Federation joined forces with FIBA Oceania and the SPG's Organising Committee to stage a most successful basketball tournament. Congratulations to the organising committee, who under the supervision of Glynis Miller and Tom Wilson did an outstanding job.

The basketball federations of the Pacific were delighted that the Secretary General of FIBA, Patrick Baumann was able to attend the tournament for a short period.

15 national teams participated in the tournament – 7 women's and 8 men's teams. Tahiti, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, Guam, New Caledonia and Fiji entered a men's and women's team, while Kiribati and Vanuatu entered men and Palau entered the women's division.

The newly constructed multi-purpose hall proved to be an outstanding venue, although a number of small technical difficulties were experienced during the tournament. With its timber floor, spectacular electronic scoreboard, transportable backboards and ample spectator seating the facility allowed teams to perform to their best. The vastness of the hall allowed the courts to be configured to suit the competition. The new complex allows several court configurations – up to three basketball courts at the same time. The preliminary rounds were played across the auditorium, while the finals were played on the championship courts which allowed greater spectator space.

Individual team preparation for the Games varied, but the exposure gained by the players from New Caledonia, Tahiti and Fiji through pre-Games tours to Australia and New Zealand provided an additional level of intensity. Congratulations to the federations who were able to incorporate off-island training programs for their players.

An exciting observation, from a development perspective, was the number of 2003 All Star Youth representative players who attended the Games in their senior national team. The goal to encourage generational transition in national teams has become a reality. All Star players from Papua New Guinea, Fiji, Tahiti and New Caledonia stepped up to their senior national teams with skill and confidence.

The 2004 South Pacific Games saw a 'changing of the guard' in the women's competition. Coming into these Games as the 1995 & 1999 SPG gold medallists, 1997 Mini Games gold medallists and 2001 Oceania Tournament gold medallists, Tahiti were considered favourites to continue their domination of the women's competition. Perhaps this domination was the motivating factor used by other federation in their Games preparations. History will show that the Tahitian women's team finished the 2003 SPG's in 4th place.

It was encouraging to see the continued improvement in the standard of play and coaching at the Games. The vastly improved play of the PNG men's and women's teams, and the Vanuatu men's team was a credit to their coaching staff. The appearance of the Palau women's team, having won the gold at the Micronesian Games, proved an invaluable experience for the girls, and will boost female participation in basketball in Palau.

It was evident that a great deal of time and effort had gone into the training of the basketball volunteers prior to the commencement of the games. There were an ample number of volunteers to undertake the scorebench, statistics and administrative tasks, and they performed their duties in a very professional manner. Congratulations to section leaders Lydia Sokosoko (scorebench), Jacki Low (statistics) and Joe Cash (administration) for their work in ensuring that their staff were well trained.

The rostering of volunteers worked well, people were enthusiastic about being involved, and the fact that there were very few problems with the conduct of the tournament points to a well trained volunteer group. Volunteer uniforms provided by the SPG Organising Committee proved very successful, and looked very professional.

FIBA Oceania's AYAD Michelle Roffey and Fiji Basketball's Joe Morrell did a magnificent job in coordinating the Games preparations. The arrangements for the training of volunteers, facilities, equipment, practice games, referees, uniforms, meals, transport and venue management were expertly handled by Michelle and Joe. Congratulations to them both for the thorough and professional manner they went about their work.

The integration of the statistics program into the computerised competition package enabled the tournament administrators to post full game and player statistics to the tournament website a short time after each game had been completed. A great deal of time had been spent prior to the tournament in ensuring that the game results, match reports and photographs could be posted to the website. Proof that this was time well spent are shown in the figures – the SPG basketball site received an amazing 117,824 hits from countries right across the world.

While it is opportune to praise the participating teams and the volunteers from Fiji who made the tournament the success it was, we must also review the disappointing aspects of the Games.

Federations must ensure that they provide a referee for each team that they enter in the competition to ensure a suitable number of referees are in attendance. FIBA Oceania tries to ensure that games are refereed by neutral referees, that referees do not have to run multiple games each day and that a competitive atmosphere is created between the referees to ensure the best possible referees receive the medal games. For these things to occur, it is most important that each federation sends a suitably qualified referee for each team they enter in the competition.

The other disappointing aspect of the 2003 Games was the noticeable decline by some teams in player and coach behaviour. The high standard of sportsmanship that has been a feature of basketball in the Pacific was shattered by incidents in both the men and women's competition. It was extremely disappointing that unsatisfactory conduct lead to fights, coach dismissal and abuse of officials.

While the desire to win is always high, and games are played with physical intensity, there is never an excuse for player and coach misbehaviour to the level seen in these Games. Federation executive members must ensure that their players and coaches respect the opposition, the referees and the tournament officials so that a repeat of this behaviour is not seen again.

Competition Format:

Due to the late withdrawal of teams from the competition, the final competition draw and format was not decided until the week prior to the Games. This was most unsatisfactory and resulted in confusion between the various organising groups and the participating federations. A failure to communicate the exact days of competition early in 2003 resulted in many basketball teams arriving in Fiji 8 days prior to the commencement of the basketball program. This escalated the costs for federations and was not the preferred lead-up to such an important competition.

The basketball competition was conducted in line with the SPG charter. This created some difficulties. Some men's teams only played 4 games during the whole tournament, while in the women's competition the situations was reversed, where some teams had to play 8 games in the same time.

The preliminary rounds of the men's competition was conducted in two pools of 4 teams. The top two teams from each pool crossed over in the semi finals, with the winners going to the gold medal game. Play-off games between the bottom two teams in each pool were played, providing an accurate final team ranking.

The women's competition, with 7 teams, played a full round robing competition with the top two teams playing off for gold and the 3rd and 4th placed teams playing off for bronze. Play off games for the positions 5 - 8 were not conducted due to time restrictions.

There were difficulties in scheduling all of the women's competition into the days provided for basketball, which resulted in teams playing two games on some days.

The top group of referees was competent for this level of competition. The top group of referees included Jean-Claude Fuller, Golden Kiloko, Samuel Tehuiotoa, John Halloran, Gabriel White, Peter Izono, Sailass Kotton, Brian Pogotapu, Emma Hatigeva and Kelevi Serukalou.

- * The fact that the Solomon Islands, Marshall Islands and CNMI supplied referees but did not send teams allowed for us to have some neutral officials.
- * Palau sent 1 team and 2 referees.
- * Guam, Tahiti and New Caledonia sent 2 teams each but only one referee each.
- * Samoa and PNG sent 2 teams each but no referees.
- * Kiribati sent 1 team but no referee.

Obviously those countries that did not send the required number of referees created problems with the rostering of referees. FIBA Oceania continues FIBA's requirement of neutral country referees. There are many constraints placed on the rostering of referees, and for teams to be able to play under the best possible conditions, it is necessary that every team provides a suitably qualified referee for every team they enter.

We had 4 meetings with the referees during the tournament for education and organisational reasons. The only referees who failed to meet these requirements were from the local Fiji contingent.

The major areas that required attention during our education sessions were:

- 1. Correct court coverage in the trail and lead position.
- 2. Reading the play.
- 3. Game management

The first two problem areas are surely a result of a lack of evaluations taking place in the local officiating in their home countries. The third area is one that we need to highlight more at the Referee Technical Meeting prior to all tournaments.

Both Jon Hoyle and myself did written evaluations for each referee in all games up until the Friday night. On the last day of medal rounds I did verbal appraisals.

Each referee was given a copy of the evaluation.

Pre-planning for this trip included working with the referees and scorebench officials from Fiji who would officiate at the upcoming South Pacific Games. While Stuart Manwaring had spent three weeks in May in Fiji, it was believed that there was need for further training and encouragement of these officials.

The bulk of my time prior to the South Pacific Games was spent working and helping to organise these officials. Also, three referees who had been nominated by Fiji Basketball Federation to work the games tournament were in need of acquiring their Oceania Level 1 Referees Certificates.

Once again it was a highlight of my year to attend this major international basketball event. It was satisfying to renew acquaintances with the members of the various national delegations and more importantly to witness the continued improvement in playing standard exhibited by all teams.

The highlights were many:

* The vastly improved play of the PNG men's and women's teams was a delight to witness. Finally in Moses Koroi, the men have a teaching coach who may be able with continued involvement and commitment to take the team to the next level. The dedication and commitment of the women's team in the face of adversity – losing their coach at the last minute – would have made players of lesser

fortitude give up in exasperation. Yet the girls were self-motivated, not focusing on negatives but in my opinion things are finally starting to look very positive for the future of PNG basketball.

- * The participation, performance and attitude of the Palua women's team gladdened me. While many countries culled team sports because of the belief that results would not reflect the financial cost, the Palau National Olympic Committee and the Palau Basketball Federation supported their women's team because the team were able to meet the NOC's self-imposed qualifying standard medalling at the Micronesian Games. While many countries have a short-sighted view to the development of sports especially team sports, Palau, in encouraging their women's team's participation are fulfilling their Olympic charter. While the team was unable to win a game, they were very competitive with all the other teams and played with enthusiasm and in the "right" spirit. I hope that the team will continue to attend international events outside the Micronesian region should they meet qualifying standards in the future.
- Likewise, the dramatic improvement in the quality of play of the Vanuatu men's team was equally gladdening to have witnessed. Continually a supporter of FIBA Oceania events, Vanuatu have not previously had access to a quality coach the equal of American Dean Donnellan who was their mentor for these championships. While the team's positioning in the classification was at a similar level as in previous games, the quality of play was substantially better. With Coach Donnellan leaving Vanuatu soon after the games, it is hoped that the players have been able to learn from him and that they will be able to continue on their upward path into the future.
- * Fiji can be very proud of the performance of its men's and women's teams at the championships. Their preparation was a credit to the coaching and support staff, and while obviously disappointed in not "winning gold", the teams played quality basketball and proved that they are on target for continued success in future Oceania competitions.
- * The continued improvement and development of New Caledonia basketball was also pleasing to witness. Both men's coach Angelo Francoise Elocie and women's coach Ivanhoe Fenuafanote are maturing in their approach to the game and it is a credit to the philosophy of the New Caledonian Federation that they have been able to allow these two coaches to grow into their roles as national coaches over the last four to six years by providing them with adequate preparation opportunities. Both cagou teams are 'teams' in every sense of the word, epitomising 'together everyone achieves more.'
- * FIBA Oceania's Australian Youth Ambassador, Michelle Roffey proved to be an invaluable asset for FABF in the lead up to the Games. She has a personable vitality, is enthusiastic, committed and thorough. Without her dedication, the conduct of the South Pacific Games Basketball tournament and its preparation would not have run so smoothly. Working with Michelle as her local counterpart has been Joe Morrell. I have been thoroughly impressed with Joe's dedication and commitment to the job.
- * The FABF can also be very proud of the efforts of the various volunteers who were instrumental in the outstanding success of the SPG basketball tournament. Glynis Miller, David Simpson, Tom Wilson and Lydia Sokosoko, Jacki Low and Joe Cash as leaders of the various volunteer groups, can take great pride in what they were able to achieve.

That teams of the quality of the Fiji Men's team and the Tahitian women's teams were unable to medal at the games augers well for our sport. Both competitions were very even with the top teams seemingly starting to pull the traditionally "bottom" teams closer to their level of play. What a great legacy the games have left to Fiji sport. The opportunity of having a three-court stadium available for local competitions should be the impetus for dramatic participation growth for basketball. I hope that the FABF and Michelle and Joe "strike while the iron is hot" over the next two months to take advantage of the opportunity that the games have provided.

During my visit, I witnessed many kids walking down the street with basketballs who currently do not have a regular competition in which to play. It will be a crime and a waste of everyone's efforts if those kids enthused from witnessing the games' basketball competition do not get that opportunity over the next few months.

Mid-Term Conference and Special General Meeting:

FIBA Oceania conducted its mid-term conference during the competition rest day of the SPG's. We also held a special general meeting in order to make changes to our constitution to reflect our name change, to formalise the position of Honorary Life President and to clarify the method of voting at FIBA Oceania meetings. It was a great honour that FIBA's new secretary general Patrick Baumann made time in his busy program to spend time with us.

The mid-term conference considered and adopted the 2001 & 2002 annual reports which summarise activity since our last meeting in June 2001.

The presence of the FIBA Secretary General allowed the presentations on the new FIBA brand and logo and on the strategic plan to be explained in the context of FIBA's global vision.

The FIBA Oceania budget for the 2003-2006 shows a significant excess of spending over income and the FIBA Oceania Secretary General was instructed to take all necessary action to ensure a balanced budget over the 4 year cycle.

FIBA Oceania advised that it had made a submission to the SPG Council to bring eligibility for the SPG basketball competition into line with FIBA regulations.

The mid-term conference gave Secretary General Smith and the Management Committee permission to continue discussions with Basketball Australia and Basketball New Zealand regarding the expansion of the Australian men's National Basketball League through the inclusion of a New Zealand based team. The mid-term conference endorsed a recommendation from the management Committee that the 2004 Oceania Youth Tournament will be staged in Coffs Harbour during the month of June 2004.

Furthermore there being only one application, the 2004 Oceania Championships for Young Men and Junior Women will be played in Australia.

It was confirmed that FIBA Oceania would not conduct a separate Oceania Tournament in 2005 and would put its efforts behind the Mini-South Pacific Games Basketball Tournament in Palau.

Rout, White honoured:

Following a recommendation from the Management Committee, FIBA Oceania Member of Honour status was bestowed on Michael White from the Northern Marianas and David Rout from New Zealand.

David, a former President of Basketball New Zealand, has served FIBA Oceania over an extended period as its representative on the International Commission for Mini Basketball. David showed a great commitment and enthusiasm for this aspect of basketball and it was only a change in the structure of FIBA's International Commissions in 2002 which brought his involvement to an end.

David carried out most of his mini basketball work on behalf of Oceania at his own expense for many years and it is only fitting that his contribution has been honoured with the bestowing of Member of Honour.

Michael White, the secretary/treasurer of the basketball federation of the Northern Marianas has a lifetime of involvement with basketball at the regional level and has played a number of roles including national representative player, coach, referee and administrator.

Michael is seen at almost as many Oceania events as Al Ramsay and in 1998 became an Oceania representative to the FIBA Central Board. At the same time, during the 1997-2001 period he was also a member of the FIBA Oceania Management Committee.

With a background in the legal area he has made a significant contribution to FIBA Oceania in helping to frame and modify its constitution. As well as being a tournament referee he has also acted on the Technical Committee of several FIBA Oceania events. It is certainly fitting and appropriate that his services to the game is recognised with the bestowing of Member of Honour status.

Vautrin receives Administration Award.

Robert Vautrin, the President of the New Caledonian basketball federation, was chosen from among a field of four as the 2003 recipient of the Patricia Ramsay Award. Instituted in 1997 the award is designed to recognised the achievements of basketball administrators at the national or Oceania level.

Vautrin, who has held a number of positions with the New Caledonian Basketball Federation, has been its president since 1987. Over a 16 year period his commitment, enthusiasm and professional approach to his volunteer duties has seen the teams from his country rise to a position of consistently high level performers at the Oceania level.

Robert became an administrator after also serving as player, coach and referee. There is no doubt that his dedicated service to the sport in New Caledonia has been a major element in the rise of the federation. It is very pleasing that his efforts have been recognised with the awarding of the Patricia Ramsay Award.

Congratulations on the recognition:

Thank you to the basketball federations of Australia, Papua New Guinea, Palau and New Caledonia on seeing fit to nominate one of their members for the 2002 Patricia Ramsay Award.

While it is true there can only be one winner, it must be pleasing for Ronnie Mea (PNG), Bernie Harty (Australia) and Sinton Soalablai (Palau) to know that their work as administrators is recognised and appreciated by their federation. FIBA Oceania on behalf of our sport thanks them for heir work for basketball which in all cases extends over very many years. I hope you continue to receive many more years of enjoyment from basketball.
