Dear GSP Families and Friends,

We all know that we are part of an excellent school. GSP does great things as a learning community together. I write today to share important information about the future of our school. It is time for us to work together as parents, teachers, board members, friends and students to chart the course for this school's next five years. Your participation in this process is vital to helping inform the board of your interests, wishes and ideas.

The Past Five Years:

- -The school has operated under a long range plan to ensure the stability of our program.
- -The focus has been on being the best pre-K through 5th grade program that we can be.
- -We weathered a significant global economic downturn and came through it with a rock solid financial base.
- -We firmly established our place among the upper echelon of elementary school programs in the Portland Metropolitan area.

The Next Five Years:

- -Our lease on the current space expires June 28, 2015.
- -Before a decision on where to go (or stay) should be made, the school needs to proactively decide what kind of school we want to be.
- -Over the next two months, the board is embarking on a research and decision making journey to identify and develop a strategic plan.

- 4. Add an English language track <u>Barbara Simon-Evrenosoglu/ Karen Keene</u>

It is very important to us to get feedback from the GSP community on how we should move forward. As such, we are reaching out to you, GSP's teachers, parents, administration, alumni, and interested community members in an effort to better understand your thoughts, questions, hopes, and fears. I encourage you to connect with the board members above or with Blake Peters at the school if you would like more information. We will create more options for giving more specific input in the coming weeks. Until then, please send emails (in German or in English) to these individuals, talk with us and help us all work together to continue improving our school. Look for information on community talks and posters to provide input and more over the coming weeks.

Wait, there is one more important thing:

Our goal here at GSP is to support students with a nonnative speaker background in their acquisition of the German language. While language support is an integral part of our day-to-day classroom instruction we saw the need for additional instruction for smaller groups based on their individual needs.

DfdS was developed by the <u>University of Heidelberg</u> and is currently used by various school districts in Germany to better serve their diverse student population.

At GSP we introduced DfdS in 1st grade this school year and intend to expand the program into Kindergarten and potentially preschool later in the year.





The 2011-12 fiscal and academic year further built upon the successes of 2010-11. On June 30th we closed last year and ended on a very strong financial note – the operating year resulted in an increase of \$214,000. The key contributors of this successful result are:

Extended Care – we launched the GSP Extended Care Program last fall and expectations were surpassed. Enrollment was strong throughout the year and the program curriculum was well-received by our families. We are continuing to build upon last year's success as we are continuing into the 2012/13 academic year.

Enrollment was higher than budgeted (budget: 153 students, actually enrolled: 164 students) resulting in the opening of a 3rd preschool class two weeks before school started.

German Government Support – we continue to receive support from the German Government; this past year the support received was higher than anticipated.

We also were the beneficiaries of a rare situation of a decrease in health insurance expenses.

The successful year end result puts GSP in a strong cash position that allows us to continue to build up our reserves as well as to continue to invest back into our program. Some of the investments that took place this past year:

Technology – we conducted a long-needed network upgrade for the school and we were able to fulfill the goal of getting a computer into each classroom, which was partially funded through Special Appeal.

Continued investment in our staff as well as program materials for the German Accreditation process.

Offered small student group instruction opportunities.

We appreciate your continued support for the school and look forward to another strong year.

New Honorary Consul, Robert Manicke



Great things happen at GSP every day...

Strive for academic and creative excellence

While many of us might remember memorizing poems as a cumbersome process, writing poems is a wonderful way to instill the love for writing and word play in students. Students who tend to have a harder time with writing are getting excited when it comes to poems. Writing poems is a manageable task, allows for creativity and is accompanied by a creative component that provides a gateway into language learning. If you have a moment, read through the creative thoughts our students put into fall and Halloween poetry – both in English and German.

Student-centered learning environment, teamwork

I was fortunate enough to visit 4th grade during their sound experiments in our science lab. Students were hard at work exploring the movements of paper clips on a drum, for example, describing experiments and documenting their findings. They were discussing ideas in their small groups about how sound waves travel and shared their own experiences – this is when meaningful learning happens on so many **levels**!

Student-centered learning environment that encourages growth into bilingual world citizens,

Our two first grade classes are adjusting well to new routines. We evaluated German language skills of all first grade students using "Deutsch für den Schulstart" and have started tailored small group instructions. Students enjoy the fun and age-appropriate approach to learning about German grammar and language structure and are expanding their vocabulary continuously. Using this program with these groups allows for a high level of student involvement and we look forward to continuing and expanding this program.

Professional Development

Value independence, teamwork and lifelong learning.

We used our staff development day in October to expand our knowledge through pedagogical workshops and work on our competency-based science curricula for grade school. Defining competencies that students need to demonstrate supports differentiated instruction in the classroom and throughout the day there were many constructive discussions about how this could be advanced in our classrooms. We clearly have a dedicated group of teachers and assistants!

School Development Committee

We prioritized our goals for this school year and are currently working on coordinating curricular development. We also started planning our upcoming peer review visit, which will be scheduled for the end of January.

As you might know, we are preparing for a visit of German Government representatives who will accredit our school according to quality criteria for German schools. This process is called *Bund- und Länderinspektion* (BLI). The development of our new <u>Mission Statement</u> or *Leitbild* was one integral part of this process and our upcoming peer review is another important component of our preparation for the BLI visit, which will occur in 2013. Expect to hear more about this process in the coming months!

Teacher Spotlight: Frau Ashley Parsons, Head Teacher Extended Care



For the past few years I have been working on my Master's in Zoology and Science Education through Miami University in Ohio. The Global Field Program (GFP) brings Master's degree candidates, scientists, educators, community leaders, and others together at conservation hotspots in Africa, Asia, Australia, and the Americas for firsthand experience with inquiry-driven education, environmental stewardship, and global understanding. During this program I have been able to travel to Costa Rica, Belize, and Australia connecting with a network of leaders who work collaboratively to bring about change in local

and global contexts. While in each country I have worked with scientists on local conservation issues like forest management and preservation, manatee and marine turtle surveys, and this last summer was able to conduct Great Barrier Reef health assessments. During my trips I had the privilege to spend time with local educators and schools getting first-hand experience on how other schools from around the world work.

The most exciting part of about this program is that I have been able to conduct most of my research projects with the students of the GSP Extended-Care Program. This year I have switched my focus to include the whole families. Through my research I have found that family role models are the top reason children gain an appreciation for the environment. There are countless health, social, and academic benefits to engage with nature and I hope that I can encourage you as a family to spend more time outdoors, no matter the weather. This year I have created Nature Explorer Kits, including a magnifying glass, bug catcher, collection box, and other fun tools for you to play with. It requires your family to check out a box for the weekend, play together, and bring it back the following Monday. There is a short survey for parents to fill out, too. Over the next few months I will be contacting parents asking if they are willing to participate in my project and if you just can't wait please contact me at Ashley.parsons@gspdx.org.

I want to express my gratitude to all the families of GSP who over the last few years have supported my projects, activities, and curriculum while I have been working on my Master's degree.
