

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
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Sarah Sartain
































Francisco Diaz

International Collaboration

As a digital photographic artist, I have embraced the 21st century wholeheartedly, creating cinematic narrative montages that speak about the road we must travel in order to lift ourselves out of states of inertia that limit our potential.

I grew up in the shadow of the ruins of the once great amusement park of Coney Island in New York City and spent much of my childhood wandering around this once impressive seaside resort. My Cuban/Spanish heritage was a portal to religious, psychological and imaginative themes and—when mixed with the freakish sights of Coney Island street life—inspired in me a comfortable blending of both the mundane and the unusual.

I came out of that childhood experience with one eye on the magical realism mode and the other, on movie framing concepts. This led me to develop what I see as a cinematic narrative photomontage approach wherein the photographer thinks more like a director/cinematographer. I also realized that what can be accomplished photographically today is astounding.

Out of this joyful embrace of the digital era came a unique vision for an International Collaboration: an inspired artistic effort wherein photographers would collaborate from different corners of the globe, never having met (essentially remaining total strangers), yet coming together using Facebook as a creative portal.

There is no other era in which this could have taken place. I wondered if disparate individuals from countries halfway around the world could work together in real time as a positive model for creation rather than destruction. That's what I set out to discover. Working with artist/photographers from different cultures—focusing our energies on the creation of powerful new photographic work rather than international conflict—I thought this just might be one small step toward bringing a troubled planet closer together.

My first collaborator and the person who worked with me to hone this novel concept is Deb Young, an amazingly talented artist/photographer from New Zealand. She has brought keen insights and a powerful eye for crafting unique compositions to the effort. "It's a time of seeing old things in new ways," says Young, "which makes this a thrilling time for people in all corners of the world to communicate through visual language."

Deb and I have created several compelling works but have never met. Our primary means of creative communication and discussion has been Facebook, where we have shifted that portal's emphasis from a simple support/contact tool to one where innovative ideas can flourish.


Recently we invited a wonderful French artist/photographer, Agnes Courrault, to collaborate with us and expanded the International Collaboration to a triad. Agnes brings a superb improvisational sensibility and strong photographic insights to the effort.

The International Collaboration is meant to be steadily, but unhurriedly expansive and positive, bringing disparate people together from different continents using Facebook as our portal, blending creative energies to create exceptional work as an example of true cooperation.


