Canoe Trip Packing List

The Canoe

\Box Kevlar/Carbon - is preferable for open lake and some river travel where you will be portaging around the rapids.
$\ \square$ Royalex - is preferred if your trip is going to be more river based and you may consider running
some of the rapids (skill, knowledge & experience is required) instead of portaging. For full
whitewater trips (eg Petwawa river in Algonquin's North East), float bags, thigh straps and
whitewater instruction & training are suggested.
□ Deep dish contoured yoke - makes portaging more comfortable. A Yoke pad also helps.
$\hfill\Box$ Painter lines - ropes attached to either end of your canoe for lining your boat down rivers or to
tie your boat off at shore. (always remove your canoe from the water when you are not using it, do
not tie it to the shore as this could damage it)
□ Bailing bucket or bilge pump - to remove any water that gets in your canoe.
□ 15m of floating throw rope
□ Whistle - beadles so it will work when wet
☐ Flashlight - if you are going to travel past dusk (around sunset)
$\hfill\Box$ Paddles - 1 for each person, shorter wider blades for river travel, longer thinner blades for lake
travel
□ Lifejackets or PFD's - A proper fitting, comfortable PFD is important. It's also important to
always wear your PED when ever you are in your cance

Canoe / Camping Specific Equipment

□ Canoe pack - these canoe specific packs are shorter and wider than backpacking packs and almost always hold over 100 litres worth of gear, about double your average hiking pack. They sit lower on your back so you can portage a canoe with them easily and fit easy into the canoe. Often they have handles to help you get it in and out of the canoe and side handles so someone can assist with getting it on your back. They also often have side since straps to adjust the volume and paddle pockets so you can put a paddle on either side if your not portaging a canoe, keeping your hand free. They may or may not be water proof.
□ Food barrel - These are recycled shipping barrels that custom backpacking harnesses have
been attached to. They are very water and critter resistant (although I wouldn't say they are bear
proof). They come in 30l and 60l size and make great packs for carrying food for groups.
□ Dry bags - Many people look for a water proof back pack. I tend to just put all my gear than
needs to stay dry (my down sleeping bag, cloths, tent, food, etc) in a dry bag. They come in many
different shapes, sizes and even colours. You can now get dry bags that are light weight,
compressible, or even transparent <u>Sea to Summit</u> line that we also carry.
□ Pelican case - You may also want to use a hard sided water proof case (Pelican Case) to
protect gear like a GPS or camera.
$\ \square$ Canoe route map - It may be obvious but it is important that you know where you are and
where you are going.
□ Water proof map case - to protect your maps
□ Compass or GPS (extra batteries)
□ Canoe / camp chairs

□ Pot set – stainless or non stick work well
□ Pot gripper
□ Plate/ bowl
