## A Note on Trail Ratings:

These ratings are simply a guide. Only your experience and judgment can determine which recreation option is right for you and your family.

#### Hiking:

Difficult: Long in length, steep hills, numerous exposed rocks and roots

Moderate: Medium in length, short hills, occasional rocks and roots

Easy: Short in length, minimal hills, smooth trail conditions

### Biking:

Expert: long in length, steep hills, numerous rocks and roots, sharp technical turns, rough trail conditions, seasonal water crossings

Intermediate: medium in length, occasional steep hills, exposed rocks and roots, occasional sharp turns

*Novice:* short in length, wide trails, smooth conditions, minimal steep hills

Please stay within your limits! Always remember your helmet for biking and be prepared to ride and hike safely.

# **Trail Map**



#### Please... Leave No Trace:

Plan Ahead and Prepare: Bring water, a map and a flashlight.

#### White Banks Trail: 3 Miles

This challenging out-and-back trail features steep hills, tight turns and some amazing views. Take a break at the white clay cliffs for a spectacular view of the Bay. Start at the Rogues Harbor boat launch facility or North East River day use area.

Hiking: *Difficult*Biking: *Expert* 

## Mauldin Mtn. Loop: 1 1/2 Miles

From forests to paved roads, this trail displays many trees including oak, beech and tulip poplar. Some of these tulip poplar trees are over 100 feet tall! Start from Mauldin Mountain day use area, within North East River Area.

Hiking: *Moderate*Biking: *Intermediate*Pet Friendly Trail

### Farm Road Trail: 1 Mile

You will follow an old road bed from the North East River day use area to Route 272. Then this out-and-back trail travels through mountain laurel and beech trees towards the Park Store. Start from North East River Area or the Park Store.

Hiking: *Moderate*Biking: *Intermediate* 

## Pond Loop: 1 ½ Miles

Around the pond you will find many types of trees, plants and birds. The narrow winding sections of this loop trail are full of surprises! Start from the Park Store or Park Headquarters. To make the hike easier, skip the loop, go around the eastern side of the pond, from the Park Store to Park Headquarters and back.

Hiking: *Moderate*Biking: *Expert*Pet Friendly Trail

#### Ravines Loop: 1 Mile

Water is a powerful force! This trail shows the effect of erosion in the soft soils of the Park. Three short bridges and a marsh view make this an excellent trail for exploring. Start at the Park Store.

Hiking: *Easy* 

Bikes are not permitted on this trail.

## **Beaver Marsh Loop: 2 Miles**

Hiking around the marsh is a great place to see wildlife. These tall forests support squirrels, deer and eagles. Beavers have an active lodge in the middle of the marsh. This is a longer trail and the waterfront portion is under water at high tide, so be prepared! Start at the Rogues Harbor boat launch area.

Hiking: Difficult

<u>Biking:</u> *Expert*, bikes not permitted on certain portions of this trail. Please

## Lighthouse Trail: 1 1/2 Miles

The signature destination at Elk Neck State Park is the Turkey Point Lighthouse. This historic tower sits on a 100 foot tall cliff overlooking the Chesapeake Bay. Travel an easy loop trail to enjoy this amazing and unique place... start at the Turkey Point parking lot, located at the very southern end of Route 272.
