Summary

53% of people in the Bathurst Region engage in full time or part time employment. Unemployment in the region is 0.2% higher than the NSW average. Rural Area

The rural areas of the Bathurst Region extend from the historic mining towns of Hill End and Sofala situated on the Turon River to the headwaters of the Wyangala Dam, situated on the Abercrombie River. 2.2.2 Climate

Rainfall and Evaporation

Bathurst, unlike other areas of the tablelands, is in a rainshadow and receives only an average annual rainfall of 634mm (compared to Orange with 878mm). Mean maximum temperatures in the City are 27°C in summer and 11°C in winter.

The average annual rainfall of the Bathurst region varies from 634 mm at Bathurst to 905mm at Sunny Corner. The region is subject to snowfalls although the higher lands to the east and southeast of Bathurst are more susceptible and are the localities where snow is likely to build up and remain for some time. Areas below 900mm are likely to receive less than 5 falls per annum.

Rainfall and evaporation data has been collected from the Bathurst Agricultural research Station since 1908 and 1972 respectively.

Generally rainfall in the region follows a seasonal pattern with the higher mean rainfall occurring in the summer months. As expected, evaporation levels are at their highest also during the summer months. Rainfall varies across the area with rain shadows occurring in the Bathurst basin and other areas affected by deep valleys cut into the tableland.

High intensity rainfall events and storms are more common during the months of October to February, with December typically having the most intensive rainfall events.

A summary of rainfall data for the Bathurst Agricultural Research Station for the period 1909 – 2008 is presented below:

Temperature

Bathurst has a propensity for temperature inversion conditions. This acts as a lid to trap pollutants and is therefore an issue with respect to pollution generating activities including the use of solid-fuel heaters. The temperature inversions which occur at Bathurst and follow the Macquarie, Fish and Campbells Rivers within the Bathurst Basin cover much of the central areas of the council area. The potential exists for greater air pollution problems when a temperature inversion occurs.

Temperatures in the Bathurst Region vary from very warm to hot in the summer months to cool to cold in the winter months. Mean maximum and minimum temperatures (as measured at the Bathurst Agricultural Research Station) are presented below:

Wind Patterns

Wind patterns are irregular but are dominated by south, west and south-west winds, particularly in the winter months.

Wind speeds and directions follow distinct seasonal patterns. During summer and autumn there is a fairly even distribution of wind direction with a slight dominance of wind originating from the southeast. High speed winds are fairly rare. During winter there is a strong dominance of winds from the southwest. Again high wind speeds are rare. In spring, winds are also predominantly from the southwest and higher wind speeds are more likely to occur.

2.2.3 Topography, Drainage and Flooding

The City of Bathurst is situated beside the Macquarie River and lies at the centre of a basin surrounded by country of higher elevation. The City is at the centre of a limited expanse of gently undulating country.

Elevations vary from 635m AHD near the Macquarie River to 879m AHD to the south of Mount Panorama. The floodplain of the Macquarie River covers 20 square kilometres and dissects the urban areas of Bathurst. High quality agricultural lands are located on the floodplain and are used primarily for market gardening activities.

Parts of the City are subject to flooding by the Macquarie River and as a result Council adopted the Bathurst Floodplain Management Plan in 1995. The Plan recommends a combination of structural measures (e.g. construction of levees) and non-structural measures (e.g. voluntary land acquisition).

Development is not permitted in the floodplain unless Council is satisfied that the proposed development will not increase the flood hazard rating or likely flood damage to any other property. All development requires Council's consent.

2.2.4 Geology and Landform

The Bathurst Region consists of two physical components, the Bathurst Basin and the tablelands area, which are drained by the Fish, Campbells, Macquarie and Turon Rivers to the north and the Isabella and Abercrombie Rivers to the south.

The northern section of the council area comprises sandstones, conglomerates, greywack, siltstones, limestones and minor volcanos whilst the central basin is comprised predominately of granite soils.

The southern section is more complex with siltstones, sandstones, greywacks, shales and chert, basalt and granite intrusions, embedded volcanic and limestones.

The dominant underlying geology of Bathurst is the Bathurst granite with basalt occurring at Mount Panorama and Mount Stewart. An unprocessed construction material quarry is located at the Mount Pleasant. This is the only known mineral or construction material deposit within the urban lands of the City.

2.2.5 Soils and Salinity

Fertile alluvial soils occur along valley floors and along the Macquarie River through Bathurst City.

Salinity has been recognised as a major national resource management issue. The National Action Plan for Salinity and Water Quality identified the Macquarie River catchment as one of 20 priority catchments nationally with regard to salinity. The Assessment of Riverine Salinity in the Macquarie and Cudgegong Catchments 1999/2000 by the Department of Land and Water Conservation states that 36% of the 230,000 tonnes of salt which flowed down the Macquarie River below Dubbo was from the Upper Macquarie River above Burrendong dam. The majority of this catchment area is within the Bathurst Regional Local Government area.

A report prepared by the Central West Salinity Alliance highlights the potential for the subdivision of rural land and the intensification of rural land uses to exacerbate salinity problems.

In regard to urban salinity, it has generally been thought that salinity and high water tables represent a relatively minor land and water degradation issue in the Urban area. More recent research indicates that the problem might be worse than originally thought and that impacts of salinity are expected to worsen in future years. Exmaples of Salinity in Bathurst's urban areas include salts on older buildings.

2.2.6 Biodiversity

Urban Biodiversity

The area of Bathurst City and the surrounding region is a highly modified landscape with significant areas of native vegetation being cleared since settlement.

An interesting comparison between vegetative change in the Bathurst area for the 30 year period of 1954 – 1984 suggests three major trends:

- Woodland cover decreased from 33% in 1954 to 20% in 1984.
- Clearing increased the area occupied by open woodlands and grasslands from 65% to 74%.
- The area of scattered tree cover declined by 18%.

The Bathurst Vegetation Management Plan for the City of Bathurst indicates that tree cover in the City is generally sparse with it being speculated that large scale clearing commenced on the undulating country in the early 1930s. It is noted, however, that the Bathurst plains were naturally treeless.

The best examples of Native Remnant Vegetation predominantly occur in the Boundary Road Reserve and the Mount Panorama precinct. Some of these areas are classed as near natural and modified and include identified native revegetation areas. It is considered of primary importance to maintain and enhance these areas and ensure prevention of their further fragmentation.

Wildlife distribution throughout the region is closely related to areas of natural flora where areas are of sufficient size to support particular species.

Wallabies, grey kangaroos and koalas occur in a number of localities within the Bathurst Regional LGA. A variety of birdlife also occurs with the Lagoon being a dominant wetland feature of significance.

Rural Biodiversity

Woodland communities occur throughout the region with the most common vegetation form being Savannah Woodlands. Small areas of dry Scherophyll forest association are also to be found generally on the upper slopes and ridges. Land clearing and firewood usage are the major threats to these communities.

Improved pasture species dominate land which is cultivable and used for grazing.

Wildlife distribution throughout the region is closely related to areas of natural flora where areas are of sufficient size to support particular species.

Wallabies, grey kangaroos and koalas occur in a number of localities. A variety of birdlife also occurs with the Lagoon being a dominant wetland feature of significance.

Threatened species of fauna and flora as identified by the National Parks and Wildlife Service and the Department of Environment and Heritage under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC Act) for the former Bathurst City and Evans Shire Council areas include a variety of species of fauna, Flora and aquatic fish.

Importantly the Bathurst copper butterfly (Parabccia spinfera) has been identified in a number of colonies in the Yetholme and Sunny Corner areas.

Introduced species are of particular concern and include feral goats, rabbits and pigs which have the potential to impact significantly on the natural environment if their numbers are not controlled.

2.2.9 The Water Resource

The rural areas of the Bathurst region are located within either the Burrendong or Wyangala catchment areas within which are located the Ben Chifley and Winburndale Dams. The Ben Chifley dam is the water supply for the City of Bathurst. Winburndale dam provides a raw water supply to Bathurst. The region contains the Turon, Macquarie, Abercrombie and Fish Rivers.

River and stream health is generally regarded as fair in the rural areas. Information provided through AusRivAS analysis of macro invertebrate assemblages for the former Evans Shire Council area is identified in the table below.

The vast majority of river tributaries within the local government area are regularly stocked with trout and most of these are gazetted trout water. The Abercrombie River and several other tributaries of the Lachlan River contain important populations of the native Macquarie perch and Murray cod, noted for their fine sport and table qualities but which are being reduced in number and distribution due to habitat destruction.

The flood event in 1986 provided the opportunity to record flood information. The most significant impact was the speed and devastation created by the rise of the Turon River at Sofala and immediately upstream which has been described as the worst flood in living memory of the locality.

Other areas which experienced significant flooding included the lower areas of the Fish, Campbells and the Macquarie Rivers with the most economic loss being to the flood plains in the O'Connell area and at the Lagoon.

Georges Plains and Vale Creek have the potential for flooding and the village of Georges Plains has areas that are flood prone. Land surrounding Wattle Flat has localized flooding/drainage issues as does Peel.

Approximately 10% of households in the City of Bathurst do not have a motor vehicle, nearly 40% have one motor vehicle and over 40% have 2 or more motor vehicles.

Approximately 70% of persons travel to work by car (as either the driver or passenger). Less than 1% ride a bike and less than 1% catch a bus. Approximately 6% walk to work.

Car dependency is consistent with the NSW average (91.8%), with 87.5% of households having at least 1 motor vehicle per household. Mode of travel to work in the region is dominated by car (72.8%). 5.1% of people walk to work and 0.9% of people cycle, both higher than the NSW average. It is also of interest to note that travel to work by car, bicycle and bus have increased over the last 15 years and walking or catching taxis to work have both decreased.

- The Central West region continues to show steady positive growth.
- Some larger regional centres are charactertised by the strongest population growth, including Queanbeyan (1.9%), Wagga Wagga (1.6%) and Albury (1.4%).
- Bathurst Regional continues to show population growth at 0.4% although this is down from the 2004-2005 period of 1.2%.
- Centres such as Dubbo, Orange, Lithgow and Mudgee show similar levels of moderate growth, for Bathurst particularly, this is lower than previous years.

2.3.3 Historical Population Characteristics

A summary of the historical development of the Bathurst Regional Council is as follows:

- 1815 Bathurst proclaimed a Town Site
- 1852 Bathurst proclaimed as a Town
- 1856 Representative Government granted to Bathurst
- 1862 Bathurst proclaimed as a Municipality
- 1885 Bathurst proclaimed a City
- 1937 Enquiry into enlargements of the City boundaries in 1937, which took effect in 1938
- 1938 2,900 acres added to the City area
- 1952 7,264 acres added (following a public enquiry in 1951). The additional area was previously in Abercrombie and Turon Shires. Alteration took effect in 1953.
- An application in 1956 to extend the boundaries of the Bathurst City Area was not approved.
- 1958 A Boundaries Enquiry was held to investigate the boundaries of the Local Government Areas in the Mitchell Region. The application by Bathurst for a boundary was not accepted by the Enquiry and the city boundaries remained unchanged.
- 1977 Shires of Abercrombie and Turon were dissolved to form the Shire of Evans and the expansion of City of Bathurst by 2,000 people.
- A Boundaries Commission dissolved Bathurst City Council and the Shire of Evans and formed the Bathurst Regional Council through the amalgamation of the City of Bathurst and 80% of the Shire of Evans.

Bathurst is New South Wales' oldest inland settlement. After Gregory Blaxland, William Lawson and William Wentworth found a way through the Blue Mountains in 1813, Governor Lachlan Macquarie ordered Assistant Surveyor George Evans to explore further west. Evans discovered the Bathurst plains in 1814 and Macquarie then directed William Cox to build a road from Emu Plains to the new country. In 1815 the governor travelled to Cox's depot on the Macquarie River and there formally proclaimed the settlement of Bathurst on 7 May. Bathurst was named after Lord Bathurst who was, at the time, Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies.

In 1815 the settlement of Bathurst was confined to the left bank of the Macquarie River where the convicts and soldiers were located. In 1818 when the first free settlers arrived they were given land grants on the right hand and the unplanned village of Kelso slowly grew to cater for an increasing population. Kelso is named after the birthplace of Lady Anna Brisbane the wife of Governor Sir Thomas Brisbane.

Bathurst was later declared a municipality in 1883 and a City in 1885, on the same day as Sydney.

2.3.4 Historical Statistics

The document *Bathurst City of Golden Opportunities* produced by the Bathurst Business Enterprise Centre in c1991 states that the population in 1820 was 114 Europeans of which 74 were convicts, working as assigned servants. Within a year however, a great many new settlers arrived. The number of Wiradjuri people is unknown.

As stated in *City of Bathurst Town Planning Scheme – Ordinance 106 – Statements* **1961** the official census of April, 1851 revealed the following populations:

The population of the City of Bathurst and the areas within its sphere of influence for business and other miscellaneous purposes would be the Shire of Turon, Abercrombie and part of the Shires of Lyndhurst and Oberon. The populations of these areas are listed below. The City of Bathurst was added to those of the Shires of Turon and Abercrombie to give one set of totals; to this was then added half the population figures of the Shires of Lyndhurst and Oberon.

The conclusions reached in 1961 in regards to the potential growth of Bathurst, was that unless past trends are reversed the next immediate five year planning period could well expect something approaching the following trends:-

- For the City of Bathurst, where over the last seven years, population growth averaged 121 persons (approximately) per year, the future growth could be possibly between approximately100 persons to 200 persons per year increase.
- For the total population of the City plus people from the surrounding district which tends to use Bathurst as its service centre, the above figure which over the last seven years averaged a net increase of approximately 60 persons per year, the future growth could be possibly between 50 persons and 100 persons per year.

2.3.5 Demographic Statistics 1961

A summary of the findings outlined in Statement No. 1 for the City of Bathurst Town Planning Scheme 1961 are as follows:

- The yearly average of 328 births which exceeded deaths taken over the sixteen years from 1946 to 1961.
- There were 16,089 persons in the 1954 census count: 50.7% males and 49.3% female
- The largest population groups in the 1954 census count were in the age groups under 15 years.
- From school leaving age onwards, it was evident there was a large fall, indicating the vast majority of children leaving school sought employment elsewhere.
- The number of adults 65 years and older was 1,192 and this represented 7.4% of the population.

- The age group of 65 years and over is increasing on both numbers and proportion of the total population (3.1% increase between 1933 and 1954).
- The under 21 age group represented 43% of the total population.
- 41.2% of the total population were married.
- The largest age groups were between 0-19 (0-4=9.6%, 5-9=9.5%, 10-14=12.1% and 15-19=11.9%).
- There was a decrease in numbers of persons and the percentage to total population of the age group 20 to 35.
- The number of persons 65 and over represented a growth of 14% between 1954 and 1961. These age groups increased both in numbers and proportion of the total population.
- The under 21 age group increased approximately 9% between 1954 and 1961.
- The highest nationality presented in 1953 was British at 96.3% (Australian was not counted as a nationality) and foreigners totalled 3.37% of the population. The highest numbers of foreign nationalities were Dutch 67 persons, German 68 persons, Polish 86 persons and Yugoslavs 59 persons.
- 92.7% of the population in 1961 were born in Australia and of the 7.3% born overseas 5.99% came from Europe. Of the European countries the highest birthplace was from UK and Ireland at 2.6%.
- For the Bathurst District 26.4% of the workforce was employed in primary industry; 15.3% were employed in secondary industry; 57% were employed in tertiary industry and 1.3% were unclassified. For the Municipality of Bathurst the figure were 5.5%, 21%, 72.5% and 1% respectively.
- For the City of Bathurst the highest workforce in primary industry were Agriculture and Mixed Farming at 2.4% and Grazing at 2.2%. The corresponding figures for the Bathurst District were 11% and 12.4% respectively.
- For the City of Bathurst the highest workforce in secondary industry were Clothing at 9.2%, Food, Drink and Tobacco at 4.5% and Vehicles at 3.6%. The corresponding figures for the Bathurst District were 5.5% and 3.1% respectively. (there was no figure for vehicles)
- For the City of Bathurst the highest workforce on Tertiary Industry were Public Authority and Professional at 21.3%, Commerce at 16.25, Building and Construction at 11.2%, Transport and Storage at 10.3% and Amusements, Hotels at 7.5%. The corresponding figures for the Bathurst District were 14.7%, 12.7%, 10%, 8% and 6% respectively.
- Major employment groups in order are therefore Public Authorities and Professional Groups; Grazing and Commerce; Agriculture (when combined with grazing and farming it is the largest group for employment); Building construction; transport and storage. The medium sized group of employers include the Amusement and Hotels group, Clothing Group; and Food and Drink. The smaller groups included Communications Group, Vehicles, Finance and Sawmills.

- The employment pattern within the Region showed little change in primary and secondary industries between the census counts of 1947, 1954 and 1961. There was a slight decrease in workers in primary industries which was attributed to mechanisation, improved scientific methods and more efficient management.
- Average sales for the Bathurst Saleyards between 1952-1961 were 13,026 cattle;
 157,483 sheep; 879 pigs; and 152 horses; with a total revenue to Council of £ 2327.0.9.
- The Bathurst District Tourist Association was set up in 1961.
- The majority of residents of the City of Bathurst and Surrounding Districts were Christian (92.8%) with 35.9% being Catholic, 9% being Presbyterian and 8.6% being Methodist.
- In 1961 the Teachers College was the largest employer of the various educational groups. The Teachers College (opened in 1951) gave Bathurst City a cultural advantage over many other cities of the same size by virtue of the fact that there is a concentration of academically trained professional people. This advantage extended to the fields of Art and Drama and Music where Bathurst over a number of years has distinguished itself.
- The average number of building permits issued of all kinds over the seven year period from 1954 to 1960 was 194.7 permits per year. The average number of Housing Permits over the same period was 66.4 permits per year.
- The average number of persons per housing unit in 1954 was 4.3 persons.
- Overall density of population of the city was low (approximately 2.3 persons per acre for the total city area). A typical central section showed a gross density of 10 to 12 persons per acre.
- The population of Bathurst District increased only an estimated 1.5% between 1954 and 1961. The City of Bathurst increased 5.3% during the same period.
- One of the main functions of Bathurst is to act as a Service and Shopping Centre for a surrounding rich and mixed grazing and farming district.
- Bathurst City Council employed 166 persons directly as at June 1962.
- Bathurst is very sport minded and the Rugby League Club is one of the largest and most modern Clubs in Country Regional Centres.
- There is an awareness of the value of culture and various groups are most active.
- The total revenue from all sources received at 1960 by Bathurst City Council was over half a million pounds.

In the paper titled *The Bathurst Region: A Profile 1989* the author, I Bowie, Senior Lecturer in Environmental Planning at Charles Sturt University offers the following outline of Bathurst from the 1960's onwards.

The years immediately following the second world war witnessed a short spurt to the growth of Bathurst (and also Oberon which achieved urban status in this time), reflecting its new found role as a manufacturing centre (and the 1954 census population was boosted by

people who settled in Bathurst after spells in its migrant camp). But this short spurt was short lived and was followed by two decades of stagnation in both Bathurst's and the rural population (although Oberon continued to grow as forest-based manufacturing continued to expand there).

The period of the 1970s and 1980s had been one of renewed growth at a steady yet unspectacular pace in Bathurst and its commuting zone but continuing to decline elsewhere. Although rural employment fell by a further 40 percent between 1933 and 1986 (despite the rise in forestry employment), non urban populations have risen sharply reflecting net migration to Bathurst from Sydney, and the movement of often affluent families on to hobby farms and rural residences within the expanded commuting zone of Bathurst. Urban employment expanded, in part a reflection of the activities of the Bathurst-Orange Development Corporation (1974-90), reflecting the dramatic growth in commerce, community services and government employment as well as in manufacturing and tourist related employment. Bathurst's population growth was about 1.8% per annum during the period 1971-87.

The Department of Planning's *Inland Centres of New South Wales Trends and Opportunities* 1992 Information Paper, states that the Growth Rates (per cent per annum) for Bathurst were:



During the period 1993-2000, based on the data from the Australian Bureau of Statistics the average growth rate per year for the City of Bathurst is 0.8%. Between 2001 and 2003 the average growth rate per year is 1.1%.

The document *Bathurst City of Golden Opportunities* produced by the Bathurst Business Enterprise Centre in c1991 states that the population of Evans Shire Council was 4,900, it had a growth rate of 3%p.a and an area of 427,800ha.

The Department of Planning (Transport and Population Data Centre, 2004) projects an average annual population growth of 0.9% for the former Bathurst City Council LGA, with the population projected to reach 40,120 persons in 2031.

The above table indicates consistent population growth for the period 2001 – 2031. Importantly it should be noted that the percentage of the population aged over 65 is expected to double over the next 30 years. In 2031 it is projected that approximately 1 in 4 persons will be aged over 65 years.

No significant change is evident in the ratio of female to male populations for the period 2001 -2031.

In 1997, the former Evans Shire Council estimated the population of the key rural settlement areas as outlined in the table below. It is not known what methodology was used to generate these estimates nor the land area considered.

The City of Bathurst's population is younger than the NSW average with larger numbers of young people in the age range 10 to 24 years and in particular between 15 to 19 years of age. This is reflective of the City's large number of educational institutions.

The median age in Bathurst in 2001 was 32 years and is expected to increase to 43 years by 2031. Thus despite the high proportion of younger people, the City's population is expected to age over the next 20 years.

As indicated above, the Department of Planning (Transport and Population Data Centre, 2004) projects a decline in 0 to 14 year olds and a significant increase in persons aged over 65 years to 2031.






Collection District 1141612






