USING SIT AND SET

The verb **sit** means "to rest with the legs bent and the back upright," but there are many other related meanings. It is an intransitive verb, meaning that it does not have a direct object.

The verb **set** means "to put or place something." It is a transitive verb, meaning that it has a direct object, usually.

The principal parts of the two verbs are as follows:

Present	Past	Past Participle
sit	sat	sat
set	set	set
