


- **23 John 4:1-3** Jesus left the Jerusalem area to return to Galilee.

- **Mark 1:21–28** At Capernaum Jesus healed a man with an unclean spirit.
- **Matthew 4:18-22** Jesus called Peter, Andrew, James, and John to follow Him.
- 29 Mark 1:40-45 Jesus healed a leper.
- **30** Matthew 10:1-4 Jesus called and ordained His Twelve Apostles (see BD, "Apostle," 612).
- 31 Matthew 10:5-42 Jesus taught His Twelve Apostles about their duties.
- **32 Matthew 5-7** Jesus taught the Sermon on the Mount (see BD, "Beatitudes," 620).
- **33 Matthew 8:5-13** At Capernaum Jesus healed a centurion's servant.
- **34 Luke 7:11-17** At Nain Jesus raised a widow's son from the dead.
- **35 Matthew 8:14-17** At Capernaum Jesus healed Peter's mother-in-law and others.
- **36 Matthew 8:23-27** Jesus calmed the storm at the Sea of Galilee (see BD, "Galilee, Sea of," 677).

- **37 Matthew 8:28–34** Jesus commanded a legion of devils to depart; they entered into swine.
- **38 Matthew 9:1-8** Jesus healed a man who was paralyzed.
- **39 Matthew 9:10-17** Jesus preached of new wine and old bottles.
- 40 Matthew 9:18-26 A woman was healed when she touched Jesus's clothing; He also raised Jairus's daughter.
- 41 Matthew 9:27-31 Jesus healed two blind men (see BD, "Blindness," 626).
- **Matthew 9:32–34** Jesus healed a dumb man possessed with a devil.
- **Matthew 11:7-19** Jesus testified of the greatness of John the Baptist.
- 44 Luke 7:36-50 A woman washed Jesus's feet with her tears at the home of Simon the Pharisee (see BD, "Anoint," 609).
- **Luke 7:41-42** The parable of the two debtors (see BD, "Parables," 740-41).
- **John 5:1** Jesus went to Jerusalem for the second Passover (see BD, "Feasts," 672–74).
- **47 John 5:2-16** Jesus healed a man on the Sabbath by the pool of Bethesda (see BD, "Sabbath," 764–65).
- **John 5:17-47** In the temple Jesus taught about His relationship with the Father.
- **Matthew 9:35-38** Jesus returned to Galilee, where He preached and healed.


- 50 Matthew 12:1-21 Pharisees accused Jesus's disciples of breaking the Sabbath; Jesus healed a man with a withered hand.
- **Matthew 12:22–23** Jesus healed a man possessed with a devil.
- **Motthew 12:24-45** Jesus taught the Pharisees about Satan, blasphemy against the Holy Ghost, and seeking signs (see BD, "Blasphemy," 625–26).
- **Matthew 13:1-53** Jesus used parables to teach about the kingdom of heaven.
- **Matthew 13:3-23; Mark 4:21-22** Parables of the sower and of the candle.
- 55 Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43; Mark 4:26-29 Parables of the wheat and tares and of the seed growing secretly.
- **56 Motthew 13:31-35** Parables of the mustard seed and of the leaven (see BD, "Leaven," 723).
- 57 Matthew 13:44-52 Parables of the hidden treasure, the pearl of great price, the gospel net, and the householder.
- **Matthew 13:54-58** The people of Nazareth rejected Jesus a second time.
- 59 Matthew 14:1-12 Herod feared that Jesus was the beheaded John the Baptist returned from the dead.
- **John 6:1-15** Shortly before Passover, Jesus fed 5,000 with five loaves and two fishes.
- 61 John 6:16-21; Matthew 14:22-33 Jesus walked on the water; Peter followed, then wavered.



- **John 6:22-66** Jesus declared that He is the Bread of Life. Many disciples rejected Him.
- 63 Mark 7:1-23 When His disciples ate with unwashed hands, Jesus taught the Pharisees about true cleanliness (see BD, "Clean and Unclean." 646–47).
- 64 Mark 7:24 Jesus went north to Tyre and Sidon (see Bible Map 11).
- 65 Mark 7:24-30 Jesus healed a Canaanite woman's daughter (see BD, "Gentile," 679-80).
- **66** Mark 7:31 Jesus returned to Galilee.
- 67 Mark 7:32-37 Jesus healed a deaf man who had a speech impediment.
- **68** Mark 8:1-9 Jesus fed 4,000 people.
- 69 Mark 8:10-21 At Magdala Jesus taught about seeking for signs; He warned His disciples about the "leaven" of the Pharisees.
- 70 Mark 8:22-26 At Bethsaida Jesus healed a blind man.
- 71 Matthew 16:13 Jesus went with His disciples to Caesarea Philippi.
- 72 Matthew 16:13-20 Peter testified that Jesus is the Christ
- 73 Matthew 16:21-28 Jesus taught His disciples about His death, His Second Coming, and discipleship.

- 74 Matthew 17:1 Jesus took Peter, James, and John up into a high mountain (see BD, "Hermon," 700).
- 75 Matthew 17:2-13 Jesus was transfigured. Peter, James, and John received priesthood keys (see BD, "Transfiguration, Mount of," 786).
- 76 Matthew 17:14, 22 Jesus and His disciples returned to Galilee.
- 77 Matthew 17:14-21 Jesus healed a "lunatick" boy.
- 78 Matthew 17:22-18:35 Jesus taught His disciples about His death, tribute money, and the principles of humility, service, and forgiveness.
- 79 Matthew 18:23-35 The parable of the unmerciful servant.
- 80 Luke 9:51-56 Jesus traveled through Samaria, Judea, and Perea on His way to Jerusalem (see Bible Map 11).
- 81 Luke 10:1-24 Jesus appointed the Seventy and sent them out to preach. They returned and reported.
- **82 Luke 10:25–37** The parable of the good Samaritan.
- **83 Luke 10:38-42** Jesus rested at the home of Martha and Mary and taught them.
- **Luke 11:1-13** Jesus taught His disciples about prayer (see BD, "Prayer," 752–53).

- **85 Luke 11:5-8** The parable of the friend at midnight.
- **86** Luke 11:14-12:12 Jesus again rebuked the Pharisees for seeking a sign and for hypocrisy.
- 87 Luke 12:13-21 The parable of the rich fool.
- **88 Luke 12:22-13:9** Jesus taught His disciples about seeking the kingdom of God first and about His Second Coming.
- **89 Luke 12:35–48; 13:6–9** Parables of the watchful servants and of the barren fig tree.
- 90 Luke 13:10-17 Jesus healed a woman on the Sabbath.
- 91 Luke 13:22-35 Jesus taught about the "strait gate" and about who may enter His kingdom. He lamented over Jerusalem.
- **92 Luke 14:1-6** Jesus healed a man with dropsy on the Sabbath day.
- **93 Luke 14:7-24** Parables of the wedding feast and the great supper (see BD, "Marriage," 728–29).
- **94 Luke 14:25–35** Jesus taught the multitude about discipleship.
- **95 Luke 14:28-33** Parables of the tower and of the rash king.
- **96 Luke 15:1-16:31** Jesus taught and condemned the Pharisees for hypocrisy.





- **97** Luke 15:1-17:10 Parables of the lost sheep, the lost coin, and the prodigal son. Parables of the unjust steward, the rich man and Lazarus, and the unprofitable servant.
- 98 Luke 17:11-19 Jesus healed ten lepers; only one returned to give thanks.
- **99 Luke 17:20–18:14** Jesus taught the Pharisees about His Second Coming.
- 100 Luke 18:1-14 Parables of the unjust judge and of the Pharisee and the publican (see BD, "Publicans," 755).
- **101 John 7:2-13** Jesus arrived in Jerusalem for the Feast of Tabernacles (see BD, "Feasts," 672–74).
- **John 7:14–8:59** Jesus taught in the temple. A woman taken in adultery was brought to Him. He testified that He is the Messiah.
- John 9:1-41 Jesus healed a man who was blind since birth and testified that He is the Light of the World.
- John 10:1-21 Jesus taught that He is the Good Shepherd.
- Mark 10:1 Jesus left Jerusalem to preach in Perea (see Bible Map 11).


- 106 Mark 10:2-31 Jesus discussed divorce with the Pharisees. He blessed the little children, answered the question of a rich young ruler, and taught His disciples.
- 107 Matthew 20:1-16 The parable of the laborers in the vineyard (see BD, "Vine," 787).
- John 10:22 Jesus returned to Jerusalem for the Feast of the Dedication.
- John 10:23-39 Jesus taught in the temple, "I and my Father are one."
- John 10:40-42 Jesus departed for Perea.
- Mark 10:32-52 Jesus taught His disciples and healed a blind man named Bartimaeus.
- 112 Luke 19:1-10 Zacchaeus the publican hosted Jesus in his home.
- **Luke 19:11-27** The parable of the pounds (see BD, "Pound," 752).
- John 11:7 Jesus returned to the Jerusalem area for the final time.
- John 11:1-46 Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead.
- John 11:54 Jesus went to the city of Ephraim.








- Matthew 25 Parables of the ten virgins, the talents, and the sheep and the goats (see BD, "Weights and Measures," 788-89).
- Matthew 26:1-2 Jesus told His disciples He would be crucified in two days.
- Matthew 26:3-5 Chief priests again conspired to kill Jesus.
- Matthew 26:6-13 Jesus visited the house of Simon the leper. A woman anointed Jesus in preparation for His death (see BD, "Simon," 775).
- 24 Luke 22:3-6 Judas Iscariot arranged to betray Jesus to the chief priests (see BD, "Judas," 719).
- Luke 22:7-13 The disciples prepared an upper room for the Passover meal (see BD, "Feasts," 672-74).
- Luke 22:14-38 After sundown Jesus had His Last Supper with His Twelve Apostles.
- John 13:18-30 Jesus announced that one of His disciples would betray Him. Judas left the room.
- Mark 14:22-25 Jesus instituted the sacrament.
- John 13:2-17 Jesus washed the feet of the Apostles.
- John 13:31-35 Jesus taught His disciples and commanded them to love one another as He had loved them.

- Mark 14:27-31 Jesus's disciples pledged their loyalty to Him.
 - John 14 Jesus testified of His divinity and taught of the Comforters (see BD, "Comforter," 648; "Holy Ghost," 704).
- Luke 22:39 Jesus and the disciples left for the Mount of Olives.
- John 15-16 Jesus taught His disciples of the true vine, love, opposition, and His imminent death (see BD, "Grace," 697).
- John 17 Jesus offered the Intercessory Prayer, praying to the Father for His Apostles and all who believe in Him through them.
- John 18:1 Jesus and His disciples arrived at the Garden of Gethsemane.
- Mark 14:32-42; Luke 22:40-46 Jesus took Peter, James, and John into the garden; Jesus prayed; an angel comforted Him; Jesus found the three asleep; He prayed a second time; Jesus bled from every pore; the three continued to sleep; He prayed a third time; Jesus woke His disciples (see BD, "Abba," 600; "Atonement," 617; "Gethsemane," 680).
- Luke 22:47-48; John 18:2-9 Judas Iscariot betrayed Jesus with a kiss. Jesus's accusers fell to the ground.



- **39 John 18:10–11** Peter tried to stop the arrest of Jesus.
- **40 Luke 22:49–51** Jesus healed the ear of the high priest's servant.
- 41 Mark 14:46, 48-52 Jesus was arrested; the disciples fled.
- **John 18:13** Jesus was first taken to the palace of Annas (see BD, "Annas," 609).
- John 18:24 Jesus was sent to Caiaphas (see BD, "Caiaphas," 628).
- **John 18:14-23** Caiaphas questioned Jesus; an officer struck Jesus in the face.
- **45 Matthew 26:59-68** Members of the ruling council questioned, mocked, spat upon, and beat Jesus.
- **Luke 22:56-62** Three times Peter denied knowing Jesus (see BD, "Peter," 749).
- **47 Luke 22:66-67** At sunrise Jesus was questioned by the whole ruling council.
- 48 Matthew 27:1; Luke 22:67-71 Jesus declared that He was the Son of God. He was condemned to death (see BD, "Blasphemy," 625-26).
- **49 Matthew 27:3-10** Judas hanged himself (see BD, "Aceldama," 602; "Potter's Field." 752).
- John 18:28 Jesus was led to the Roman hall of judgment.



 - John 18:29-38 Pilate questioned Jesus and found no fault in Him (see BD, "Pilate,"
- **52 Luke 23:6-7** Pilate sent Jesus to King Herod Antipas.

751; "Pontius," 752).

- **53 Luke 23:8-12** Herod questioned and mocked Jesus (see BD, "Herod," 700–1).
- **Luke 23:11** Jesus was sent back to Pilate.
- to release Jesus, but the people said, "Crucify him." Pilate released Barabbas (see BD, "Barabbas," 619).
- John 19:1-16 Jesus was whipped, had a crown of thorns placed on His head, was clothed in a purple robe, and was beaten by Roman soldiers. Pilate sought again to release Jesus, but the people wanted Him crucified.
- 57 Mark 15:20-22 Jesus was led to Golgotha (see BD, "Calvary," 629; "Golgotha," 682).
- 58 Mark 15:23-28; John 19:23-24 Jesus was nailed to the cross. Soldiers cast lots for His clothes (see BD, "Crucifixion," 651).
- **Mark 15:29-32** Jesus was mocked as He hung on the cross.



- **62** Mark 15:37-38 Jesus spoke His last words and died. There was an earthquake, and the veil of the temple was torn in half.
- **John 19:31-37** A soldier pierced Jesus's side with a spear.
- John 19:38-42 Before sundown Jesus's body was laid in a tomb.
- **Matthew 27:62-66** Chief priests and Pharisees sealed the tomb and assigned guards to watch it.
- **66 D&C 138:11-24** While His body lay in the tomb, Jesus visited the righteous in the spirit world (see BD, "Paradise," 742).
- 67 Joseph Smith Translation, Matthew 28:2-4 At Jesus's Resurrection, the earth shook and angels unsealed His tomb.
- **68 Matthew 27:52-53** Righteous Saints in the spirit world were resurrected (see BD, "Resurrection," 761).
- Joseph Smith Translation, Matthew 28:1-8; Joseph Smith Translation, Mark 16:1-8 Some women, including Mary Magdalene, found the tomb open, saw the angels, and ran to tell the disciples (see BD, "Mary Magdalene," 729).

- 72 Luke 24:34 Jesus appeared to Peter.
- 73 Matthew 28:9-10; Luke 24:10-11 Jesus appeared to other women. They testified to the disciples of His Resurrection.
- **Luke 24:13–35** Jesus appeared to two disciples on the road to Emmaus.
- 75 Luke 24:36-48; John 20:19-25 At Jerusalem Jesus appeared to a group of disciples; Thomas was not with them.
- 76 John 20:26–29 Eight days later Jesus appeared to Thomas and the other Apostles.
- John 21:1-23 At the Sea of Galilee Jesus appeared to seven of His disciples. He said to Peter, "Feed my sheep."
- **78 Matthew 28:16-20** In Galilee Jesus appeared to 11 disciples.
- 79 Luke 24:49-53; Acts 1:1-11 Forty days after His Resurrection, Jesus ascended into heaven from the Mount of Olives. Two angels promised that Jesus would return in like manner (see BD, "Ascension," 614).

- **80 3 Nephi 8:2-3** The righteous people in America began to look with earnestness for the sign of Christ's death.


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Dates, including the dates when epistles were written, are approximate.

- **Acts 1:1-11** Jesus ascended into heaven. Angels promised His disciples that He would return in great glory (see Bible Dictionary [BD], "Ascension," 614; "Coming of Jesus Christ," 648).
- **2** Acts 1:12-26 The Lord chose Matthias to replace Judas Iscariot as an Apostle (see BD, "Matthias," 729).

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
- **3** Acts 2:1-47 The Holy Spirit was poured out on the day of Pentecost. Peter testified of Christ and many believed and were baptized (see BD, "Feasts," 673).
- **4 Acts 3:1–26** Peter healed a lame man at the temple and testified of the latter-day Restoration (see BD, "Beautiful Gate," 620).
- **S** Acts 4:1-31 Peter and John were imprisoned overnight and forbidden to teach of Christ. They continued to testify boldly.
- **6** Acts 4:32-37 Church members were "of one heart and of one soul" and "had all things common" (v. 32).
- 7 Acts 5:1-11 Ananias and Sapphira lied to the Lord and died.
- **8** Acts 5:17-42 Peter and John were imprisoned by the Sanhedrin and set free by an angel. In spite of warnings, they continued to teach of Christ (see BD, "Gamaliel," 677; "Sanhedrin," 769).
- **9** Acts 6:1-7 Seven faithful disciples were called and set apart to assist the Apostles.
- **10 Acts 6:8-7:60** Stephen, one of the seven, bore testimony of Christ to the Sanhedrin. He was stoned to death (see BD, "Stephen," 777).
- 11 Acts 7:57-8:3 A young rabbi named Saul participated in the stoning of Stephen. Saul actively persecuted the Church (see BD, "Paul," 742–43).
- **12 Acts 8:4-13** Philip, another of the seven, baptized in Samaria (see BD, "Philip," 750; "Samaritans," 768).
- **Acts 8:9-25** Peter and John went to Samaria to bestow the Holy Ghost by the laying on of hands. Simon, a new member, asked if he could buy the priesthood and was rebuked by Peter (see BD, "Confirmation," 649).
- 14 Acts 8:26-40 Philip taught and baptized an Ethiopian eunuch (see BD, "Ethiopia" and "Eunuch," 667).
- **Acts 9:1-22** Saul, on the road to Damascus, was blinded when Jesus appeared to him. At Damascus Saul was healed, baptized, and began to preach of Christ in the synagogues.



- Acts 9:23-26; 2 Corinthians 11:32-33; Galatians 1:15-18 Saul went to Arabia, returning to Damascus after three years. When Jewish leaders conspired to kill him, he fled to Jerusalem, but ma ny of the disciples at Jerusalem doubted that Saul was truly converted. Saul spent 15 days with Peter.
- 17 Acts 9:27 Barnabas spoke before the Apostles on behalf of the repentant Saul (see BD, "Barnabas," 619).
- 18 Acts 9:29-30; Galatians 1:21-24 Saul went to Tarsus and spent about four years teaching in Syria and Cilicia.
- 19 Acts 9:31-43 Peter healed Aeneas and raised Dorcas from the dead (see BD, "Dorcas," 658).
- 20 Acts 10:1-11:18 In a vision Peter was commanded to take the gospel to the Gentiles. The Holy Ghost fell upon Cornelius and his household, and they were baptized (see BD, "Cornelius," 650).
- 21 Acts 11:25-26 Saul helped Barnabas minister to the Church in Antioch for a year (see BD, "Antioch," 609).
- 22 Acts 11:29-30 Saul and Barnabas took relief supplies from the Saints in Antioch to the needy Saints in Jerusalem.
- **23 Acts 12:1-2** The Apostle James was beheaded by King Herod Agrippa I (see BD, "James," 709).
- 24 Acts 12:3-23 Peter was imprisoned. He was freed by an angel of the Lord. The angel smote Herod, and Herod died.
- **25** Acts 12:25 Barnabas, Mark, and Saul returned to Antioch (see BD, "Mark," 728).
- **Acts 13:1–12** Saul, with Barnabas and Mark, went to Cyprus to preach the gospel. Saul, now also called Paul, began his first missionary journey.

- **Acts 13:13-14:6** Paul visited Perga, Antioch in Pisidia, and Iconium, where he had great success in baptizing Gentiles (see BD, "Gentile," 679–80).
- 28 Acts 14:6-19 In Lystra, Paul healed a crippled man. The citizens believed that Paul and Barnabas were gods. Paul was later stoned and left for dead.
- 29 Acts 14:20-15:3 After much success in Derbe, Paul returned to Antioch, stopping at some cities to strengthen the members.
- 30 Acts 15:4-29; Galatians 2:1-3 Peter presided at a council of Church leaders in Jerusalem, where it was decided what Gentiles must do to be good members. Paul, Barnabas, and Titus attended (see BD, "Titus," 785-86).
- 31 Acts 15:30-35 Judas and Silas, accompanied by Paul and Barnabas, returned to Antioch. The decision of the Jerusalem conference was received with great joy (see BD, "Silas," 774).
- **32 Acts 15:36-40** With Silas as his companion, Paul began his second missionary journey.
- **33 Acts 16:1-3** At Lystra, Timothy joined the Church and became a missionary companion to Paul and Silas (see BD, "Timothy," 785).
- 34 Acts 16:8-11 Paul journeyed to Troas, where he had a vision directing him and his companions to go to Macedonia.
- **35 Acts 16:10–11** Luke joined Paul and his companions (see BD, "Luke," 726).
- **36** Acts 16:12-15 At Philippi, Lydia and her household were converted to the Lord.
- **37 Acts 16:16-40** At Philippi, Paul and Silas were beaten and imprisoned. After an earthquake shook the prison, the jailer and his family were baptized. Paul and Silas were released from prison.
- **James** As a Church leader in Jerusalem, James wrote "to the twelve tribes which are

- scattered abroad" (1:1). This may have been the first general epistle (see BD, "James, Epistle of," 709–10).
- Acts 17:1 Paul and his companions traveled through Amphipolis, Apollonia, and Thessalonica.
- 40 Acts 17:2–9 At Thessalonica, Jason, a kinsman of Paul, and others believed in Christ. A mob arrested Jason. Paul and his companions escaped (see BD, "Jason," 710).
- 41 Acts 17:15-34 Paul left Timothy and Silas in Berea and traveled to Athens. Paul taught some Greek philosophers at Mars' hill (see BD, "Epicureans," 666; "Stoics," 777).
- 42 Acts 18:1-3, 5, 11 Paul was reunited with Silas and Timothy in Corinth. Paul taught and labored there for one and a half years.
- 43 Acts 18:2-18 In Corinth, Aquila and his wife, Priscilla; Justus; and Crispus, a ruler of the synagogue, believed in Christ. Paul was arrested and taken before the Roman governor.
- 1 Thessalonians; 2 Thessalonians From Corinth, Paul wrote two letters to the Saints in Thessalonica (see BD, "Epistles to the Thessalonians," 743).
- **45 Acts 18:18–21** Paul journeyed to Ephesus and preached in the synagogue.
- **46** Acts 18:21-22 Paul went to Jerusalem, saluting the Church there, and returned to Antioch.
- 47 Acts 18:24–28 Apollos, an Egyptian Jew, went to Ephesus and was taught by Aquila and Priscilla (see BD, "Apollos," 611).
- 48 Acts 18:23; 19:1 Paul visited and strengthened the Church in Galatia and Phrygia. He remained in Ephesus for about three years.
- 49 Acts 19:1-7 Paul gave the gift of the Holy Ghost to disciples baptized by Apollos.



- **Acts 19:11-20** Paul performed many miracles in Ephesus, and the Church grew there.
- **51 1 Corinthians** While in Ephesus, Paul wrote to the Saints in Corinth (see BD, "Epistles to the Corinthians," 743–44).
- 52 Acts 19:23-41 In Ephesus worshippers of the Greek goddess Diana caused the people to riot against Paul and the Christians. Gaius and Aristarchus were taken by a mob but later released unharmed.
- **2 Corinthians** While in Macedonia, Paul wrote again to the Saints in Corinth.
- **Acts 20:1–2** Paul journeyed to Greece, where he remained for three months.
- **Galatians** Paul wrote to the Saints in Galatia (see BD, "Epistle to the Galatians," 744–45).
- **Acts 20:2-6** Paul and seven companions visited and preached in the cities of Greece.
- **Someons** Paul wrote to the Saints in Rome (see BD, "Epistle to the Romans," 745).
- **Acts 20:6-12** At Troas, Paul restored the life of a young man named Eutychus.
- 59 Acts 20:13-38 On his way to Ephesus, Paul stopped in Miletus and warned the Saints of apostasy. He told them that he must go to Jerusalem for Pentecost.
- **Acts 21:1–15** On his way to Jerusalem, Paul visited the Saints in Tyre and Caesarea.
- 61 Acts 21:16-23:10 Paul met with Church leaders in Jerusalem. He went to the temple, causing a riot. He told the Sadducees and Pharisees of his conversion to Christ. He was arrested by Roman soldiers and taken to Caesarea for his own safety.
- Acts 23:11-26:32 Paul appeared before two Roman rulers, Festus and Herod Agrippa II. Paul told them of his conversion and bore testimony of Christ. They decided to send him to Rome for trial (see BD, "Agrippa," 605; "Festus," 674).

- 63 Acts 27:1-28:16 Under Roman guard, Paul sailed to Rome. Shipwrecked at sea, he swam to Melita (Malta). Paul was unharmed by a snakebite and healed many people.
- **Acts 28:16–31** Paul was under house arrest for two years in Rome.
- 65 Ephesians; Philippians; Colossians; Philemon; Hebrews In Rome, Paul wrote to the Saints in the cities of Colosse, Philippi, and Ephesus, and to a disciple named Philemon. He also explained to Jewish members of the Church that the law of Moses was fulfilled by the law of Christ (see BD, "Pauline Epistles," 745–47).
- 1 Timothy 1:3; 2 Timothy 4:13, 20; Titus 1:5; 3:12 Released from prison, Paul journeyed to Greece and probably revisited the Saints in many cities. He may have even preached in Spain.
- 67 1 Timothy; Titus From Greece, Paul wrote his first letter to Timothy. He also wrote a letter to Titus, who was in Crete.
- **1 Peter** Peter wrote to the Church, probably from Rome (see BD, "Peter, Epistles of," 749–50).
- 69 Mark 1:1; Luke 1:1-4; Acts 1:1 Mark and Luke wrote their Gospels, and Luke wrote the Acts of the Apostles.
- **70 Matthew 1:1** Matthew wrote his Gospel.
- **2 Timothy 4:6** Paul was arrested and sent to Rome for another trial.
- **22 Timothy** Paul wrote again to Timothy. This was Paul's last New Testament letter.
- Paul was most likely executed in Rome at the time Nero was emperor of Rome.
- 74 2 Peter Peter wrote again to the Church.
- **75 2 Peter 1:14** Peter was also probably executed during the reign of Nero.

- 76 The city of Jerusalem, including the temple, was destroyed by the Romans. Many Jews were killed or scattered.
- Jude Jude, the brother of James, wrote to the Church, warning of apostasy (see BD, "Jude, Epistle of," 719).
- **Revelution 1:9** While living in Ephesus, John was banished to the Isle of Patmos.
- 79 Revelation 1-22 John had a vision of the Lord and received messages for seven branches of the Church. He wrote the vision and sent it to the Church. He also saw events of the latter days and the ultimate triumph of God and His kingdom through the Savior Jesus Christ (see BD, "Revelation of John," 762-63).
- **80 John 21:25** John wrote his Gospel.
- **81 1 John; 2 John; 3 John** John wrote three letters. He taught of Christ and love. He urged members to be faithful to the truth (see BD, "John, Epistles of," 715).
- **82 John 21:20–24** John was translated so he could continue his mission on earth until the Second Coming of Christ.
- 83 2 Thessalonians 2:3 The Great Apostasy.

BOOK OF MORMON

- **3 Nephi 11:1-26:15** Jesus Christ visited and ministered to the people in America.
- **4 Nephi 1:1-3** All the people were converted to the Lord and had "all things common among them" (v. 3).
- **4 Nephi 1:7-18** The people rebuilt their cities. There was no contention in the land, and "there could not be a happier people" (v. 16).
- **87 4 Nephi 1:19** There was continuous peace in the land. Nephi passed the records on to his son Amos.
