"We played everybody we could," the Oklahoma coach said after the game.

When pressed for a number, Fairbanks smiled and said, "Oh, I don't know for sure, but a bunch."

Records Fall In 44-17 Win By Nebraska

Manhattan, Kan.—The agonizing wait is on for Nebraskans. But for the Huskers the looking ahead may have started a bit early.

True, the Huskers whipped a hard-hitting Kansas State team, 44-17, Saturday in what has become typical of their methodical fashion.

The Nebraskans took a 14-0 lead on marches of 80 and 94 yards the first two times they had the ball, but they never really matched that early fury thereafter.

Kansas Staters have no doubts about which team, Oklahoma or Nebraska, should be favored Thanksgiving Day.

The K-State fans drowned out some 10,000 Big Red followers who chanted "We're No. 1" during the fourth quarter action.

Kansas State, pummeled by Oklahoma, 75-28, four games back, made it an ouchy after-noon for the Huskers.

"They (Kansas State) probably hit us harder than anybody has yet," said N.U. assistant Tom Osborne.

The wait for T-Time (title game at Oklahoma Thanksgiving) will suit Osborne fine, he said.

Injuries

"We got some people hurt, like Jeff Kinney and Carl Johnson, and I'm sure there will be some others with minor aches," Osborne said. "We can use 11 or 12 days to get our players ready."

Although Osborne conceded the Huskers might have looked ahead to the title game, there were bright spots.

Jerry Tagge, the artistic thrower from Green Bay, put 20 more notches on the completion log as he threw for 285 yards and three touchdowns.

Two of his aerials went to Johnny Rodgers, who surpassed the school record of nine season touchdown receptions set by Clarence Swanson in 1921.

Johnny the Jet picked off 10 passes, to give him 10 playoff passes this season. His yardage total was a respectable 125.

Nebraska's defense against the rush shut off Kansas State with a minus one yard the first quarter and finished the game by yielding only 57 in 34 attempts by the fired-up Wildcats.

Lefty Dennis Morrison, in the face of a difficult rush most of the afternoon, still displayed the best passing effort against N.U. this season.

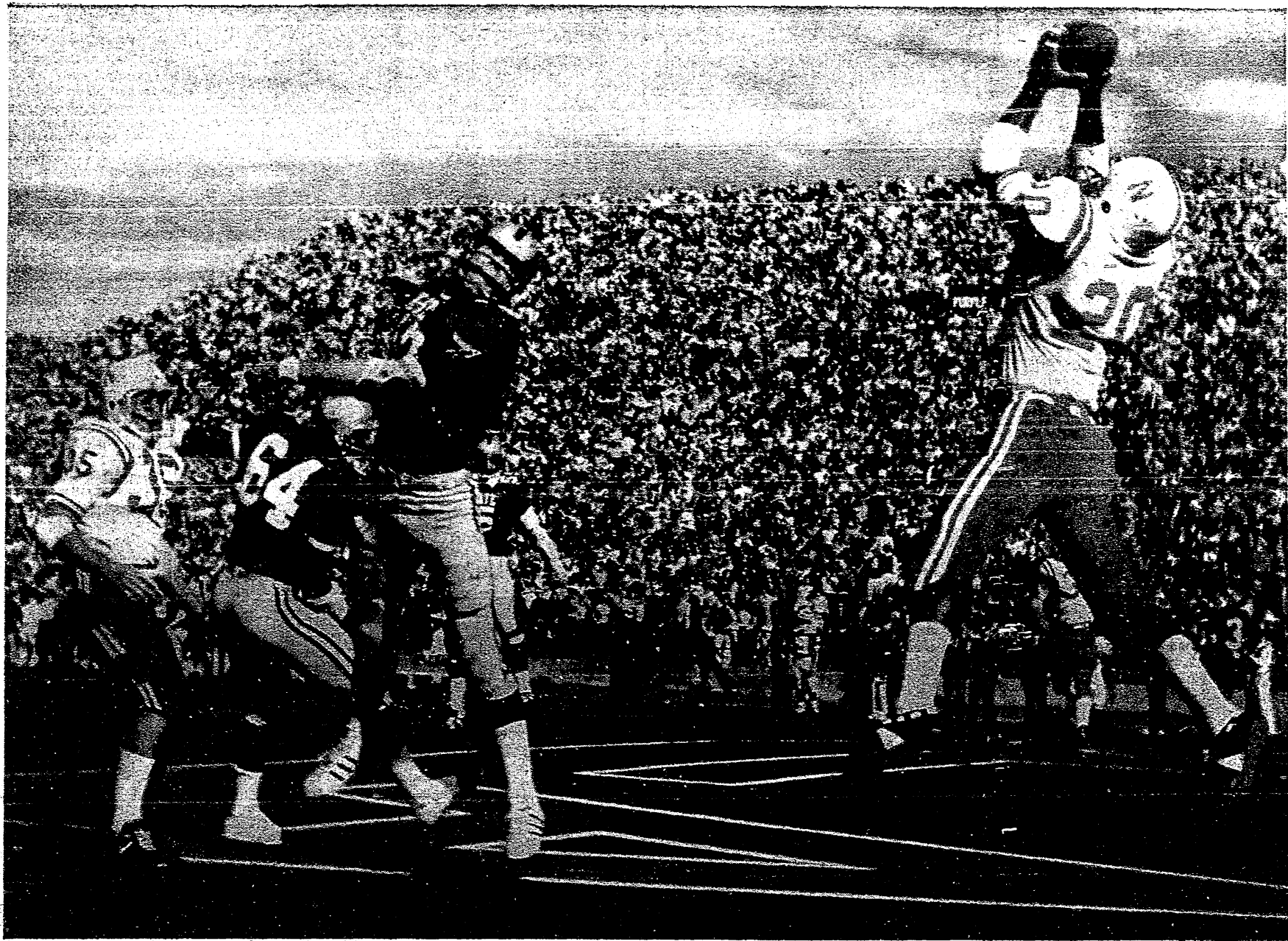
On Target

Morrison, the California junior, completed 23 of 46 passes for 179 yards against the league's best pass defense.

The 17-point total, all against the No. 1 Blackshirts, was the most scored on N.U. this season.

But the 236-yard total recorded by Kansas State might give Husker followers solace in making comparisons.

Auburn Rips Georgia On Sullivan's Aerials

Athens, Ga. (AP)—Pat Sullivan fired four touchdown passes Saturday, equaling an NCAA record, as sixth-ranked Auburn knocked No. 7 Georgia from the undefeated ranks 35-20, in a Southeastern Conference game.

Sullivan connected on scoring bombs of 34 and 70 yards to Terry Beasley and 15 and five yards to Dick Schmalz.

The four touchdowns allowed Sullivan to equal the NCAA career record of 71 touchdowns passes previously held by Steve Ramsey of North Texas State.

The Auburn triumph denied Georgia at least a share of the SEC championship and set up a

also broke the SEC career mark of 50 held by Babe Parilli of Kentucky. Sullivan now has 53.

"Sullivan is the best I've ever seen, bar none," said Georgia Coach Vince Dooley.

"We simply were, beaten by the best I've ever seen," said Dooley. "Sullivan was a superman having a super day and Beasley is a boy wonder. It will have to be proven to me there is a better combination than those two."

"They had perfect timing between them," Dooley added. "If Sullivan isn't the Heisman winner, I don't know who it would be."

Meanwhile, Coach Ralph "Shug" Jordan of Auburn also heaped praise on his star quarterback, who has a 25-4 career record.

"If he ever played a better game, I don't remember it and he's played lots of great ones," Jordan said. "He seems to play his best in the biggest games."

The Bulldogs trimmed Auburn's lead to 21-20 with 11:46 remaining on a two-yard touchdown run by Andy Johnson following a fumble recovery at the Auburn 26.

Twenty-two seconds later Sullivan and Beasley connected on the 70-yard touchdown pass, with Beasley grabbing it at his 45 and pulling away from two Georgia defenders to score.

Moments later, James Owens galloped 60 yards on a punt return to the Georgia 20 setting up Sullivan's game-icing touchdown toss to Schmalz.

Georgia's other touchdowns came on a two-yard run by Jimmy Poulos and a four-yard run by Donnie Allen, both in the first half.

Good Fellows Pin Tourney Is Scheduled Nov. 28-Dec. 4

Bowlers, want to help The World-Herald Good Fellows Charities? You'll have your chance Nov. 28 through Dec. 4.

That's the week of the 24th annual Good Fellows Bowling Tournament and any league bowler who have an average based on at least nine games is eligible.

To enter the Good Fellows competition, each bowler must pay his league secretary 50 cents prior to rolling his three games. Competition is based solely on pins over average.

In other words if a bowler has a 150 average and rolls a 600 he is 150 pins over his average for the three games. There are four pins-over-average divisions for men and four for women.

In addition there are special divisions for men's, women's and mixed teams and men's and women's league secretaries. Bowlers compete for more than \$1,000 in cash prizes and trophies.

Since the first tourney in 1948, bowlers have contributed \$203,012.17, mostly through entry fees, to the Good Fellows.

The money is used in a number of ways to help the needy. It buys shoes, clothing and toys. It helps the Visiting Nurses Association provide milk for children. And last year it provided 50 pairs of eye glasses and some hearing aids for children.

Huskers: Bring On the Sooners

Manhattan, Kan. — Jim Anderson took his cue well Saturday after being asked week after week if the Nebraska football team was looking ahead to Oklahoma.

"I don't think we're looking ahead to the game with Hawaii," the Cornhusker defensive captain said in the dressing room after a 44-17 conquest of Kansas State.

The Thanksgiving Day game with Oklahoma was next. Everybody talked about it.

"This is the one we've been waiting for," said Coach Bob Devaney. "This probably is the one to settle the national championship. It's going to be a fine football game. It is a tribute to the Big Eight Conference for two teams to be playing down there in Norman for the national championship."

Anderson said the Husker captains "won't have to do too much talking" to have the Nebraska players in a proper frame of mind for the Nov. 25 game.

"This is our season," said Anderson. "This is the one we want. Everybody knows that."

Others commented on the game, including flanker Johnny Rodgers: "I'm an overly confident person. I'm not going to say we're going to run away with the game, but I don't think we're going to lose. We've tried not to think about the game, but it's always been there."

Quarterback Jerry Tagge added: "Definitely, the game's been in our conversations, but it's always been secondary. But now . . . the show-down. I have a lot of confidence in our team; confidence in our defense. I think we can win."

And tackle Bill Janssen added: "We've been wanting to play them all year. We just couldn't afford to look ahead to them until now."

Halfback Jeff Kinney nursed sore ribs he said wouldn't slow him. "There's no other game to look over now. We'll go down there, and on Turkey Day, I think you'll see a bunch of fired up Cornhuskers," Kinney said.

They'd been wanting to say that for a long time.
