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IMPERIAL TABLE X.

Language.

NOTE 1.—The area and population covered by this table are the same as those covered by Imperial Table VI-A, so that the areas (indicated in Note 1 of that table) in which the population was only estimated have been omitted from it.

NOTE 2.—Persons who speak more than one language have been entered only as speakers of that language which they returned in the enumeration schedules as the language they ordinarily used in their homes.

NOTE 3.—The languages returned have been collected into four classes as *Indigenous*, *Indian*, *European* and *Other* Languages.

NOTE 4.—No attempt has been made to classify in accordance with any accepted linguistic scheme the languages included under the last three names, the meanings of which are defined by Part IB of the table which gives a list of the separate languages included under each and the numbers of their speakers.

NOTE 5.—The indigenous languages have been arranged according to the best available information into groups, branches, sub-families and families as shown in Parts IA and IB of the table, which also show the number of speakers of each language and the total number of speakers of languages of each group or higher class.

For convenience in reference and indexing the letters A to O inclusive have been used to represent the groups of indigenous languages other than Chinese which is represented by R. The *Indian*, *European* and *Other* classes are similarly treated for convenience as artificial groups and represented by the letters X, Y and Z respectively. The letter corresponding to each group is shown in Part IA of the table. S is used in Imperial Table XIII to include the Zerbadis, the Arakan-Mahomedans and the Arakan-Kamans, but it does not appear in this table as these races have not separate languages.

For further information with regard to the classification scheme the Report Volume should be consulted.

NOTE 6.—Part IB shows in its *Remarks* column the districts in which are found speakers of some indigenous languages which are spoken over only a small area and for which more detailed information is not given in Part III of the table. In addition it gives, in italics, for some languages, other names which are in some cases alternative names of the same language and in other cases names of dialects of that language; further study may in some cases require some dialects to be regarded as separate languages, but generally such division has been avoided where not particularly required. The addition of * or † to a name has the same meaning as in Part IC (See Note 7).

NOTE 7.—Part IC is an alphabetical index of the various names of languages and dialects designed to show where in Part IB the speakers of each indigenous language or dialect are tabulated. To make this index serve the purposes of Imperial Table XIII also, some names are included which are used only for races and not for languages. Such names are marked with an *, while names which are used for languages but not for races are marked with a †. Some names however which are properly used only to designate a race or tribe have been used by some people to designate a language or *vice versa*.

NOTE 8.—Part II gives the distribution by districts of the total speakers of languages of each class and of each indigenous group and also of speakers of English, and at the same time classifies the whole population of each district according to the group to which their languages belong.

NOTE 9.—Part III gives the distribution by districts of the speakers of the most important and widely spread languages of the indigenous class.

NOTE 10.—The form of Imperial Table XIII has been made parallel to that of this table to facilitate the extraction of corresponding figures for race and language. It should however be noted that, while Chinese (R) has been regarded as an indigenous language-group, none of the races of the Chinese group has been treated as an indigenous race.
