(Continued from page 4) Empire where the civil service maintained civilisation in the east of Europe for a thousand years after the fall of Rome. Nowhere clocked a common civilisationendured so long except it China where it has been kept alive by the same means. The alive by the same means. The other lesson that we can learn from the Middle Ages is equally important. This is the device of representation by election. Officials know how to do things, but they do not know what to do. They can conduct political affairs according to formand precedent, but for any departure for precedent they depend on instructions from outside. It is encessary to give them instructions. If these instructions are to be acceptable to the people they must be given instructions are to be acceptable to the people they must be given by some authority accepted by the people, by some one who represents the people. It is not necessary that this representative should be elected. Probably the King of Burma represented the people of Burma better than a modern Legislative Council. But election is a device by which representatives may be chosen to act in accordance with the will of act in accordance with the will of the people for the time being. It was invented for the English Par-liament of 1295 and as yet no better device has been dis-covered. Although then no great contribution to political thought has come down from the Middle has come down from the Middle Ages we inherit from them two great contributions to Political practice; the official hierarchy on a national basis, and representa-

tion by election.

## Hsenwi Customs seize truck-load of contraband

LASHIO, Nov. 9-Chinese goods worth over K 10,000 were seized from a truck at the Customs gate at Hsenwi on November 8. The truck had come from Kyukok, on the frontier

# 200 MUJAHIDS TO SURRENDER SOON

# They capture their own leaders for surrender

( By Our Staff Reporter )

Over two hundred Majahids with a considerable number of arms will be returning to the light soon. They have also captured their own leaders, Salai Ahmed and Shauffi, and are furning them in to the authorities.

The Frontier Administration has already made arrangements to receive the returning Mujahids in a fitting ceremony at Maungdaw.

Brigadier Aung Gyi, Vice Chief of Staff, will officiate at the ceremony in Maungdaw and accept the surrender, it is

learnt.

Mujahid followers arrested their top-line leaders, Salai Ahmed and Shauffi, as the two were about to escape across the border and collecting over two hundred of themselves, they have arranged to turn in 11 machine guns, three 3" mortars, three 2" mortars, 18 tommy and sten guns, 274 assorted arms including rifles, nine revolvers and an assortment of ammunition at the surrender ceremony in Maung-

It will be recalled that on July 3 last, 273 Mujahid insur-gents, led by Mujahid Party President Robi Hula, surrendered en masse to Brig. Aung Gyi at a ceremony held at Maungdaw. # 200 Mujahids surrender in Maungdaw

End of trouble & heralding in of peace in Mayu, Brig, Aung Gyi says

( By Our Staff Reporter )

Two bundred Mujahid insurgents led by Vice-President of the East Suthitaung Mujahid Party, Mr. Raunchid, surrendered on musse in a formal ceremony yesterday at Manughaw in Maya Frontier District.

Brigadier Aung Gyi, Vice Chief of Staff, in accepting the surrender said it was a momentous day. He said that for the past twenty years, since 1942, the people in the District had lived in mortal fear of their life and limb and that the auspicious day, not only marked the end of death and destruction in the area, but also the heralding in of peace and tranquility in Mayu.

"From today peace would descend on the countryside, making Mayu one of the most peaceful places in the whole of the Union," said the Brigadier, and added, "People in the area can now go about their chosen tasks in peace."

Dwelling at length on the aspects of rural economy, refgion and education, Brig. Aung Gyi explained in detail how these aims might be achieved.

The surrender ceremony was held at the Parada Ground at 5 a.m. and over 5,000 people surned out in force to witness the scene.

The Vice-President of the East Buthidaung Mujahid Party, Mr. Rauschid, surrendered to Brig. Aung Gyi a gun to which was tied the Mujahid Insurgest Flag, as a token of their surrender.

as a token or their entrescer.

The surrender coremony was attended amongst others by Commodore Than Pe, Vice Chief of Staff (Navy), Col. Saw Myint, Director of Frontier Areas Administration, Lt.-Col. Myint Maung, Ministry of Defence, Lt.-Col. Bo, Director of Psychological Warfare, Lt.-Col. Ye Gaung, Arakan Force Commander and civil, police and army officers.

The Mujahids surrendered 3" and 2" mortars, sub-machine guns, tommy, sten and other arms, totalling over 300 and over 5,000 assorted ammunition.

After the speech by Brig. Aung Gyi, Commodore Than Pe, Col. Saw Myint and Mr. Rauschid also addressed the gathering.

Commodore Than Pe said there was no rhyme or reason for



the armed revolution as the Constitution of the Union of Burma guaranteed equal rights for all Union citizens. He asked the former insurgents to forget about the historical past and strive for the good of the nation.

Col. Saw Myint declared that the day marked a new chapter in the annuls of the Maya Frontier District. The magnanimity of the Burma Army towards the Mujahids had been samply demonstrated, he said, by the presence of top army officers at the day's ceremony. He exhorted the Mujahids to make a chunge of heart and pursue the path chalked out for them by the Frontier Areas Administration for ecomomic, social and religious advancement of the people in the Mayu District. The Colonel, however, warned that severe action would be taken against saboteurs who tried to undermine the progress of the Mayu Frontier District.
