Of Sequels, Storylines and Space Opera

Should Blake's 7 be continued?

Should there be a sequel to Blake's 7? Only if the people who make the sequel are genuinely interested in telling a good story the best way they can and who understand and respect space opera. If not, better to be content with the existing episodes than see the program ruined by people who don't know what they're doing, or worse, are merely interested in taking advantage of a readymade audience.

I am totally opposed to the replacement of the original actors by others, possibly younger, I've never found one actor replacing

another playing the same character in a series satisfactory; in the case of Blake's 7, in which the input of the actors was one of the factors that made the series successful, the replacement of the original actors with others would be particularly disastrous. If the original actors are unable or unwilling, the characters can be killed off and new characters created to fill the empty slots; if an actor is willing but not immediately available, his character can be occupied elsewhere for any number of reasons until he can rejoin the cast.

As for the original actors being older: I don't see any prob-

'Star Cops': Frontier Justice in Space

Chris Boucher's magnum opus premieres on KERA

It is the year 2027. Lapels are wider, the Cold
War is once again a factor in global politics, and
humanity has reached beyond its first tentative
steps off its home planet and established a firm
foothold in space.

On the high frontier, fighting crime has been the part-time responsibility of space settlers. The world's spacefaring nations, despite continued political squabbling, are ready to commit to a full-time peacekeeping detail, the International Space

Police Force.

Chris Boucher, script editor during Blake's 7's four seasons, brings that scenario to vivid reality in Star Cops, premiering in July on KERA.

Englishman Nathan Spring, portrayed by character actor David Calder, is a career policeman who is growing disissusioned with the "advances" of crime-fighting, in which all the investigative work is taken out of human hands and the policeman only serves to carry out the computer's determinations of guilt and innocence.

But when he's told he's the unlikely compromise choice for the job of commander of the ISPF, he's reluctant to give up the security of his job, his home, and his girlfriend to bring full-time law and order to the space settlements.

Spring's unwillingness to trust, or to take things at face value, work as well for him in space as they did on Earth. His unorthodox — and visually electrifying — solution of the murder of a Swedish politician clinches Spring's reassignment to space.

Other members of the force are introduced roughly one per episode: Spring's second-in-com-

 The interaction... even carries the show past the infrequent weak script moment. mand, David Theroux (Erick Ray Evans), who left the American

space program in unfavorable circumstances; Pal Kenzy (Linda Newton), a brash Australian with experience on both sides of the law; confirmed chauvinist Colin Devis (Trevor Cooper); and quiet, vulnerable Anna Shoun (Sayo Inaba). Base commander Alexander Krivenko (Jonathan Adams) rounds out the varied cast of characters, each with their own quirks, each developing more fully as they get used to each other and the rigors of work in space.

No group gets a break in Star Cops. Americans are portrayed as flag-waving warmongers, Italians as agents of organized crime, Australians as loud lager-drinking louts, Japanese as zealous subservients, and so forth. But Boucher reserves his harshest criticism for the British, or more enecifically.

He remained true to that brief. Even though the series devotes a lot of detail to life in the 21st century, the stories are strong enough to not rely on gadgets to keep viewers interested. The interaction among the characters even carries the show past the infrequent weak script moment; it's rare for a show to spawn characters who not only care about each other, but for whom we care a great deal as well. This is particularly evident during the final minutes of the final episode, Little Green Men and Other Martians; those are moments not to be missed.

The series does get off to a slow start; the first two episodes serve as more of a character study of Spring, Theroux and Devis than as a particular springboard for plot development. By the time the third episode, *Intelligent Listening for Beginners*, rolls around — coincident with the relocation of the lead characters from the *Eurostation Charles de Gaulle* to the Moonbase — character development lessens as the storylines begin to take precedence.

But that development never stops, as the writers use the later episodes to round out the characters' personalities while still providing interesting plots. The episode Other People's Secrets, for example, brings on board psychologist Angela Parr — one of Devis' five ex-wives — to run profiles on Moonbase personnel, while a wave of technical problems hit the base just as the safety controller does his tour of duty. In Little Green Men and Other Martians, Spring must deal with a major discovery at the Martian colonies, a case of lunar due control.

lem. The storyline could simply be picked up after a lapse of time equal to however long the series had been out of production. Doctor Who and Star Trek have established a precedent for older characters in adventure series. If the actors aren't capable of performing the action sequences, the surviving members of the Seven could now be masterminding the actions of younger recruits, as Servalan masterminded the actions of Travis (before she used the poor fool as a fall guy), or Captain Picard does those of the Away Team.

The original characters being older would also, incidentally, add some interesting elements to the series in terms of plot and theme — I have an image in my mind's eye of Tarrant getting the "I'm younger, faster, sharper" speech from a vounger counterpart of himself. A lapse in time could also serve to explain a change in faces on the Federation side; given the apparent volatility of Federation politics, especially after the intergalactic war, it's unlikely the political situation would have remained unchanged, and I for one always found it strange there weren't more Feds with a personal interest in nailing our heroes' hides to the walls. Pursuit of power seemed to be the chief pastime of Federation officials. Servalan couldn't have been the only person whose plans our heroes thwarted.

I agree with Cynthianna Appel (Tarriel Cell, June 1989) that Terry Nation is the obvious first choice to write a sequel, but I'm opposed to Paul Darrow as a writer after the Terrible Aspect debacle. The same goes for Tony Attwood and the perpetrators of Dawn of the Gods, The Harvest of Kairos and Ultraworld. Any of the other original writers would be acceptable. What I'd most like to see, however, would be a sequel written by professional SF writers, especially those who've demonstrated their ability to write SF as adventure thriller. I'd propose the likes of Robert


Asprin, C.J. Cherryh, David Drake, Joe Haldeman, George R.R. Martin, Michael Moorcock or J.M. Stirling... or perhaps their freshman colleague, P.N. Elrod, who has also proven her ability to write space opera as adventure thriller and done so specifically with *Blake's 7*.


All discussion and wishful thinking aside, however, my position on a *Blake's 7* sequel can be summed up as follows: Do it right or don't do it at all.

Book Review: 'Lifeblood'

If you've been around ORAC for any length of time, you're probably familiar with Pat Elrod's first novel Bloodlist and its phenomenally successful "Buy the book and nobody gets hurt" advertising campaign. (Just kidding, Mark!) Bloodlist began with its hero, Jack Fleming, being murdered by gangsters in 1936 Chicago. Instead of staying dead, Fleming becomes a vampire and hunts

down his own killers. Bloodlist has a steady flow of action and several interesting characters: Fleming, his detective friend Charles Escott, and a torch singer named Bobbi.

Lifeblood, the second book in the series, opens in more of a state of equilibrium. Jack is working on and off as Escott's assistant (only at night, obviously) and continuing a warm and stable relationship with Bobbi. He crosses paths with some vampire hunters, though he finds them more of a nuisance than a threat.

Most importantly, to him,
Jack finally gets the first clue in
his five-year search for his missing vampire girlfriend, Maureen.
He meets Maureen's sister
Gaylen, an elderly woman who
is not a vampire. Fleming gets
details of Maureen's earlier life
both from Gaylen and from the
inept vampire hunters. Up until

the end of chapter eight, Lifeblood reads much like a Sherlock Holmes or Nero Wolfe novel; you're interested in the outcome of the case, but you don't expect its solution to cost much physical or emotional harm to the series hero. Then you hit page 144, chapter nine.

The rest of Lifeblood tosses you from the frying pan to the fire to the blast furnace. The novel completely shifts gears. Instead of trying to tie up the loose ends of a bittersweet past relationship, Jack finds himself fighting for his life and the lives of his closest friends. He has to fight a vampire adversary far more ruthless than himself, and he nearly dies — at least twice — in a thoroughly traditional vampiric manner.

The novel's last third is effective and exciting; I for one found it impossible to put down during that section. But if I had one complaint, it would be that this pacing is a little too effective. A page or so more of winding down, just to re-confirm for the slower readers who lived and who died, might have brought me down with less of a bump. I had to sit still for a few minutes after finishing the novel and review mental notes to make sure all the loose ends had gotten tied up (they had). I recommend both novels without reservation, but I also recommend setting your schedule so you can read Lifeblood, at least, pretty much in one sitting.

The first thing that stands out in these novels is the plotting, solid as handmade furniture. If there's a phone in the bathroom in chapter seven, someone has used it and commented on it in chapter three. The details are right in these books: 1930's slang, attitudes of the time period, the best way to use a gun.

Their other strong point is characterization. The protagonists are likeable, and so well-defined that you can read most of a page of unattributed dialogue without getting confused as to who's saying what. Even the villains are people, with clear motivations and the occasional redeeming quality. They also have brains, which feeds back into the strong plotting. Every action a villain takes in these books makes sense to the villain at the time, even if it eventually benefits the hero.
