

'Blake's 7' At 15: The Aging of a Legend

On January 2, 1978, Blake's 7 premiered on the BBC. While its special effects weren't stellar, its scripts and characters were well-constructed, and the series became a cult favorite.

But how well has the series aged? To find out, several ORAC members drew lots at a recent meeting to review the first seven episodes of the series. No restrictions were placed on the length or content of the review — we were interested in finding out their reactions to the episodes. The remaining six episodes of the first season will be reviewed next issue.

The Way Back

The Way Back is probably the least typical of Blake's 7 episodes. Of course pilot episodes often present a sort of "rough draft" of characters and ideas that change later on, but The Way Back is an extreme example of this phenomenon. The pilot episode presents a Blake without a "Seven" or much foreshadowing of where he might acquire one. If someone reviewed Blake's 7 based entirely on this episode, they would probably conclude that it was a Prisoner-style psychodrama focused on only one man, Blake.

The Way Back omits virtually every key element of later Blake's 7 stories: the spacecraft with the teleport capacity, the talking computer, the basic "have a space battle/help an endangered planet" plot. The absence of the running battle between the two most popular characters, Vila and Avon, is particularly noticeable. The give and take between Vila's prole common sense and Avon's ever more noticeable Richard III complex — "mad, bad and dangerous to know" — is the emotional generator that drives most episodes in the series.

The Way Back is a straightforward story of man versus the system. While Jenna and Vila make their first appearances in this episode, they are only shadows of their future selves; Vila is comic relief and Jenna is simply a spunky romantic interest. The real focus is solely on Blake as he becomes a whole different person in fifty minutes of screen time.

At the beginning of the series, Blake is so much a prisoner that he no longer knows he is not free. What we see of the reconditioned Blake is almost an emotional vacuum, presumably interested in his own day-to-day life but with no urge to go beyond the rules. He accepts the faked videotapes of his mother and sister as genuine, he follows even the smallest rules of "the authorities" blindly. He even wants to turn in the other dissidents when he realizes they are against the government. Little besides dumb luck saves him from being massacred with the others, but witnessing that massacre starts him on the road back to his

nd here it is at last, after a two A year wait, another offering of mixed British media SF&F from that crowd in Queensland. Worth the wait? Well, I'm impatient, so I wish they'd been faster! As usual, all the illos are good, and Bruce Mitchell's are superb. The pieces are mostly Blake's 7 this time, with some peeps from The Tomorrow People, Space: 1999, Sapphire & Steel and UFO. There is also a lovely folio by Sonia Van Den Ende, a fan artist I have always admired. But let's look at it piece by

Insurance by Ana Dorfstad: This one fills in a little question — if the Liberator treasure room had so much stuff in it, why were stunts like the

Worth the wait? Well, I'm impatient, so I wish they'd been faster!

Kairopan haul needed in season 3? Well written, plausible, gets the character nuances right, particularly the relationship between Blake and

The Gate Beyond Winter by Marie Logan: One of my favourite ever stories. An ancient Queen fights goblins and is rescued by elves - or is that what is really happening? It is so good to see the Seven from such a different perspective. One has one's cake and eats it too, where fantasy meets reality and one finds it to be cultural difference rather than un-

Nascent by Catherine Stewart: One sees so few Tomorrow People stories, and this one is fun.

River of Night's Dreaming by Jack Wynguard: Sad, but pretty well done. One of those noble uplifting tragic kind of endings. But hope lives

How To Be Ridiculously Well-Acquainted With The First Season Of Blake's 7 In Less Time Than It Takes To

Make A Good Cup Of Coffee by Danny Murphy and David Leighton: This was full of chuckles. Poems and other summaries, aptly accompanied by cartoons. My favourites were the ones for Project Avalon and Deliverance.

Might-Have-Beens by Bryn Lantry: She's got Avon here dancing on the edge of sentimentality but not quite crossing it.

Infernal Devices by David Tulley: Good style, but I don't care that much for Space: 1999 — and this is an improbably happy ending, even though it does explain what happened to Prof. Bergman et al.

A Lie — After Orbit by Bryn Lantry: This poem catches Avon's self-deception well enough. If it was self-deception.

Celtic Circle by Catherine Stewart: Well done! It is so hard to think of an original and interesting menace for Sapphire and Steel to battle, but she's done it. It was also refreshing to have the "civilian" play a partnership role rather than a tool role with Steel, amusing to see him wrong for once. I liked the way some things were the reverse of the usual.

The Devil's Loom by Ana Dorfstad: I like the twist. I was sure all along Avon wasn't a psychopath, but I can't be sure that my other suspicions about what was going on wasn't due to my proof-reading part of this story earlier. This one explains why the Liberator crew gave up on looking for Blake for most of the third season. Yet another story where good comes out of bad, if the cryptic last paragraphs mean what I think they do.

The Seventh Rebel by Bryn Lantry: A different idea, postulating Zen-asperson deciding whether or not it wants to be part of the Cause.

In My Enemy's Eyes: The Inheritors Part 1 (UFO) by Catherine Stewart: Oh, I like this one so much, perhaps partly because I had been looking forward to it after hearing part of the plot from the author a few years ago.

But it is better than I had anticipated. Carlin crashes in the bleak North American tundra, with no one alive out there but the alien whose UFO he had damaged. This is set after her story Cloudeye, from the way some of the characters in that get mentioned.

The double meaning of the last remark of Carlin was a pleasantly ironic way to end it. And the way Carlin is trying to avoid Straker's overtures of friendship is amusing. I love the picture of the alien: nicely enigmatic.

original personality.

From the moment Blake returns to his underground city and is arrested, the story is an ever-escalating game of hardball between Blake and the system. The similarity is less to Number Six in The Village than to Winston Smith in the totalitarian system of Nineteen Eighty-four, because Blake is hopelessly outgunned. Does he have a chance of serving the rebel movement again as either a hero or a martyr? The Federation has the perfect frame-up — a crime so socially disgusting that the other rebels will shun him, but not carrying the death penalty so he can be exiled and murdered quietly without public relations damage. Does he convince his lawyer he's truly innocent, and deserves to appeal? Then the takeoff of his prison ship is moved up - the lawyer has a shorter deadline to act that he thinks. Do the lawyer and his girlfriend, finally, find evidence to clear Blake? Then they can be quietly murdered as well — they aren't dangerous rebel leaders who would be missed.

At the end of the episode, Blake has gone from being a relatively "free" citizen of the Federation to an

exile chained to his chair in a prison ship with an execution to look forward to. But the triumphant tone of his final line "I'm coming back" is not out of place. He has become his old self again, a determined man firmly committed to a cause. Blake's mind is free; having accomplished that, achieving other kinds of freedom will be relatively easy.

In some ways, The Way Back is not necessary for an understanding of Blake's 7. The rebels Blake meets die off very quickly. The only personal enemy Blake develops, Dev Tarrant, never appears in the series again. Jenna and Vila barely rate screen time, and the impression of the Federation in the first story geographically almost limited to Earth, but capable of immensely detailed mind control - isn't much like the Federation that Blake and friends fight for the next four years. If you want to indoctrinate friends into the series, you can just as easily start them off with the second episode without confusing them. But The Way Back is a very good piece of drama on its own merits, and the series would be missing something

Space Fall

Blake and his fellow prisoners attempt unsuccessfully to take over the transport ship, the London, halfway through its eight-month voyage to the prison planet Cygnus Alpha. Blake and the two other prominent conspirators, Avon and Jenna, are given the opportunity to lighten their punishment by securing an abandoned alien ship for the London's officers. The three convicts

instead seize the alien ship, the Liberator, for their own use and es-

Viewers who gamely returned for this second episode of *Blake's* 7 after watching the tedious series opener were rewarded with a tight, suspenseful plot, better dialogue, a beautiful new spaceship, and two more continuing characters. The appearance of Avon alone improved the show one hundred percent. It would not have become a hit without him.

The basic personalities of five of the series' main characters and the relationship between them (which is the real hook of the show) are firmly established in Space Fall. Blake, a manipulative, charismatic idealist becomes obsessed with the idea of escaping and fighting the mighty Federation. He is constantly challenged by Avon, the practical, arrogant money-loving computer genius but supported by the infatuated pilot, Jenna, and the stalwart Gan, with the cowardly thief, Vila, dithering back and forth.

Another potential main character, Nova, gets written out of the show in this episode. In a scene that I still find frightening, he suffocates in a crawl space filled with sealing gel during the failed takeover attempt. The good die young — this show. Never knowing who will be next adds to the

suspense.

This episode's main baddie, Subcommander Raiker, also gets killed, a more traditional plot development which satisfies the viewer's desire for right to prevail — a necessity in a series in which the continuing baddie, Servalan, eventually survives all of the good guys. Leslie Schofield, who played Raiker, made a wonderful antagonist for Blake on the London, the first of many strong guest actors throughout the series.

The beautiful *Liberator* appears two-thirds of the way through *Space Fall*. The *London* was a slow, ugly

ship with a drab, cramped flight deck. The contrast between the cold, institutional whites and grays of the transport ship's interiors (similar to the dome sets of the first episode) and the warm bright colors and shapes of the *Liberator*'s flight deck make the alien ship look better than it really is.

Objectively, the Liberator's flight controls look like stacks of plastic washtubs, and the multi-leveled deck is technically impractical, no matter how beautifully it films. However, I doubt if any viewers were feeling objective during their first look around the Liberator with Blake,

Avon and Jenna.

The first six episodes of Blake's 7 are serialized. The continuity between the first three episodes is generally excellent. Blake's decision to take the Liberator to Cygnus Alpha to rescue the remaining crew hooks the viewer to watch the next show.

But I do have one small complaint. Why is it that during the break between Space Fall and Cygnus Alpha, four months have gone by on the London but not on the Liberator? The London has completed the last half of its eight-month trip while Blake and company are still figuring out the Liberator's controls and meeting Zen. I know the Liberator made the trip in minutes (or hours), but are we expected to believe Blake and the others then waited four months before exploring the ship, playing with the teleport, and discovering the treasure room and the clothes closet? (Once you've explained that, then tell me what happened to Orac and Dayna's huge weapon between Aftermath and Powerplay.)

Overall, Space Fall is a good episode even when judged by today's standards. I give it 8 out of 10 for dialogue, characterization and

Cygnus Alpha

Cygnus Alpha, the first planet of the star Cygnus, is a primitive planet yet it is a Federation prison. A religious sect has developed and the newly arrived prisoners are considered new souls for the faith. On Cygnus Alpha new prisoners are greeted by the sight of an unbeliever, crucified and rotting.

Blake, Avon, and Jenna, the three escaped prisoners from the next incoming ship, have acquired a ship they dub the *Liberator*. As they learn the workings of their new ship they meet the ship's computer, Zen, and set out for Cygnus Alpha to retrieve the remaining members of their party.

Blake tests the teleport (odd, I don't remember it being pronounced as "telly-port" when I first saw this) and sees a few of the believers while on Cygnus Alpha for a few minutes.

The prisoners meet the believers. They are welcomed and taken indoors. Blake returns to Cygnus Alpha and discovers the "Curse of Cygnus" is upon the novices. They seem to be suffering from a sickness which passes after a time with the aid of a drug from the priest. There is one catch, they will never be able to leave the planet and must take the drug for the rest of their lives. Blake also catches the curse and upon recovery he finds he has been cap-

tured by Vargas, the leader of the sect, who is descended from the first prisoners on uninhabited Cygnus Alpha and has total power.

Blake tries to bargain the freedom of the prisoners along with some of the drug but the only thing Vargas

wants is the Liberator. He refuses and is shown the fate of unbelievers. The drug is also being withheld from the

prisoners.

Blake talks the prisoners into making a break and the teleport bracelets are retrieved from Vargas during the fight. Vila and Gan get away while Blake goes back for the weapons. During his escape he loses his bracelet and is held up by Vargas. He has a bracelet and is beamed up by Jenna and Avon before Blake retrieves his bracelet calls in. Vargas starts giving orders when Blake, Vila, and Gan appear. The drug is revealed to be a simple cure and a ruse to keep everyone dependent on their leader. Vargas manouvers everyone together not realizing he is standing in a teleport station. The ship is moving away from Cygnus Alpha and Blake teleports him to the vacuum of space, killing him.

A fleet of Federation ships is spotted and the chase in on.

Upon looking back to the early shows of *Blake's 7*, I notice that the overall appearance of the shows are still not affected by a dated look even though anyone can see a difference







decipher room, Gan is distracted by Avon, and the device is never activated.

A guard escapes to turn in an alarm; Cally is attacked and in the ensuing struggle loses her bracelet. Blake and companions are discovered and barely escape in time. It is only later, on the *Liberator* that they realize that Cally is missing.

The story then moves to a space station where the Supreme Commander had just reinstated Travis as Space Commander and assigning him the task of capturing Blake and his associates. This appointment is made over the objections of representatives of the civilian government and from officers within her military.

Examiners at the Federation base have discovered that the decipher is missing and informed Travis and the Supreme Commander of this fact. Travis plans to use this information to trap Blake by using Cally as bait.

Jenna receives the message that says that a prisoner is being held for questioning, and the group realizes that Cally is still alive. Blake knows when he hears Travis' name what kind of trap to expect from a previous encounter and makes plans ac-

cordingly.

While waiting for their arrival, Travis taunts Cally with Blake's one reliable flaw, loyalty. He steps out to check with the guards; when he returns, he finds that Cally has been freed. Blake tells him not to feel bad, since he had only used a procedure that Travis had originated. Travis warns Blake to kill him, otherwise Blake will never be free of him, but Blake tells him he is not important enough to kill. Soldiers come and Travis orders them to fire, stating that he is not important, but they won't do it. Blake and Cally escape and the Liberator evade the interceptors. As technicians attend to the Space Commander, Travis looks toward space and says, "Run, Blake, run, as far and as fast as you like. I'll

find you. You can't hide from me. I am your death, Blake."

So ends this episode, and its ending foretells the relationship between Blake's Seven and the Federation. Blake's group never makes a real net gain toward overthrowing the government, but the Federation is equally unable to stop or capture the group. They merely inflict damage on each other.

Mission to Destiny

Everybody likes the occasional murder mystery, even if it's not your usual cup of tea. In this very well done first series Blake's 7 episode the viewer gets a well rounded dose of mystery, SF, and some interesting character development thrown in to boot.

To recap the story, the Liberator finds a circling spaceship. Boarding, Blake, Avon, and Cally find a crew which has been drugged asleep with the pilot dead. Scratched in blood on the pilot's message board is "54124". A nice cryptic chue! As it turns out, the ship is from Destiny, a small farming world at the edge of colonized space. A plague has struck there, threatening all plant life and leaving nothing but a slimy fungus in its wake. The hope of Destiny is in the Neutrotope, a device which,

when placed in an orbiting satellite, will expose the surface to a particular frequency of radiation which will kill the plague. Now neutrotopes aren't cheap. The planet has mortgaged itself for the next few decades to get it. So, in comes human greed. Someone on the ship has realized how nice it would be to sell the thing and retire for life (not on Destiny, I would think). Therefore, a murder.

The ship is damaged and can only travel at sub-light, which will take 4 months to get to Destiny. Blake volunteers to take the neutrotope in the Liberator. He leaves. Avon and Cally stay on to help with repairs and also because, in Avon's words, "I hate leaving mysteries unsolved."

And now, Avon plays Hercule Poirot. After another murder, he gets everyone in the ship's lounge for a classic parlor room question and answer scene. You can tell he's enjoying himself. This sort of thing goes on for a while, with someone being killed, Avon and Cally investigating, and getting the survivors together for questioning. I won't give away who did it (in case you haven't seen it yet shame on you!), but I will say that at one point near the end Avon has to punch out a woman (who was admittedly attacking him at the time) and then comments, "You'd better get her out of here, I believe I rather enjoyed that." One of the first times we get to see the side of Avon that

won't let anyone get in the way of what he has to do.

Another interesting thing to see is Blake's single-mindedness in transporting the Neutrotope to Destiny. This isn't his world, he just met a few people from there, they aren't even members of the Federation, but he is willing to risk destruction of his ship by taking it through a

dangerous meteor field to get the Neutrotope there on time. Why? His idealism. This is the kind of personality that causes him to recklessly search for Star One, and even later to set up the trap for Avon and crew on Gauda Prime which proves his undoing. At the end of this episode he rigs the airlock of the transport ship to explode, which kills several people. While the rest look at the viewscreen in horror, asking what happened, Blake grins rather like a child who has just managed to write his name for the first time. "I put an explosive in the airlock so that both ships would go when they locked on."

Why? What is the point of this? They have the neutrotope and the remaining crew on the Liberator and they are on the way to Destiny! Why destroy the other ships? Any why does no one say anything to Blake about it? The episode just ends here.

I believe this indicates Blake's disregard for other people except those which his idealism tells him he must protect. All others are enemies who must be done away with. His world contains very well defined lines of good and evil. The people of Destiny are good, the people trying to steal from them are evil, get rid of them. The subject planets of the Federation are good, the Fed is evil. The one person who doesn't fit this pattern with Blake is Avon. But that's another
