# **Terry Nation, 1930-1997**

### Prolific writer never fully escaped shadow of Daleks

Terry Nation, creator of Blake's 7 and Survivors as well as the Daleks, the greatest enemy of Doctor Who, died on March 9. He was 66.

Terry Nation provided British children with a new nightmare when he invented the Daleks in 1963. The

Daleks made him a rich man. one of the highest-paid freelance television scriptwriters of his generation. Yet he had first turned down the suggestion of writing for a children's television series, and had only dashed off the idea to please his

The BBC liked his proposal, and introduced the Daleks during the fifth Doctor Who episode, entitled The Dead Planet. at the end of 1963. Made of nobbly metal and about three feet high, the creatures resembled upturned beakers with domed tops. A dull metal flange surrounded their "heads", and three different kinds of rod probed the air like a beetle's antennae. There was an endearingly home-made quality to the early Daleks, whose death-ray

guns were constructed, fairly obviously, from rubber sink plungers. "We will exterminate," delivered in strangulated falsetto, was their rallying cry.

Like Frankenstein, Nation never quite escaped the long shadow of his monster. Whatever distinguished adult work he later put his mind to, he was known around BBC corridors ever afterwards as "the Dalek


Man". "I find that against my will I am taken over by the Daleks," he once lamented.

His love for science fiction had blossomed as an only child, growing up in South Wales. After school at Cardiff, Nation briefly joined his father in the family

furniture-making business. When that closed he tried his luck as a stand-up comedian. After several auditions, endured by the audience in painful silence, a forthright agent told him that, while his material was good, his delivery was appalling.

Spike Milligan took pity on the gaunt young man he found haunting the BBC studios, and gave him a check for £10 to write a script for The Goon Show. He liked the result, and Nation all but moved in to Milligan's office over a greengrocer's shop in Shepherds Bush. He also wrote comedy for Frankie Howerd, Harry Worth and Peter Sellers, and episodes for The Saint and The Avengers, later becoming script supervisor for the

latter. He was working with Tony Hancock in Nottingham when his London agent rang to ask if he wanted to write for a new BBC children's series, Doctor Who, "A children's series. Who do they think I am?" was his initial reaction. But when he returned to London without a job he decided to give it a try, and dreamt up a verbal description of a Dalek,

### **Imax: The Final Frontier**

After conquering TV and theatrical films, Star Trek is about to explore the final frontier of filmed entertainment: Imax 3-D. Paramount and Trek executive producer Rick Berman are in serious discussions with Imax Corp. to create a Star Trek film.

The film will be shot in state-of-the-art Imax 3-D with CGI graphics, with a running time of about 40 minutes

and a budget of around \$10 million.

There's no deal yet and no script, but sources said the plan on the drawing board would be either to use the cast from the Next Generation, Deep Space Nine or Voyager series, or to cull characters from each. If that constellation of stars is unavailable, the third option is to assemble a new cast.

The development marks a warp-speed move forward for Imax, whose screen size and 3-D capabilities dwarf traditional moviehouses, but which so far has lacked a brand-name product like Star Trek. Most Imax pictures have been documentaries, along with several fiction productions, including L5: First City in Space and the Jean-Jacques Annaud-directed Wings of Courage, the latter produced by Sony and starring Val Kilmer.

Imax now has 150 theaters in 22 countries, with projected 20% screen growth for the next few years.

Though the number of theaters is small compared to traditional hardtops, the ticket prices are about \$9 per show, the films stay in theaters longer, and they can be shown up to 10 times per day.

Paramount and Berman, always looking for new ways to feed the *Trek* audience, are eager to jump into Imax, though it's undecided whether the film will be financed jointly or only one will pick up the costs. The effort is being spearheaded by Berman, Imax chairman-co-CEO Bradley J. Wechsler and Andrew Gellis, Imax senior vice president of film. None of the principals would comment.

which he named after the spine of an encyclopaedia on his bookshelf, DAL-EK.


According to the storyline of the feature film, Doctor Who and the Daleks (1965), the Daleks were not actually robots, as they were popularly presumed to be, but the last members of a doomed race which had adapted to the corrosive atmosphere of their planet, Skaro, by wearing protective metal armor. The live part of them was a slimy green, brain-sized blob.

After a rapturous reception from the series' youthful audience, the Daleks became a fixture on *Doctor Who*, and established Nation at the BBC. Their success cost him surprisingly little effort. Though he could be a painstaking writer on more serious projects, he found he was able to write a Dalek television script in about eight hours.

The Daleks made way for deadlier foes during the 1970s. Nation, not pleased by the sadistic direction the series appeared to be taking. branched out on his own again. His first new series was The Survivors (1975) which followed a group of plague survivors - the last men and women left on earth after a new disease has wiped out 98 per cent of mankind. The guestion had been intriguing Nation for several years. How could he cope without clean water, lightbulbs, pencils? To answer that, he made his family selfsupporting for nine months. He bought a goat and some chickens and he and his wife Kate - formerly a pianist - grew all the family's food.

The next series, Blake's 7, was set in outer space and did particularly well – opening as it did only days after Star Wars had its first night in Britain in 1977.

Nation uprooted his family to Los Angeles in 1980. Working in Hollywood had been a dream for years. But the reality of an increasingly gray-suited film-making environ-



ment on the West Coast did not suit Nation's style and there were no new television series. There was, however, always some new project for Fox or MGM to keep him busy, and American aficionados of *Doctor* Who, such as Steven Spielberg, made "the Dalek Man" welcome.

Terry Nation died in Los Angeles after several years of bad health, and is survived by his wife and by a son and a daughter.

For this to work, a lot of fans have got to write, and they must do it in 1997 – in other words, now.

We would like the BBC to repeat the 52 episodes of the series, and also make a two-hour special about "The Making of Blake's 7" which would consist of interviews of people associated with the series, and perhaps clips from the show. The special could then be marketed as a video.

The BBC have to be convinced that this would be profitable to do. That's why a lot of fans have to write expressing their interest in *Blake's 7* and also in both seeing the special and buying a video of it.

Non-British fans should just express an interest in Blake's 7 and emphasize the special. UK residents should mention both repeating the series and making the special.

I also wrote my local PBS station when I made my contribution and asked them to show Blake's 7 in the Los

Angeles area. The May pledge drive would be a good time to do this.

## 'Who' In £22 Million Lawsuit

The Doctor Who television series is at the centre of a £22 million dispute. The BBC said that it would "vigorously contend" accusations that it had reneged on a deal for a feature film.

A consortium of three film-makers and other backers, including the pop stars Bryan Ferry and John Ill-sley of Dire Straits, issued a writ in the High Court seeking immediate compensation for £1 million they say they lost when the deal failed. They are also claiming damages of £21 million for potential profits from the three film versions of Doctor Who they had planned to make.

The consortium, known as the Daltenreys, says it negotiated exclusive film rights to the *Doctor Who* film after the television series was axed. Leonard Nimoy, the American actor and director who played Mr. Spock in *Star Trek*, was recruited as

director. Alan Rickman was about to be cast as the Doctor in January 1994 when the BBC announced it was going ahead with a rival American version involving Amblin TV, Steven Spielberg's company.

The American film, which was eventually made by a third company and which starred Paul McGann, flopped when it was released last year.

The film-makers - George Dugdale, John Humphreys and Peter Litten - say they invested everything they owned, including savings and second mortgages on their homes, to raise the £440,000 for the film rights. They claim that the BBC blatantly "breached its undertaking" with the Daltenreys.

Mr Humphreys said: "We have been ruined by the BBC. They made every effort to ensure that the project did not get off the ground."

The consortium signed the original deal in 1987 with John Keeble, head of BBC Enterprises, now BBC Worldwide. It began to go wrong when the Daltenreys secured an agreement with Lumière Pictures, a company which wanted to invest £20 million in films. The film-makers went to the BBC for final approval, as they were contractually bound to do. According to the writ, BBC executives "obstructed and delayed" progress and even encouraged Lumière to exclude the Daltenreys from the project.

A spokeswoman for the BBC said: 
"We are unaware of any legal action but we will vigorously contest it. 
They had the rights from us but even with an extended period of time could not get the production off the ground. The rights reverted back to the BBC."

The Daltenreys' lawyer, Stuart Lockyear, said: "This has caused financial hardship. Fortunately, Nat-West Bank has been very understanding."



# **BBC Takes Hits, Hits The Road**

The BBC, fed up with American partners like A&E and PBS hogging the credit for such noted BBC productions as *Pride & Prejudice* and *The Singing Detective*, will set up a 24-hour entertainment cable network in the U.S.

Sources say the British Broadcasting Corporation plans to push its brand aggressively — the tentative name of the new U.S. channel is BBC America — and to walk away from its output deal with A&E, which expires in the summer of The BBC is fully aware of the problems it could face when the A&E contract lapses, these sources say, because A&E was willing to put up half or more of the budgets of such lavish productions as the forthcoming six-hour adaptation of *Ivan-hoe*.

It could take years for BBC America to yield the kinds of revenues from advertisers and from cable operators and DBS distributors to make up for the disappearance of generous co-production money from the likes of A&E and PBS.

"But my question is: Will the American consumer buy a 24-hour channel made up of British programming?" asks Nick Davatzes, president and CEO of A&E and the History Channel. The stock in trade of the BBC network will be dramatic series, TV movies, miniseries, sitcoms and arts programming.

Davatzes says he has already begun planning for the demise of the BBC output deal by entering into more co-production arrangements with such British ITV channels as Granada, Meridian and Yorkshire.




