Roddy McDowall, 1928-1998

Reliable character actor became fan favorite as an ape

Not every child acting prodigy becomes an adult star. Roddy McDowall was one who did, starting out before he was ten and going on to enjoy a varied film, stage and television career that lasted 60 years.

McDowall, who died October 3 in Los Angeles aged 70, was 13 when he first came to prominence, in How Green Was My Valley (1941), that lavish Hollywood vision of impoverished mining-village life. The film won an Oscar for Best Picture, and critics hailed the fresh-faced English newcomer with enthusiasm, suggesting he had the potential to become a male Shirley Temple.

He was astute enough to avoid that awful fate. Starring alongside a variety of winsome creatures - horses, dogs, the young Elizabeth Taylor - he made engaging appearances in a string of 1940's hit films, and he was always to say that he had loved every minute of his brilliant early career. But as he grew a little older, he quickly tired of being typecast by directors who insisted on seeing him still as an English adolescent. In the early 1950s he left Hollywood for New York in a deliberate attempt to perfect his craft.

throwing himself into a vast range of stage and television roles.

He emerged as a versatile and dedicated character actor,

who could be relied on to create a vivid and thoughtful cameo from even the most unpromising material. If his adult roles were all too rarely of real substance, he was always a lively and welcome presence on screen, and his performance as Galen, the cerebral simian in the Planet of the Apes series of films, brought

him recognition on a par with his childhood fame.

Roderick Andrew Anthony Jude McDowall was born to a Scottish father (an officer in the Merchant Marine) and an Irish mother in Herne Hill, South London, where he went to St Joseph's Roman Catholic School. Before he was into his teens, his precocious acting talent had found expression in films: he appeared in Murder in the Family (1938), a less than gripping British whodunnit, and he played Ginger in the first and best of the Just William films in 1939.

His burgeoning film career continued after he was evacuated to America in 1940 to escape the Blitz. He and his sister Virginia gave a scene from A Midsummer Night's Dream at a ship's concert during the crossing. The audience response was a foretaste of what was to come. To Hollywood producers McDowall seemed the epitome to the well-scrubbed, well-spoken English schoolboy, and his appealingly innocent air had obvious screen potential.

He moved to Los Angeles, and was soon continuing his

How Now?

'Avengers' lacks spark, turns out weak

Avengers would be close to the top of the list of this summer's films. Take its three stars for example: Uma Thurman as Mrs. Emma Peel raises many a pulse in her short skirts or skin-tight leather outfits. Ralph Fiennes is striking in John Steed's traditional ultra-conservative British suits, bowler hat and Bond-like umbrella of many tricks. And of course, Sean Connery who appears in everything from tweed to full Scottish regalia complete with kilt and feathered cap is most enjoyable to behold. All three play their characters with charm and gusto, which is amazing considering the generally weak dialogue.

Then there's the special effects - see London get pummeled by a regalia of meteorological disasters, ecosystems encased in glass bubbles, and an unusual car chase where our heroes are pursued by a swarm of robot bees (yes, robot bees!) in a scene strongly reminiscent of the chase though the Ewok's Forest in Star Wars. The movie's finale also borrows heavily from the same saga, complete with a Death Star-like contraption that must be destroyed and a sword fight on a catwalk.

The main premise, which is not made terribly clear until about half way though the movie, is that Sir August De Winter, played by Sean Connery, has invented a machine that can control the world's weather. He calls a meeting of world leaders (which they all, amazingly, attend) and announces that they must from now on "buy" their weather from him or be destroyed.

Where's Luke and Laura when you need them? In their absence, Steed and Emma take up the search for the location of De Winter's contraption through the most dreadful series of rabbits out of hats and conveniently left behind maps, infiltrate the abysmally un-guarded so-called hide out and... well, I won't give everything away. Use your imagination, it won't take much. Mixed in with this uninspired main story is a pointless and just plain silly subplot involving a hot air balloon chase and a clone. Each scene seemed almost like a capsule unto itself, bearing little relation (or flow) to what came before or after. Some attempt was made to capture the campy atmosphere of the original TV show, but the large budgeted sets and effects for the most part spoiled the intended effect. The lighthearted banter between our heroes also lacked the humor and spark of the original.

All in all, while the eye candy of the effects and the sex appeal of the stars (take special note of the scene where Steed helps Mrs. Peel on with a tight-fitting pair of boots!) is enjoyable, the complete lack of a decent story or good writing to hang all these lovely elements on left me feeling like I'd just eaten a large wad of cotton candy: Many calories consumed, a overly sweet taste in my mouth, but my appetite unsated.

Colin Mochrie: Household Face

Comedian's projects leading to limelight


t must be that Canadian work ethic.

Rick Mercer is starring in two prime time series as well as narrating a documentary show on History Television. Double-Gemini winner Patrick McKenna co-stars on both *Traders* and *The New Red Green Show*. Writer-directoractor Don McKellar was involved with no less than six movies at the recent Toronto International Film Festival.

And then there's Colin Mochrie.

The Vancouver-raised improv comic — a veteran of Toronto's Second City troupe — can be seen in four — count 'em — four TV comedy shows this fall.

"I've been very lucky this year in that all my friends have gotten

into a position where they can hire me," explains the lanky entertainer who really knows how to make use of a lightning mind and a permanent sad-sack mug,

"Before that it was dry spells for long periods of time."

For nearly a decade, Mochrie, 40, has been commuting to England to be a featured player on the original Whose Line Is It Anyway?, a show in which teams of comics must improvise sketches based on ideas tossed out by the studio audience.

Last summer he was invited to Los Angeles to take part in Drew Carey's U.S. version of the show, by fans from New Zealand, who recognize him from the U.K. improv series.

"You're not that guy who's on Whose That Line? You're unbelievable! You're funny as hell!" says a guy in a hockey jacket who wants a snapshot and an

which aired on ABC and CTV and which will return later this season.

If that wasn't enough, this month he stars in two more series on cable's The Comedy Network. Improv Heaven and Hell is a homemade variation on the improv format, while Supertown Challenge is a game-show send-up.

In addition Mochrie does voices on a new animation series, appears in various TV commercials and still performs occasional improv sketches in local theatre. It seems not to have occurred to him to choose from the projects offered him.

"If somebody's asking me, that's all I need, I'm doing it!" he says.

"All I ever wanted from this business is to make a living from it and work in it and have fun. And luckily with every project this year it's been that."

Which has made Mochrie one of those well-known faces that is not yet attached to a household name.

During an interview over lunch at Wayne Gretzky's downtown restaurant, at the very moment Mochrie is explaining the virtues of near-celebrity he is interrupted autograph.

"Well thank you very much," Mochrie replies, vigorously denying in an aside to his interviewer that this was arranged.

"What's your name again?" the man asks. Soon other patrons are seeking autographs, prompting management to offer free dessert.

Mochrie has mastered the dangerous but exciting high-wire act that is improv comedy. He says it brings a special kind of rush to go onstage as part of a team of performers with no prepared material.

"If I'm going to die, I'm taking someone with me. If I can use their corpse to get out of this scene intact, I'm going to do it!"

But he swears he actually finds improvisation easier than standup because improv audiences — while quick to smell the blood of failure — come prepared to give the performers a special break.


"They know you're making it up on the spot. Whereas with a comic they know he's been working on it and they ask 'Is this the best he can do?'"

Mochrie says improv is not something you practice or train for and the required faster-thana-speeding-bullet wit is more of a subconscious talent.

"I try to relax as much as I can out there and just play off the other people. And a big part of it is the trust in the other people you're working with."

Mochrie says he was a withdrawn bookworm as a kid who got his first onstage laugh playing an undertaker in a highschool play. He says he is still shv.

"It's the most relaxed I am in life," he adds about doing live improv. "Because I know what I'm doing. Whereas in life I'm just bumbling around, hoping things work."

Mochrie is married to another comic, Deb McGrath (Go Girl). He recalls their lean years in Los Angeles when her show was can-

celled and they had to sell their CD collection to buy diapers for their infant son, now eight.

"We had a lot of laughs because basically it was the only thing we could afford."

Does he think those days could ever return?

"I hope not. Unless something goes horribly wrong."

schooling between film takes. In 1941 he was in the tense propaganda thriller Man Hunt, Fritz Lang's exciting treatment of Geoffrey Household's novel Rogue Male, about a plot to assassinate Hitler. The same year saw his first great success, when he played a crippled boy in How Green Was My Valley, an improbably moving saga of Welsh depri-

ious to shake off the English stereotype, he played all kinds of American roles - Midwesterners, Southerners, Hispanics. He won an Emmy award in the drama Not Without Honour in 1960; his extensive Broadway stage work was recognised the same year with a Tony award as best supporting actor for his role in The Fighting Cock.

He appeared in some 140 films. But it is as a monkey that he will probably be remembered.

vation, produced, with no expense spared, by Darryl F. Zanuck and persuasively directed by John Ford.

The roles that followed were less taxing, but no less successful. He starred in the hugely popular My Friend Flicka (1943), about the adventures of a boy and his pet colt, and in its sequel, Thunderhead, Son of Flicka, two years later. A canine variation on the same theme, Lassie Come Home (1943) saw him cast opposite another Britishborn child prodigy, the then almost unknown Elizabeth Taylor; the two were to remain lifelong friends.

A slightly more grown-up role came when McDowall played Malcolm in Orson Welles's endearingly strange low-budget Macbeth in 1948. But on the whole directors continued to treat him as if he was 11 years old. Aware that "you can't act the same as an adult as you did as a child", he decided to find out for himself what he could do as a grown-up actor.

When he moved to New York in the early 1950s, the city was still the centre of the live television industry. McDowall took to TV work with enthusiasm. Anx-

It was also in 1960 that he resumed his screen career, in no great style, with a role in an unintentionally comic tale of beatnik life, The Subterraneans, based, none too firmly, on a novel by Jack Kerouac. Two years later he was in The Longest Day, a noisy and spectacularly overcrowded account of the Normandy landings; every other male star in Hollywood was in it too, it seemed, and he had little chance to shine. He had to fight his way through the on-screen crowds once again in 1963, when he was reunited with Elizabeth Taylor in the epic Cleopatra; overlong, but oddly entertaining, it was then the most expensive film ever made, and almost bankrupted 20th Century Fox.

McDowall found the fame that had eluded him since adolescence when he took the role of Galen, benign intellectual leader of a society in which apes are the rulers and men their uncivilised slaves. He appeared in four of the five Planet of the Apes films, beginning in 1968, and also starred in the spin-off television series. It was a more demanding role than it might have first appeared. The elaborate makeup took at least 90 uncom-

fortable minutes to apply, and McDowall went to great lengths to ensure the plausibility of his performance, studying chimpanzees in zoos and trying to copy their movements and facial expressions.

McDowell found the Planet of the Apes concept "wildly inventive and imaginative"; a large cult following agreed. The actor's subsequent roles included such popular successes as the Mary Poppins remake Bedknobs and Broomsticks (1971); the Funny Girl sequel Funny Lady (1975); the disaster movie The Poseidon Adventure (1972); and the tongue-in-cheek vampire film Fright Night (1985). In all he appeared in some 140 films. But it is as a monkey that he will probably be remembered.

McDowall's attempts to establish himself as a film director were unsuccessful, but he did enjoy a significant parallel career as a celebrity photographer, using his unrivalled access to fellow stars such as Elizabeth Taylor to take candid shots of them (with their permission) both on set and in their homes. The resulting photo-features appeared in magazines from Life to Playboy, and in a number of books. The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences, of which he had been a board member, intends to rename its photographic archive in memory of McDowall.

Roddy McDowall never married. •






