

Redskins Clinch 15th Division Title In Franchise History

With a 38-24 victory over the Eagles Dec. 26 in Philadelphia, the Washington Redskins clinched their 15th NFC East title in the team's history – and the team's second in four seasons.

Worst to first.

That's exactly what the Washington Redskins accomplished Dec. 26 in Philadelphia by knocking off the second-place Eagles to win their 15th division title in franchise history.

It's an exciting moment for second-year head coach Jay Gruden and his team, which has made tremendous improvements from a 4-12, last-place finish just a season ago to take the division crown in 2015.

In other historic news for the Redskins, the victory over the Eagles was the 600th win in the team's history, as it becomes the fifth franchise in NFL history to reach the plateau, joining the Chicago Bears, Green Bay Packers, New York Giants and Pittsburgh Steelers.

Here's some more news and notes on the Redskins' 2015 NFC East Division title, courtesy of Redskins Public Relations:

- The Redskins have earned their 24th playoff berth in team history.
- The Redskins have completed their second "worst-to-first" one-season turnaround in team history (2012). The Redskins finished last in the NFC East in 2014 with a 4-12 record.
- The Redskins have earned a Week 16 victory to have a playoff berth already in hand prior to Week 16 for the first time since 1999.
- The Redskins have become the only team to win the NFC East twice in the last five seasons.
- Gruden has become the sixth coach in team history to lead the Redskins to a playoff berth within the first two years of his tenure (Ray Flaherty, Dutch Bergman, Dudley DeGroot, George Allen and Joe Gibbs).
- The Redskins have guaranteed a final regular season winning percentage of .500 or better for the first time since 2012.

The Redskins wrapped up their 2015 regular season slate Jan. 3, when they traveled to Dallas to take on the Cowboys. Washington avenged its 19-16 Week 13 loss to Dallas at FedExField on



Monday Night Football by defeating the Cowboys this time around, 34-23, to finish the regular season with a 9-7 record.

Now, the Redskins, who have the No. 4 seed in the NFC, will play in an NFC Wild Card round game Sunday at FedExField against the fifth-seeded Green Bay Packers, who finished 10-6 this season, good enough for second in the NFC North Division.

The Redskins and Packers have met 34 times in their longstanding series history, with the Packers claiming a 19-14-1 advantage in those games.

The Redskins and Packers have met two times in the postseason, with each franchise claiming a win:

1936 NFL Championship Game: Packers 21, Boston Redskins 6

1972 NFC Divisional Playoff Game: Redskins 16, Packers 3

REDSKINS PLAYOFF HISTORY

The Washington Redskins earned their first division title since 2012 with a 38-24 win against the Philadelphia Eagles on the road at Lincoln Financial Field in Week 16. At 9-7, the Redskins are the NFC East champions for the first time since 2012. The championship is the Redskins' 15th division title in team history.

This season will also mark the 24th season in which the franchise has participated in postseason games. The Redskins have captured 5 World Championships featuring 2 NFL Championships and 3 Super Bowl Titles, 5 NFC Championships and 15 NFC East Championships so far in their postseason history.

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Jay Gruden: 'I'm Very Proud Of Kirk'

As the Redskins have hit their stride, so too has quarterback Kirk Cousins in recent weeks, as he has led an offensive onslaught in the second half of the season.

The last play at the end of the first half of the Washington Redskins 38-24 victory over the Philadelphia Eagles Dec. 26, followed by what ensued in the second half, has been indicative of Kirk

Cousins' ability to bounce back in this breakout season of his.

With a chance to toss his third touchdown pass of the first half with six seconds left on the clock, Cousins, who was expected to throw an end zone fade to Pierre Garçon, instead took a knee, ending the half inside the Eagles' 10-yard line.

But like he did Week 7 against the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the Redskins' largest comeback victory in franchise history, and just like he did in throwing four touchdown passes against the New Orleans Saints seven days after a tough outing against the Carolina Panthers, and just like he did by leading the Redskins to a road victory over the Chicago Bears a week after struggling to put points on the board against the Cowboys, Cousins returned in the second half against the Eagles to throw an additional two touchdown passes – and critical ones at that.

"I'm very proud of Kirk," Redskins head coach Jay Gruden said after the game. "He came in here and we had the debacle at the end of the half and a normal guy could have gone in the tank there, but he just came in and kept his composure, just like he has all year. Just like he has done his whole career. He's kept his composure and just kept his nose to the grindstone and just kept battling and competing and doing what he's supposed to do."

Cousins finished the night completing 31 of his 46 pass attempts for 365 yards and four touchdowns to zero interceptions.

Entering the Week 17 game against the Cowboys, in his previous nine games since throwing a pair of sloppy interceptions against the New York Jets in a Week 6 loss, Cousins has thrown 20 touchdowns to just three interceptions, completely swatting away the turnover bug that annoyed him early in his career.

"I've seen him progress from last year to this year, through OTAs, training camp, minicamps and all that stuff just watching him steadily get better and better every day and then to put it on the field," Gruden said. "You know,



when we really thought we had a great chance with him was probably the pre-season game against Baltimore when

he had a really good pre-season game. I think he was 20-for-27 in the first half and led us on a big two-minute drive

there at the end of the half and that's when I thought we really could build this offense around him and he could be successful. He knew that he had the confidence of the coaches and the players around him. I think he is a guy that will get better."

"It's been quite a journey," Cousins said. "It will be quite a journey going forward. You almost expect it in this league the way things work and the way things can change quickly. But I'm very satisfied to see how the tables have turned this year. Now we look forward and say, 'Where can we go from here?' and 'How high can we take it?'"

Getting to where they want to go, at least on offense, will be dictated by Cousins' ability to move the offense.

Since DeSean Jackson returned to the lineup after the Bye Week, that's seemingly been an easier task as the speedy wide receiver stretches defenses, allowing other weapons like Jordan Reed and Pierre Garçon more space to maneuver.

"This is his first year under his belt that he's ever been the starting quarterback," Jackson said. "Last year he came in under the fire. This year, he was able to prepare and he was able to get reps with the first team. He's doing what you've asked of him and what starting quarterbacks in this league do. He's getting the ball where he needs to get it to and at the same time we're able to get big shots down the field with me, Pierre and Jordan Reed. We're just really taking advantage of what the defense is giving us. If they take the deep coverage, that's when you have Jordan Reed making awesome catches underneath him. He has some big runs after the catch too because he's faster than a lot of the guys that are out there guarding him. So I think his addition and his playing are blossoming and he's been doing a great job this year."

Indeed, Reed has been extraordinary this season, especially in recent weeks, as the third-year tight end entered Week 17 with 25 receptions for 333 yards and five touchdowns in his last three games.

A lot of that has to do with the rapport he's built with Cousins.

"I have seen a lot of confidence and growth from him," Reed said. "I think that he is one of the best quarterbacks in this league and he can be one of the best and get us to the Super Bowl."

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Scot McCloughan: 'These Guys Deserve It'

Redskins general manager Scot McCloughan credited the team's coaches and players for their hard work to earn the NFC East Division title this season.

How do you continue to compete – and at a high level, no less – in the National Football League when your roster becomes depleted by injuries?

It all starts with a team's personnel staff, which spends countless hours throughout the week keeping tabs on all possible available free agents who could possibly make an impact in a pinch.

That's been a major theme of the Washington Redskins' 2015 season. When one player has gone down to injury, it seems a veteran has been brought in off the streets and hasn't missed a beat, leading to the team clinching the NFC East Division title Dec. 26 after defeating the Philadelphia Eagles 38-24 at Lincoln Financial Field.

The man leading those personnel decisions, first-year general manager Scot McCloughan, was all smiles early into the next morning as his team celebrated in the Redskins locker room.

"You know what, anytime you can get a win the division, it's huge, but the thing I respect most about it is the way the coaches coach and the players play," McCloughan told Larry Michael and Sonny Jurgensen in the ESPN980 postgame show. "It's not about me. I've got a great personnel staff that's done a lot of work during the season to bring guys in to help us win games, but the coaches did a really good job, and the players fought their tails off. I respect that."

McCloughan might be quick to deflect the praise, but the impact in his first year with the Redskins certainly can't be ignored.

Hired in January to help revive a franchise that had won just seven combined games the previous two seasons, he made his first imprint during the free agency period, bringing in proven winners and leaders like Terrance Knighton, Dashon Goldson, Ricky Jean Francois, Chris Culliver and Jeron Johnson.

But McCloughan's bread and butter throughout his career has always been in the NFL Draft, and he came through once again this year, as the team got several players who ended up making an immediate impact on the team: Brandon Scherff (starting right guard), Preston Smith (seven sacks as a rookie, including three Saturday vs the Eagles), Matt Jones (794 total yards rushing and receiving; four touchdowns), Jamison Crowder (54

receptions, 495 yards, one touchdown; primary punt returner) and Kysheon Jarrett (key replacement in the secondary, both at safety and at the nickel cornerback spot).

Then, during the season, the Redskins would fall victim to several potentially-crippling, season-ending injuries at multiple key positions. Free

agent signees like cornerback Will Blackmon, linebacker Mason Foster and running back Pierre Thomas were signed to fill in the holes.

Thomas made a huge impact against the Eagles. Just three weeks after signing with the team, he caught seven passes for 67 yards and ran the ball four times for 22 yards. His

presence on the Redskins' final drive was huge as the team notched a game-sealing touchdown.

"[A] very good football player," McCloughan said of the 31-year-old veteran Thomas. "And the thing about it, everybody talks about height, weight, speed and identifying certain guys like that. I try to identify, and tell my guys, football players. Guys that will help us win games -- especially late in the year, you know, which he did tonight."

McCloughan said the key to finding the right veteran to come in and make an impact is to realize they're not likely "long-term answers," but "they're football players. And if they can help us, they help us."

The Redskins certainly haven't accomplished all their goals for the 2015 season, but their division-clinching victory over the Eagles in a hostile environment was certainly a huge step forward under McCloughan's watch.

"You know what, winning the East is huge, and these guys deserve it," he said. "They work every day – hard. Hard. Coaches work every day— hard. To have success and win the NFC East, it's pretty big, guys."



Preston Smith Churns Out Three Sacks On Emotional Day

Playing with a little extra emotion after learning earlier in the day that his cousin had passed from cancer, rookie linebacker Preston Smith tallied three sacks in a division-clinching victory.

Before taking down Philadelphia Eagles quarterback Sam Bradford on three different occasions Dec. 26 in the Washington Redskins' division-clinching 38-24 victory, rookie linebacker Preston Smith received news that his cousin passed away after a long battle with cancer earlier in the day.

"She lost her battle to cancer, and I believe this game she was looking over me," said Smith, who received a text that she had passed away around 5 a.m. "She died this morning to cancer, and I prayed and I asked her to look over me and be with me and the team today and win this game."

Smith said that the two hadn't seen

in each other much over the years, but when he was selected by the Redskins in the second round of the NFL Draft this year, they were able to meet once again, as she lived in Gainesville, Va.

"Last time I probably saw her I was little, but I met her this year," Smith said. "Once I started talking to her, we became close 'cause, you know, changing from college to NFL it's a lot that comes on your plate and she was understanding. You know, her situation she had a different view of life. So when I was talking to her, I felt like I lost a good friend today."

Smith's cousin didn't have a chance to attend any games at FedExField this season, but she continually cheered him on from home.

"She hadn't gotten a chance because

she [was] always doing chemo and stuff," Smith said. "So she would watch the game at home with my uncle. Her husband always comes when he gets the chance."

While Smith started the season still learning the ropes in the NFL, the second-round pick out of Mississippi State has come on strong in recent weeks, collecting a combined four sacks in Weeks 15 and 16.

His performance against the Eagles was the first time he'd gotten three sacks at any point – high school and college included – during his football career.

"I had two, but this is the first time I got over that hump and got three," Smith said with a smile while wearing an "NFC East Champions" hat.

Smith's season total of seven sacks

entering the team's Week 17 game against the Dallas Cowboys is more than some of his first round classmates in the 2015 NFL Draft.

"You've just got to keep a positive mindset no matter how things may roll," Smith said. "You've got to be ready to play when the ball is in your court. You know, I stayed focused. Guys stayed around me, it's a long season, so week in week out nothing's going your way, and you've just got to keep grinding and working. You know, it's going to be like a game today. I didn't know I was going out there and get three sacks. I just came out there rushed and kept rushing and [sacks] were falling in my lap. I just kept on playing hard and I keep on progressing each week seeing what I need to fix each week and go off that."

Jordan Reed Sets More Records En Route To Title

Redskins tight end Jordan Reed continued his dominance this season, rattling off another record-breaking performance to help the Redskins become NFC East champions.

After most of his teammates had left the locker room, and the celebratory dancing, music and slapping of hands had migrated with them, tight end Jordan Reed stood by his locker shaking his head and smiling, trying to contemplate the reality of the "NFC East Champions" hat on top of his head.

"It feels awesome. It feels amazing," Reed said. "Everything we've been through all year, all the injuries, all the ups and downs all season -- to come out on top it's a great feeling."

Reed knows about the bottom, about missing time to injuries for prolonged periods of time and seeing his team fall short, persistent suffering that has made his breakout 2015 season all the more gratifying, as an individual and as part of a team.

And so, in the Redskins' 38-24 victory over the Eagles at Lincoln Financial Field on Dec. 26, it seemed only acceptable that the culmination of an NFC East Championship would align with another record-breaking performance, the kind fans have grown accustomed to as the season came to its end.

Heading into the game with three touchdowns in his last two games, Reed continued his dynamic stretch of play against an Eagles defense missing some key starters and any sort of game

plan to stop Washington's most potent receiving threat down the stretch. The tight end caught a team-high nine passes for a season-high 129 yards and two touchdowns, both of which he collected in the first quarter.

"Just being on the field, being available," Reed said of why he's had so much success. "I feel like I could have done this years in the past, I just kept getting hurt and things. God blessed me to stay healthy this season and I've been taking advantage of it."

His performance broke the Redskins single-season receiving yardage record of 849, set last by Chris Cooley in 2010. He also tied Cooley for most receptions by a tight end in a single season with 83 and became the third member of the Redskins to post two or more receiving touchdowns in back-to-back contests in a single season.

In the last month or so, this kind of game has become the norm, thanks to an increased rapport between Reed and quarterback Kirk Cousins. As head coach Jay Gruden said last Wednesday, "it's really become a thing of beauty the last few weeks. It's just going to get better and better the more they work together."

The progression continued on the Redskins' second drive of the game, first with a pass down the right seam that Reed collected for 28 yards and then three plays later, with a 22-yard strike over the middle of the field that

Reed collected, then abruptly spinning his way through defenders for the first touchdown of the night.

With the score, Reed became the first member of the Redskins to record 10 receiving touchdowns in a single season since Gary Clark in 1991. It was just the eighth time a member of the Redskins recorded 10 receiving touchdowns in a season in team history, joining Jerry Smith (12 in 1967) as the only Redskins tight ends to accomplish

the feat.

"I've seen a lot of confidence man, a lot of confidence and growth in him," Reed said of Cousins. "I think he's one of the best QB's in the league and he could beat one of the best and get us to a championship. So I trust Kirk a lot. I got a lot of confidence in him. He got a lot of confidence in us."

Three receptions later, Reed added his second touchdown of the day and 11th of the year, thanks to a 12-yard touchdown pass. Reed lined up to the left of Cousins in the slot, and used a stick move against linebacker Mychal Kendricks to get open for the score.

He finished his first quarter with five catches, 87 yards and two touchdowns, and gave the Eagles something to think about for the rest of the evening, opening up opportunities for wide receiver Pierre Garçon and running back Pierre Thomas.

The victory, hard-earned and easily handled, had made all those stats and records worth it. Acting as the backbone of a tight end position that had lost so many to injury this entire season, Reed remained sturdy, but for a moment, looking at a locker room that had found jubilation once again, took a load off.

"It's euphoria right now. It's a great feeling – amazing," Reed said. "We came out on top. We fought together, played a strong game all three phases, and we're the champs."



DeSean Jackson Helps Eliminate Former Team – Again

Just like they did last season, the Redskins, with the help of former Eagles wide receiver DeSean Jackson, eliminated Philadelphia from playoff contention in Week 16.

When the Philadelphia Eagles decided to release DeSean Jackson before last season, they did so believing that it was a smart football decision.

On Dec. 26, for the second time in as many seasons, Jackson, who once again has a gaudy per-catch average and is showing absolutely no signs of slowing down, helped lead the Washington Redskins to a victory over their NFC East counterparts.

Unlike last season's victory, which simply meant the Eagles would be home once the playoffs started, this year's win, a 38-24 final at Lincoln Financial Field, means the Redskins are NFC East champions for the second time in four years.

"We're in the playoffs and we're winning," Jackson said after the game. "Second year in a row for them not to be [in the playoffs], so hopefully we can do something good, you know, carry off with this hot streak we're in right now take it to the playoffs."

While Jackson's numbers didn't necessarily stand out in their Week 16 win – he had four catches for 40 yards – his presence allowed for other Redskins to have big nights.

With the Eagles constantly keeping an eye on him, often moving one of the safeties either over towards his side or



further back than they'd usually line up, tight end Jordan Reed, for example, was able to take advantage of soft coverage with nine catches for 129 yards and two touchdowns.

Pierre Garçon, meanwhile, hauled in seven passes for 80 yards and a touchdown.

And someone like Pierre Thomas, playing in only his third game with the Redskins, was able to catch seven passes for 67 yards out of the backfield.

In total, Redskins quarterback Kirk Cousins threw for 365 yards and four touchdowns to zero interceptions.

It was the third time this season that Cousins, in his first season as a full-time starter, had four touchdowns and no interceptions in a game, and the second time in as many weeks.

"Last year he came in under the fire. This year, he was able to prepare and he was able to get reps with the first team," Jackson said. "He's doing what you've asked of him and what starting quarterbacks in this league do. He's getting the ball where he needs to get it to and at the same time we're able to get big shots down the field with me, Pierre and Jordan Reed. With a victory sealed by early into the next morning, jubilation exuded from the Redskins locker room.

Players exchanged heartfelt hugs, high-fives and congratulations among themselves.

After head coach Jay Gruden's locker room speech, applauding the team but still reminding them a lot more work is ahead of them, players started dancing and cheering.

The moment was months in the making, an extension of the team becoming even tighter following their comeback victory over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in October headlined by Cousins' "You like that" outburst.

"I mean sometimes it takes things like that to grow," Jackson said. "Sometimes you need a spark, sometimes you need a word or whatever and start slogans."

Jackson added that Redskins, currently on a three-game winning streak, have a special vibe to them after so few predicted they'd be NFC East Champions this season.

"I think we're undervalued," Jackson said. "I think everybody is really not giving us the credit we deserve, they're not believing in us. In the locker room, I think we have a lot of guys, we have a lot of veteran guys, that have come from other teams and have had success. A lot of guys have been in the playoffs and are used to winning. The mentality is changing here. I think older guys like Dashon Goldson, Jason Hatcher, guys like that on the mentality on the defensive side, they're building something that's kind of scary. Other teams are definitely going to feel their presence. On the offensive side I can say the same thing. We're building something that is dangerous in the offense. We have a lot of weapons and we do a lot of good things."

Morgan Moses Guts It Out To Win Division Title

Morgan Moses gutted out an incredible performance Dec. 26 in the Redskins' victory, playing 75 snaps on a painful ankle injury that limited him in practices throughout the week.

In the days leading up to the Dec. 26 Washington Redskins-Philadelphia Eagles matchup, it seemed more and more likely that Morgan Moses was going to miss the game as he dealt with a painful ankle injury.

Moses barely took part in practice drills throughout the week, and while Redskins head coach Jay Gruden thought he'd be "good enough to dress," playing in the game was certainly up in the air.

Then gameday came, and in the Redskins' biggest game since Week 17 of the 2012 season, Moses not only suited up, he played -- on a sloppy playing surface no less -- and appeared on all 75 of the offense's snaps, gutting it out for his team so it could win its first division title since 2012.

"I'll tell you what, I was really concerned," Gruden admitted on a conference call with reporters the next day. "You know, Thursday in practice we did some one-on-one drills, offensive line against defensive line, and he looked bad. He looked really bad. He couldn't redirect and he was sore. I was like, 'Morgan, you gonna be alright?' And he said, 'I got you, coach. I'll be alright.' And I was talking to the trainers, 'There's no freaking way he's going to be alright.' But he just kept getting treatment, and we took a look at him in pregame, said he was going to be alright – still was a little concerned – and he just went out there and played great – one of his better games that he's played. So, you know, tough guy, and played his butt off and we're happy for him, and I'm proud of the fact that he went out and battled through a tough injury."

With the NFC East locked up,

Gruden and the coaching staff was faced with how much they would play the starters the next week against the Dallas Cowboys.

The team wanted to continue capitalizing on their hot streak, but they also wanted to make sure the team was as healthy as possible, Moses included.

"We have to dress 46 obviously, and seven guys will be inactive and the injuries will be a major part of that, but the guys that play, they have every intent of trying to win this football game," Gruden said. "It's a big game for us to keep our momentum, but we also have to be smart about the guys that are a little bit [inaudible] and get them well for the playoffs."

Moses has easily been one of the brightest spots for a Redskins season that has quickly turned into something special, as he's been incredibly stout in protection after moving into the starting

lineup in August.

After the team brought in first-round pick Brandon Scherff and said he'd start at right tackle opposite of Trent Williams, it meant Moses was shifted down to second-team duties.

But the move didn't deter him from getting back to where he wanted to be: the starting lineup.

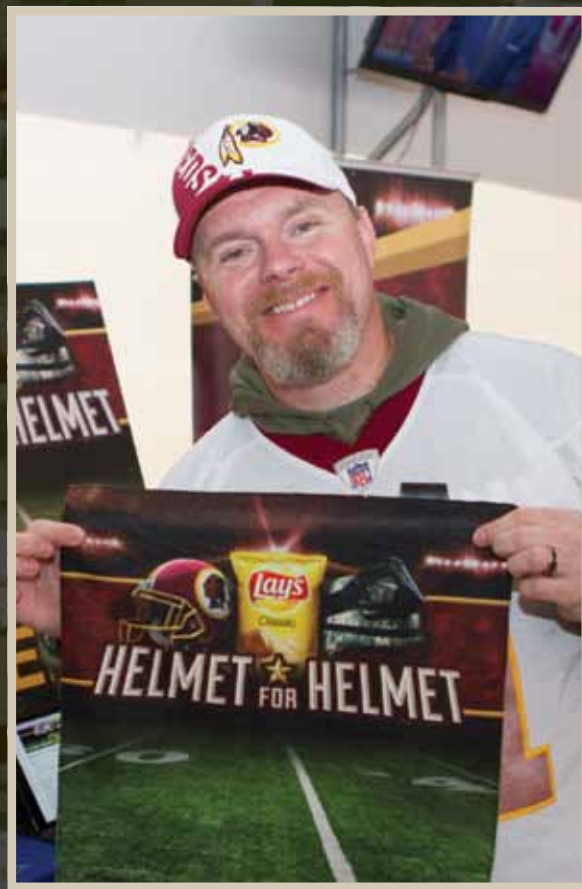
And the starting lineup is where he was as he won a division title against the Eagles, just as he has been all season, with Scherff to his left at right guard.

"I just never blinked, man," Moses said recently. "I knew what I had to do. I had a plan coming off the injury and when you have plans man, you're able to execute things. That's what I really did. I didn't let them drafting a left tackle determine what I wanted to do in the long run. So I just had a plan and I stuck to it."

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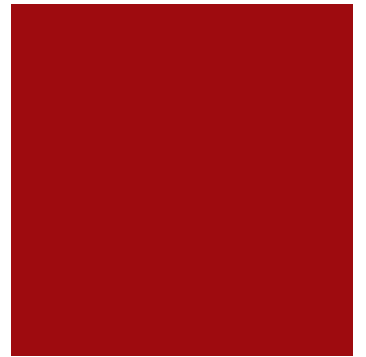
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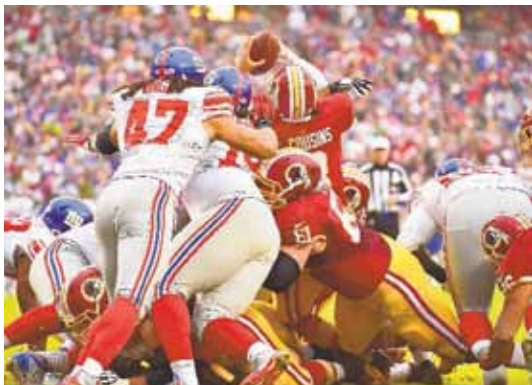
