Transmittal # 271

The purpose of this transmittal is to provide notice of new and revised guidance for Chapter C. Child Protective Services of the VDSS Child and Family Services Manual. Unless otherwise stated, the provisions included in this transmittal are effective upon release.

Section 6: Services has been significantly revised and reorganized. One of the significant changes is the implementation of two tools which will be used to assess family strengths and needs and reassessing risk in a CPS on-going case. These tools are taken from the Structured Decision Making (SDM) model and provide consistency in assessments statewide. These tools build upon the SDM tools currently used in CPS intake, Family Assessments and Investigations. The guidance incorporates best practices related to the development of a service plan and the delivery of services in an on-going case. See Broadcasts 9305 and 9248 regarding the training of the revised course CWS2010: On-Going CPS Services.

Significant changes in Section 6 include:

- Adding new training requirements specific for CPS on-going staff and supervisors.
- Clarifying the roles and responsibilities of the CPS on-going worker.
- Adding specific guidance and procedures on the use of the Family Strengths and Needs Assessment Tool (FSNA) which is used to develop a service plan.
- Adding specific guidance and procedures on the use of the Risk Reassessment Tool which is used to guide case opening decisions.
- Clarifying the basic elements of a service plan: Goals, Objectives, Tasks/Activities and Services.
- Adding clearer guidance on how to document elements of the CPS on-going case in OASIS.
- Removing guidance that is no longer applicable due to implementation of the SDM tools.
- Adding seven (7) new appendixes.

Additional significant changes to the other sections include:

- Clarifying guidance regarding children of Native American, Alaskan Eskimo or Aleut heritage, including how the Indian Child Welfare Act applies to these children.
- Revising Section 1, Appendix A: Indian Child Welfare Act.
- Adding new guidance in Section 4 (Section 4.2.4) regarding the removal of an Indian child.

- Adding new Appendix D in Section 8 regarding court proceedings and an Indian child.
- Adding definition of sex trafficking and requirement for screening children to determine if they are or have been a victim of sex trafficking in Section 4 and in Section 6.
- Adding new Appendix I in Section 6 regarding services for victims of sex trafficking.
- All sections: Updating links for the Code of Virginia and the Virginia Administrative Code (VAC) to reflect new Internet websites.
