Detroit, Mich., Oct. 12.—The Chicago National league baseball team this afternoon, at Bennett park, won the world's championship, beating the Detroit American league team by a score of 2 to 0. It was the fourth successive victory for the Chicago team in as many days. Taking advantage of every slip made by the local players and running the bases cleverly, they scored two runs in the first two innings, while the Detroit team did not score at all. The game was a hard-fought one, the weather was raw and cold, entirely unfit for baseball. The official count of the attendance was 7,370. The temperature was below 30 degrees and a raw wind swept across the field throughout the game. The sun broke through the clouds only once, and then but for a few moments.

Mullin and Brown both pitched well, but the Chicago man received stronger support from his teammates. Brown was also successful, Mullin giving but one base on balls to Mullin's three, one of which developed into a run in the first inning.

D S MOINES-CREIGHTON GAME POSTPONED BY WRECK

Big Crowd at Vinton Park Is Disappointed at Failure of Visitors to Arrive.

Talk of Playing Game Monday, but This Is Improbable.

The Des Moines-Creighton football game scheduled for yesterday failed to materialize. The Des Moines team was delayed by a small wreck and did not arrive in Omaha until late last evening. There is some talk of keeping the game Monday afternoon, but such an arrangement is improbable.

It was a great disappointment to the members of the Creighton squad and the 2,000 spectators who had assembled to see the "go."

Couch Bell's men were all in the pang of condition and were badly prepared to do things to most of the players who faced them. The hard work of the past week has had the desired effect.

Several changes have been made in the varsity lineup. Up to date the team has been overbalanced on the weight position, the left side of the line being much the heavier, with the right end and backfield entirely too light. To remedy this, Coach Bell has shifted the Wagner to tackle and has sent Hansen to Peterson's position at left halfback. Peterson has been placed at left guard and he is expected to show a good form as Wagner's successor.

When Morganthaler is over from his injury he will be played at right tackle. Warner sent back to guard and Martin shifted to the left side of the line. These changes look good and should prove useful when the "varsity" lines up against Drake and St. Louis.

McCormick is still a star at center. Hoodless is doing nice work at end, and Truquardt, Roseboom and McLennan, the ends, are all doing work that is an excellence. In the back field, Blume, Hronck and Magel are at their old positions and are all doing creditable work.

The next scheduled game is October 13 with Highland Park. The two schools are rivals, and as there is bad blood between them, the contest next Saturday will be a warm one. Highland Park has beaten Creighton decisively the last time they met on the gridiron, and Coach Bell is more than anxious for his team to redeem themselves.

In just two weeks Creighton meets St. Louis, the undisputed champion of the middle-west, and one of the best of the nation. In the country, and Coach Bell will do well if he holds them to a close score. Robinson, the St. Louis end, is touted as the best executor of the forward pass in the country, and his team makes heavy gains drilled on handling the pass until it is well high impossible to stop them.

Last year they worked this play of Iowa for seven touchdowns and every team that has played St. Louis has been defeated.

Creighton's practice on the gridiron will endeavor to stop it, but just how well they'll succeed will be seen October 26.
