


Logic of Nonsense Seminar January, 2014 Walt DisneyWorld

Dr. David Randle was a presenter at the conference and the WHALE Center served as the project administrator.




Patras Dewan Pakistan Global Healing


MacDonald Sembereka

Elephant Awareness Training

Small Families Campaign And Contraceptive Planning

- * In 2014 UPEC raised over \$12000 from various sources, to be used for radio advertising
- * UPEC spent \$8,000 to run radio ads for the Small Families Campaign on NOW 97.9 in October and a similar ad on KUDD 107.9 in November.
- * Population Matters, a non-profit organization that learned about us through the Small Families Campaign. They were interested in supporting family planning/population efforts in Utah. They provided \$8181.50.
- * UPEC sed the funds to cover one half of the cost of a program carried out by Planned Parenthood Association of Utah. Heather Stringfellow of Planned Parenthood reported that through this cooperation, they were able to assist 27 women in obtaining the contraceptive of their choice. Specifically, 27 uninsured, low-income, women at our South Jordan health center were able to afford the reduced cost of a ParaGard IUD.




Earth Calling SOS



Visit to EPCOT



The tour was conducted by Dr. Fred Petit, Walt Disney World Agriculture & Water Science Director.









Tourism's Education Responsibility


Dr. David Randle traveled to the Georgia Aquarium in Atlanta to learn about new educational models for the oceans and coastal habitat.

What was most surprising was to find a large Aquarium attracting many tourists had made a conscious choice to not use the words global warming or climate change.



The Disney Cruise line was rated as the best in terms environmental performance by <u>Friends of the Earth</u> last year but much improvement is still needed.

More work needs to be done.











Tour de Turtles

VIOLATORS SUBJECT TO FINES AND IMPRISONMENT

FLORIDA LAW CHAPTER 379.2431(1)

No person may take, possess, disturb, mutilate, destroy, cause to be destroyed, sell, offer for sale, transfer, molest, or harass any marine turtle or its nest or eggs at any time.

Upon conviction, a person may be imprisoned for a period of up to 50 days or fined up to \$500, or both, plus an additional penalty of a \$100 for each sea turtle egg destroyed or taken.

U.S. ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT OF 1973

No person may take, harass, harm, pursue, hunt, shoot, wound, kill, trap, or capture any marine turtle, turtle nest, and/or eggs, or attempt to engage in any such conduct.


Any person who knowingly violates any provision of this act may be assessed a civil penalty as to \$25,000 or a criminal penalty up to \$100,000 and up to one year imprisonment.

- * 3. Promoting professionalism and integrity within the ecotourism industry by providing and maintaining a certification/recognition program for ecotour providers.







The Pine Avenue District includes organic and hydroponic food, sustainable seafood, energy efficient buildings, solar energy, rain water collection and more.




































United Nations



The Consultation communique was forwarded to the UNWTO in Madrid to then be formerly sent on to the U.N. Secretary Generals office.




Key West/Climate Change

The students will visit different destinations and develop best practices for sustainable tourism destinations.























Blue Marble






