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Disclaimer

This document includes information about the 24 teams and their head coaches, as well as a head-to-head review of each side's 18 possible opponents for the final round. These records include all matches played in UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup qualifying competitions and final rounds. Only results during normal playing time and extra time are taken into account.

UEFA EURO 2016 is the first 24-team finals. The UEFA European Championship started life as a four-team knockout competition in 1960, adding four more teams and a group stage in 1980 before adopting the system of four groups of four and knockout stages from the quarter-finals onwards between 1996 and 2012.

For statistical purposes, Germany's results include the Federal Republic of Germany; Russia's includes the Soviet Union while both the Czech Republic and Slovakia take Czechoslovakia's results. Ukraine and Croatia are considered only as independent nations rather than as part of the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia respectively.

Media: A Media Information System (MIS) has been created for the UEFA EURO 2016 final draw and final tournament. The MIS will be a central information hub for accredited media to access event information and exclusive content. This will include live streaming and Video on Demand content, transcripts, news and media releases, operational guidelines, team and stadium profiles, travel information, and much more.

Media representatives will also be able to receive up to the minute information and updates via a customised morning newsletter and email/SMS subscription service, making the MIS a unique platform for media to stay informed on the latest developments of the Final Draw and Tournament.

How the draw will work

18.00CET, 12 December 2015, Paris

Draw procedure

The 23 qualifiers are divided into four pots based on UEFA national coefficients with Spain, as the reigning European champions, assured of a place in Pot 1 having qualified. France are not included in the pots as they are automatically assigned as team A1 so Pot 1 has five teams.

The teams will be drawn into six groups of four teams each (Groups A to F). The draw starts with Pot 1. One ball is drawn and the team is assigned to Group B, position B1; a second ball is drawn and the team is assigned to Group C, position C1; and so on till Group F.

The draw continues with Pot 4. A ball is drawn and the team assigned to Group A. The position of this team within Group A is also determined by draw. A second ball is drawn from Pot 4 and assigned to Group B; again the position within Group B is drawn. The procedure is repeated for all teams in Pot 4.

The draw continues with Pot 3 and concludes with Pot 2. Each time a team is drawn the position within the relevant group is determined by draw. The top two in each plus the four best third-placed sides advance to the knockout phase.

Ruud Gullit

Date of birth: 01/09/62 Nationality: Netherlands

Playing career: HFC Haarlem (1979–82), Feyenoord (1982–85), PSV Eindhoven (1985–87), AC Milan (1987–93), UC Sampdoria (1993–94), AC Milan (1994–95), UC Sampdoria (1994–95), Chelsea FC (1995–98), Netherlands (1981–94)

Coaching career: Chelsea FC (1996–98), Newcastle United FC (1998–99), Feyenoord (2004–05), LA Galaxy (2007–08), FC Terek Grozny (2011)

- Emerged alongside Johan Cruyff in Feyenoord's 1983/84 double-winning team and came to the fore as a total footballer at PSV. Recruited by Milan, together with fellow Dutchman Marco van Basten, in 1987 for a world-record fee, he made a stunning start to life in Serie A and was voted Ballon d'Or winner at the end of that year; with Van Basten injured, he was the inspiration behind the Rossoneri's first Italian title in nine years.
- In 1988 he skippered the Netherlands to victory at the UEFA European Championship in West Germany, scoring a formidable header to put the Oranje 1-0 up in the final against the Soviet Union.
- He would appear in just one FIFA World Cup Italia '90 but was back to his commanding best at EURO '92, where the Netherlands' title defence was derailed by Denmark in a semi-final shoot-out. In all he won 66 caps, scoring 17 goals.
- With Milan, Gullit landed back-to-back European Champion Clubs' Cups, netting twice in the 1989 final against FC Steaua Bucureşti and recovering from a season-long injury to play in the 1990 decider against SL Benfica.
- His eight-year sojourn in Italy closed with a move to England, where he merged the end of his playing days with the start of a coaching career at Chelsea, picking up the FA Cup as player-manager in 1997; he subsequently had short spells in charge of Newcastle, Feyenoord, LA Galaxy and Terek.

Bixente Lizarazu

Date of birth: 09/12/69

Nationality: France

Playing career: FC Girondins de Bordeaux (1988–96), Athletic Club (1996–97), FC Bayern München (1997–2004), Olympique de Marseille (2004), FC Bayern München (2005–06), France (1992–2004)

- Born in the French part of the Basque country, left-back Lizarazu launched his career with Bordeaux. Although he won no trophies with the club, he helped Les Girondins reach the UEFA Cup final in 1996.
- He moved that year to Bilbao to join Athletic but remained in Spain just one season before signing for Bayern the team that had beaten Bordeaux in the UEFA Cup final.
- First capped by France in 1992, he became a pivotal member of the side that got to the semi-finals of EURO '96 before lifting the FIFA World Cup on home soil two years later and adding the European crown at UEFA EURO 2000; he ended a highly successful international career in 2004 with 97 caps (and two goals).
- Despite suffering many injuries during a nine-year stay at Bayern interrupted only by a six-month sojourn at Marseille in autumn 2004 he claimed five Bundesliga titles, five German Cups and four German League Cups.
- In 2001 he also won the UEFA Champions League and European/South American Cup, thus becoming world and European champion at club and international levels at the same time. Retired from playing in 2006 as the most decorated French footballer of all time, later working as a pundit on French television.

EURO Legends

Oliver Bierhoff

Date of birth: 01/05/1968

Position: Forward

Germany were trailing 1-0 to the Czech Republic in the EURO '96 final when Berti Vogts introduced Udinese Calcio striker Bierhoff midway through the second half. Within four minutes he had headed his team level, then five minutes into extra time he struck the first major international golden goal. Germany had a new national hero though for Bierhoff, who had only made his international debut a few months earlier, it was just the start. He went on to star for AC Milan and won his 70th and final cap in the 2002 World Cup final, bowing out with 37 goals. He now has a senior role at the German Football Association (DFB).

Angelos Charisteas Date of birth: 09/02/1980 Position: Forward

Heroes abounded for Greece at UEFA EURO 2004, but no one was more deserving than the scorer of winning headers both in the final against hosts Portugal and in the last-eight defeat of holders France. Charisteas was that man. He also found the net in the group game against Spain, but his contribution to Greece's glorious journey was about more than goals. Willing, adaptable and indefatigable, he looked fresh – although he came to the finals as a German double-winner, his contribution to SV Werder Bremen's success had been peripheral. Greece's second highest all-time scorer, club success has continued to elude the tall striker during spells in the Netherlands, Germany, France and Greece among others.

Vicente Del Bosque Date of birth: 23/12/1950 Position: midfielder

Winner of five league titles and four Spanish Cups with Real Madrid CF, Del Bosque ended his Spain career at the 1980 UEFA European Championship in Italy – his only major tournament as a player. Joined Madrid's coaching staff shortly after hanging up his boots in 1984 and, after many years in youth development, took over as first-team coach in November 1999. Landed seven trophies including two UEFA Champions Leagues and two Spanish titles, leaving in 2003, and succeeded Luis Aragonés as Spain coach in July 2008. Set a global record by winning his opening 13 matches and guided Spain to a first FIFA World Cup in South Africa before successfully defending their continental crown at UEFA EURO 2012.

Antonín Panenka

Date of birth: 02/12/1948
Position: Midfielder

The standout moment of Panenka's long career came in Belgrade on 20 June 1976 when he scored Czechoslovakia'swinning penalty against West Germany in the UEFA European Championship final shoot-out. Displaying nerves of steel, the midfielder audaciously lifted the ball over the diving Sepp Maier into the centre of the goal – a cheeky chip that would forever bear his name. The FC Bohemians Praha playmaker played at the 1980 finals and the 1982 FIFA World Cup, where he scored two more penalties, and also helped SK Rapid Wien to the 1985 European Cup Winners' Cup final as the competition's joint highest scorer.

David Trezeguet

Date of birth: 15/10/1977 Position: Forward

When Trezeguet's thumping shot soared into the roof of Italy's net 13 minutes into extra time during the UEFA EURO 2000 final, the super-sub became a French national hero. 'Trezegol', a penalty-box predator, also scored the vital winner against Iceland in France's last qualifier nine months earlier and struck 34 in 71 international appearances but was never really sure of a starting place. His penalty miss in the 2006 FIFA World Cup final shoot-out enabled Italy to extract revenge. The striker left AS Monaco FC for Juventus after his 2000 heroics and went on to become the club's

most prolific foreign marksman of all time.

Facts & figures

UEFA European Football Championship final tournament: Did you know?

- Spain (1964, 2008, 2012) and Germany (1972, 1980 both as West Germany 1996) are the competition's most successful sides having lifted the trophy three times each. Only France (1984, 2000) have also triumphed more than once.
- Only three teams have ever won the UEFA European Championship on home soil: Spain (1964), Italy (1968) and France (1984).
- In 2012 Spain became the first nation to retain the Henri Delaunay Cup, having also won in 2008. The Soviet Union (1960, 1964) and West Germany (1972, 1976) returned to the final as holders only to lose.
- Eight players have appeared in two victorious finals Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández, Cesc Fàbregas and David Silva all started Spain's triumphs in 2008 and 2012, with Fernando Torres starting in 2008 and coming on four years later and Xabi Alonso coming on in the 2008 final and starting in 2012. Rainer Bonhof twice picked up a winners' medal with West Germany (1972, 1980) but did not play in either tournament.
- Berti Vogts was a winner as a player with West Germany in 1972 and as Germany coach in 1996, making him the only man to triumph in both roles.
- Since 1980, when the final tournament expanded to become an eight-team event, the hosts or co-hosts have only failed to reach the semi-finals or better four times: Italy (1980), Belgium (2000), Austria and Switzerland (2008) and Poland and Ukraine (2012).
- UEFA EURO 2016 will be Germany's 12th successive UEFA European Championship final tournament they last missed out as West Germany in 1968.
- Germany are appearing in the finals for the 12th time, one more than Russia (includes appearances as USSR). This is the tenth tournament for Spain.
- Six teams have qualified for the finals with a perfect record, including England this time round. The others are France (1992 and 2004), the Czech Republic (2000) and Spain and Germany (2012).
- The Netherlands' 6-1 defeat of Yugoslavia in the UEFA EURO 2000 quarter-finals is the biggest win in a final tournament. Three games have finished 5-0, most recently Sweden's 2004 defeat of Bulgaria.
- Three teams have held the UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup at the same time. West Germany won the European title in 1972 and added the world crown two years later, while France claimed the 1998 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000 and Spain triumphed at UEFA EURO 2008 and the 2010 World Cup. Spain's 2012 EURO victory made them the first country to win three major tournaments in a row; West Germany were within a shoot-out of achieving the feat before their 1976 loss to Czechoslovakia.
- For West Germany, Sepp Maier, Franz Beckenbauer, Hans-Georg Schwarzenbeck, Paul Breitner, Uli Hoeness and Gerd Müller played in both those finals, while Fabien Barthez, Marcel Desailly, Bixente Lizarazu, Lilian Thuram, Didier Deschamps, Youri Djorkaeff, Patrick Vieira, Zinédine Zidane and Christophe Dugarry achieved the feat for France.
- Iker Casillas, Sergio Ramos, Carles Puyol, Joan Capdevila, Andrés Iniesta, Xavi Hernández, Cesc Fàbregas, Xabi Alonso and Fernando Torres played in Spain's 2008 EURO final win and the 2010 World Cup success. Casillas, Ramos, Iniesta, Xavi, Fàbregas, Alonso and Torres appeared in all three of Spain's final wins between 2008 and 2012.
- In addition to the 24 players mentioned above, Dino Zoff (Italy 1968, 1982) and Germany's Thomas Hässler and Jürgen Klinsmann (1990, 1996) also featured in two final triumphs.
- In 2012 Spain's Chelsea FC pair Fernando Torres and Juan Mata joined a small group of players to have appeared in European Cup and UEFA European Championship final victories in the same year. Luis Suárez achieved the feat with FC Internazionale Milano and Spain in 1964, while in 1988 PSV Eindhoven quartet Hans van Breucklen, Ronald Koeman, Barry van Aerle and Gerald Vanenburg were all in the victorious Netherlands side.
- Wim Kieft and Nicolas Anelka narrowly missed out on this club. A European Champion Clubs' Cup finalist with PSV in 1988, Kieft was an unused substitute in the Netherlands' European Championship triumph, while Anelka was similarly thwarted with France in 2000 after appearing in Real Madrid CF's UEFA Champions League final. Anelka's Madrid team-mate Christian Karembeu holds the unique position of being an unused substitute in European Cup and European Championship final victories in the same year.
- In 2008 Germany's Michael Ballack, then with Chelsea FC, became the first player to appear in European Cup and EURO final defeats in the same year.

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- Four players have followed European Cup final defeat with EURO victory in the same year: Ignacio Zoco and Amancio Amaro (1964, Real Madrid CF and Spain) and Manny Kaltz and Horst Hrubesch (1980, Hamburger SV and West Germany).
- Lothar Matthäus is the oldest player to have appeared in a UEFA European Championship finals; he was aged 39 years 91 days in Germany's 3-0 loss to Portugal at UEFA EURO 2000.
- The Netherlands' Jetro Willems is the youngest player to have featured; he was 18 years 71 days in the 1-0 defeat by Denmark at the 2012 finals.
- Six players have appeared in four final tournaments: Lothar Matthäus, Peter Schmeichel, Alessandro Del Piero, Edwin van der Sar, Lilian Thuram and Olof Mellberg.
- Austria's Ivica Vastic is the oldest player to have scored, having found the net in a 1-1 draw against Poland at UEFA EURO 2008 aged 38 years and 257 days.
- Johan Vonlanthen was 18 years and 141 days old when scoring in Switzerland's 3-1 defeat by France at UEFA EURO 2004, making him the youngest player to have struck at the finals.
- Russia's Dmitri Kirichenko scored the fastest goal in a UEFA European Championship; his effort against Greece at UEFA EURO 2004 was timed at 67 seconds.
- There have been eight hat-tricks in a final tournament: Dieter Müller (1976), Klaus Allofs (1980), Michel Platini (1984, twice), Marco van Basten (1988), Sérgio Conceição (2000), Patrick Kluivert (2000) and David Villa (2008).



Les Bleus have a happy habit of fulfilling expectations on home soil. They won the 1984 UEFA European Championship, when Michel Platini drove them to victory with a record-breaking final tournament haul of nine goals, and claimed the FIFA World Cup for the one and only time in 1998 when another famous No10, Zinédine Zidane, inspired them to victory with two goals in the final against Brazil (3-0). Also winners at UEFA EURO 2000, and World Cup runners-up to Italy in 2006, France have struggled to make the same impact at recent major tournaments, falling at the group stage in 2008 and 2010 and exiting in the guarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2012 and the 2014 World Cup.

France have been ever present in the EURO finals since missing out in 1988, an early end to the defence of the trophy they had lifted on home turf four years earlier. Their second victory came at UEFA EURO 2000, Roger Lemerre's side becoming only the second team after West Germany (1972, 1974) to hold the world and European titles at the same time.

It was a close-run thing. Zidane's extra-time penalty settled a tense semi-final against Portugal before Sylvain Wiltord saved them from a showpiece loss to Italy with a last-gasp equaliser, setting the scene for David Trezeguet's goldengoal winner. Automatic qualifiers as hosts, France will attempt to join Spain on three EURO titles in 2016, having suffered a 2-0 defeat by La Roja in the UEFA EURO 2012 quarter-finals.

- Signed for Juve in 1994 and won the UEFA Champions League again in 1996, adding three Serie A titles, a Coppa Italia and a European/South American Cup. Left in 1999 for Chelsea, staying one season and lifting the FA Cup, before ending his career with a year in Valencia, watching from the bench as they lost the 2001 UEFA Champions League final to FC Bayern München.
- Skippered France to victory on home soil at the 1998 FIFA World Cup and also at UEFA EURO 2000, retiring that year with 103 caps.
- Started coaching career in 2001 with Monaco, landing the French League Cup in 2003 and reaching the UEFA Champions League final a year later, going down to José Mourinho's FC Porto. Resigned in September 2005 and joined his old club Juventus, then in Serie B, the following June. Stepped down after securing promotion back to Serie A in May 2007.
- Appointed Marseille boss in May 2009, replacing Eric Gerets. Ended OM's 18-year wait for the Ligue 1 championship in his first term and added a maiden League Cup, retaining the latter trophy in the next two campaigns. Succeeded Laurent Blanc after UEFA EURO 2012 and guided France to the 2014 World Cup via the play-offs, triggering a contract extension that ensured he would remain in charge for the 2016 finals on home soil. Took Les Bleus to the last eight in Brazil, losing to eventual winners Germany.

- Sweden ended France's 23-match unbeaten run by defeating them 2-0 in their last group game of UEFA EURO 2012, but it was a hollow victory as Erik Hamrén's side had already been eliminated.
- Prior to that fixture France had been unbeaten in the countries' previous 11 encounters stretching back to 1969, when the teams met competitively for the first time. Les Bleus returned to winning ways when the sides last faced off, in November 2014, defender Raphaël Varane scoring the only goal for Didier Deschamps' men in a Marseille friendly.

After decades of underachievement following a UEFA European Championship triumph on home soil in 1964, Spain suddenly became world football's dominant force. UEFA EURO 2008, which they won with a 1-0 final victory over Germany, was followed by a first FIFA World Cup win two years later, in South Africa, Vicente del Bosque's side becoming the first European nation to lift the trophy outside their own continent.

Further history was made at UEFA EURO 2012 as Spain became the first team to retain the European title after overwhelming Italy 4-0 in Kyiv, although their World Cup defence ended in the group stage two years later. They are back to defend the Henri Delaunay Cup in France after topping their UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying group with 27 points out of a possible 30.

Spain's long wait for silverware ended in Vienna in 2008 as Luis Aragonés's side defeated Germany to win a competition they had taken by storm. Fernando Torres provided the decisive blow and four years later became the first player to score in two EURO finals as Spain, now under Del Bosque, successfully defended their title.

They had become only the fifth team to complete a EURO qualifying campaign with a perfect record and crowned another memorable campaign with a record final win against Italy thanks to goals from David Silva, Jordi Alba, Torres and Juan Mata.

Prior to 2008 Spain had only once even reached the semi-finals – finishing runners-up in 1984 – since claiming their first major prize on home soil in Madrid in 1964. They won that year's final 2-1 against the Soviet Union at the Santiago Bernabéu. Marcelino Martínez headed a memorable winner six minutes from time after Galimzian Khusainov had quickly cancelled out Jesús María Pereda's sixth-minute opener.

- Came up through the ranks at Real Madrid and became an important member of the team as a defensive midfielder during the 1970s, winning five league titles in six seasons and four Spanish Cups.
- Capped 18 times, Del Bosque ended his Spain career at the 1980 UEFA European Championship in Italy his only major tournament as a player. Also appeared for Madrid in the 1981 European Champion Clubs' Cup final against Liverpool FC.
- Joined Madrid's coaching staff shortly after hanging up his boots in 1984 and spent many years in youth development, stepping up in 1994 and 1996 as the first team's interim coach.
- Given the job full time in November 1999, he landed seven trophies including two UEFA Champions League triumphs and two Spanish titles. Left in 2003 and resurfaced briefly in Turkey with Beşiktaş.
- Succeeded Luis Aragonés as Spain coach in July 2008. Set a global record by winning his opening 13 matches and steered the European champions to the 2010 FIFA World Cup with a perfect qualifying record. Went on to guide Spain to a first world title in South Africa with a final victory against the Netherlands and then successfully defended their continental crown at UEFA EURO 2012, although their reign as world champions was ended in the group stage at Brazil 2014, but overcame some early qualifying worries to guide them to UEFA EURO 2016.

- The nations last met in a 1986 FIFA World Cup qualifier in Wrexham, Wales winning 3-0 with a double from lan Rush and a spectacular scissor kick from Mark Hughes, who joined Barcelona the following year.
- That was Wales' first victory in five attempts against Spain. The Roja had won the earlier fixture in that qualifying group by the same 3-0 scoreline at Seville's Estadio Benito Villamarín, Emilio Butragueño among the marksmen.
- Wales' UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying talisman Gareth Bale plays alongside several Spanish internationals at Real Madrid.

A powerhouse of European football, Germany (West Germany from 1945 to 1990) have only once (1968) failed to qualify for the finals of either the UEFA European Championship or a FIFA World Cup that they have entered. They have won the World Cup four times, claiming the global prize in 1954, 1974 and 1990 and 2014, and became champions of Europe in 1972, 1980 and 1996. They have also been runners-up in three European Championships and four World Cups. Although it is almost two decades since their last EURO triumph, they have reached at least the semi-finals of the last two tournaments.

Three-time winners and runners-up in 1976, 1992 and 2008, Germany have won 23 of their 43 finals matches – all are records, though Spain also have three European titles to their name. UEFA EURO 2012 was Germany's 11th successive final tournament – also a UEFA European Championship record. Though in ominously good form in Poland and Ukraine – having won all ten of their qualifiers, scoring an average of 3.4 goals per game – they lost 2-1 to Italy in the semi-finals.

Germany have advanced to the knockout stages in every one of their World Cup appearances but in the UEFA European Championship they have suffered group stage exits three times, finishing third in their section in 1984 and 2004, and bottom in 2000.

26/06/1996: England 1-1 Germany (5-6 pens), EURO '96 semi-finals

Andreas Möller converted the decisive spot kick as Berti Vogts' team eliminated the hosts.

22/06/1980: West Germany 2-1 Belgium, 1980 UEFA European Championship final

Horst Hrubesch's second goal, two minutes from time, earned West Germany a second title.

29/04/1972: England 1-3 West Germany, 1972 UEFA European Championship quarter-finals

This first leg is considered the birth of Germany's strongest side, the so called Wembley XI.

Did you know?

Despite their excellent UEFA European Championship record, Germany failed to win a finals match between the Wembley triumph in 1996 and their victory over Poland in Klagenfurt in 2008. Between those years, they recorded three draws and three defeats, scoring three goals and conceding eight.

- A native of the Black Forest in south-west Germany, Löw spent most of his playing days with local club Freiburg, where he had three spells, before winding down his career in Switzerland.
- Operated as a player-coach in Switzerland before becoming an assistant, and later head coach, back in Germany with Stuttgart. Succeeded Rolf Fringer in 1996 and led the Swabian side to a German Cup win in his first season and the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup final against Chelsea FC in his second.
- Left Stuttgart for Fenerbahçe but struggled to match his early success until he joined Tirol Innsbruck, guiding the team to the 2001/02 Austrian Bundesliga title.
- After nine months with Austria Wien he was summoned by old friend Jürgen Klinsmann to become his assistant with Germany. The pair steered the Nationalmannschaft to a third-place finish on home soil at the 2006 FIFA World Cup.
- Replaced Klinsmann as head coach, taking the side to a runners-up spot at UEFA EURO 2008 and third place at the 2010 World Cup. They also reached the last four of UEFA EURO 2012, before qualifying unbeaten for the 2014 global finals.
- The real glory was to follow in Brazil, Löw leading the team to their fourth world title with a final defeat of Argentina. In 2015 he signed a new contract running until 2018.

- Albania and Germany (including West Germany) are frequent opponents in qualifying competition: they have been drawn together seven times.
- Germany have won 13 of the 14 games, racking up their biggest win in qualifying for the 1982 FIFA World Cup when a Karl-Heinz Rummenigge hat-trick helped the reigning European champions to an 8-0 win in Dortmund.
- Gerd Müller and Ulf Kirsten have also scored hat-tricks against Albania, the former bagging four in a 6-0 win also in Dortmund in the teams' first meeting, in April 1967.
- Albania's only qualifying point against Germany came in the teams' first encounter on Albanian soil a 0-0 draw in 1967 that contributed to their opponents' only ever qualifying failure. Seven of Germany's last eight wins have been by a single-goal margin, the exception being the most recent encounter, in June 2001, when Rudi Völler's side won 2-0 in Tirana.

- Austria's only competitive victory against their neighbours came at the 1978 FIFA World Cup, when striker Hans Krankl scored twice in a famous 3-2 win.
- \bullet Four years later the teams took part in a well-known group match at the 1982 World Cup. Germany won 1-0 a result that enabled both teams to progress to the second phase at the expense of Algeria, who had already completed their programme. The game led to the widespread practice of staging final group matches simultaneously.
- Germany defeated co-hosts Austria 1-0 in the final group game of UEFA EURO 2008, with a goal from Michael Ballack. Four qualifiers between the nations since then have all gone Germany's way, with a goal balance of 13-4.
- Germany head coach Joachim Löw won the Austrian league title with FC Tirol Innsbruck in 2001/02 and also coached Austria Wien.
- A large number of the players who helped Austria qualify for UEFA EURO 2016 play their club football across the border in Germany, including Bayern München star David Alaba and qualifying ever-presents Zlatko Junuzovic (Werder Bremen), Florian Klein and Martin Harnik (both Stuttgart).

- The countries' first official encounter came in a EURO '96 quarter-final. Croatia were reduced to ten men after Igor Štimac's red card, and Germany scored the decisive goal soon afterwards through 1996 Ballon d'Or winner Matthias Sammer.
- Croatia gained revenge two years later at the 1998 FIFA World Cup, unexpectedly winning another quarter-final by a 3-0 margin after Germany defender Christian Wörns had been sent off. Robert Jarni, Goran Vlaović and Davor Šuker scored.
- Bastian Schweinsteiger was dismissed in added time when the teams met in the UEFA EURO 2008 group stage, meaning a player has been dismissed in each of the sides' three competitive contests. By that stage Germany were 2-1 down, having fallen behind to Darijo Srna and Ivica Olić before Lukas Podolski pulled one back.

- Germany beat the Czech Republic twice at EURO '96, 2-0 in the group stage and then 2-1 in the final at Wembley thanks to Oliver Bierhoff's extra-time golden goal. The Wembley win was revenge of a sort after West Germany lost the final of the 1976 UEFA European Championship to Czechoslovakia on penalties in Belgrade.
- The Czechs knocked Germany out of UEFA EURO 2004, Milan Baroš coming off the bench to score the winning goal and give his team a maximum nine points from their three group games.
- The countries both qualified for UEFA EURO 2008 with ease from the same group. Each beat the other away from home, Germany prevailing 2-1 in Prague and the Czech Republic winning 3-0 in Munich, Jaroslav Plašil completing the scoring. The Czechs, who have not played Germany since, were group winners.
- Germany and the Czech Republic have been drawn together in qualifying for the 2018 FIFA World Cup.

- The 1954 FIFA World Cup brought wildly differing fortunes for the two countries. Hungary overwhelmed West Germany 8-3 in a Basel group game but then went on to lose 3-2 in the Berne final, Helmut Rahn scoring both the equaliser and the late winner. It was the Mighty Magyars' only defeat in 50 matches over a seven-year period.
- Those matches in Switzerland remain the only competitive encounters between the two countries.
- While Germany are unbeaten on their last six visits to Budapest, Hungary have won the last two friendlies staged on German soil 1-0 in Hamburg in January 1985 and 2-0 in Kaiserslautern in June 2004.
- Hungary's German coach Bernd Storck spent six seasons in the 1980s as a defender with Borussia Dortmund.

- Germany have never beaten Italy in a competitive match. The nations have met at eight tournaments in each of the last six decades, including the 1982 FIFA World Cup final. Italy beat West Germany 3-1 in Madrid with goals from Paolo Rossi, Marco Tardelli and Alessandro Altobelli.
- Germany faced the Azzurri in the 2006 World Cup semi-final in Dortmund. Late extra-time goals from Fabio Grosso and Alessandro Del Piero took Marcello Lippi's team through.
- An even more dramatic World Cup semi-final took place in Mexico City in 1970, when extra time was also needed before Italy triumphed 4-3. The encounter is widely cited as the greatest World Cup match of all time.

- Their first two EURO finals meetings resulted in draws the opening match of the 1988 tournament, which Germany hosted, and the final group game at EURO '96. In the latter fixture, a missed penalty from Gianfranco Zola effectively eliminated Italy from the competition.
- Germany's winless competitive run against Italy was extended in the semi-finals of UEFA EURO 2012, two Mario Balotelli goals giving the Azzurri a 2-1 victory in Warsaw.

- Poland finally ended their 18-match winless run against Germany when they defeated the world champions 2-0 in Warsaw during the UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying campaign, Arkadiusz Milik and Sebastian Mila getting the goals. The return match in Frankfurt ended 3-1 to Joachim Löw's side, who went on to top the group.
- Two Lukas Podolski goals earned Germany a 2-0 victory against the country of his birth at UEFA EURO 2008. Two years earlier, Oliver Neuville's last-minute winner knocked Poland out of the 2006 FIFA World Cup.
- The teams also met at the first World Cup staged on German soil, in 1974. Again the hosts won 1-0, in a decisive second phase game in Frankfurt, thanks to a late winner from Gerd Müller.
- Poland striker Robert Lewandowski, the UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying competition's leading scorer with a record 13 goals, plays alongside several current and former German internationals at Bayern München. Compatriots Łukasz Piszczek (Borussia Dortmund) and Paweł Olkowski (Köln) are also Bundesliga-based.

- Beaten 9-2 overall by Germany in their two 2014 FIFA World Cup qualifiers, Ireland recovered under Martin O'Neill to get the better of the world champions in UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying. A last-gasp equaliser from defender John O'Shea on his 100th appearance gave Ireland a 1-1 draw in Gelsenkirchen, O'Neill's charges then beating Joachim Löw's side 1-0 in Dublin with a Shane Long strike. Germany nevertheless topped the group while Ireland finished third.

England's recent record in major tournaments could have looked very different had it not been for penalty shoot-outs. Since losing on spot kicks to West Germany in the semi-finals of the 1990 FIFA World Cup in Italy, they have been eliminated by that method from five further tournaments – three UEFA European Championships (1996, 2004 and 2012) and two World Cups (1998, 2006). It means the 1966 World Cup triumph on home soil remains their only final appearance, although Roy Hodgson's team, group stage fallers at the 2014 World Cup, should travel to France in confident mood having qualified for UEFA EURO 2016 with ten wins out of ten.

England are alone among Europe's World Cup-winning nations in failing to capture the Henri Delaunay Cup. Indeed, they are yet to reach a UEFA European Championship final, having come closest in 1996, when they hosted the event, only to be denied by Germany in a semi-final penalty shoot-out defeat at Wembley. They also reached the last four – as world champions – in 1968, but otherwise the competition has brought few happy memories.

In the four eight-team final tournaments from 1980 to 1992, England were unable to reach the knockout phase, failing to qualify altogether for the 1984 edition in France. EURO '96 apart, they have also struggled to make an impression in the 16-team finals, going out at the group stage in 2000 and suffering elimination in qualifying for the 2008 tournament. On the other two occasions, in 2004 and 2012, respective quarter-finals with Portugal and Italy both ended in shoot-out disappointments.

- After he spent most of his playing days in the English non-league system, Hodgson's coaching career spanning eight countries began with Halmstad. He guided the Swedish club to their first-ever Allsvenskan titles in 1976 and 1979; then guided Malmö to top of the table for five years in a row, although the play-off system then used meant they were champions only twice in that time.
- A period at Xamax followed before the first of four forays into international management. Hodgson's Switzerland qualified for the 1994 FIFA World Cup their first in 28 years and then EURO '96 but the coach departed for Inter before the latter tournament.
- After taking the Nerazzurri to the 1997 UEFA Cup final, Hodgson had spells in England, Switzerland, Denmark, Italy, the UAE, Norway and Finland, as well as a short stint back at Inter as technical director.
- He returned to England and relegation-threatened Fulham in 2007/08, helping them to safety in his first term, a clubbest seventh in the Premier League in his second and then the 2010 UEFA Europa League final. The 2-1 extra-time defeat by Club Atlético de Madrid proved his last game with the Cottagers, before he accepted the reins at Liverpool.
- He left Anfield after 31 matches in charge, the shortest reign in Liverpool history, yet within five weeks was at West Brom, whom he steered to a then Premier League high of 11th. He was appointed England manager on 1 May 2012 and took them to the quarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2012 and also reached the 2014 World Cup, where they failed to get out of the group stage, although they made serene progress to UEFA EURO 2016.

- Five months later England were invited by Sweden to take part in the inaugural fixture at the new Friends Arena in Solna. Welbeck scored again but the show was stolen by Zlatan Ibrahimović, who scored all four goals including an outrageous long-range lob as Sweden triumphed 4-2.
- The teams drew their group stage encounters at the 2002 and 2006 FIFA World Cups; on both occasions each team progressed and England were led by Swedish coach Sven Göran Eriksson.
- Tomas Brolin scored a spectacular late winner to enable Sweden to come from behind and defeat England 2-1 in their final group game at EURO '92, the victory sending the host nation through to the semi-finals and eliminating Graham Taylor's side.
- Swedish internationals Martin Olsson, Sebastian Larsson and Ola Toivonen play their club football in England.

Portugal ended a lengthy semi-final jinx for UEFA European Championship host nations when they made it through to the Lisbon showpiece in 2004, but defeat by Greece meant they became the only team in the competition's history to lose a final on home turf. Since then, with Cristiano Ronaldo an increasingly potent attacking force, Portugal have reached two semi-finals – at the 2006 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2012, losing in the latter to Spain on penalties. They have a perfect qualification record for major tournaments since the turn of the millennium, which was extended by a group-topping performance en route to UEFA EURO 2016.

Portugal made their UEFA European Championship finals debut in 1984, and came within six minutes of the Paris showpiece, leading hosts France deep into extra time until Jean-François Domergue and Michel Platini struck to turn the tie. They next qualified for the tournament in 1996 and are one of seven nations to have taken part in the last five EUROs, along with Spain, Germany, Italy, France, Netherlands and the Czech Republic.

Portugal have never failed to advance beyond the group stage, losing semi-finals to eventual winners France in 1984 and 2000, and Spain in 2012. They went one better on home soil at UEFA EURO 2004 before going down 1-0 to Greece, complete outsiders at the start of the tournament, in the Lisbon final.

- After a career change as a technician Santos holds a degree in electrical and telecommunications engineering he returned to football in 1987, taking over at former team Estoril-Praia. Stayed seven years, guiding them to two promotions and the Portuguese top flight.
- Had four seasons with Estrela da Amadora prior to joining Porto in 1998. Led his side to the Liga title in his first term, adding two domestic cups before departing for AEK in 2001. Again made an instant impact, lifting the 2002 Greek Cup. Went to Panathinaikos that summer followed by spells at Sporting, AEK and Benfica.
- He then revived PAOK's fortunes, steering them to runners-up spot in the 2009/10 Super League to earn a place in the UEFA Champions League third qualifying round. Announced his departure in May 2010 and was confirmed as Otto Rehhagel's successor as Greece coach six weeks later, proving an immediate hit as he helped them to UEFA EURO 2012.
- Repeated the feat for the 2014 FIFA World Cup, guiding them to the last 16, before stepping down. He was appointed by Portugal that September after Paulo Bento's departure following a 1-0 defeat by Albania and led them to UEFA EURO 2016 thanks to seven successive victories.

Belgium ended a 12-year absence from major tournaments with an impressive qualification for the 2014 FIFA World Cup, their surge up the FIFA rankings earning them seeded status for the finals draw, where they reached the last eight. The good times continued for Marc Wilmots' star-studded side as they topped their UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying section. In France they will hope to match, or perhaps even better, the achievements of previous Red Devils selections. Highlights include a runners-up spot at EURO '80 and fourth place at the 1986 World Cup.

Belgium are now firmly back among Europe's elite having ended a three-decade wait to qualify for the UEFA European Championship, in which they were regulars during the 1970s and early 1980s. They finished third on home soil in 1972 and eight years later went one step closer to lifting the trophy, losing the Rome final 2-1 to a late West Germany goal.

Since then the Red Devils have only managed two more group stage appearances, in 1984 and in 2000, when they were the tournament co-hosts, but failed to progress on both occasions. UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying came too early for Belgium's new wave, Georges Leekens' side never recovering from defeats in their first two Group A games as they finished third, two points shy of Turkey and a play-off spot. Now, though, they are four years older.

A forward before later moving into midfield, Wilmots helped Mechelen clinch the Belgian title in 1988/89 ahead of a switch to Standard, where he lifted the Belgian Cup in 1993.
- Signed for Schalke after five years with Standard, scoring the winner in the first leg of the 1997 UEFA Cup final against FC Internazionale Milano and then converting the decisive spot kick in the second-leg shoot-out. Wilmots ended his career with Schalke picking up the German Cup in 2002 after a short stint at Bordeaux.
- Notched 28 goals in 70 outings for Belgium, including two at the 1998 FIFA World Cup and three in South Korea/Japan in 2002; he also featured at the 1994 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000.
- Took over as Schalke coach after retiring in 2003 but left the post soon afterwards to pursue a career in politics. Serving as a senator in his native Belgium, he then briefly held the reins at Sint-Truiden from 2004 to 2005.
- Returned to the dugout in 2009 as assistant to Belgium boss Dick Advocaat, and later Georges Leekens, before his own nomination as head coach in May 2012. Steered his country to the 2014 World Cup in his first qualifying campaign, Belgium going on to reach the quarter-finals in Brazil, and then took them to UEFA EURO 2016.

One of those Ukrainians, Igor Belanov, scored a hat-trick and went on to receive that year's Ballon d'Or.



- The nations qualified for UEFA EURO 2016 from the same group, Belgium topping the section but Wales having the edge in the head-to-head encounters. The Welsh won 1-0 in Cardiff with a Gareth Bale goal after a 0-0 draw in Brussels.
- Belgium came out on top in both respects during qualification for the 2014 FIFA World Cup, going through to Brazil as group winners after prevailing 2-0 in Cardiff with defenders Vincent Kompany and Jan Vertonghen on the scoresheet. It was 1-1 in Brussels after Aaron Ramsey equalised late on for the visitors following Kevin De Bruyne's opener.
- Wales defender Ben Davies is a Tottenham Hotspur team-mate of Belgian quartet Vertonghen, Toby Alderweireld, Mousa Dembélé and Nacer Chadli. Joe Allen plays alongside Simon Mignolet, Christian Benteke and Divock Origi at Liverpool.

Europe's joint most successful nation in the FIFA World Cup with four victories, in 1934, 1938, 1982 and 2006, Italy have been crowned champions of Europe on just one occasion, back in 1968 when they lifted the Henri Delaunay Cup after a replayed final against Yugoslavia in Rome.

They have experienced mixed fortunes in the competition since then, failing to qualify in 1984 and 1992 but reaching the final in both 2000 and 2012. The Azzurri won their UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying group with room to spare, remaining undefeated in their ten matches to secure their place at the finals for the sixth time in a row.

Italy's sole UEFA European Championship success came in Rome in 1968 when, under coach Ferruccio Valcareggi and with Dino Zoff in goal, Yugoslavia were beaten 2-0 in a final replay two days after a 1-1 draw. The Azzurri came close to adding a second European title in 2000, Sylvain Wiltord's last-gasp equaliser for France denying them before David Trezeguet ended their dreams with an extra-time golden goal.

There was more heartbreak in 2012, but a 4-0 loss to Spain was hardly close – indeed, that marks the most one-sided EURO final to date. Semi-finalists in 1980 and 1988, Italy have reached every tournament since 1992, when they were edged out by the Commonwealth of Independent States in qualifying.

- A combative and versatile midfielder, Conte also weighed in with his share of goals usually spectacular.
- Made Serie A debut with hometown club Lecce aged 16 in 1985/86 but was not a regular until 1988/89 when his side returned to the top flight after two seasons away. Joined Juventus in November 1991.
- Spent the next 13 seasons at Juve, later describing the famous black-and-white shirt as his "second skin". Won five league titles, the UEFA Champions League in 1995/96 and the UEFA Cup in 1992/93 in addition to triumphs in the UEFA Super Cup, Italian Cup and a European/South American Cup, wearing the captain's armband from 1996. Capped 20 times by Italy, he was part of the squads that finished runners-up at the 1994 FIFA World Cup and UEFA EURO 2000.
- Started coaching career as assistant at Siena in 2005, taking over Serie B side Arezzo the following season. After leading Bari and Siena to the top flight in 2009 and 2011 respectively, he signed a two-year contract with Juventus.
- Wasted no time in revamping the squad and enjoyed a debut season to remember as the Bianconeri claimed the Scudetto without losing a single game, suffering their sole defeat of the season against SSC Napoli in the Coppa Italia final. Led Juventus to a second successive title in 2013 and made it three in a row the following year, before stepping down in July 2014. Appointed Italy coach on a two-year deal a month later, he guided the Azzurri undefeated to UEFA EURO 2016.

- The countries met for the first time since 2008 in November 2015, Belgium coming from behind to defeat Italy 3-1 in a Brussels friendly. Jan Vertonghen, Kevin De Bruyne and Michy Batshuayi scored for the hosts in reply to Antonio Candreva's early strike.
- That was only the fourth victory for Belgium over the Azzurri in 21 meetings, their sole competitive triumph coming in the quarter-finals of the 1972 UEFA European Championship. They won 2-1 in Brussels after a goalless draw in Milan to eliminate the holders.
- The nations have met twice at the EURO final tournament, a goalless draw in Turin in 1980 enabling Belgium to reach the final at the hosts' expense. - Paired in 2014 FIFA World Cup qualifying, Italy reached Brazil at the Czech Republic's expense. The teams drew 0-0 in Prague; three months later, Italy came from behind to win 2-1 in Turin with two goals in four second-half minutes from Giorgio Chiellini and a Mario Balotelli penalty.
- Pavel Nedvěd, a legendary footballer in both countries, scored his first international goal in the Czech Republic's 2-1 victory over Italy at EURO '96.

- The Azzurri also got the better of England in the opening group game of the 2014 FIFA World Cup, winning 2-1 in Manaus. Neither team, however, managed to qualify for the knockout phase.

- The two nations contested the 2006 FIFA World Cup final, Italy taking the title for the fourth time after a shoot-out in which they converted all five of their spot kicks. The only player to miss was David Trezeguet, whose golden goal had defeated Italy in extra time of the UEFA EURO 2000 final.
- The World Cup final in Berlin featured an extra-time red card for Zinédine Zidane in his last ever game. He had been in the France team that overcame Italy on penalties in the 1998 World Cup quarter-final at the Stade de France.
- Having qualified for UEFA EURO 2008 from the same section, Italy beat France 2-0 in the group stage at the finals. Andrea Pirlo gave the Azzurri the lead from the spot after Éric Abidal was sent off, with Daniele De Rossi adding a second after the break.
- France edged Italy 2-1 in a Parma friendly in the sides' most recent meeting, in November 2012. Bafétimbi Gomis scored the winner after Mathieu Valbuena had swiftly equalised Stephan El Shaarawy's opener.

- Germany have never beaten Italy in a competitive match. The nations have met at eight tournaments in each of the last six decades, including the 1982 FIFA World Cup final. Italy beat West Germany 3-1 in Madrid with goals from Paolo Rossi, Marco Tardelli and Alessandro Altobelli.
- Germany faced the Azzurri in the 2006 World Cup semi-final in Dortmund. Late extra-time goals from Fabio Grosso and Alessandro Del Piero took Marcello Lippi's team through.
- An even more dramatic World Cup semi-final took place in Mexico City in 1970, when extra time was also needed before Italy triumphed 4-3. The encounter is widely cited as the greatest World Cup match of all time.
- Their first two EURO finals meetings resulted in draws the opening match of the 1988 tournament, which Germany hosted, and the final group game at EURO '96. In the latter fixture, a missed penalty from Gianfranco Zola effectively eliminated Italy from the competition.
- Germany's winless competitive run against Italy was extended in the semi-finals of UEFA EURO 2012, two Mario Balotelli goals giving the Azzurri a 2-1 victory in Warsaw.

- Northern Ireland have failed to score in their past five encounters with Italy, which include four away defeats and a goalless draw in Belfast.
- That draw came in the UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying campaign, but it proved an insignificant stumbling block for Cesare Prandelli's side. The Azzurri won the group by ten points, signing off with a 3-0 win against Nigel Worthington's team in Pescara, where Antonio Cassano scored twice.
- Northern Ireland's only victory over Italy, 2-1 at Windsor Park in January 1958, was a crucial one as it took the team through to that year's FIFA World Cup in Sweden, eliminating their opponents. That remains the only time in 19 attempts that Italy have failed to qualify for the World Cup.

- The teams met at UEFA EURO 2012 in Poznan their first UEFA European Championship final tournament encounter Cesare Prandelli's Italy overcoming Giovanni Trapattoni's Republic of Ireland 2-0 thanks to goals from Antonio Cassano and Mario Balotelli.

- Italy and Romania drew 1-1 at UEFA EURO 2008, Christian Panucci equalising Adrian Mutu's opener within a minute and Gianluigi Buffon then keeping his team in the tournament by saving a late Mutu penalty.
- Italy had won the four meetings prior to that Zurich encounter without conceding a goal, the sequence beginning with a 2-0 victory in Brussels in the quarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2000. Francesco Totti and Filippo Inzaghi scored, while Gheorghe Hagi was sent off on his 124th and last appearance for Romania. - Spain beat Italy 4-0 in the final of UEFA EURO 2012 in Kyiv to become the first team to retain the trophy. The nations had also met in the group stage, drawing 1-1 in Gdansk. There was another draw, 0-0, in the 2013 FIFA Confederations Cup semi-finals in Brazil; Spain won 7-6 on penalties.
- Cesc Fàbregas converted the winning kick as Spain beat Italy 4-2 on penalties in the UEFA EURO 2008 quarterfinals after a 0-0 draw. That was their first competitive win against the Azzurri since the final of the 1920 Olympic Games football tournament.
- · Italy have twice beaten Spain in FIFA World Cup quarter-finals, Giuseppe Meazza sealing a replay triumph in

- 1934. Sixty years later, Roberto Baggio's 88th-minute goal earned a 2-1 win in Boston.
- The most recent meeting, a Madrid friendly in March 2014, was won 1-0 by Spain with a 63rd-minute strike from Pedro Rodríguez. The nations are set to meet again in qualifying for the 2018 World Cup.

- Erik Hamrén's first match as Sweden coach came against Italy in Cesena in November 2009, when defender Giorgio Chiellini scored the only goal in a friendly victory for the Azzurri. That was the teams' last meeting.
- Italy ended Sweden's UEFA EURO 2000 ambitions with a 2-1 group stage win but the Blågult gained a measure of revenge four years later in Portugal when a 1-1 draw, courtesy of Zlatan Ibrahimović's impudent equaliser, helped to eliminate the Azzurri.

- The last four matches between Italy and Wales were all in UEFA European Championship qualifiers, the Azzurri progressing to the 2000 and 2004 finals with the help of 4-0 home wins in both campaigns.

Since the break-up of the Soviet Union – the inaugural winners of the UEFA European Championship, in 1960, and runners-up in 1964, 1972 and 1988 – Russia have been regular qualifiers for the four-yearly continental gathering, but only once have they made it through the group stage. That was in 2008, when Dutchman Guus Hiddink's attractive side reached the semi-finals. In post-Soviet days they qualified for the FIFA World Cups of 1994 and 2002, and again for Brazil 2014. UEFA EURO 2016 qualification was achieved as Group G runners-up after new coach Leonid Slutski, a mid-campaign replacement for Fabio Capello, oversaw wins in each of the team's last four matches.

As part of the Soviet Union, Russia helped win the inaugural competition in 1960. A side containing FC Dinamo Moskva goalkeeper Lev Yashin and FC Spartak Moskva's Igor Netto beat Yugoslavia 2-1 in the final; striker Viktor Ponedelnik scored the extra-time winner. The USSR were runners-up to Spain in 1964, lost the 1972 final to West Germany and suffered more showpiece woe in 1988 as a Ukrainian-accented team went down 2-0 to the Netherlands.

Since playing under the banner of the CIS in 1992, Russia have struggled to repeat past glories. They earned one win in nine finals games in 1992, 1996 and 2004 and failed to qualify in 2000, before a welcome return to form in Austria and Switzerland where they reached the semi-finals. UEFA EURO 2012 brought another group stage exit, despite opening with a 4-1 defeat of the Czech Republic and a 1-1 draw with co-hosts Poland. Needing just another draw, they lost 1-0 to Greece.

- Started playing career as a goalkeeper with Volgograd regional team Zvezda Gorodishche, but suffered a severe injury after falling from a tree and was forced to hang up his gloves after just 13 matches.
- Began coaching career in youth football at Olimpia Volgograd. From 2002 to 2004 he worked at Uralan Elista where he was promoted to head coach following relegation from top flight. Took the reins at Moskva reserves in 2004 and replaced Valeri Petrakov as the club's head coach the following summer.
- Under Slutski, Moskva finished fifth in 2005 and sixth in 2006 before attaining a record-high fourth position in 2007. After a spell at Krylya Sovetov, guiding them into Europe, he took over at CSKA in October 2009, replacing Juande Ramos. That December he led CSKA to the UEFA Champions League knockout stages for the first time before quarter-final elimination by FC Internazionale Milano.
- Lifted first trophy in May 2011 with CSKA's Russian Cup triumph and went on to further success. CSKA returned to the UEFA Champions League knockout rounds in 2011/12, losing in the last 16 to Real Madrid CF, but 2012/13 brought their first league title since 2006 and a shoot-out defeat of FC Anji Makhachkala on penalties in the Russian Cup final.
- Began the next season with another trophy as CSKA lifted the Russian Super Cup and ended it with a second straight league title. In August 2015, he agreed to take charge of the Russia team until the end of UEFA EURO 2016, alongside his CSKA role, following the departure of Fabio Capello. Russia won all four of their remaining games, qualifying for France as Group G runners-up.

- There had been nothing to choose between the teams either in the 2006 FIFA World Cup qualifiers, a 1-1 draw in Moscow followed by a goalless stalemate in Bratislava.
- Aleksandr Kerzhakov scored the only goal, his 25th for Russia, in the most recent encounter a St Petersburg friendly in May 2014.

Switzerland, the country that provides the headquarters for both FIFA and UEFA, made it three successive FIFA World Cup participations when they competed in Brazil in 2014, having topped their qualifying group with seven wins and three draws in their ten matches. Their route to UEFA EURO 2016 was less straightforward, incorporating three defeats, but they eventually finished as comfortable Group E runners-up to England. All three of the country's UEFA European Championship final tournament appearances have resulted in group stage elimination, including the 2008 event they co-hosted with Austria.

For years, Switzerland were subject to a stream of slender defeats, until the appointment of Roy Hodgson signalled a change in fortunes. Having qualified for the 1994 World Cup, their first in 28 years, Hodgson then led the team to EURO '96 after topping a section containing Turkey and Sweden, although Artur Jorge took charge for the final tournament. They kicked off their finals by drawing 1-1 with hosts England, before consecutive defeats against the Netherlands and Scotland ended their campaign.

Switzerland qualified again in 2004 under Jakob 'Köbi' Kuhn but garnered only one point, although Johan Vonlanthen did become the EURO's youngest goalscorer in a 3-1 defeat by France. They co-hosted the tournament with Austria in 2008 but failed to make home advantage count, losing against the Czech Republic and Turkey before overcoming Portugal 2-0. Opening defeats by England and Montenegro, and a campaign that yielded only two away points, undermined their UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying hopes, Switzerland finishing third in Group B.

Moved to Switzerland in 1987, playing for second-tier Chur and then ascending to the top flight with Sion in 1988/89; returned to the second division to represent Martigny, Bellinzona and Locarno.
- Petković hung up his boots in 1999, aged 36, following a season as player-coach at Bellinzona. Then led Malcantone Agno to promotion from the third divison in 2002/03 before becoming the first coach of AC Lugano successors to FC Lugano.
- Rejoined Bellinzona in October 2005, steering them to the 2007/08 Swiss Cup final, where they lost 4-1 to FC Basel 1893, but consolation came two weeks later as victory in a relegation/promotion play-off against FC St Gallen gave Bellinzona a Super League berth.
- Was appointed Young Boys coach in August 2008, guiding them to second-placed finishes in his first two campaigns in charge as well the 2008/09 Swiss Cup final. After short spells in charge of Turkey's Samsunspor and Sion back in Switzerland, was named Lazio coach in June 2012 and won the Coppa Italia in his first term in Italy, also helping the side to seventh position in the final standings.
- Left in January 2014 after being anointed Switzerland coach Ottmar Hitzfeld's successor, taking the reins after the 2014 FIFA World Cup. Promptly guided his charges to UEFA EURO 2016.

The halcyon days of Austrian football are in the distant past, with third place at the 1954 FIFA World Cup standing as a pinnacle of achievement. In all there have been seven World Cup appearances, the last of them at France '98, but just one until now at the UEFA European Championship – as co-hosts in 2008 when they endured group stage elimination after losing to Germany. Their cross-border rivals proved a stumbling back again in qualification for both UEFA EURO 2012 and the 2014 World Cup, but under Swiss coach Marcel Koller the team cruised to France, winning nine of their ten qualifiers and drawing the other.

UEFA EURO 2008 remains Austria's only tilt at the latter stages of the continental competition and it did not last long. In a tournament they co-hosted with Switzerland, Josef Hickersberger's young team paid for inexperience despite some spirited performances. They lost the opening game to Croatia and after picking up a draw against Poland, bowed out after the group stage following a 1-0 defeat by Germany.

Until UEFA EURO 2016 Austria were never quite able to get across the line in qualifying, their 2012 campaign all too familiar when after a bright start they slipped to fourth. They came close, however, ending a point short of an automatic berth for the 1980 finals and twice defeats in the UK - 1-0 by Wales (1976) and 5-3 in Northern Ireland (1996) – ended their interest.

- A former midfielder, Koller spent his entire playing career with Swiss side Grasshoppers, making over 400 league appearances from 1978 to 1997 and winning seven league titles and five Swiss Cups.
- Capped 55 times by Switzerland, he scored three goals for his country and made two appearances at EURO '96, coming off the bench in the 1-1 draw with hosts England and starting the 1-0 loss to Scotland.
- Began coaching career at Wil in 1997 and took over at St Gallen two years later, leading the club to their first Swiss championship since 1903/04 in his maiden season. Returned to Grasshoppers in 2002 and promptly secured the Swiss league crown, but resigned in October 2003 after a disappointing run.
- Appointed by Köln the following month, he was sacked after the Bundesliga team finished the season bottom, yet bounced back at Bochum in 2005, earning promotion to the top tier in his first campaign.
- Dismissed by Bochum in September 2009, Koller was installed as Austria coach on 4 October 2011, replacing Dietmar Constantini. Missed out on a place at the 2014 FIFA World Cup but earned a contract extension until December 2015 and rewarded that faith by overseeing a first successful UEFA European Championship qualifying campaign as Austria reached UEFA EURO 2016.

- Austria's only competitive victory against their neighbours came at the 1978 FIFA World Cup, when striker Hans Krankl scored twice in a famous 3-2 win.
- \bullet Four years later the teams took part in a well-known group match at the 1982 World Cup. Germany won 1-0 a result that enabled both teams to progress to the second phase at the expense of Algeria, who had already completed their programme. The game led to the widespread practice of staging final group matches simultaneously.
- Germany defeated co-hosts Austria 1-0 in the final group game of UEFA EURO 2008, with a goal from Michael Ballack. Four qualifiers between the nations since then have all gone Germany's way, with a goal balance of 13-4.

Since seceding from Yugoslavia in 1991, Croatia have emerged as a force in international football. They qualified in their debut UEFA European Championship and FIFA World Cup campaigns, finishing third at France '98 where Davor Šuker was the six-goal top scorer. Croatia have become final tournament regulars, missing out only twice – in 2000 and 2010 – but have progressed beyond the group stage on just one further occasion, at UEFA EURO 2008. They qualified for the UEFA EURO 2016 finals – their fourth in a row – as runners-up to Italy in Group H.

UEFA EURO 2012 was Croatia's fourth European final tournament in five attempts since the break-up of Yugoslavia, their only failure coming in 2000. Inspired by three-goal Šuker, Miroslav Blažević's 1996 vintage reached the last eight in their maiden finals appearance, and the semi-finals beckoned in 2008 before Turkey's last-gasp equaliser and then defeat in the penalty shoot-out. There was more disappointment four years later as Slaven Bilić's side were narrowly edged out of a tough group by Spain and Italy, the eventual finalists.

Croatia, of course, also contributed players to the Yugoslavia team that twice finished runners-up at the UEFA European Championship. They lost the inaugural showpiece 2-1 in extra time against the Soviet Union in 1960 and went down 2-0 to hosts Italy in a final replay eight years later.

Ukraine supplied several players to Soviet Union sides competing at the FIFA World Cup and UEFA European Championship, notably in the late 1980s when legendary coach Valeriy Lobanovskiy was in charge. Since independence the country has challenged consistently for major tournaments but qualified only twice.

Firstly when Oleh Blokhin led an Andriy Shevchenko-inspired side not just to the 2006 World Cup but onwards to the quarter-finals, and then via the play-offs for UEFA EURO 2016. Ukraine's EURO duck was broken when they cohosted the 2012 finals, but despite Blokhin's return a win against Sweden was followed by defeats by France and England and a group stage exit.

Ukraine was a prolific resource for the Soviet Union team that won the inaugural UEFA European Championship in 1960 and finished runners-up three times: losing to Spain (1964), West Germany (1972) and the Netherlands (1988). Ukraine had never qualified as an independent nation until now, but came within 12 minutes of reaching UEFA EURO 2000. Denied an automatic spot after a last-day draw in Russia, they were heading through on away goals in the playoffs before Miran Pavlin gave Slovenia a 3-2 aggregate win.

They had to wait until 2012 for their first appearance, participating as co-hosts with Poland. Blokhin's side enjoyed a dream finals debut, Shevchenko rolling back the years and raising the roof of Kyiv's NSK Olimpiyskyi with two predatory headers as Ukraine came from behind to beat Sweden 2-1. It was as good as it got as they went down 2-0 against France and 1-0 to England to bow out.

- First moved into coaching in 1979 with Frunzenets Sumy, working in Ukraine, Georgia and Iraq, before taking over at old club Dynamo Kyiv in 1993 and helping them to a Ukrainian league and cup double during his only season in charge.
- Enjoyed a first taste of international management when taking the helm of Guinea, but swiftly returned to the domestic game. Had three separate stints at Metalist Kharkiv between 1996 and 2005, and also took CSKA Kyiv to the Ukrainian Cup final, only to fall to FC Shakhtar Donetsk.
- Spells at Tavriya Simferopol and Russian side Salyut Belgorod followed, before he was called upon by the national federation to take permanent control of Ukraine after Oleh Blokhin stepped down following UEFA EURO 2012. Helped his country to a play-off place in 2014 FIFA World Cup qualifying; despite a 2-0 first-leg success against France, Ukraine fell 3-2 on aggregate to miss out on Brazil, but did overcome Slovenia in the play-offs to make UEFA EURO 2016.

The Czech Republic have only been competing as an independent nation since 1994, yet in that time the country has qualified for every UEFA European Championship, finishing runners-up at EURO '96 – their first major tournament – and reaching the semi-finals of UEFA EURO 2004. In contrast their qualifying record for the FIFA World Cup has been disappointing, reaching only the 2006 tournament in Germany, where they were eliminated at the group stage. The former Czechoslovakia lifted the European title in 1976, defeating West Germany on penalties in the final, and were twice beaten finalists in the World Cup (1934, 1962).

The Czech Republic reached the quarter-finals at UEFA EURO 2012, their fifth EURO final tournament since the 1993 dissolution of Czechoslovakia. They lost the EURO '96 final to Germany, Oliver Bierhoff's golden goal inflicting a 2-1 defeat, and suffered more extra-time disappointment in the last four against Greece eight years later.

En route to UEFA EURO 2000 they became only the second side to negotiate qualifying with a 100% record, only to exit in the group stage, as they would do in 2008. Not so in 1976, when Prague-born Antonín Panenka's memorable spot kick earned Czechoslovakia the European title with a 5-3 shoot-out victory against West Germany following a 2-2 draw in Belgrade. The Czechs came third in their championship defence four years later.

- The defender was part of the Czechoslovakia side that reached the final of the 1982 UEFA European Under-18 Championship and also appeared at the FIFA U-20 World Cup the following year; the Czechs lost in the quarter-finals to a Brazil team including Bebeto and Dunga.
- His club career did not hit the same heights, Vrba making a handful of appearances for Cheb and Baník before finishing his playing days in the lower leagues with home-town side Přerov.
- Returned to Baník as a youth coach and also went back to the U-20 World Cup, taking charge of the Czech Republic in the 2003 edition. Became assistant at Baník and despite a 7-0 loss to SK Slavia Praha when he was in temporary control in May 2003 ended the next season with the league title.
- That summer crossed the border into Slovakia, winning a championship as head coach of Žilina in 2007, by which time he was also working as assistant to Ján Kocián with the Slovak national team.
- Moved on to Plzeň in 2008, collecting the Czech Cup in his second season when he was voted the country's coach of the year and the league in 2011. Led Viktoria into the UEFA Champions League group stage for the first time in 2011/12 and repeated the trick two years later following another title in 2013. In November 2013, he agreed to take the Czech Republic helm at the close of Plzeň's group stage campaign and led the national team to UEFA EURO 2016.

- Germany beat the Czech Republic twice at EURO '96, 2-0 in the group stage and then 2-1 in the final at Wembley thanks to Oliver Bierhoff's extra-time golden goal. The Wembley win was revenge of a sort after West Germany lost the final of the 1976 UEFA European Championship to Czechoslovakia on penalties in Belgrade.
- The Czechs knocked Germany out of UEFA EURO 2004, Milan Baroš coming off the bench to score the winning goal and give his team a maximum nine points from their three group games.
- The countries both qualified for UEFA EURO 2008 with ease from the same group. Each beat the other away from home, Germany prevailing 2-1 in Prague and the Czech Republic winning 3-0 in Munich, Jaroslav Plašil completing the scoring. The Czechs, who have not played Germany since, were group winners.
- Germany and the Czech Republic have been drawn together in qualifying for the 2018 FIFA World Cup.

- Pavel Nedvěd, a legendary footballer in both countries, scored his first international goal in the Czech Republic's 2-1 victory over Italy at EURO '96.
- Nedvěd's last competitive appearance for his country was the 2-0 defeat by Italy that eliminated the Czech Republic from the 2006 World Cup. The Czechs played the second half with ten men following Jan Polák's red card, Marco Materazzi and Filippo Inzaghi getting the goals.

The only FIFA World Cup host nation to be defeated in the final, Sweden have never matched their run of 1958, but did make the last four in the only other tournament they have staged, EURO '92, the first time they had competed on that stage in the continental competition. They took bronze at the 1994 World Cup and although they have failed to qualify for the last two editions of the global finals, despite the elaborate gifts of star striker Zlatan Ibrahimović, they have reached the last five UEFA European Championships.

Sweden reached the semi-finals on home turf in 1992, beating eventual champions Denmark and England after an opening-day draw with France. However, with Stefan Schwarz suspended and Jonas Thern playing through injury, they were overwhelmed by Germany even if a last-minute effort made it 3-2.

It was not until 2000 that they successfully negotiated qualifying to reach the final tournament, yet the Blågult have been ever-presents since. Sweden exited UEFA EURO 2004 unbeaten, losing 5-4 on penalties to the Netherlands in the quarter-finals after a goalless draw, while their last two campaigns ended at the first hurdle, a win and two defeats not enough each time. In 2012 they lost to Ukraine and England despite having led both matches in the second half, and were already out before their last game when Ibrahimović's brilliant acrobatic goal set up a 2-0 win against France.

- Joined Allsvenskan outfit Degerfors in 1994 and moved on a year later to AIK. Guided the Stockholm club to three successive Swedish Cup finals, losing the first, in 1995, and winning the next two. Lifted the cup for a third time in 2000 with his next team Örgryte after two-legged final victory against AIK. Stayed for six seasons before going abroad in January 2004 to coach Danish side AaB.
- Led AaB to the 2007/08 Danish Super League title just the third championship in their history yet announced mid-season he would be leaving at the end of the campaign for Rosenborg.
- Masterminded runaway Tippeligaen title triumph for Rosenborg in his first full season. Replaced long-serving Sweden coach Lars Lagerbäck in November 2009, also remaining with Rosenborg until the onset of UEFA EURO 2012 qualification in September 2010.
- Proved an immediate success in his new role, guiding Sweden to the finals thanks to a defeat of the Netherlands on the last day of qualifying, though they fell in the group stage. Missed out on the 2014 FIFA World Cup in a play-off with Portugal but took his side to UEFA EURO 2016 having overcome Denmark at the same stage.

There had been a Polish presence at seven FIFA World Cups before the country finally qualified for a first UEFA European Championship final tournament, in 2008. As co-hosts for the 2012 event a second appearance quickly followed but, as on their debut in Austria, they failed to win a game and did not progress beyond the group stage. It was a different story in the 1970s and 1980s when, with world-class forwards Grzegorz Lato and Zbigniew Boniek to the fore, Poland reached four successive World Cups, collecting the bronze medals in West Germany in 1974 and again in Spain eight years later. Now the team possess another top-grade striker in Robert Lewandowski, who powered Poland to UEFA EURO 2016 with a record-equalling qualifying competition tally of 13 goals.

Poland qualified for a UEFA European Championship at the 13th time of asking after topping their 2008 qualifying group featuring Portugal, Serbia and Belgium. Leo Beenhakker's side made a limited impression in Austria and Switzerland, managing a goal – from Roger Guerreiro – and a point as they finished bottom of their section.

Poland doubled both tallies as co-hosts at UEFA EURO 2012 but, once again, ended propping up the group, and having claimed second place in their UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying section behind Germany, they will hope for better in France. Before 2008 the closest the Biało-czerwoni had come to qualifying was in 1976 and 1980. In 1976 they missed out on goal difference to a Netherlands side that barred their path again four years later when they recovered from 2-0 down to beat East Germany and pip Poland by a point.

- Having qualified as a coach, he took charge of Krzeszowice in 1996 before returning to Wisła two years later to head their youth set-up. He twice had spells at the senior helm, winning the 2001 Polish League Cup.
- After several adventures in the dugouts of clubs in Poland's top two divisions, culminating in a 2006–07 return to Wisła, Nawałka had a short stint as assistant to national coach Leo Beenhakker, aiding their UEFA EURO 2008 qualification.
- Soon back in club coaching with Katowice, at the start of 2010 Nawałka switched to Górnik and within six months had guided them to promotion.
- With Górnik top of the Polish First Division in October 2013, Nawałka agreed to take the Poland job, beginning the following month. Qualifying for UEFA EURO 2016 started in style with a first win against Germany in 19 meetings and, though Poland finished second behind their opponents, it was still enough for a finals place.

- Poland finally ended their 18-match winless run against Germany when they defeated the world champions 2-0 in Warsaw during the UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying campaign, Arkadiusz Milik and Sebastian Mila getting the goals. The return match in Frankfurt ended 3-1 to Joachim Löw's side, who went on to top the group.
- Two Lukas Podolski goals earned Germany a 2-0 victory against the country of his birth at UEFA EURO 2008. Two years earlier, Oliver Neuville's last-minute winner knocked Poland out of the 2006 FIFA World Cup.
- The teams also met at the first World Cup staged on German soil, in 1974. Again the hosts won 1-0, in a decisive second phase game in Frankfurt, thanks to a late winner from Gerd Müller.
- Poland striker Robert Lewandowski, the UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying competition's leading scorer with a record 13 goals, plays alongside several current and former German internationals at Bayern München. Compatriots Łukasz Piszczek (Borussia Dortmund) and Paweł Olkowski (Köln) are also Bundesliga-based.

One of only four countries to participate in each of the first three FIFA World Cups, Romania saved their finest hour for the 1994 tournament in the United States, where, with playmaker Gheorghe Hagi in peerless form, they reached the quarter-finals, losing to Sweden only on penalties.

They would participate in three of the next four UEFA European Championships, their best effort coming in 2000 when a late penalty enabled them to beat England 3-2 and earn a place in the quarter-finals, where they lost to Italy. Having not reached the World Cup since 1998, their 2014 hopes ended with a play-off defeat by Greece but they recovered to qualify unbeaten for UEFA EURO 2016, with veteran USA '94 boss Anghel Iordănescu returning to the fold in mid-campaign.

Having often encountered tough draws when they have reached the finals, Romania's EURO success has been limited although, having qualified unbeaten, Emeric Ienei guided his team through a group containing Germany, Portugal and England to reach the last eight of UEFA EURO 2000. It was a feat that Victor Piţurcă had a chance of matching eight years later after impressive draws against 2006 World Cup finalists France and Italy – Adrian Mutu scoring but later missing a penalty in the latter match – but beating the Netherlands in the final group game proved a step too far.

A slow start cost them the chance to make it to UEFA EURO 2012, draws against Albania and Belarus preceding a 2-0 loss in France. Răzvan Lucescu was succeeded six games in by Piţurcă, back for a third spell as national coach, and three draws and a victory in the last four matches both earned third spot and provided hope for the future.

- The Romanian Football Federation (FRF) named lordănescu 'Coach of the 20th Century' for his exploits with both Steaua and the national team, to which he was appointed for the third time on 27 October 2014.
- Between the ages of 12 and 32 he was a midfielder with Steaua, making his debut aged 18 in 1968. Before leaving in 1982 he won two titles and four Romanian Cups, scoring 155 goals in 317 league games. He also made 57 appearances for Romania, scoring 21 international goals.
- After two years at OFI Crete, returned to Steaua as assistant and surprisingly played as a 73rd-minute substitute in the 1986 European Champions Clubs' Cup final win against FC Barcelona. Then became Steaua coach, winning the UEFA Super Cup, three league titles and three cups in four seasons as well as reaching the 1989 European Cup final. After two years at Anorthosis, returned to Steaua and won the league again.
- In 1993 became national coach and led Romania to their first FIFA World Cup quarter-final a year later, also taking them to EURO '96 and the 1998 World Cup where they made the last 16, a unique run in the team's history. After 1998 had spells as Greece coach and in the Middle East, leading Al-Hilal to 2000 Asian Club Championship victory, and coached Romania again between 2002 and 2004.
- In 2004 he joined Saudi Arabia's Al-Ittihad, winning the 2005 AFC Champions League, before retiring from football to concentrate on politics, becoming a Romanian senator. However in 2013 he was appointed FRF technical director and ten months later became national coach again.

Eight of the 11 Czechoslovakian players who started the 1976 UEFA European Championship final against West Germany – and triumphed on penalties after a 2-2 draw – hailed from Slovakia, but the country took time to find its feet since it began competing as an independent state. Glory did arrive, however, in the 2010 FIFA World Cup, Vladimír Weiss's team not only topping their qualifying group but also knocking out holders Italy with a momentous 3-2 win at the final tournament in South Africa. Slovakia then broke their UEFA European Championship qualifying duck to reach the 2016 finals in France under coach Ján Kozák thanks largely to seven straight wins at the start of their campaign.

Slovakia's first three attempts to qualify for a UEFA European Championship each ended in a third-placed finish, their steady progress undermined by home defeats against Romania (twice), Portugal, England and Turkey. That trend of losing on their own turf continued in the UEFA EURO 2008 series when the Czech Republic (0-3), Germany (1-4) and Wales (2-5) inflicted heavy reverses.

Weiss's charges were brimming with confidence in UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying, though, when they recorded back-to-back 1-0 victories against the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia and Russia. However, failure to score more than once in each of their ten matches, coupled with a 4-0 defeat at home to Armenia, put the brakes on an ultimately disappointing campaign – but success was to follow four years later, the highlight of their campaign a home win against holders Spain.

Did you know?

Jozef Čapkovič – a member of Czechoslovakia's successful 1976 squad – won the European Cup Winners' Cup in 1969 alongside his twin, Ján, while at ŠK Slovan Bratislava. The brothers, however, never played together for the national side.

- A creative midfielder, Kozák spent much of his playing career with local team Lokomotíva Košice, where he had three spells. He returned for the first time in 1982 at the conclusion of his military service in Prague, where he turned out for Dukla.
- A member of the Czechoslovakia squad that finished third at the 1980 UEFA European Championship, beating Italy 9-8 on penalties in the bronze-medal match, he scored nine goals in 55 international appearances. Kozák also travelled to the 1982 FIFA World Cup in Spain but did not feature due to injury.
- Won the Czechoslovak Cup three times and the 1982 league championship with Dukla before retiring in 1990. Moved into coaching several years later and proved an instant success, steering 1. FC Košice to successive titles (1997, 1998) and into the 1997/98 UEFA Champions League where, as Slovakia's first ever group stage representative, they lost all six games in a section containing Feyenoord, Juventus and Manchester United FC.
- Left Košice in 1998 but came back for further stints in 2005 and 2012. He stood down in summer 2013, succeeding Stanislav Griga and Michal Hipp as coach of Slovakia on a two-year contract, and led the team to UEFA EURO 2016 as Group C runners-up behind holders Spain.
- His son Ján Kozák Jr played in the 2005/06 UEFA Champions League group stage for MFK Petržalka, equalising and then creating the winner in a famous 3-2 comeback victory over FC Porto; grandson Filip Lesniak has been at Tottenham Hotspur FC since 2012.

Once giants of European and world football, finishing runners-up in the FIFA World Cups of 1938 and 1954 and claiming three Olympic titles, Hungary failed to qualify for 14 successive major tournaments after reaching the 1986 World Cup but ended that miserable run by making it through to UEFA EURO 2016 via the play-offs.

The golden age of Ferenc Puskás, József Bozsik, Sándor Kocsis and the rest of the Mighty Magyars, who reigned supreme in the 1950s, is a distant memory; Hungary finished third and fourth respectively in the UEFA European Championships of 1964 and 1972 but have not featured since.

Flórián Albert inspired Hungary as they finished third in 1964 and fourth in 1972. In 1964 they overcame Wales, East Germany and France before suffering a 2-1 extra-time semi-final defeat by Spain. Three days later Hungary prevailed 3-1 in extra time in the third-place play-off with Denmark, Dezső Novák scoring twice. In 1972 they overcame Romania in a quarter-final replay, but a late penalty miss by Sándor Zámbó confirmed defeat against the USSR and this time the third-place play-off ended in a 2-1 reverse to hosts Belgium.

Hungary's next ten qualifying campaigns were unsuccessful, though under Sándor Egervári they finished a creditable third behind the Netherlands and Sweden in their UEFA EURO 2012 section. The highlight came in the home fixture against Sweden when Gergely Rudolf's 90th-minute goal earned a 2-1 victory. It was Hungary's first competitive win against a team above them in the FIFA world rankings this century.

A regular in the Dortmund defence for the next six seasons, he helped the club to victory in the German Cup in his final campaign, 1988/89; ended his playing career with eight goals in 171 Bundesliga appearances.
- Joined forces with leading German coach Jürgen Röber and acted as his assistant at Stuttgart, Hertha, Wolfsburg, Partizan and Dortmund. Moved abroad midway through 2008 to take charge of Kazakh top-flight club Almaty; was also appointed simultaneously as the Kazakhstan U21 coach.
- Named the Kazakhstan senior team's interim coach following the dismissal of Dutchman Arno Pijpers in autumn 2008. His first game in charge was a 5-1 defeat by England at Wembley in a 2010 FIFA World Cup qualifier, but he was subsequently installed as the permanent head coach.
- However, Storck was sacked in October 2010 after presiding over four losses at the start of UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying and resurfaced at Olympiacos' youth team, taking charge for the inaugural UEFA Youth League group stage in 2013/14.
- In July 2015 he took charge of Hungary, having led the national side at the FIFA U-20 World Cup in New Zealand the previous month, and promptly ended their 44-year absence from the UEFA European Championship thanks to a play-off defeat of Norway.

The pinnacle of Turkey's achievement came at the 2002 FIFA World Cup, where Şenol Güneş's side upset the odds to finish third. It was only their second World Cup appearance and they have not been back since. It took Turkey ten attempts to qualify for their first UEFA European Championship final tournament, and after losing all three matches at EURO '96 they reached the quarter-finals at UEFA EURO 2000 under Mustafa Denizli. They went one step further eight years later in Austria/ Switzerland, a dramatic penalty shoot-out win over Croatia putting Fatih Terim's team into the semi-finals, where they lost 3-2 to Germany. After missing out in Poland/Ukraine, they returned to the finals at UEFA EURO 2016 by qualifying as the best third-placed side over the nine preliminary sections.

Having not managed a win in their previous two qualifying campaigns, Turkey eventually reached a first finals at EURO '96, but Terim's men could not muster a point in England. They bettered that in 2000, battling through the group stage before a 2-0 quarter-final loss to Portugal. A play-off defeat by Latvia meant Güneş' Turkey missed UEFA EURO 2004 but with Terim back at the helm they starred at UEFA EURO 2008. Last-gasp victories over Switzerland, the Czech Republic and Croatia took them through to the semi-finals, where they finally met their match in Germany.

Despite making a bright start to a tough Group A in qualifying for UEFA EURO 2012, losses in Germany and, more surprisingly, Azerbaijan put Guus Hiddink's side on the back foot. Turkey recovered to finish second ahead of Belgium but Croatia were too strong in the play-offs, a 3-0 first-leg win in Istanbul proving decisive.

Coaching career: MKE Ankaragücü, Göztepe AŞ, Turkey Under-21, Turkey (three times), Galatasaray AŞ (three

times), ACF Fiorentina, AC Milan

• A central defender, Terim represented Galatasaray for over a decade and played 51 games for Turkey, 32 as captain. Began his coaching career with Ankaragücü and Göztepe, before being named assistant to national team boss Sepp Piontek and put in charge of the U21s in 1990.

- Appointed Turkey coach in 1993, Terim led them to EURO '96. They lost all their matches in England, but just getting to the final tournament, Turkey's first since the 1954 FIFA World Cup, was a major landmark.
- Returned to Galatasaray after the EURO, winning four league titles and the 2000 UEFA Cup. Serie A came calling and Terim took the helm at Fiorentina and Milan before rejoining Galatasaray; however, a run of disappointing results brought about a temporary retirement in 2004.
- Reappointed Turkey coach in 2005, Terim known as 'İmparator' (The Emperor) for his leadership skills could not guide them through a 2006 World Cup play-off against Switzerland. Success followed at UEFA EURO 2008 with Terim steering Turkey to the semi-finals but he resigned following unsuccessful bid to reach the 2010 World Cup.
- Back for a third spell as Galatasaray boss in July 2011, in his first season he inspired Cimbom to their first Süper Lig crown in four years. Repeated the feat in 2013 when also helping Galatasaray to the UEFA Champions League quarter-finals. Named head of the national team for a third time on a part-time basis in August 2013, he parted company with Galatasaray in September to assume the role full time. Was unable to lead Turkey to the 2014 World Cup despite winning three of his four qualifiers in charge, but did take them to UEFA EURO 2016.

- Romania and Turkey have met 25 times but their only UEFA European Championship encounters came in the first round of the inaugural 1960 event. Romania went through to the quarter-finals 3-2 on aggregate after both sides won at home.
- In contrast the most recent competitive encounters, in 2014 FIFA World Cup qualifying, both resulted in away wins. Romania's Gheorghe Grozav scored the only goal in Istanbul before Burak Yılmaz and Mevlüt Erdinc made it 2-0 to Turkey in Bucharest.
- Romania's Gabriel Torje and Bogdan Stancu both play in the Turkish Süper Lig, at Osmanlıspor and Gençlerbirliği respectively.

The Republic of Ireland made their major tournament debut in 1988, memorably beating England and only just failing to pip eventual winners the Netherlands to the last four. Englishman Jack Charlton also steered them to the next two FIFA World Cups, the first of them, in Italy, bringing a place in the quarter-finals. A third World Cup was reached in 2002 but Ireland did not return to the UEFA European Championship until 2012, when Giovanni Trapattoni's side lost all three matches in a tough group.

Ireland qualified for their first major tournament in the 1988 UEFA European Championship, opening their campaign with a famous 1-0 win against England thanks to Ray Houghton's early header. They then held the Soviet Union 1-1 and Charlton's side were only edged out for a semi-final place in West Germany by an 82nd-minute goal for the Netherlands.

Ireland narrowly missed out on the final tournament in 1992 and lost play-offs to the Netherlands and Turkey in 1996 and 2000 respectively. They finished third in their qualifying groups for both 2004 and 2008 but made the 2012 finals; beaten to an automatic place by Russia, they defeated Estonia in the play-offs. They had performed consistently throughout, at one point going eight matches (friendlies included) without conceding, establishing a new national record. Trapattoni's side arrived in Poland and Ukraine 14 games unbeaten, but that was soon forgotten as they lost 3-1 to Croatia, 4-0 to Spain and 2-0 to Italy.

- The highlight of Northern Irish international O'Neill's playing career was winning the 1977/78 English title and 1979 and 1980 European Cups under Brian Clough at Nottingham Forest (though he did not play in the first of those finals). He also appeared at the 1982 FIFA World Cup.
- After injury ended O'Neill's career, he entered management with non-league Grantham, Shepshed and Wycombe, whom he led into the Football League for the first time in 1993 and a further promotion the next year.
- He left Wycombe for Norwich in June 1995 but within six months had gone to Leicester, whom he would guide into the Premier League, winning the 1997 and 2000 League Cups to earn two UEFA Cup campaigns.
- O'Neill was appointed by Celtic in summer 2000 and in five years at the helm landed three league titles and three Scottish Cups, the Scottish League Cup completing a 2000/01 treble. He also led them to the 2003 UEFA Cup final.
- Managed Aston Villa between 2006 and 2010, then Sunderland from 2011 to March 2013. O'Neill was appointed Ireland manager, to be assisted by fellow former Forest player Roy Keane, that November, and led the team to UEFA EURO 2016 via a play-off win against Bosnia and Herzegovina.

A team on the rise, constructed on the foundations of the talented Under-21 squad that qualified for the 2011 UEFA European Championship in Denmark, Iceland made history by reaching the qualifying play-offs for the 2014 FIFA World Cup. Led by former long-serving Sweden head coach Lars Lagerbäck they finished second in their qualifying group, missing out on a place in Brazil after a 2-0 aggregate defeat by Croatia. It was their best ever performance in a major competition, eclipsing their valiant effort to qualify for UEFA EURO 2000 when only a last-day 3-2 defeat in France eliminated them — but even better was to follow as Iceland claimed second place in UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying Group A to reach a major tournament for the first time.

Iceland were slow to make an impression in UEFA European Championship qualifying, failing to record a victory in the 1964 preliminaries. Having not entered in 1968 and 1972 they earned just two wins in their next three campaigns, though the shock 2-1 defeat of East Germany in Reykjavik in 1975 hinted at their potential.

Iceland's recent history reads much better. Ahead of UEFA EURO 2000 they recorded four wins as they amassed 15 points to run France, Ukraine and Russia close. Four years later they were even closer, missing out on the play-offs by a solitary point after winning half their eight fixtures. They finished second bottom of their UEFA EURO 2008 and 2012 qualifying groups.

- A lower-league player, Lagerbäck began his coaching career in 1977 with Kilafors, joining the Swedish Football Association (SvFF) as a youth coach after spells with two other modest club sides Arbrå and Hudiksvall.
- Coached the national Under-21 and B teams until Tommy Söderberg took him on as his assistant with the senior national squad in 1998.
- Söderberg and Lagerbäck managed Sweden in tandem from 2000, reaching UEFA EURO 2000, the 2002 FIFA World Cup and the quarter-finals of UEFA EURO 2004; following Söderberg's departure, Lagerbäck took the troops to the 2006 World Cup and UEFA EURO 2008 single-handed.
- Stepped down after failing to lead Sweden to the 2010 World Cup finals, but ended up travelling to that tournament as coach of Nigeria.
- Appointed Iceland boss in October 2011, he steered the side to the 2014 World Cup play-offs where they lost to Croatia. Agreed a new contract that would mean he hands over the reins to assistant Heimir Hallgrímsson at the end of the UEFA EURO 2016 campaign and promptly guided Iceland to their first ever major tournament.

Wales last participated in a major tournament at the 1958 FIFA World Cup in Sweden, in which a John Charles-inspired team reached the quarter-finals. They did reach the last eight of the 1976 UEFA European Championship but lost a two-legged tie to Yugoslavia and missed out on the four-team final tournament. Since then a plethora of top-class footballers, among them Ian Rush and Ryan Giggs, have been unable to represent the Principality on the biggest stage. However, thanks to the seven goals of Gareth Bale in UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying, the country will at last compete at a major tournament after a 58-year wait.

Yugoslavia were always Wales' bogey team in the UEFA European Championship, denying them a place in the four-team 1976 final tournament and then stopping the Dragons in their tracks in qualifying for the 1984 final tournament. Victory in the final home game would have taken Wales through but Mehmed Baždarević's 81st-minute leveller enabled the visitors to claim the qualifying berth.

Not until UEFA EURO 2004 did Wales come as close again. Facing Russia in the play-offs, hopes soared after a 0-0 draw in Moscow only for a 1-0 home defeat to deny them once more. UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying proved to be a more troubled campaign than most, with promising results on the pitch overshadowed by the death of manager Gary Speed in November 2011.

- A solid defender, Coleman came through the youth ranks at Manchester City but started his career in earnest with home-town team Swansea, where he won Welsh Cups in 1989 and 1991.
- Picked up the first of 32 caps for Wales while at Crystal Palace, where he occasionally served as a makeshift striker, before joining then reigning English champions Blackburn in 1995 for an injury-ravaged two-year stay.
- A broken leg sustained in a car crash in 2001 when Coleman was playing for Fulham effectively ended his playing days, but he was brought on to the club's coaching staff, taking the top job after a successful stint as caretaker in 2003.
- After leaving Fulham in 2007, Coleman headed abroad to manage first Real Sociedad and then Larissa either side of a spell at Coventry.
- Hired as Wales manager in January 2012 following the death of former team-mate Gary Speed, Coleman signed a two-year extension in November 2013, and was rewarded by guiding the side to UEFA EURO 2016 their first major tournament since 1958.

A founder member of UEFA, Albania had never qualified for a major tournament until reaching UEFA EURO 2016, although there was a sign of things to come with improved recent results under experienced coaches like German Hans-Peter Briegel and Dutchman Arie Haan. Albania have not ended bottom of a qualifying group in their last seven campaigns; indeed, but for a poor finish to 2014 FIFA World Cup qualifying, they might have reached the play-offs under Italian Gianni De Biasi, the man who stayed on to steer them to France as Group I runners-up.

Albania's introduction to the UEFA European Championship brought a famous win in a losing cause, a pattern that continued until UEFA EURO 2016 qualification. Having sat out the inaugural tournament, they achieved their first success in the competition against Denmark in the last 16 of the 1964 edition. A side led by perhaps the country's greatest player, Panajot Pano, won 1-0 in Tirana, but the Danes had already done the damage with a 4-0 first-leg victory.

Four years later Albania again displayed their quality, albeit when already eliminated. They held West Germany 0-0 to deny them a finals place for the only time. Since then there has been only sporadic success, a 3-0 victory against Turkey in the run-up to the 1972 tournament and a memorable 3-1 win against Russia in 2003 the highlights. Albania recorded their best performance in UEFA EURO 2008 qualifying, collecting 11 points, but missed out on the finals; four years later, they finished second in their group behind Portugal to earn a first appearance.

- Helped Modena survive first season among the elite before moving to Brescia, where he stayed two years before embarking on a tumultuous spell at Torino in 2005.
- Arrived with Torino picking up the pieces after bankruptcy and exceeded expectations by steering them back to Serie A in his first campaign, only to be replaced by Alberto Zaccheroni three days before the start of the next term. He was reappointed within seven months, leading the Granata to safety.
- Spent 2007/08 at Levante, winning plaudits despite relegation, then returned for a third stint at Torino with five games of the season remaining and saved them from relegation again. Sacked that December, he had a two-month reign at Udinese in 2009/10 before finding more constancy as Albania boss.
- A one-time midfielder with a handful of top-flight playing campaigns under his belt, De Biasi was installed in December 2011 as successor to Josip Kuže. He signed a new deal running until the end of UEFA EURO 2016 qualifying in November 2013, and promptly led the team to the finals for the first time.

Despite some memorable wins, Northern Ireland had never sent a team to the finals of the UEFA European Championship until now, previously coming closest in the 1984 qualifying series when they beat holders West Germany home and away. In contrast there have been three appearances at the FIFA World Cup, the first in 1958 resulting in a quarter-final appearance and the second, in 1982, featuring a famous 1-0 win over hosts Spain. Like all-time top marksman David Healy, the great George Best sadly never graced a major tournament. The current crop, under manager Michael O'Neill, will get that opportunity to shine on the big stage in France.

Northern Ireland first entered the UEFA European Championship ahead of the 1964 finals, beating Poland 4-0 on aggregate before losing out to eventual winners Spain. Billy Bingham's side overcame West Germany 1-0 in Belfast and Hamburg during qualifying for the 1984 edition – only to be pipped to qualification by the Germans on goal difference

Fans also got a run for their money during the UEFA EURO 2008 campaign when Healy's prolific strike rate helped them to memorable home wins against eventual champions Spain (3-2), Sweden (2-1) and Denmark (2-1), but Northern Ireland could only finish third in their pool. Under Nigel Worthington they started UEFA EURO 2012 qualifying brightly, a 1-0 win in Slovenia and a 0-0 draw with eventual group winners Italy raising hopes, but the campaign ended in disappointment. A frustrating 1-1 draw in the Faroe Islands and a 4-1 defeat by Estonia in Tallinn did much of the damage.

- A midfielder and forward during a 20-year playing career, O'Neill spent the bulk of his time in Scotland, most notably with Dundee United and Hibernian. Enjoyed late success when winning a Northern Irish league and League Cup double with Glentoran in 2002/03.
- Made 31 appearances for his country, scoring four goals, two of which came in a memorable 5-3 victory against Austria during EURO '96 qualifying.
- Moved into coaching as assistant manager of Scottish club Cowdenbeath in 2005 before taking the reins at Brechin in March 2006. Was named coach of Shamrock Rovers in the Republic of Ireland in December 2008, guiding the Hoops to a second-place finish in his debut season before clinching their first title since 1994 in 2010.
- Made history as Rovers became the first Irish side to qualify for the group stage of a European competition, beating FK Partizan in the 2011/12 UEFA Europa League play-offs. Also led the Hoops to a second successive domestic championship in 2011.
- Appointed coach of his country in December 2011 and helped Northern Ireland record several notable results in 2014 FIFA World Cup qualifying, including a 1-1 draw in Portugal and a home win against Russia. Even better was to come as O'Neill steered his charges to UEFA EURO 2016, their first UEFA European Championship appearance.

- The construction of the €184m Stade de Bordeaux began at the start of 2013 and was completed 26 months later, the stadium hosting its first game on the last weekend of the 2014/15 Ligue 1 season.
- It has been designed by Swiss firm Herzog & de Meuron, the team behind the Fußball Arena München, and features a 'floating' roof supported by 900 stanchions, designed to resemble local Landes-pine posts.
- Located between a man-made lake and the Garonne river in north Bordeaux, it has replaced the Stade Chaban-Delmas venue for games at the 1938 and 1998 FIFA World Cups as home for the Girondins.

Stade Bollaert-Delelis (Lens) UEFA capacity: 35,000

Tenants: RC Lens

Reopened: August 2015 (original opened in June 1933)

- One of France's most iconic football landmarks, the ground was originally named after the former commercial director of the Lens Mining Company, Félix Bollaert. The suffix Delelis was officially added in September 2012, a few days after the death of André Delelis mayor of the city from 1966 to 1998 and a diehard supporter of the club.
- Built by unemployed miners, the venue originally possessed an oval shape but began to take on a rectangular form when the first of four new stands was unveiled in 1976.
- The stadium underwent renovation work and improvements ahead of both the 1984 UEFA European Championship and 1998 FIFA World Cup, and was also used during the 2007 Rugby World Cup. The rebuilding programme ahead of UEFA EURO 2016 will last until late 2015.

Stade Pierre Mauroy (Lille) UEFA capacity: 50,000 Tenants: LOSC Lille Opened: August 2012

- Located in the suburb of Villeneuve d'Ascq, 6km south-east of Lille city centre, the stadium was constructed by the company behind the Millau Viaduct in Aveyron.
- The arena's retractable roof can be opened or closed in 30 minutes, while half of the pitch can be raised above the other for use in music performances and other sports.
- The capacity is more than double that of LOSC's previous homes, Stade Grimonprez-Jooris and Stadium Lille Métropole.

Stade de Lyon (Lyon) UEFA capacity: 59,000

Tenants: Olympique Lyonnais

Due to open: 9 January 2016, Ligue 1 match v Troyes

- Located in the commune of Decines-Charpieu, 10km east of central Lyon, the stadium will form part of a complex stretched over 50 hectares and featuring a training ground for OL as well as hotels and office buildings.
- · Constructed under the project name Grand Stade OL, the finished venue will consist of three tiers.
- The arena replaces the Stade de Gerland, Lyon's home since 1950 and among seven venues for the 1984 UEFA European Championship, hosting Denmark's semi-final loss on penalties to Spain. The Stade de Gerland was also a venue for the 1998 FIFA World Cup, staging Croatia's 3-0 quarter-final victory against Germany.

Stade Vélodrome (Marseille) UEFA capacity: 67,000

Tenants: Olympique de Marseille

Reopened: October 2014 (original opened June 1937)

- Famously open to the elements in the past, the renovated stadium now features a roof. The estimated €267m makeover was carried out with the team still playing matches there and was completed in September 2014.
- As its name suggests, Stade Vélodrome possessed a cycling track when it first opened in 1937, though the new venue's opening ceremony was capped by a football match between Marseille and Italian side Torino. The stadium

has also hosted athletics, rugby, boxing, tennis, hockey and even motorsports, though its days as an all-purpose arena ended when the cycling track was removed in 1985.

• Stade Vélodrome staged matches at the 1938 and 1998 FIFA World Cups, with its capacity increased to 60,000 for the latter tournament; it also hosted games at the 1960 and 1984 UEFA European Championships.

Stade de Nice (Nice)
UEFA capacity: 35,000
Tenants: OGC Nice
Opened: September 2013

- The ecofriendly Stade de Nice threw open its doors for OGC Nice's 4-0 Ligue 1 win against Valenciennes FC on 22 September 2013. The crowds descended on the stadium over four hours before kick-off, with the four stands Garibaldi, Ray, Ségurane and Sud being officially inaugurated with a spectacular pyrotechnic display.
- Drawing over three times its own energy requirements from more than 4,000 solar panels, and with its own geothermal installation for heating, it uses rain water channelled from the stadium roof into four collection reservoirs for pitch watering.
- The sixth largest football stadium in France also houses the Musée National du Sport (National Sport Museum), which moved to the Côte d'Azur from Paris. More than 45,000 pieces and 400,000 documents, comprising one of the largest collections in the world, are now on show in the venue designed by Jean-Michel Wilmotte.

Parc des Princes (Paris) UEFA capacity: 45,000

Tenants: Paris Saint-Germain

Opened: May 1972

- Situated in the south-west of the French capital, the Parc des Princes owes its name to its location on terrain used as a royal hunting ground in the 18th century. The current stadium is the third to have been built on the site, the first opening its doors in 1897 and the second in 1932.
- The Parc des Princes was the finishing point of the Tour de France from 1903 to 1967; it also boasts a long history as an international rugby venue. It has hosted six European club football finals, including the first ever European Champion Clubs' Cup showpiece in 1956 when Real Madrid beat Reims 4-3; in addition to staging games at the 1938 and 1998 FIFA World Cups, the stadium was the venue for the 1960 and 1984 UEFA European Championships finals.
- The stadium has been renovated for UEFA EURO 2016, the first part of the renovations being completed in summer 2014, with two new rows of seats added closer to the pitch, as well as new substitutes' benches and brand new executive boxes and lounges.

Stade de France (Saint-Denis)

UEFA capacity: 80,000

Tenants: France national team

Opened: January 1998

- Constructed ahead of the 1998 FIFA World Cup, the Stade de France has hosted major events in football, rugby, athletics, motorsport and concerts from artists ranging from André Rieu to AC/DC. U2 held three dates of their 360° Tour at the Stade de France in 2009 and 2010, attracting an aggregate attendance of 283,084.
- The venue features movable seating, which can be retracted to uncover part of the athletics track, while the elliptical roof was designed to protect spectators while leaving the pitch uncovered.
- It has the unique distinction of having hosted World Cup finals for football (France 3-0 Brazil, 1998) and rugby (South Africa 15-6 England, 2007). The arena has staged two UEFA Champions League finals, Real Madrid's 3-0 win against Valencia in 2000 and Barcelona's 2-1 triumph over Arsenal six years later.

Stade Geoffroy Guichard (Saint-Etienne)

UEFA capacity: 42,000 Tenants: AS Saint-Étienne Opened: September 1931

- Known affectionately as Le Chaudron (the Cauldron) due to its reputation for atmosphere, the stadium is named after the founder of the Casino retail chain, under whose auspices AS Saint-Étienne originally came into being. Situated to the north of the city centre, the ground was built on old mine tunnels and next to a steel factory, and in the early days, fumes from the plant's chimneys were known to drift across the pitch.
- The stadium originally incorporated an athletics track, though this was removed in 1956 ahead of rebuilding work that moved supporters closer to the action. The venue staged matches at the 1984 UEFA European Championship,

1998 FIFA World Cup and 2007 Rugby World Cup, undergoing renovation work in the run-up to each tournament.

• Famed in the past for an 'English-style' design due to its four separate stands, the ground has had a facelift that enlarged its capacity to 41,500 while also making the venue more eco-friendly. The work was done with Saint-Étienne in situ and was completed in late 2014.


Stadium de Toulouse (Toulouse)

UEFA capacity: 33,000 Tenants: Toulouse FC

Opened: 1937

- Situated on an island in the heart of Toulouse, the stadium was built specifically for the 1938 FIFA World Cup and was soon labelled 'mini Wembley' because of its resemblance to the iconic London venue.
- The biggest ground in the Midi-Pyrenees region, the stadium underwent considerable renovations in 1949 and 1997, the latter work coming ahead of the 1998 World Cup, when it hosted six matches. Following extensive repair efforts after a nearby chemical plant suffered a major explosion in 2001, further upgrading work took place ahead of UEFA EURO 2016.
- The arena has witnessed many of Toulouse's finest moments, including a UEFA Cup first round victory against Napoli in October 1986, when Diego Maradona fired against a post during the penalty shoot-out.

Social responsibility and sustainability

Social Responsibility and Sustainability

Jacques Lambert, EURO 2016 SAS president: "A coherent policy of social and environmental responsibility is an integral part of the organisation of major sporting events. It is not a luxury, much less a gadget but a civic responsibility and has now become an operational requirement as much as safety, marketing or ticketing sales."

UEFA's social responsibility and sustainability strategy for UEFA EURO 2016 aim to:

- reduce the environmental impact
- integrate a social dimension into the tournament
- · measure the economic impact derived from the organisation of such a big sports event

The strategy also has a very strong focus on ensuring UEFA EURO 2016 leaves a positive legacy of sustainability for the host cities, the stadiums, French football and UEFA.

Capitalising on UEFA EURO 2008 and UEFA EURO 2012 social responsibility initiatives and building on the RESPECT campaign, UEFA and the EURO 2016 SAS have defined eight priorities. In order to ensure a realistic and achievable strategy, concrete and measurable objectives have been set for each priority.

- Respect Access for All to make the UEFA EURO 2016 stadiums fully accessible and therefore inclusive, in collaboration with the Centre for Access to Football in Europe (CAFE).
- Respect Health tobacco-free tournament. To create a smoke-free environment for all ticket holders, staff and suppliers at all UEFA EURO 2016 stadiums past the turnstile, in collaboration with the World Heart Federation and Healthy Stadia.
- Respect Diversity anti-discrimination match monitoring: To monitor matches against racist and discriminatory incidents, and to reduce the number of such incidents, in collaboration with the FARE network (Football Against Racism in Europe).
- **Respect Fan Culture** fan embassies: To offer a support service for football fans by setting up 'fan embassies' in host cities, in collaboration with Football Supporters Europe (FSE).
- Respect Environment public transport and mobility: to minimise the environmental impacts of transport, to ensure efficient mobility to, between and within the host cities for spectators, visitors and residents, and to encourage public transport and walking.

UEFA has worked with Climate Friendly to develop the UEFA EURO 2016 Eco-Calculator (https://enecocalculator.uefa.com/journey). This online tool enable the fans to explore how their journey to the tournament contributes to greenhouse gas emissions and offset their emissions. Moreover, UEFA also measures, reduces and offsets the CO2 emissions associated with its necessary air travel.

- Respect Environment waste management: to optimise waste management by reducing, reusing and recycling ('3R' strategy) and to achieve 50% recycling rate, zero waste to landfill and improved public awareness.
- Respect Environment energy and water: to promote renewable and green energy, water harvesting, and to foster optimisation.
- Respect Environment sourcing of products and services: to promote responsible sourcing of products and services, to help buyers to consider environmental and social issues within the supply chain and to engage suppliers and licensees to follow social responsibility and sustainability guidelines.

The priorities as well as the strategy and measures to implement them are detailed in the 'One Year To Go' report on social responsibility and sustainability.

UEFA will use the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI) guidelines (https://www.globalreporting.org/Pages/default.aspx) for its UEFA EURO 2016 social responsibility and sustainability reporting. The key performance indicators (KPIs) of UEFA EURO 2016 will be shared through a post-event report, which will also analyse all implemented actions, successes and lessons learned.

UEFA and the EURO 2016 SAS will attempt the ISO 2012-1 certification for UEFA EURO 2016 operations. ISO 2012-1 is a framework for implementing sustainability throughout event management operations. It is a way of working to make sure sustainability is taken into account at every step when planning and implementing our event.

Finally, the Sustainability Tips and Tricks Guide (http://www.uefa.org/MultimediaFiles/Download/uefaorg/General/02/26/41/85/2264185_DOWNLOAD.pdf) has been written for all UEFA EURO 2016 stakeholders and details 15 simple ways to play an active part in protecting the environment.

EURO finals: The UEFA European Championship was a four-team event in 1960, 1964, 1968, 1972 and 1976 (when the preliminary round and quarter-finals were considered part of qualifying).

From 1980 it was expanded to an eight-team finals and remained in that format in 1984, 1988 and 1992 until 1996, when the 16-team format was adopted. UEFA EURO 2016 is the first tournament to be played as a 24-team finals.

Records of inactive countries

A number of UEFA associations have been affected by dissolution or splits of member associations. For statistical purposes, the records of these inactive countries have been allocated elsewhere: therefore, all Soviet Union matches are awarded to Russia; all West Germany – but not East Germany – matches are awarded to Germany; all Yugoslavia and Serbia & Montenegro matches are awarded to Serbia; all Czechoslovakia matches are allocated to both the Czech Republic and Slovakia.

Abandoned/forfeited matches

For statistical purposes, when a match has been started and then abandoned but later forfeited, the result on the pitch at the time of abandonment is counted. Matches that never started and were either cancelled or forfeited are not included in the overall statistics.
