It somehow seems selfish to be having fun and acting like business as usual when my Mom is going through a major health crisis, so many people have been suffering from the earthquakes in New Zealand and Japan, and the Middle East is in the midst of several uprisings (leading to higher oil prices for everyone around the globe).

I've realized that life goes on and I have to keep living my life because it doesn't help anyone if I get depressed and make myself suffer out of misplaced guilt or fear over the worst possible outcomes. Instead of feeling negative, I have chosen to feel hope and get into action. I have donated to the Red Cross for both New Zealand and Japan. I send love and compassion in my thoughts and prayers to the victims. It's probably a good time to check in on my earthquake preparedness (a good idea for anyone living in the Bay Area). Also, while the troubles in the Middle East are scary, I think it is a good direction in the long run that there is a move for more democracy and human rights in a part of the world that is still quite backwards in that respect.

My Mom, thankfully, is doing okay. Her operation late last January went fairly well and the surgeons were able to remove the cancer successfully. However, she needs to have another operation to finalize everything. She was scheduled for another operation on the first day of the Nova Albion Steampunk Exhibition and I was torn between having to be there for her all day and then having to do the costume contest and ball all evening afterwards. I remembered I was at the hospital until 9:00 p.m. during her first operation after which I was too stressed and tired to do much else.

Then she was unexpectedly hospitalized on her 70<sup>th</sup> birthday in early March due to complications. All of this has felt surreal, like I go through the motions and everything is okay, but inside I was scared and anxious. So I would be okay during the day but then cry at unexpected moments over the smallest things at night.

So her final operation is now up in the air, which is a good thing because I can now go to Nova Albion with a clear conscience. Still, I feel selfish somehow... and guilty. It must be my Catholic upbringing coming up from deep within my psyche.

It has helped, however, that my boyfriend has been so caring, understanding and supportive. And I have a couple of friends who have told me that they know what it's like and their doing what they loved to do has actually helped them cope with their respective family member's illness. My sister and Dad have also been mostly normal about this all and we've all gotten along well through this. And my Mom has shown inner strength that I have not seen from her in a while.

Anyway, our family has not had the chance to celebrate her birthday as well as mine in mid-March. My sister's birthday is in late March and so we're just going to celebrate our three birthdays at the same time. And give thanks that we are still all alive and, well, still doing great by relative standards.

Coincidentally, I'm taking an online spiritual course by Jean Houston, one of the leaders of the human potential movement. This has helped me have a bigger picture view of the human race as a whole and our evolutionary journey as a species. She believes, as I do, that despite troubles here and there in the world, the human race is evolving into a better stage, and each of us has a role to play if we chose to fulfill our individual potential. She also says that art and creativity are necessary human expressions and are not the frills society generally thinks they are. She explains that most great works of art and literature are born from wars and other times of hardship. Her words and positive beliefs lift me up when I'm dragged down by worries and fears.

Still, it's a day-to-day struggle. I find that my anxiety is always there, just brimming below the surface, while I try to be happy and show a brave face on the outside. It's the unpredictability of it all that gets to me. I never know when something will happen with my Mom or something will happen that will prevent me from doing something I love to do that I've planned for months in advance. A lot of the things I do, like conventions, balls and the like, need a lot of preplanning. From buying tickets, to making or buying costumes, to, well, just generally feeling excited and looking forward to them.

I know that worrying doesn't help. And I'm confident that I will make the best decision I can at the moment if things do happen (I'm one of those calm, rational and decisive people in

the midst of emergencies). I also realize that whatever will happen, will happen, and I'll just have to deal with it. At the end of the day, I'll get over missing an event if I have to. Still, it's stressful!

I suppose it's a matter of time, stress and energy management. I find that I'm just exhausted and stressed all the time trying to do everything that I normally do while fitting in all the hospital visits and such. But my parents are getting older and everyone eventually has to go through this. That's the other thing that has been on my mind. I'm entering a new stage in life where I'm faced with thoughts like these and of my own mortality. I'm thinking this new stage will get easier in time as I get more used to it. In the meantime, I will still continue to live my life to the fullest. With perhaps more thought toward prioritizing my time and energy and taking better care of myself by getting more exercise and sleep.

Gallifrey is one of the conventions at which I care about the panels, so I was up relatively early for breakfast and am glad to report that overall the main restaurant, Latitude 33, did quite a good job over the weekend, maintaining reasonable hours and doing their best despite being clearly overwhelmed on Saturday, on which I will take more about later.

Over the course of the weekend, I mainly attended the panels with the classic *Who* guests starting with the Matthew Waterhouse interview on Friday and including several panels with Peter Davison, Sarah Sutton and Janet Fielding, including Davison's solo panel, which Fielding crashed to defend her reputation. But the highlight of it all was Opening Ceremonies.

Again, Gally is one of the few conventions aside from Worldcon, where I bother with this event. Both Opening and Closing ceremonies are attended by just about everyone, it feels a bit cult-y but somehow it's necessary and in the past

This year, he sent a sequel, which he shot himself and has now made me a fan for life. *Who* guests really do seem to be the best guests in the world.


Another amazing guest, whom I credit with introducing me to the wonderful Patrick Throughton era series, is Frazer Hines who played companion Jamie McCrimmon on the show beside Throughton (the second regeneration of the Doctor). Hines has an autobiography out now, which gave me an opportunity to get his autograph since I've never gotten into simply collecting signed photos, having no use for them. He also had a one-man show on Friday evening telling stories from his run on the show, which sadly included a number of clips from lost episodes, a real tragedy given the brilliance of Throughton's performance.

And after that, finally, I got to change into my first proper costume of the weekend: Supreme Commander Servalan from the show *Blake's* 7 with Palle costuming another character from the same show, Kerr Avon. Normally, I think it's a bit silly to costume from anything but *Who* at a *Who* convention, but there is some canonical support for both shows being in the same universe. And it is after all, a relatively obscure British SF show with a lot of overlap both in front of and behind the camera so I hoped it wouldn't be too far off. As it turned out, the people who recognized it loved it, there may even be some other cosplayers joining in next year.

The Friday highlight was the Torchwood 4 party, hosted by Merv and Judith, the theme was the opening of the Van Gogh

exhibit at the National Museum. Ant dressed as Van Gogh with Deb as a representation of Art. In honor of the "Christmas Carol" episode, Kevin had strung up some "singing bass" with fairy lights and the effect was really quite lovely. Even more awesome was Andy in shark footy pajamas. The convention had wisely expanded its evening entertainment and provided a dance and a pirate rum party (for the "Islands of Mystery" convention theme that year), which in addition to the lobby and bar activity, allowed for a number of options. A good thing as the convention continues to grow and expand.

Saturday was again all about panels for me. I dragged my ass down to a quick breakfast and then off to the Podcasters panel with Palle. In addition to 'casts I already listen to, such as the aforementioned Mutter's Spiral and Radio Free Skaro, there were representatives of The Oodcast and Little Finish, now both on my list and many shout outs to the Two Minute Time Lord who was not on the panel but that I also recommend. I had meant to stay for the next panel, which had Javier Grillo-Maurxach, the creator of the brilliant but cancelled show The Middleman, on it but had to attend to some business and missed it. year was not seeing any of his panels and that regret was compounded when I later saw he had dressed up as The Master during the convention.

Anyway, after much running around and buying too much stuff and general tomfoolery, I decided I needed food and a nap, or perhaps a nap and food. Point being that this was the night the restaurant was overwhelmed because, as luck would have it, Craig Ferguson plugged the convention on his show on Friday night, sending Chris Hardwick from the Nerdist podcast to get some interviews. Between the already increasing numbers, the NBA Playoffs crowd and this, the seams were creaking a bit and it took forever to get dinner. Advance scouts informed us that the lines for the Masquerade were around the block, so to speak, so I decided not to bother. Although it hurt a bit since (say it with me) Gally is one of the few conventions where I bother with the Masquerade.

I did, however, change into my Romana I costume, which had caused me a lot of stress in the making but had turned out pretty decent, if I do say so myself. Moreover, as my first realio-trulio sewn-by-me costume, I am inordinately proud and simultaneously dissatisfied with the thing. There were many great creations around including Bryan Little as Sutekh the Destroyer, a Quark, another million or so Amy Ponds, and of course, as usual sporting the crowning costuming achievement of the weekend: Mette as a new series Silurian.

Unfortunately, the evening was somewhat foreshortened for me as I got myself into a drinking contest with a British writer, which says it all right there really. On the plus side, I didn't have a hangover the next day, though I certainly deserved one.

Sunday at a con is usually bittersweet but the postconvention lobbycon experience gives everyone something to look forward to, which takes a lot of the sting out of things. As is usually the case, I spent most of the day in the main ballroom, Gally's own version of Comic-Con's Hall H, I suppose. There were two panels I was interested in before the video retrospective, in which they show all the bits and pieces of news coverage for *Who* in the UK, plus a repeat of Davison's video for those who were not at Opening Ceremonies, and the infamous Craig Ferguson 'lost' cold open from earlier this year. As with opening ceremonies, it was mostly quick and cult-y and a chance to say your goodbyes to folks not staying for lobbycon.

Dinner, a lie-down and then it was time to join the proceedings already in progress in and around the bar. The evening started somewhat civilized as people who were going home that evening had one beer and then headed into the night. The second wave dropped off as midnight approached, usually folks who had early morning flights, or who are sane. At this point, it's the die-hards who were unwilling to let the con end and started bringing out their remaining drink supplies as the bar closed. Night owls, like myself, have the advantage since we would be awake anyway at this point. In previous years, guests such as Steven Moffat and Paul Cornell seemed to be the tentpoles of this experience; however, Tony Lee and the Podcasters (the name of my Murray Gold tribute band, BTW) did a creditable job of taking up the torch this year as did the inimitable Frazer Hines.

Conversational clusters formed and reformed, the topography of the lobby allowing multiple little islands with easy navigation between them, everything from large raucous groups to intense one-on-one exchanges, and the occasional corner for other, slightly more discreet, encounters.

At some point many hours into the night, I found myself coming back into the lobby from hanging with some nicotine addicts in the smoking area only to be greeted by the sight of a line of folks waiting for the airport shuttle. A combination of early morning fans looking a little sad to see the lobbycon-ers still at it and a whole bunch of civilians, specifically airservice personnel, who looked frankly a bit appalled, not the least I realized because I was still carrying a pint-glass half full of beer at 5:30 a.m.

Realizing this, and that the beer was warm and flat after being nursed for hours, my cohorts and I were delighted to see that the light were on at Starbucks. We all got ourselves some caffeine and cupcakes and then called it a night, counterintuitive but effective.

We were among the last to leave lobbycon but it had reformed by the time we emerged from our late checkout at 2:00 p.m. Last minute podcasting and scarf unraveling by Peter Davison extended the con by a few precious hours. In fact, I spotted Melody still in the same spot we left her at six hours previously. I saluted her, and then we hit the road.

Luckily, there are YouTube vids of all the masquerade entries, which along with the evergreen #gally hashtag on Twitter help prolong the con high through the months till 2012.



machinery mechanics. There is now a Second Edwardian Ball in Los Angeles.


I first went to the Edwardian World's Faire when it was at the Great American Music Hall a few years ago. I haven't gone every year but loved every year I've gone.

Every Presidents' weekend, gamers descend on San Ramon for the convention called DunDraCon. Just like the other two conventions I have written about, this one is a collection of games and the people who play them, getting together for fun,

no sleep and camaraderie with others who have something in common.

Imaginations are encouraged to soar, buffs of military history debate strategies and possible different outcomes if "B" had happened instead of what history tells us happened. Compared to the last con I went to, I saw a large number of families playing together, whether it was board games, RPGs or even miniatures.

If you are not sure what miniatures are, check out the games Warhammer, Flames of War, Star Fleet Battles and a plethora of games representing other genres and time periods. They use small plastic or metal models to represent ships, troops, creatures, buildings, etc. on a tabletop and go at it. Bragging rights go to the one or ones left standing.

LARP is actually big at this con compared to the other two I have written about in the past (KublaCon and Pacificon).

Groups of people get together and act out a certain role in a certain context. Some games the players might be vampires, Elizabethan nobles, or commoners in a village plagued by a werewolf. This year, they actually had a LARP game based on L5R, Legend of the 5 Rings.

L5R is a game originally based on fantasy Japan. It has expanded from a collectible card game (CCG) to an RPG, and then into LARPing. Many of the players actively research myths, ghost stories, folk lore and legends from all over Asia and Southeast Asia. If you are looking for a game other than Dungeons & Dragons (D&D), this might be the one for you.

Speaking of D&D, the RPGA and Pathfinder players made their presence known, with eight sessions and multiple games each session. Fun was had by all, but the weather and economy was definitely hampering the turnout just like last Labor Day weekend.

The next convention is ConQuest Sac in March. Yours truly cannot attend—must work to pay the rent. After that, Memorial Day weekend will see the return of KublaCon in Millbrae. The con where the favorite phrases are "KUBLA!!!" and "Nuke it From Orbit!"

If you have never heard of these games and would like to find out more, D&D is printed by Wizards of the Coast, Pathfinder is printed by Paizo Press, Warhammer is made by GDW, and so on. If you have the time, drop in and check out Kubla in May, it may surprise you how much it has of what you might be looking for.

Everyone threw in some cash to the Potlatch donation jar in lieu of memberships, since no badges are sold at the con, and we retired up to the consuite for a few more hours before calling it a night.

All in all it was an enjoyable little con, as Potlatch usually is, with enough programming to feel well run and literary but a good deal of sitting around gabbing for that fannish and relaxed experience. It was apparently a return from the brink since there had been talk of this being the last year, but the website for next year in Seattle is already up and running.

The following, weekend many of the same people headed over to the Holiday Inn up on Van Ness in San Francisco. I chose not to get a hotel room this time, it being in the city and all, but that may change next year since I regretted heading out each night. Despite its newness and small size, the con was very interesting and well run. There seemed to be a lot of WisCon veterans, and there were a lot of touches that made the convention feel a bit more literary and political that many of the regular cons I attend, interesting things seem to be afoot there.

Rather than having guests of honor, the convention had honored guests. I am not a hundred percent certain of the difference, but as with Potlatch, the convention programming revolved more around a theme rather than an individual or individuals, in this case *The City in SF*. So, Jeff and Ann VanderMeer and Pat Murphy where the guests and there were discussions about Murphy's *The City Not Long After* and JeffVanderMeer's *Ambergris* novels. Fritz Leiber was named posthumous guest based on his wonderful *Our Lady Of Darkness*, which of course is set in San Francisco. There were panels on many topics, however, and I especially enjoyed one called "your favorite book no one has ever heard of" in which the audience was able to fill out a slip of paper with the book name, author and brief description and then the panelists/ moderator would call on each person to come up and talk about the book, it was a very neat idea and I came away with several interesting new titles.

The program book included accessbility, code of conduct information and a copy of the Convention Anti-Harrasment Project manifesto, which I think is vital to the growth and well

being of our community. There were several other nice touches such as the "interstitial programming," which took place during the "lost hour" of the Daylight Savings time change and a selection of homebrew beers made by Corie Ralston that included Pat Murphy's Golden Coffee Stout, Jeff and Ann VanderBeer and Fritz LeBeer. I stuck to the stout, which was delicious, except for also having one or two Flaming Rum Monkeys, which I am not certain how they related to the theme but were on fire, and also delicious.

The panels went well into the evening, allowing me to leave my house at five or six p.m. and still catch two or three panels if I wanted. The consuite was well stocked and friendly and a couple of nice local fans held an honest to goodness room party down the hall from the consuite to keep things lively. There was also karaoke and a few meetups apparently organized by fans outside of the official convention schedule

So all in all a very successfully first year for FOGcon, I look forward to seeing them top this next year.

November 2<sup>nd</sup> was the planned launch date for the Discovery but due to bad weather conditions, it was postponed





really felt like I was in the Caribbean with the pastel-colored low buildings surrounding a lagoon. Palm trees and tropical plants dotted the landscape and there were little beaches in between the different villages named after islands in the Caribbean.

Since the shuttle launch was delayed yet again, we opted to go to Epcot that day. We pretty much spent the entire day there as it was huge and there were several things we both wanted to do. I've been to Epcot once in 1989 but very little looked the same to me. This time, we lucked out as there was a food festival in progress. There were little booths around the World Showcase lagoon that featured cuisines from all over the world. I pretty much ate my way around the World Showcase.

They had a buffet that was incredibly delicious! We had to wait 30 minutes as we didn't have reservations. I found out that at Disneyworld, you have to make reservations online in advance for any of the restaurants or you'd have to wait a long time or not be able to get in at all.

So that meant enjoying the other side of Florida away from the hustle and bustle of the major attractions. I booked a massage appointment at the Saratoga Springs Resort and Spa (a Disney timeshare facility). To get there, I had to take a water taxi from Downtown Disney.

Downtown Disney was quite a sight to see. There were lots of stores, bars, restaurants and shows. It was very modern and way too loud and busy for me. But I'm glad I saw it.

I just went with my whims for the day and checked out everything. Unfortunately, it was too cold and windy to use the pools or to sunbathe on the beaches. So I settled for biking around the lagoon twice. The bike I rented was one of those cruisers that are hard to maneuver and don't have any gears for speed. So you really have to just go at a leisurely pace. I got to see all the different villages, which you could tell apart from their different colors. There was also a tropical island in the middle of the lagoon, which I was able to explore.

Afterwards, I rented a mini speed boat. I've never driven a boat before and it was incredibly fun. I went around the lagoon where I could see the villages. Then I went into another connected lagoon that went into a less developed area with wildlife and plants growing naturally.
