

Shot his 'best ever' Gushue was jumpin' for joy

rad Gushue nearly jumped out of his shoes after a spectacular final shot he called his 'best ever' gave his Newfoundland-Labrador team a heart-stopping 8-7 victory over Alberta Wednesday at the Tim Hortons Brier, presented by SecurTek Monitoring Solutions.

"I think I pulled an oblique muscle jumping up there but at least I've got the night to recover," a still emotional Gushue said later. "That's a huge emotional lift (for the team). That game felt like we should win and then it felt like we were letting it go and then we played a great eighth end to get up by two. They played a great ninth to tie it."

The win moved his team from The Rock to 7-2, within range of at least a tiebreaker, while across the other side of the Scotiabank Saddledome ice Brad Jacobs of Northern Ontario clinched a berth in the Page 1-2 game with a tough 4-3 win over

Steve Laycock of Saskatchewan.

Gushue and Jacobs will meet in today's 8:30 a.m. draw in what could be a preview of the 1-2 game.

Asked to describe his final shot, with Alberta sitting two and looking to have the victory in hand, Gushue said it was the "best shot I've ever made.

"When you put in the importance and the difficulty of it, to pull it off is pretty special. Definitely going to be something I will remember, but more importantly it's big for this event. For us to win that, we're going to get a tiebreaker, worst case.

I think if we win one of our last two games we should get into the 1-2 game. I might be a little quick saying that but at least the ball's in our hands going into tomorrow."

But what was the shot?

"I guess it was a double raise, double, around the horn backwards, something or other," he laughed. "It

was crazy. That's the only shot we thought was there. I envisioned it the way it happened. It's just the percentage of actually making it happen are so small, because not even a millimetre on the top rock and we miss it."

The shot was a huge emotional lift for Gushue and teammates, third Mark Nichols, second Brett Gallant, and lead Geoff Walker. It was an arrow through the heart of Kevin Koe and his Alberta team of third Marc Kennedy, second Brent Laing and lead Ben Hebert.

"A tough one." Koe said of the loss. "I didn't think (the shot) was there. I thought we had it in the bag honestly. I don't know how many times out of a 100 he makes that but unfortunately for us he did and that's just kind of the way it's been going, wrong side of the inch."

Koe beat his brother, Jamie and his team from the Northwest Territories in the evening draw to keep alive Alberta's slim hopes of getting into at least a tiebreaker.




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


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LEFT: P.E.I. skip Adam Casey exhorts his brushers to lean into it in a game against Saskatchewan.

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



Team New Brunswick remains upbeat, proud

hey are four Tim
Hortons Brier rookies
without a hope of
making the playoffs, they had
just been handed their sixth
straight loss, and yet Team
New Brunswick was still
upbeat, optimistic and proud.

Hey, said the words of skip Jeremy Mallais, what's not to be proud of?

"Our first Brier, we're fighting hard, we won our first game, which was a big high, and we've been battling hard ever since. We're proud of the way we're playing. We're turning some heads, which was one of our main goals."

A mostly unknown, surprising entrant out of New Brunswick, they won their first game 6-5 over Northwest Territories, nearly beat Team Canada and have been competitive in every game but a 10-2 loss to Brad Gushue of Newfoundland-Labrador. Wednesday they got their second win, 9-4 over Ontario in eight ends.

"Finally felt good to bring a whole game together. All eight ends were well-played and we fought hard," said Mallais.

"Hurry hard," he screeches. "Yes! Oui! Gotta go! Suffice!"


"That's just the way I play on the ice, the intensity I have," says Crête. "It's been that way ever since I played junior. It keeps me in the game."

Crete's level can be a bit much for some of his opponents, especially those who have the misfortune of playing on the adjacent sheets.


Crête says nobody has complained to him about yelling too loud, at least to his face. So he keeps on hollering.



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Is there a medic in the house? Yes!

Thether you're stopping by for help with a nasty scrape or need a Tylenol for a hangover, you're in good hands in the medical room at the Tim Hortons Brier, sponsored by SecurTek Monitoring Solutions. Tom Kulisz, one of the event's full-time paramedics, has already had to deal with a few on-site injuries.

"Mainly cuts, bumps, bruises and headaches. Nothing major, so far," says Kulisz, who explains that these types of "injuries" are normal during the Tim Hortons Brier.

A normal day at the Tim Hortons Brier is fairly quiet, but can heat up.

"With the Brier and the general population that's here, I find that they are not as rowdy as concerts or hockey games," Kulisz says.

A regular day for Kulisz would be weaving a few stitches, lending a band-aid to a curling official in need, or accepting lost medication from volunteers.

The Tim Hortons Brier on-site medical staff can handle almost any kind of emergency.

"Anything and everything that I can be faced with as a paramedic I can treat. So trauma, medical cases, etc.," says Kulisz.

"On-site I have advanced life support equipment, defibrillators, medications, IV supplies, stretchers and hospital beds."

Kulisz has been a practicing paramedic for six years and works for Aaron Paramedical Services. The company prepares all of its staff before the event.

"There is a training process," says Kulisz. "You have to know the building. You have to know your site."

Alberta has varying regulations for on-site medical personal at events. Kulisz says it's usually determined by attendance numbers.

"It depends on the amount of people. The number of on-site staff goes up as the number of people escalates. Right now, I'm the only one that's in the Saddledome. Other than that, there are people here who have first-aid training who can definitely assist. I think that's how things are balanced out."

Kulisz says first-aiders are a huge support for paramedics at events like the Tim Hortons Brier.

"You develop a certain value for every level of medical care as a paramedic," he says. "I don't know who is or who is not trained in first-aid. Usually if I get to a scene people, more often than not, voluntarily tell me, 'Hey I'm a first-aider. I can give you hand.'"

After working the event for the past couple days, Kulisz says his opinion on curling and the fans hasn't changed. He's happy to be here and help keep the public safe. Kulisz reminds us that the best way to avoid paying him a visit is to just be aware.

"Stay responsible. Drink responsibly. And make sure that you know where your medical facility is and that you have good people take care of you," he says.

The medical centre is located on the Saddledome's main level near the west entrance. It has a giant "Medical" sign above it that can't be missed. Kulisz encourages anyone to stop by when needed.

They could have meekly surrendered after giving up three to Olympic champion Brad Jacobs Wednesday morning but they fought back, scored a rare deuce against the unbeaten Northern Ontario crew and took the game into the 10th end before surrendering 7-4.

"I can't say we're feeling badly at all right now, coming off that game," said third Zach Eldridge, the oldest of the team at 30. "We thought about an end where we gave up three, could have been a two. Had a chance for a deuce and only got one. Just thinking about those two shots, if they're executed we're coming home down one with the hammer, against probably the best team in the world right now.

"So coming off the ice as Team New Brunswick, we feel pretty proud right now,"

The week has been a huge learning experience for Mallais, Eldridge,

second Chris Jeffrey, lead Jared Bezanson, alternate Jason Vaughan and coach Mark Wood.

"You learn a lot about the ice, about this type of conditions, but at the end of the day you really learn a lot about your teammates and stuff that you can build on for next year," said 26-year-old Mallais, the only married member of the team.

"It's a very stressful environment, we've lost six games, so you kind of get into that funk where you start nitpicking a little bit. But our team has done a real good job of communicating so I think the biggest (thing) we're going to take from it is what we learned about each other."

They've also learned things like how to play with Brier rocks and on arena ice.

"Been a lot of firsts for us," said Eldridge. "First time on the main TSN network, first Brier game, a lot of emotions to deal with, lot of things that you just have to live and feel to understand. I guess we've come a long ways if we just think about where we were when we started."

Crete admits he's toned it down over

"Five or six years ago I was screaming a lot harder," Crete admits. "But now I tone it down."

Howard, when he played in Calgary, used to say the dry Alberta air played havoc with his voice.

No such trouble for Crête.

"I drink a lot of water," he says. "I've never lost my voice in a tournament. I have the strong vocals. I have endurance."
