UNO kept its season alive, but its future could be very ominous after Saturday's wild, entertaining and even amazing 39-36 victory over St. Cloud State.

To get the win, the Mavericks overcame an 11-point first-half deficit and the play of Harlon Hill Trophy candidate Keith Heckendorf.

But a fourth-quarter injury to their own star quarterback — sophomore Brian Masek — casts doubts on UNO's chances to win an




But, after thrilling a Caniglia Field crowd of 4,400, the University of Nebraska at Omaha was
