Keynote 1: Centering Digital Humanities: Collaboration and Community at Ryerson

Abstract: At Congress 2017 Ryerson's Centre for Digital Humanities (CDH) is formally launching its new premises in the Library, where it shares space and facilities with Archives and Special Collections. If "a university is just a group of buildings gathered around a library," what does it mean to centre digital humanities scholarship and learning within this core institutional structure? In this talk, Lorraine Janzen Kooistra reflects on building and sustaining a Centre for Digital Humanities as a collaborative community of scholars, librarians, and students engaged in using computational tools to preserve, analyze, and create accessible digital objects for local users within the academy and the public sphere.

Bio: Lorraine Janzen Kooistra is a founding Co-Director of Ryerson's Centre for Digital Humanities (CDH). She is co-founder and principal investigator of the SSHRC-funded Yellow Nineties Online, a digital research environment for the study of aesthetic periodicals of 1890s Great Britain. She has published numerous essays on Victorian illustrated books and periodicals, co-edited *The* Culture of Christina Rossetti, and authored The Artist as Critic: Bitextuality in Finde-Siècle Illustrated Books; Christina Rossetti and Illustration: A Publishing History; and Poetry, Pictures, and Popular Publishing: The Illustrated Gift Book and Victorian Visual Culture 1855-1875. Her innovative teaching of historical materials through experiential and digital methods have garnered her prestigious teaching awards, including the Provost's Experiential Teaching Award (2012), The President's Award for Excellence in Teaching (2016), and Ontario Confederation of Faculty Associations (OCUFA) Teaching Award (2013). Abstract: Dr. Siemens's presentation will explore understandings of authorship, representation, and individual as well as collective agency through examples drawn from early modern literature, contemporary scholarship, and emerging practice.

Bio: Dr. Ray Siemens, distinguished professor in the Department of English at the University of Victoria and Canada Research Chair in Humanities Computing, is internationally recognized as one of the founders of the interdisciplinary field of digital humanities. He is also the founder of the annual Digital Humanities Summer Institute, which brings scholars from around the world to UVic for intensive coursework, seminar participation and lectures. Dr. Siemens has directed such social knowledge projects as Implementing New Knowledge Environments (INKE.ca) and *A Social Edition of the Devonshire Manuscript*.

Abstract: Game designer Tracy Fullerton has spent the last decade translating Henry David Thoreau's classic text Walden or, Life in the Woods into a playable experience -- a game about Thoreau's experiment in living at Walden Pond. The result, Walden, a game is an open world experience that immerses players in Thoreau's writings and ideas through its system, world and narrative design, providing an open-ended experience where players make their own choices about how to live a life of simplicity and balance. The game is based in a faithful digital reproduction of Walden Pond and surroundings circa 1845, including the political, social and natural environments that are reflected in Thoreau's works. Characters such as Ralph Waldo Emerson, Bronson Alcott, Margaret Fuller, Horace Greeley, Louis Agassiz, Sophia Thoreau and others provide a rich set of interactions and storylines to play out against the solitude of the core experiment in self-reliant living. As players live out their own experiment, they collect in their own journal a procedural version of Walden based on the choices they've made that reference a database underlying the world design that consists of hundreds of direct references to Thoreau's writings. In a discussion of the project goals, process and outcomes, Fullerton presents a vision for the digital humanities that includes game design research as scholarship and deep digital gameplay around textual adaptations as an exciting format for the digital humanities. Bio: Tracy Fullerton is an experimental game designer, professor and director of the USC Games program. Her research center, the Game Innovation Lab, has produced many influential independent games, including Cloud, flOw, Darfur is Dving. Reality Ends Here and The Night Journey, with artist Bill Viola, She is currently working on Walden, a simulation of Henry David Thoreau's experiment at Walden Pond supported by grants from the NEA and NEH. Tracy is the author of "Game Design Workshop: A Playcentric Approach to Creating Innovative Games," a design textbook used at game programs worldwide, and holder of the Electronic Arts Endowed Chair in Interactive Entertainment. Prior to USC, she designed games for companies including Microsoft, Sony, MTV, among many others.
