

After scant early success probing the middle, Nebraska turned to options and passing to wipe out the early deficit with a four-touchdown blitz in the second quarter. After Penn State staged a mild threat in the third quarter, the Huskers

closed if out with two more scores in the fourth.

The outcome triggered the first full-blown locker-room celebration in three wins for Nebraska and put Coach Tom Osborne one-up on Paterno, who has no equal in winning percentage for coaches who have survived longer than 10 seasons.

Fargo, N.D. — There were a number of ironic twists in the University of Nebraska at Omaha's 35-28 North Central Conference loss to North Dakota State Saturday night before 8,-100 at Dacotah Field.

The most damaging event, as far as the Mavs were concerned, came with just over two minutes left when UNO was driving for a touchdown.

Bobby Bass, who had his best game this season while rushing for 127 yards on 23 carries, fumbled at the N.D. State 8-yard line. The player who forced and recovered the fumble was none other than 213-pound defensive end Fred Cooperwood, who was a sophomore at Omaha Benson when Bass was a senior.

Iowa's 'Giant Step' Merits First Smile

Iowa City — Iowa Coach Hayden Fry, who repeatedly had said his team shouldn't be congratulated until it won, said the Hawkeyes have reason to be happy now.

Iowa rupning backs Dennis Mosley and Dean McKillip saw to that as their slashing running led the Hawkeyes to a 30-14 victory over Iowa State Saturday.

Nebraskans Thrilled

Mosley scored three times en route to 229 yards and McKillip tallied the other touchdown as the 7-point underdog Hawks won for the first time in four

starts.

Mosley, a senior from Youngstown, Ohio, became lowa's second leading one-game rusher in history on a 39-carry afternoon designed just the way Coach Hayden Fry outlined it.

"We wanted to keep the ball away from them," Fry said.
"This is a giant step forward for our program . . . our first time to smile."

While Iowa's offense manufactured 429 yards, the defense shut off the injury-riddled Cyclones with just 162 — only 47 in the last half.

Two Nebraskans - Bryan Sk-Two Nebraskans — Bryan Skradis of Omaha and Jim Molini of Norfolk — were ecstatic over the win that avenged a 31-0 trouncing of last year. "We should be 4-0," said Skradis, a defensive end from South High who was in on six tackles and one sack for 6 yards.

Molini, the senior co-capain who made one stop behind the line among three tackles, called game, Iowa S tough real tough, but Ne-braska is better."
