

Cotton or Fiesta Looms for NU

It's Oklahoma Week, but not the kind it's Okianoma week, but not the kind of Okianoma Week we've seen in the past. Saturday's game against Nebras-ka will be the Sooners' "bowl game" because OU is on probation and not coing to a real one.

because OU is on probation and not going to a real one.

The Huskers, who proved in their narrow loss to second-ranked Colorado that they're for real, are headed for a New Year's Day bowl, seemingly either the Fresta or Corton—and the decision apparently. will be made this week, before Saturday's game.

"I'm afraid the decision may be made before then," NU Coach Tom over Kansas. "It seems like everybody is anxious to make the tie-ups."

Official bowl invitations can't be made until Nov. 25, but that date is a joke. Things are moving fast: as the pre-bowl season enters what some call "Chear week."

"The Huskers aren't mathematically eliminated from the Orange Bowl, but that is a mere formality. Colorado, which defeated Oklahoma State on Saturday, must defeat only last-place Kansas State this Saturday to wrap up the berth in Miami that goes to the Big Eight charmoion.

the berth in Miami that goes to the Big Eight champion, If CU lost to K-State and NU beat Oklahoma, the Huskers would tie for first and the Orange Bowl Committee could pick either team. But no one is worrying about that happening.

Players Prefer Arizona

A straw vote in the Husker locker room after Saturday's game, a show of hands, indicated a slight preference for the Fiesta Bowl in Tempe, Ariz., sever-al players said.

"It looks like it's down to the Cotton
and the Fiesta," quarterback Gerry
Gdowski said, "and it looks like the
Fiesta, I don't know who will make the
final decision."

The university quarterback, Chan-cellor Martin Massengale, said only that bowl representatives were talking with NU officials and that he expected to hear from athletic director Bob Devaney.

"Bob undoubtedly will make a recommendation in the next few days," Massengale said.

Gdowski said he had no preference other than to play the highest-ranked team possible. A date in the Cotton Bowl would mean playing the Southswest Conference champion. Arkansas of the SWC was rated 10th last week and Texas A&M 16th.

A visit to the Fiesta probably would mean playing independent Florida State, fourth and fith last week in the two major polls. A victory over the Seminoles would boost the Huskers in the final ratings.

Nebraska, rated sixth last week and now 91, also faces the filp side of that the possibility of losing the last two and even finishing out of the Top 10.

Maybe that's why Osborne-seems not to want to rush things. If the Huskers already have a bowl invitation in their pockets, what effect would that have, even subconsciously, on their intensity against the Sooners?

OU has its first-team quarterback back, Steve Collins, and still has an excellent defense. The Sooners will have all the incentive they need when they visit Memorial Stadium.

Representatives of the Florida Citrus Bowl in Orlando also attended Saturday's game, and that is no Mickey Mouse bowl — nearby Disney World is an attraction for players and fans. But the money is much less for the schools compared to the Cotton in Dallas-and the Fiesta in Tempe.

In the straw vote, the Huskers were asked to choose between the Cotton and the Fiesta. It was unclear whether NU had received firm, unofficial invitations.

Nebraska is a marquee name in college football, able to attract a television audience, and the bowls apparently are willing to risk NU losing to Oklahoma and coming in at 9-2. The Huskers have another widely known asset — a large and devoted fan following.

Booing the Officials

Saturday was a typical (ahem) November day in Nebraska, 68 degrees at the 1:30 p.m. kickoff, a blue sky and otherwise perfectly gorgeous.


Just about everyone played, and the scout team scored the final touchdown, though the Huskers fell short of cover-

nce the first quarter of the 1985 game But Nebraska scored the next points to secure its 21st straight season with at least nine victories.


The Huskers also may have locked up a major bow bid with the win.

Blocked Kick Stymies UNO In 12-10 Loss By Eric Olson

Brookings, S.D. — All that came between UNO and a victory Saturday was South Dakota State's Doug Miller-The freshman linebacker blocked

John Bonacci's 37-yard field-goal at-tempt with 38 seconds left as the Jackfront of a sparse crowd of 1,023 at 16,000-seat Coughlin-Alumni Stadium.

With the loss, the University of Ne braska at Omaha finished 6-5 for the braska at Omana missed 65 for the second straight year and for the third time in the last five seasons. The Mays tled with Northern Colorado for fourth in the North Central Conference at 5.4.

"It's a tough loss," senior center Jim Olafson said. "They took us out of our game plan; we had bad field position against the wind and then we miss the

But the 6-foot-3 Miller stood, rather jumped, in UNO's way.
Ricky Thurston's snap to Dan Sellon appeared high, but UNO Coach Sandy Buda said he thought the place-kick holder recovered well.

"It looked like he got it down innormal time," Buda said: "I couldn't itell if John just kicked it low or if the guy who blocked it just got through."
Miller already had saved two South Dakota State victories this year. He blocked a field-goal try in the final minute of a 14-12 season-opening win over. Southwest (Minn.) State and two weeks, ago smothered an extra-point attempt to salvage the Jackrabbits 13-12 victory over Morningside.
"He's getting-good at that," said
