Canadian Hyphens: Next Census Will Reveal that majority of Canadians possess something other than Canadian, British or French as part of their background

Part 1 Canadian Canadians and Part 2 Canadian's Origins: A Mixed Future

Summary

By 2006 it is clear that a majority of Canadians will have something other than Canadian, British and French as part of their ethnic identification. Already as seen below this was the case in 2001 for a majority of the population below the age of 35. This scenario is a function of the combined number of persons reporting only 'other' ethnic origin and those reporting other in combination with another origin.

Those reporting either British or French origin only are the oldest groups with a significant percentage of 65 and over respondents. Those reporting more multiple or hyphenated identities tend to be younger and have low shares of persons under 65 thus suggesting a trend for the future.

The group that was most inclined to add Canadian to the response to questions about their backgrounds were persons of American descent. In effect the most hyphenated Canadians were those with some ancestors that hailed from the melting pot. Thereafter Métis and Dutch origin respondents were most likely to include Canadian in their response. Asian groups were amongst the least likely to have included the Canadian response in their census declaration. There is a substantial gap between those under the age of 15 and those over the age of 65 in the degree to which they gave multiple responses to census questions on ethnic descent. It is very likely that in the next ten years a majority of our youth will give multiple responses to census questions on ethnic origin.

Some one out six Canadians gave at least three responses when asked about their ethnic background in 2001 (9.6% gave three responses and 6.7% gave four answers). Persons that included American, Swedish and Norwegian origin responses were most likely to give four or more responses. Of the European ancestry groups it is Portuguese and Greek that reported the least ethnic mixing.

Single origin declarations were most common amongst persons of Korean descent followed by respondents of Haitian and Chinese origins.

Growing multiple identification can have serious policy ramifications as it may render singular ethnic communal ties less relevant and related issues of community belonging will become more diffuse causing government to stress communal and civic organizations that identify with visible minority or religious groups and make ethnocultural ties less a function of ascribed status and more focused on the manner in which one chooses to define themselves independent of their background and origins

Part 1 Canadian Canadians

A recent series of projections by Statistics Canada looking at the Canada of 2017 predicted considerable change to the country's landscape with the heightened degree of cultural diversity. But one of the areas that the projections did not address was the rise in multiple identifications amongst the population. By 2006 it is clear that a majority of Canadians will have something other than Canadian, British and French as part of their ethnic identification. Already this was the case in 2001 for a majority of the population below the age of 35. The phenomenon is more common amongst longer established-mostly European descendant- Canadians than more recently arrived immigrants and it is an important dimension of changing patterns in Canadian identity.

Some describe the condition of dual individual and/or multiple identities as hyphenated identity. The notion of a hyphenated identity is usually thought of as combined national with ethnocultural identity (i.e. Canadian and other) and its increased presence in the census is a result of people being encouraged in the late 1980's to respond that they were Canadian on the question of ethnic origins. Of those Canadians who have increasingly chosen to do so many combined their answers with another ethnic response.

Hyphenated Canadian identities have become an important part of the way our origins are reported. It is a significant by product of the campaign designed to get the population to respond Canadian to the census as a way to affirm their attachment to the country. The authors of this idea may have better succeeded in getting those of European origin to hyphenate their Canadian identification than in getting people to dismiss backgrounds other than Canadian.

Having a majority of 'other ethnicities' does not imply a rise in hyphenated identities as much of the new immigration has yet to encounter significant mixing, something which is far more common amongst the more established largely European descent segment of the population. Hyphenated identities are particularly common amongst the younger multigenerational groups though less so amongst Quebec francophones. Moreover a number of younger Canadians have identified rolled themselves into the Canadian only category. Still one observes an important generation gap in the reporting on origins with those below the age of 14, approximately 26% might be described as hyphenated (3 104 235) while in the 65 and over category only 6.1% are hyphens. Overall in the 2001 census some 16.5% or one of six Canadians reported hyphenated identities. Furthermore those reporting either British or French origin only are the oldest groups with significant 65 and over respondents. Those reporting more multiple or hyphenated identities tend to be younger and have low shares of persons under 65 thus suggesting a trend for the future.

Only 2.7% of persons with origins other than Canadian, French or British combined Canadian with their response in dual declarations. However when multiple declarations where Canadian is present with 'other' identification are included the percentage rises to 6.3. Not surprisingly considerably more mixing of the 'other ethnics' occurred with persons of British as opposed to French descent. As observed below the group that was most inclined to add Canadian to the response to questions about their backgrounds were persons of American descent. In effect the most hyphenated Canadians were those with some ancestors that hailed from the melting pot. Thereafter Métis and Dutch origin respondents were most likely to include Canadian in their response. Asian groups were amongst the least likely to have included the Canadian response in their census declaration.

Part 2 Canadian's Origins: A Mixed Future

Part 1 explored the extent to which Canadians added Canadian to their responses to questions on ethnic origins giving rise to an important degree of hyphenation. But multiple identity declarations can take many combinations of backgrounds and as we shall see such multiplicity of identification is much more common amongst the younger generation. As observed below there is a substantial gap between those under the age of 15 and those over the age of 65 in the degree to which they gave multiple responses to census questions on ethnic descent. It is very likely that in the next ten years a majority of our youth will give multiple responses to census questions on ethnic origin.

Conclusion

Growing multiple identification can have serious policy ramifications as it may render singular ethnic communal ties less relevant and related issues of community belonging will become more diffuse causing government to stress communal and civic organizations that identify with visible minority or religious groups and make ethnocultural ties less a function of ascribed status and more focused on the manner in which one chooses to define themselves independent of their background and origins. Hence one may have minimal identification with Greek culture but choose to engage in communal activity by affinity and interest in the cultural heritage.
