

South Bend, Ind. — "Ring Ricky's bell!" They chanted at Notre Dame's pep rally in a burst of inspiration that won't make anybody forget "Win one for the Gipper!"

But when it was over Saturday, when USC rallied three times to win a 24-17 game that see-sawed all afternoon, everybody was blowing a horn for Ricky Bell, who carried 40 times for 165 yards and one touchdown and seemingly could have run forever.

"Hey, man, you're the guy who deserves the Heisman Trophy!" screamed nose guard Hareld Stoole shutching 2011 Harold Steele, clutching Bell's No. 42 jersey, amid the bedlam in USC's locker room.

Next door, Coach Dan Devine of Notre Dame was equally impressed with the slashing jun-ior tailback from L.A.'s Fremont High School

"There's no doubt in my mind he could be starting in the NFL right now," said Devine, who coached the Green Bay Packers the previous four

years.
Then he paused, and added, "Except maybe at Buffalo."

Buffalo, of course, is where another ex-Trojan, O.J. Simpson, is playing professionally. It was hard not to compare Bell with Simpson, whose 150 yards here in 1967 was the previous best by any of coach John McKay's tailbacks against Notre Dame.

Six Buff Mistakes Turn Into Scores World-Herold Sports Writer Lincoln — When two football teams score 84 points in three

quarters, then shut it off in the fourth, the mind starts to wander, looking for something insignificant to keep the game interesting.

It is totally insignificant that the final score of the Nebraska-Colored comp. Colored comp.

Colorado game Saturday would have been 21-21 if the visiting Buffaloes could deduct the touchdowns Nebraska scored following four fumble recoveries, another recovery on a muffed kickoff and

four fumble recoveries, another recovery on a muiteu kickou and an intercepted pass.

But you can't do that, especially when you're playing in Nebraska's Memorial Stadium and a highly vocal crowd of 76,509, sixth largest in Cornhusker history, is watching.

So the final score of 63-21 in favor of Nebraska stands, which was phenomenal considering that Colorado was ranked No. 10 in the nation and had lost only to No. 2 Oklahoma by a point.

They Did Happen

The importance of the Buff turnovers is apparent in looking at another insignificant item: Nebraska led in total offense by only 515 yards to 454.

But they did happen, to the wonderment of players and coaches on both sides of the field. Colorado fumbled seven times and lost six. And the Buffs turned it over twice on interceptions.

Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne likened the interminably long

afternoon to a snowball rolling down a mountainside. Monte Kiffin, his defensive chief, called it a nightmare. And he was on the Husker assistant John Melton, who helps man the phones in the press box, left his post early in the fourth quarter and went to the locker room. "Get it over before we get somebody hurt," he

If they thought it was long, Colorado Coach Bill Mallory thought it took an eternity to play the last quarter. Even a couple of consolation touchdowns in the third quarter after Nebraska had made it 63-7 didn't speed the clock.

A Lengthy Stare

Mallory stared long into a soft drink can, trying to put it into

words...good gosh...there were just some things in there ... boy ... boy ... you can't do things like that against a team like this."

With Nebraska unbeaten in six previous games and ranked No. 4, the huge crowd had gathered on a cool sunshiny day expecting the close, bruising game both coaches had predicted for

The Buffs primed for the upset by stunning the Husker defense with a 74-yard touchdown run by quarterback David Williams on the game's third play. But Colorado won only those first 52 seconds. The Huskers won the rest.



The next drive took 2:24 and six plays to cover 59 yards, with John O'Leary sailing the last 10 yards around right end.

Nebraska's offense got those first two in brutally efficient fashion to take charge. But they were to get only one more — an 80-yard, 17-play march to the fourth touchdown — without Colora-

After a 1932 retirement, Dempsey became a restaurateur. His last establishment, on Broadway, closed a year ago.

Dempsey lost his title to Gene Tunney in a 10-round decision on Sept. 23, 1926. A rematch a year later almost to the day resulted in a highly-controversial 10-round decision in favor of Tunney and ended, but for a long series of exhibition matches. Dempsey's active ring ca-
