An Annotated Bibliography for ISAAC ASIMOV

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Part I: Catalogue of Asimov's Fiction

This catalogue lists all of Isaac Asimov's fiction, from short stories to novels (with an appendix listing comic verse and song lyrics, which he would sometimes include in his fiction collections). Unlike the other catalogues in this bibliography, the entries are arranged in order of composition (i.e. as they were completed) rather than by publication date. This is appropriate for Asimov's fiction, since he seldom worked on more than one piece of fiction at a time, whereas he would often work on many non-fiction projects simultaneously, switching back and forth freely between them. The dateline for each item gives both commencement and completion dates where possible; if a single specific day is listed by itself, it means the item was written in its entirety on that day.

I acknowledge with great pleasure the invaluable help provided by Ed Seiler, author of the Asimov Online website (www.asimovonline.com), who generously made available to me a summary of dating information gathered from the records kept by Asimov himself – the index cards on which Asimov noted the significant dates in the writing, selling, and publication of each of his stories. Without access to this primary data, an authoritative chronological listing (especially for stories from 1978 onwards) would simply not be possible. Other major sources used here are Asimov's autobiographical volumes *In Memory Yet Green* (abbreviated IMYG), *In Joy Still Felt* (IJSF), and *I. Asimov: A Memoir* (IAAM), plus the *Inventory of the Isaac Asimov Collection* (retrieved from the Howard Gotlieb Archival Research Center website at Boston University: archives.bu.edu/collections/collection?id=121382). This document is referred to simply as "Inventory"; the Collection as a whole is referred to as the "Archive".

Note that the chronological numbering of the items starts from 0, rather than 1, in order to ensure that items F.1 through F.60 match the numbers in the list given in *The Early Asimov*. Also, the Supplement and Appendix I list a number of items which were never fully completed and published by Asimov. Cross-references to these are inserted into the main listing at the appropriate chronological points.

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Fiction (Chronological Listing)

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ORGANISATION

Index of Fiction Titles

Descriptors

At the right of the line containing an item's title is a descriptor, indicating its classification within the body of Asimov's works. A few pieces, designed to mimic the form of non-fiction essays, bear the designation fictional article. Otherwise, stories are classified by length: VIGNETTE signifies a piece of less than a thousand words, a SHORT STORY is no longer than 7,500 to 8,000 words, a NOVELETTE is up to 20,000 words, and a NOVELLA is up to approximately 50,000 words; any longer work is designated a NOVEL.

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Most of Asimov's stories are science fiction, and that category may be assumed by default if no other appears in the descriptor. The designations foundation, positronic robot, multivac, and wendell urth are used to indicate the most important sub-categories of Asimov's science fiction, while novels belonging to particular series are marked trantorian empire, lucky starr, and norby. Stories in the fantasy genre are designated azazel if they are part of the "George and Azazel" series, or simply fantasy otherwise. Similarly, "straight" (i.e. non-science fiction) mystery stories are designated black widowers, union club, or larry for those in his three main mystery series, or simply mystery for the few non-series mysteries.

Publication Details

The entry for each item includes all distinct English-language publications I am aware of, in order of appearance. "Distinct" means that, unlike such other resources as the Internet Speculative Fiction Database (www.isfdb.org) or Ed Seiler's catalogue of Asimov's fiction at www.asimovonline.com, later printings or editions of the same book are not listed, nor are foreign editions (usually British) of books or magazines which were first published in the USA. Similarly, omnibus volumes or other derivative anthologies that simply repackage the contents of books which *are* listed are excluded. There are a small number of non-English publications included, but only where these are worthy of particular note. All non-USA publications are indicated by a three-letter country code (the ISO 3166 abbreviation: e.g. GBR for Great Britain, ITA for Italy, etc.) at the start of the entry. It is not always possible to provide the precise day, or even month, for each publication (especially for those outside the USA); in these cases, the unknown parts of the date are indicated by dots (**).

Books which Asimov had no part in preparing (anthologies, textbooks, etc.) have their editor(s) listed directly in the publication list. Otherwise, the reference before the publication date gives the book's catalogue number (together with the position of the item within it, where appropriate) in Part III, which can be consulted for further details.

The symbol is used when an item's first publication occurred in a magazine; a magazine reprint is indicated by a grayed-out version: If an item was first published in a daily newspaper, this is indicated by the symbol if; a newspaper reprint is, again, signified by a grayed-out version: In the symbol indicates the first appearance of the item in book form (either hardcover or paperback), while a publication entry without any symbol indicates a later reprint of the item in book form. On occasion, a short story would be released as a small book on its own; these are noted with [CHAPBOOK] in their publication entries. Finally, a few stories have been adapted by others into comic strip or graphic novel form; these are denoted by the symbol if, along with details of those responsible for the adaptation and artwork.

Multiple Titles

Many of Asimov's mystery stories (as well as a few others) were first published with titles chosen by the editors of the magazines in which they appeared, rather than the titles Asimov gave them − titles which were then retained in subsequent reprints and appearances in anthologies. In these cases, both titles appear at the top of the entry, separated by a diamond symbol (♠), with Asimov's preferred title in boldface. All publications which used the alternate title are indicated by the same diamond symbol. All other cases of changing titles (including working titles which never made it to publication) are spelled out explicitly in the individual entries.

Multiple Versions

Asimov's early positronic robot and Foundation stories were all revised to some extent when they were collected in *I*, *Robot* (C-SF.1) and the first three Foundation books (C-SF.2 to 4). These stories, as well as the later "The Heavenly Host" (F.211), therefore exist in two distinct published versions. The revised version is denoted in these cases by appending ".rv" to the catalogue number.

In a few cases, Asimov significantly revised a story before publication, but the original version was retained and later saw publication elsewhere. This applies to *Pebble in the Sky* (F.57), "Belief" (F.90), and *The End of Eternity* (F.100), whose original versions were collected in *The Alternate Asimovs* (C-SF.20), and also to "Franchise" (F.107). The original version of "The Ugly Little Boy" (F.147) is lost, but would certainly have been included in *The Alternate Asimovs* had it still existed. There are also two cases where an unpublished original version exists in the Archive: "The Fable of the Three Princes" (F.182) and "One Night of Song" (F.271). In all these cases, the "canonical" version of the story is the later, revised one, and the original version is denoted by appending ".or" to the catalogue number.

On two occasions – with "Hostess" (F.69) and "I'm in Marsport Without Hilda" (F.138) – Asimov was forced by editorial pressure to significantly alter a story (in the first case, for its initial publication; in the second, to bowdlerize it for inclusion in a collection). He also created an abridged and simplified version of "Pate de Foie Gras" (F.120). These unwanted variant versions are denoted by appending ".var" to the catalogue number; Asimov avoided reusing them in his own collections and anthologies.

In all of these instances of multiple versions, the details for both versions appear together, at the chronological point appropriate for the first version, with a cross-reference later in the listing indicating where the second version belongs. All other occasions where variations (usually minor) exist between different publications of a story are noted in the individual entries.

Copyright Information

The publication dates for the majority of Asimov's works in this bibliography have been obtained from copyright records. A searchable database of copyright records from 1978 onwards is available at the US Copyright Office website (cocatalog.loc.gov), while records for earlier years are contained in the Catalogue of Copyright Entries available at the Online Books Page (onlinebooks.library.upenn.edu/cce). The pre-1978 records contain only a single date, which is taken to be the publication date, while the newer records contain both a publication date and a separate registration date (almost always later than the publication date). On rare occasions the publication date found in a work's copyright record has been overridden by data from other sources, such as Asimov's autobiographies.

For works published in 1978 and later, the copyright lasts for a period of 70 years following the death of the author. Therefore, all of Asimov's works from 1978 on will remain protected until 2062 (unless the relevant law changes before then). Prior to 1978, the copyright on a work lasted for a term of 28 years, and could optionally be renewed (as Asimov describes in *In Joy Still Felt*) in that term's final year for a further term. This second term was originally also 28 years, but changes to the copyright law eventually extended it to 67 years. So, for an Asimov work published before 1978, its copyright extends until 95 years after publication – provided that the copyright was renewed when its original term expired. The updated copyright law in 1978 included a provision that all works copyrighted in 1964 or later automatically had their copyrights renewed, whether or not a renewal was filed. All renewal registrations for Asimov's works found in the copyright records are indicated in the catalogue entries; it will be seen that for a small number of items published before 1964, explicit renewals (or, in some cases, even initial copyright records) could not be located. However, this should not be taken as an assertion that these works are no longer under copyright protection. There is only one Asimov story, "Youth" (F.79), which seems to be generally accepted as having fallen into the public domain; see that entry for further details.



Juvenilia

Asimov's initial attempts at writing during his childhood and early teen years are mostly lost, except for one short fictional essay (written at the age of 14) which was later republished elsewhere, as detailed below.

The Campbell Era (1938 to 1949)

For the first eleven years of his career, Asimov wrote only for the science fiction magazines. Most of his stories, especially after he became established, were published in *Astounding Science Fiction*, whose editor John W. Campbell, Jr. was the dominant figure in the field throughout this period and became Asimov's mentor. Some early stories were never sold and now no longer exist, but this period also contains the stories which are at the core of Asimov's science fiction reputation: "Nightfall", the Foundation series, and the positronic robot stories making up the seminal collection *I, Robot*.

The Peak Decade (1950 to 1959)

Although Asimov's reputation was built on the stories of the 1940s, it was the following decade that saw him at his fiction-writing peak, taking advantage of the flood of new science fiction magazines that arose to challenge *Astounding*, and then branching out into book publishing, with both novels and short story collections. He also published the first of a vast number of non-fiction books dealing with various aspects of science. However, after the USSR launched its Sputnik I satellite on 4-Oct-1957, Asimov resolved to turn his energies almost fully toward science writing, after which his fiction output decreased sharply.

Also, Muller is one of a dozen Voters rather than the recipient of a unique status, and instead of ending on Muller's feelings of doing his patriotic duty this version concludes more prosaically, with Handley discussing with Muller Multivac's predictions of his personal future prospects.

In chapter 9, the scene of Baley exhibiting Daneel's true nature to three robots is streamlined and simplified. In chapter 12, an extra couple of paragraphs are added to Baley and Klorissa's discussion of human instincts and the Solarians' overcoming of them. There is some slight expansion of the final scene with Minnim.

The paragraph beginning "And mind you, the girl has to know how to handle low-gravity" is deleted. The parenthetical remark "(such flesh!)" is deleted. The sentence about Rog Crinton ending with "thought had a middle name that went sunnuvabich" is deleted. Details about Rog Crinton waiting at the unloading desk are added to replace the sentence "I laughed and told him in all necessary anatomical detail where he could put the little job, and offered to get him a mallet to help." A new parenthetical remark is introduced into the call to Flora: "(I had a wild impulse but hugging 'vision screens is no pastime for a grown man.)". "Rog Sunnuvabich" becomes just "Rog". Two sentences are added after Max learns of Jack Hawk's death: "For a minute, I forgot about the Galactic drug menace. For a minute, I nearly forgot about Flora." The sentence "The magnetic seams on her robe were opened just right..." is deleted. The sentence "The Antares Giant was on time" is expanded with "...and I waited with my leg muscles tense for a quick take-off as soon as I collared the murdering drug-toting rat and sped the two eminent captains of industry on their way". The sentence "It was amazing the liberties they could take with the moral code that way" is deleted. A few pieces of Spaceolined gibberish are changed. The sentence "The bastard was subverting the Galaxy" is changed to "The rat was subverting the Galaxy. More than that, he had killed my colleague and friend". "Damn it" becomes "Nuts". The sentence "Hell, there were no other girls" has its first word replaced with "What's the use". In Max's third call to Flora, many sentences are trimmed out: his extended description of her at the start; "Just thinking of it made me ache where I needed no more ache"; "But hope springs eternal in the human breast, and Flora had plenty of room for it to spring in"; "I threw in honeys and babies until you would have thought that every bee on the planet Earth was pregnant"; Flora's "and what do you think that will do to my reputation?" and the last two sentences of Max's thoughts in response. A phrase is added after Max mutters "Boy!" ("though it was no boy I was longing for"). The bulk of the scene of Max telling the three men about Flora is omitted. The phrase "murdering louse" becomes just "murderer". The passage "(I grew cautious — none of the bum's business as to the details, you know) '— uh, ribald stories, see...'" is changed to

He would generally only write fiction in response to a specific request, and the pieces he produced are usually short; the only novel of this period, *Fantastic Voyage* (F.166), is not fully his but is a novelisation of a pre-existing movie script.

Asimov returned to novel writing with *Foundation's Edge* (F.309), whose enormous success led to him continuing to produce science fiction novels regularly for the rest of his life. He also collaborated with his wife Janet on the "Norby" juvenile novels. His three series of mystery stories continued, and were now joined by the "George and Azazel" fantasies. Lastly, towards the end of his life he collaborated (as far as his failing health would allow) with Robert Silverberg on expansions of three of his most famous earlier stories to novel length.

The items listed here were either written by Asimov but never fully completed, or are adaptations of Asimov's stories by other writers, produced with Asimov's approval and in consultation with him (to a greater or lesser extent).

Spring 1958.

Projected seventh Lucky Starr novel; never written due to Asimov's shift towards non-fiction after 1957.

Jun-1958 to 20-Oct-1958. Attempt at a third Elijah Baley/R. Daneel Olivaw novel.

Abandoned after four or eight chapters (accounts vary), contract cancelled late Mar-1959; now lost. The third Baley/ Daneel novel (The Robots of Dawn) would eventually appear in 1983 (see F.326). However, Asimov made no use of this aborted attempt in the writing of that novel, but started again from scratch.

A9 The Case of the Dying Hint

Early 1971.

Written for Union Carbide Corporation for a "super-sleuth" competition run for their employees. This short mystery was one of three (the others were "The Case of the Missing Gold" by Hillary Waugh and "The Case of the Deadly Clock" by R.L. Fish) which appeared incomplete (i.e. without solutions) on the inside of the dust jackets of special editions of three of Arthur Conan Doyle's volumes of Sherlock Holmes stories (The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes, His Last Bow, and The Casebook of Sherlock Holmes). Contestants were to provide solutions to the mysteries, with hints as to the authors' intended solutions appearing in Union Carbide advertisements in various trade magazines. Some time later, Asimov rewrote and expanded his story, producing the Black Widowers story "The Curious Omission" (F.194). Material retained in Archive (Boxes 122 & 236).

A10 Five and Five and One

Late Dec-1974. Treatment for a science fiction movie musical, from an idea by Paul McCartney. At a meeting on 19-Dec-1974, McCartney presented Asimov with an idea for a fantasy about a musical group being impersonated by a group of extraterrestrials, and a passage of dialogue he wanted included in the story, which would then be used as the basis for a movie screenplay. Asimov completed a preliminary treatment, but did not incorporate McCartney's piece of dialogue; the project went no further. Retained in Archive (Box 235, with note by Asimov: "nothing ever came of it because McCartney couldn't recognise good stuff").
