Did you know...?

- Australia were confirmed as 2022 Series champions after Fiji failed to progress beyond the Cup quarter-finals in Langford – a fourth Cup title in five rounds (Dubai, Dubai, Seville and Langford) putting the gloss on that coronation
- Australia have reached a Cup final three times on French soil, losing to Canada in 2016 and New Zealand in both 2017 and 2018. Reaching the Cup final in Paris in 2018 saw Australia crowned Series champions for the second time
- Australia have won four tournaments in a single Series for the first time, their previous best was three in their 2015-16 title-winning campaign
- Olympic gold medallist Emilee Barton (nee Cherry) was appointed assistant coach in April, the first female coach on the Australian team
- They won their first 14 matches of the 2022 Series, equalling their record set in 2018
- Seville was only their second Cup title success in Europe, having won in London on the 2014-15 Series

Did you know...?

- Brazil are battling with Spain to avoid relegation from the Series as a core team, currently trailing Spain by four points going into the final round
- Brazil recorded their best-ever finish in Series history with sixth in R1 in Dubai, having never ranked higher than eighth before
- Malaga and Seville were their first tournaments in Europe since they were a core team on the 2016-17 Series and played in Clermont-Ferrand
- Brazil finished 11th at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, their only win being 21-12 against hosts Japan in their final match
- Brazil qualified for Rugby World Cup Sevens 2022 in South Africa on 13 November as winners of the Sudamérica Rugby Sevens in Uruguay – Brazil's 19th regional title

Did you know...?

- Canada won the first women’s Series event on French soil in 2016, beating Australia 29-19 in Clermont-Ferrand.
- They medalled in all four previous rounds in France, with one gold and three bronze medals – they are bidding to avoid a season without a medal for the first time
- Canada qualified for Rugby World Cup Sevens 2022 by beating Mexico 33-0 in the Rugby Americas North Sevens Qualifiers in the Bahamas. They did not concede a point in the tournament, beating Trinidad and Tobago (44-0), Mexico (45-0), Jamaica (66-0) and Cayman Islands (71-0) in the pool stage
- Canada posted their best finish of the 2022 Series with fifth place in Langford. They had finished eighth in the first two rounds, their joint-second lowest position in Series history after an 11th-place finish in Kitakyushu in 2018, and first time they failed to medal in the first two events of a Series
- Became the third team to play in 250 matches on the HSBC World Rugby Sevens Series in round two in Dubai, after New Zealand and Australia
- Canada finished ninth at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, missing out on the quarter-finals on points scored after pool defeats to France and Fiji
