DIRECTORY OF U.S. NAVAL AVIATION HISTORICAL COLLECTIONS

Balchen, Bernt, 1889-1973. SMS 13, 05, SMS 51.

Papers; 1927-1973; 5 linear feet and 2 rolls 35mm microfilm.

USAF Arctic survival expert, explorer, Colonel. Correspondence, scrapbooks, photographs, printed matter, art work, and memorabilia related to Balchen's military career and exploits as an engineer, scientist, explorer, aviator, and artist. The bulk of the material consists of a microfilm edition of ten scrapbooks which chronicle Balchen's varied activities, 1927-1973. Significant material reflects Balchen's expedition to the South Pole with Admiral Byrd, 1927-1929. Art work includes water colors done by Balchen depicting various arctic landscapes. The microfilm was obtained from Record Group 401, National Archives.

Doolittle, James Harold, 1896- . OS SMS 46.

Photographs; 1900-1970; 27 linear feet.

General. Photographs depict his official and personal activities, 1900-1970, mostly his childhood, military service, and post war civilian careers. Significant photographs relate to Doolittle's World War II service including the bombing of Tokyo, 18 April 1942. Contains over 200 autographed/inscribed photographic portraits of Doolittle's military and civilian contemporaries. The majority of Doolittle's papers are at the Library of Congress.

Mitchell, William, 1879-1936. MS 14.

Papers; 1917-1936; 2.5 linear feet: 6 rolls 35mm microfilm.

Air Service officer, Brigadier General. Correspondence, reports, memoranda, photographs, and printed matter related to the military career of General Billy Mitchell. The collection consists entirely of duplicate records from the Mitchell papers at the Library of Congress and microfilmed documentation from Record Groups at the National Archives. The material pertains to his military career from 1917 to 1929 and personal activities until his death in 1936. Significant material deals with Mitchell's fight for a separate air service and strategic bombardment. The bulk of the material contains data reflecting Mitchell's World War I service; personal letters to editors throughout the United States following his court-martial; and periodical articles by Mitchell expressing his continuing fight for a separate air service.

Stratemeyer, George E. SMS 27.

Papers; 1917-1969; 1 Roll 16 mm microfilm.

Lieutenant General. The collection contains the "Korean Diary" he kept while Commander, Far East Air Forces. The diary consists of a detailed account of the Korean conflict from 16 September 1950 through 20 May 1951. Included are letters, minutes of meetings, personal observations and copies of radio messages between Stratemeyer and other high ranking officers including Generals MacArthur, Vandenberg, Partridge, Walker, Spaatz, Twining, O'Donnel, Ridgeway and Lemay. Also included are Stratemeyer's personal observations of the war and the officers with whom he served with an emphasis on the activities of General MacArthur. Also included is a photographic history of the Far East Air Forces which depicts thirty-five strategic targets in North Korea, 13 Jul -26 Sep 50. The series contains the dates of attack, maps, bomb damage, assessments, and pre-strike, and post-strike photographs.

Transcripts of tape recorded interviews with significant figures in military aviation. Major topics discussed include strategies and tactics in World War I, World War II, and Korea, the establishment of the Air Force Academy and interservice relationships.

Aviation Project

Oral histories; 1903-1961; 113 items; 5,200 pages of transcript.

A broad survey of the development of aviation, beginning with accounts by associates of the Wright brothers and other pioneers in the U.S. and abroad. Interviewees include designers, engineers, pilots and executives, stunt flyers, and barnstormers. Veterans of World War I describe the development of aerial warfare in that conflict. Recollections trace the progress of aviation between the two World Wars: commercial aviation, air mail development, record flights, technological improvements, air races and polar flights, gliders, and lighter-than-air craft. General William Mitchell's campaign for strengthening military aviation and Charles Lindbergh's solo flight to Paris provide focal points for many accounts of this period. Eyewitness stories of episodes in World War II deal with exploits of the RAF, the Luftwaffe, and the U.S. Air Forces; and range from the Battle of Britain to Hiroshima. Research and production problems and achievements are detailed from the outset to the jet era and the beginnings of rockets and missiles. The material includes descriptions of the breaking of the sound barrier, stories of test pilots for supersonic planes, and accounts of aerial warfare in Korea.

There are approximately 30,000 subject files, including photographs, pamphlets, clippings, reports, manuscripts, technical manuals and drawings. The 1988 shelflist has about 500 accessioned archival collections; the 1988 listing of the biographical files includes names for over 14,000 persons. Some collection-level descriptions are available through part of the institution's online information service, SIBIS. A preliminary Guide to the Collections of the National Air and Space Archives, prepared by Paul E. Silbermann and Susan E. Ewing, was published in April 1991, 110 pages.
