III. NARRATIVE.



USS JOHN PAUL JONES (DDG 32) commenced the year finalizing preparations for her Westen Pacific deployment and on schedule, 7 January, in company with USS HANCOCK (CVA-19), USS HIGBEE (DD-806), and USS FRANCIS HAMMOND (DE-1067) departed Long Beach, arriving in Subic

Bay on the morning of 3 February.

JONES next entered a ten day upkeep period which was highlighted by the visit of Rear Admiral SYNNOT, of the Royal Australian Navy on 9 February. On the thirteenth of February, JONES departed Subic Bay and arrived in Manila Bay, commencing preparations for her role in a SEATO exercise code named SEAHAWK. JONES was joined in this exercise by some nineteen other ships representing the nations of Australia, New Zealand, Great Britain, Thailand, and the Republic of the Philippines.

Upon completion of exercise SEAHAWK, on 26 February, JONES was enroute to her first WESTPAC liberty port, Kaohsiung, Republic of China, arriving 29 February. After four days of fun and relaxation, JONES was again underway this time enroute to the Gulf of Tonkin, where she assumed plane guard duties first for USS CORAL SEA (CVA-43) and then for USS CONSTELLATION (CVA-64). She continued in this status until departing the Gulf in company with CONSTELLATION for Yokosuka, Japan and a three day liberty/upkeep period. From Yokosuka, it was back to the Gulf of Tonkin, joining the Naval Forces there engaged in countering the renewal of the North Vietnamese Easter Invasion of South Vietnamese For the next thirty days, JONES provided gunfire support for the various operations both North and South of the seventeenth parallel, expending more than 5400 rounds of 5 inch 54 caliber ammunition in shore bombardment.

On 3 May, JONES returned to Subic Bay, remaining there in an upkeep status until 21 May when she assumed duty on the South SAR Station in the Gulf of Tonkin. On 24 May, JONES commenced her second tour on the gunline, just in time to provide gunfire support for the amphibious landing of the South Vietnamese Marines North of Hue. JONES continued her gunfire support operations until 25 June when she rendevoused with USS ENGLAND (DLG-22) for North SAR Station operations in the Gulf of Tonkin. During her time on the gunline, JONES was taken under fire on fifteen separate occasions, but fortunately suffered no hits. Enclosures (2) and (3) are lists of those personnel on board JONES, who as a result of these operations, were given citations at an awards ceremony held on board JONES after her return from WESTPAC and were authorized to wear the Combat Action Ribbon respectively.

On completion of North SAR operations, JONES returned to Subic Bay, arriving 13 July for her last upkeep period prior to returning to Long Beach, On 18 July, she departed Subic Bay, enroute CONUS, stopping

only in Guam and Pearl Harbor for fuel.

Arriving in Long Beach on 5 August, JONES commenced a thirty day standdown period, allowing the crew some much deserved and well earned leave. From 4 September, through 26 October, the crew was busily engaged in maintenance. On 27 October, JONES was underway for one day of sea trials and on 31 October, JONES was again at sea, this time serving as plane guard for CONSTELLATION.
