## USS PROVIDENCE (CLG-6)

## 1967 Command History Narrative

For the greater part of January 1967, PROVIDENCE was away from her home port of Yokosuka, Japan continuing her duties as Flagship for Commander SEVENTH Fleet. Activities during the month included firing two TERRIER surface-to-air missiles at drone targets off Okinawa, naval gunfire support in Vietnam, Yankee Team operations in the Tonkin Gulf and port visits to Hong Kong and Subic Bay. During naval gunfire support missions, PROVIDENCE expended 425 rounds of 6"/47 and 295 rounds of 5"/38 for a total of 720 rounds. Much of the firing was for harrassment and interdiction, but known damage assessment resulting from observed call fire produced the following results: Nine VC killed in action (KIA), two pack animals killed, fifty nine structures destroyed or damaged, one road cut and one bridge damaged. During the at-sea period, the ship conducted twenty three helicopter operations, refueled twice, rearmed once and replenished provisions once. PROVIDENCE published a daily newspaper at sea, distributed Special Services brochures to the crew for the Hong Kong and Subic Bay visits and participated in project Handclasp in both ports.

February 1967 was a big month for PROVIDENCE. Change of Command and naval gunfire support were the two major events that occurred. The ship departed Subic Bay on 6 February, spent a few days on Yankee Station in the Tonkin Gulf then moved south into the Central I Corps Tactical Zone (ICTZ) of Vietnam. During the period 12-14 February, the ship participated in Operation STONE south of Danang inflicting the following observed results on the enemy: Twelve VC KIA, thirty six structures destroyed, eighteen caves and tunnels destroyed, six bunkers destroyed, one landing zone neutralized and three secondary explosions were observed along with the destruction of numerous huts. On 13 February, PROVIDENCE had a unique Change of Command Ceremony when Captain Norbert E. AUBREY, Jr., USN relieved Captain Charles H. TISDALE, Jr. on the wing of the bridge while the ship was conducting gunfire support missions south of Danang. The orders were read between fire missions in true "man of war" fashion. PROVIDENCE next participated in Operation DECKHOUSE VI in support of TG 76.5. The ship provided intensive preparation fire followed by call fire missions and harrassment and interdiction fire. Damage assessment during DECKHOUSE VI included twenty VC KIA, ten buildings destroyed, two caves closed and one trench line destroyed. The ship also briefly supported Operation DESOTO slightly north of the amphibious objective area on 18 February. During DECKHOUSE VI, the ship made a high speed rendezvous with PCF-85 to receive an electrical shock patient who had been injured aboard USS FIRM (MSO-44). During the month of February, the ship expended 1,024 rounds of 6"/47 and 554 rounds of 5"/38 for a total of 1,578 rounds of ammunition. PROVIDENCE conducted twenty nine helicopter operations, refueled at sea twice, rearmed three times, replenished twice alongside and had one vertical replenishment (VERTREP) by helicopters from USS MARS (AFS-1).

Most of March was spent in port at Yokosuka, Japan, in Keelung, Taiwan and in transit. The most significant operational event for PROVIDENCE was participation in Operation SEA DRAGON roaming the North Vietnamese coast as a part of TU 77.1.1. Weather hampered operations considerably and action was sparce. Nevertheless, the ship expended 202 rounds of 6"/47 and 25 rounds of 5"/38 for a total of 227 rounds on SEA DRAGON. Targets included highway ferrys, Enclosure (2)

water borne logistic craft (WBLC) and enemy shore batteries. Damage inflicted was largely unobserved. During the month of March, PROVIDENCE conducted forty eight helicopter operations, refueled at sea three times and replenished at sea once each from an AKS and an AF.

PROVIDENCE completed SEA DRAGON operations on 3 April 1967 and moved south to support Operation CANYON involving elements of the FIRST Marine Division. Action commenced with PROVIDENCE preparing the beach for an amphibious landing, with targets for the operations consisting of Viet Cong (VC) assembly areas, mine fields, bunkers and various VC positions reported by the Naval Gunfire Liaison Officer (NGLO). PROVIDENCE expended 718 rounds in four days including prep fire. As a result of this fire, 160 VC suspects were captured and two secondary explosions were observed. Altogether the ship expended 604 rounds of 6"/47 and 212 rounds of 5"/38 for a total of 816 rounds during April. Other operational events included forty one helicopter operations, a VERTREP, three underway refuelings, three rearmings and one underway replenishment from an AKS. Of outstanding note was PROVIDENCE's visit to the port of Cebu, Philippines. This is an infrequently visited port and PROVIDENCE had a royal welcome and a most enjoyable visit. During the three day stay, 14-16 April, PROVIDENCE men competed in local athletic competitions, distributed Project Handclasp material, provided a party of volunteers to paint buildings at the Leprosarium and showed the ship to more than 7,500 visitors.

May 1967 was another big month for PROVIDENCE highlighted by port visits to Port Swettenham, Malaysia and Singapore and qualifying for a "man-of-war's" purple heart. Following an upkeep period in Yokosuka, Japan, PROVIDENCE proceeded south to Port Swettenham, Malaysia on the western side of Malaysia bordering the Malacca Straits. This was a rare and colorful port and the crew had relatively easy access to the many charms of the capitol city of Kuala Lumpur. Driving tropical rain storms did little to dampen the spirits of the crew or the thousands of visitors who thronged to visit the ship. Perhaps the most colorful events were the Minister of Defense's reception in Kuala Lumpur and Commander SEVENTH Fleet's forecastle reception aboard PROVIDENCE. Both occasions brought about a friendly personal exchange between the East and the West. Another colorful event was the arrival of the Sultan of Selangor and his entourage for a luncheon with Vice Admiral John J. HYLAND in the Flag Mess. Later, following a visit to the Sultan's Palace, Vice Admiral HYLAND was heard to remark "When I can no longer be Commander SEVENTH Fleet, I'd like to be the Sultan of Selangor". The usual round of luncheons, tours, general visiting, presentation of Project Handclasp material and sports events rounded out the visit. After a one-day trip, the ship next visited Singapore and had a merry exchange with the Royal Navy. On 22 May, the ship crossed the equator and the next day appropriately initiated nearly 900 pollywogs, thus cleaning the ship of all land lubbers and the like. It was a good thing because soon the ship was back in combat. On 25 May, while providing call fire missions for Operation BEAU CHARGER in the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) dividing North and South Vietnam, the ship felt the sting of an enemy shell. Although the AN/SPS-8B radar was toppled from the main mast, shrapnel fell in harmless places resulting in only superficial damage and no personnel casualties. PROVIDENCE's gunners, aided by USS OZBOURN (DD-846) rapidly returned fire and silenced the enemy gun batteries. It was during this engagement that PROVIDENCE earned the enviable name of the "Fighting Flagship." During the

month of May, PROVIDENCE fired 876 rounds of 6"/47 and 244 rounds of 5"/38 for a total of 1,120 rounds at coastal defense batteries, artillery sites and enemy troop concentrations. The ship conducted forty eight helicopter operations, refueled at sea five times, rearmed at sea twice and replenished underway twice.

The first of June saw PROVIDENCE providing a day of NGFS support to the THIRD Marine Division, firing thirty rounds of 6"/47 ammunition prior to departing the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) for Naha, Okinawa, which she visited for two days. After a short upkeep period in Yokosuka, PROVIDENCE sailed for Iwakuni, Japan, where over 100 of her dependents met their husbands and fathers for a three day visit. The dependents then boarded the ship on 23 June for an eight hour cruise through the Inland Sea to Beppu, Japan. Following the Dependent's Day Cruise, PROVIDENCE departed for Special Operations (SPECOPS) in Vietnam. While in Iwakuni and Beppu, a total of 450 visitors toured PROVIDENCE.

Traveling from Beppu, PROVIDENCE once more lent her support in Vietnam on 1 July to the FIRST Marine Division whose troops were engaged in Operations BUFFALO, CIMARRON and HIGH RISE. During a twelve day period, interrupted only by brief trips to Yankee Station for Helo Operations, PROVIDENCE fired over 1,700 rounds of both 5"/38 and 6"/47 ammunition during seventy one missions. Included in this figure were a number of rounds expended in silencing a shore battery site which had fired, ineffectively, on both PROVIDENCE and ST. PAUL. The underway replenishment teams were kept busy during this month, restocking PROVIDENCE with stores, fuel and ammunition from thirteen ships. The crew was treated to a R & R visit from 14 July to 17 July at Kaohsiung, Taiwan. In this southern Chinese port, crewmembers were able to partake in the excellent buys afforded them. The ship played host to visiting dignitaries such as Lieutenant General YU HAO-CHANG (Commandant Chinese Marine Corps), Vice Admiral LI TUN-CHIEN (Fleet Commander) and others. From this beautiful port the ship once more made her way home and remained in Yokosuka for the remainder of the month.

The beginning of August was slow as the ship remained in upkeep in Yokosuka, yet there were plans in the making and on 7 August, PROVIDENCE set sail for Otaru, on the northernmost Japanese island of Hokkaido, arriving there 9 August. In Otaru, public relations activities dominated the agenda with the ship participating to the fullest in numerous luncheons and a special reception for 250 quests on her forecastle. Special group visiting was conducted in Otaru and Handclasp material was presented to the Mayor of Otaru by the Commanding Officer, Captain Norbert E. AUBREY, Jr. PROVIDENCE was honored to receive Governor MACHIMURA and Lieutenant General HIROSE on board for lunch. Public relations activities in Niigata, Japan, PROVIDENCE's next port-of-call once more were the highlight as the ship presented Handclasp material to the Mayor of that city. In spite of minor communist anti-war demonstrations, the ship held luncheons for seventy business and civic leaders of the community including Vice Governor TAKEO KIMI and the Mayor of Niigata, Mr. WATANABE. The second forecastle reception of the trip was held in Niigata for 250 persons and was concluded by a Sunset Parade performed impeccably by the Marine Detachment and the SEVENTH Fleet Band. During general visiting, 4,500 people toured the ship with numerous special groups also enjoying her hospitality. The entire second half of August, PROVIDENCE provided NGFS in

the I Corps Area of South Vietnam firing 136 missions with forty four structures destroyed, eighty structures damaged, sixteen bunkers destroyed, twelve bunkers damaged and nine Viet Cong killed in action (KIA), on a total of 4,487 rounds of 5"/38 and 6"/47 projectiles expended. The ship also held fourteen UNREPS and fifty eight helicopter operations in August.

Intensive support of the Third Marines in the vicinity of Danang was the keynote for the opening of September for PROVIDENCE as she fired 940 rounds in a three day period. On 4 September, PROVIDENCE set course for Hong Kong for her second visit to that city of unequalled bargains. In transit, a talent show and barbecue on the fantail provided PROVIDENCE men with additional entertainment. In Hong Kong, luncheons were hosted for seventy business and civic leaders of the British Crown Colony while the Commanding Officer, Captain AUBREY presented the Servicemen's Guides Association with 400 cubic tons of cement to be used in the construction of their new building.

After a six-day rest and recreation visit, the ship left for Yokosuka and a well-deserved in-port period. While in her homeport, PROVIDENCE found time to regun--changing her worn rifles for new, accurate barrels. On 29 September, the ship departed for Sasebo where she arrived on 30 September. During September, the ship rearmed once, refueled once and replenished once.

The first two days of October found PROVIDENCE still in Sasebo, Japan. The ship was open to the public to tour and a wardroom luncheon for twenty was hosted on board. Personnel also participated in athletic events and enjoyed sight-seeing trips to surrounding points of interest. On 7 October, PROVIDENCE, with her new guns calibrated, once more provided support for the THIRD Marine Amphibious Forces in the vicinity of Danang. This support consisted of firing 4,617 rounds of 5"/38 and 6"/47 projectiles during 168 missions. Fifty helicopter operations were staged and twelve unreps kept PROVIDENCE fully ready for all operational commitments. On 20 October, the ship left the "gunline" for Yokosuka where she stayed for the remainder of the month. At the end of the month, PROVIDENCE crewmembers were entertained by a lively USO troupe. Rear Admiral FREEMAN, COMCRUDESPAC, and Rear Admiral KINNEY, CRUDESFLOT ELEVEN had lunch with the Commanding Officer.

The inport period of November was highlighted by the SEVENTH Fleet Change of Command ceremony. Vice Admiral William F. BRINGLE relieved Vice Admiral John J. HYLAND as Commander SEVENTH Fleet on the fantail of his flagship, USS PROVIDENCE. Approximately 350 guests attended this elaborate display, the most senior of which, Admiral ITAYA, Chief of Maritime Staff, Japanese Self Defense Force was rendered a 19-gun salute. Also in attendance was Vice Admiral KIM, Chief of Naval Operations, Republic of Korea Navy. From 15-21 November, PROVIDENCE was engaged in Special Operations (SPECOPS) in the Danang expending 1,372 rounds of ammunition. Following this period, the ship journeyed to Singapore in order that Commander SEVENTH Fleet could have discussions with Vice Admiral O'BRIEN, R. N., Commander Far Eastern Fleet. In Singapore, mutual luncheons were exchanged with gusto by officers of PROVIDENCE and HMS TERROR, the finale of which was the Flagship Reception of 200 at HMS TERROR Reserve Officer's Club. Following the ship's departure from Singapore, another honored guest--a man whom all seafaring men revere--was received on board with appropriate honors. At 1800 on 27 November, while the ship crossed

the equator at longitude 106 degrees 00 minutes East, King Neptune, the Ruler of the Deep, and his Royal Court, presided over by Davey Jones, arrived to properly initiate all "pollywogs" to the Kingdom of the Sea. Following this traditional initiation the ship departed for Yankee Station fully manned by both new and old Royal Shellbacks. During the month of November, PROVIDENCE refueled four times, rearmed twice, and replenished twice.

At the beginning of December, PROVIDENCE continued her operations in the Yankee Team Operations Area with a short trip to the North to the PIRAZ Station. Later during the month, PROVIDENCE continued her support of the THIRD Marine Amphibious Force with 1,511 rounds of 5"/38 and 6"/47 ordnance at call targets and harrassment and interdiciton (H & I) targets during ninety seven missions. Twenty-nine helo operations were conducted while nine UNREPS were performed. On 13 December, PROVIDENCE departed Yankee Station for Subic Bay, Philippine Islands where two days of recreation were scheduled for the crew, culminating in a ship's picnic at Grande Island. The ship arrived at her homeport ladened with Christmas gifts for loved ones on 20 December. During this festive Yuletide vacation, working hours were shortened and a ship's party for local orphanages was given. Santa Claus was on hand distributing presents to large-eyed children from orphanages on 22 December, and then once more to dependents on 23 December. On 29 December, nearly 1,000 crew members and dependents enjoyed the annual Christmas Party held at the Enlisted Men's Club Alliance. Floor shows, comedy skits, and two orchestras completed the holiday atmosphere, providing a suitable ending to a fruitful year for PROVIDENCE.

1967 was a great year for PROVIDENCE as she ranged throughout the Western Pacific showing the flag in fourteen different ports and made significant contribution in support of friendly forces ashore in Vietnam. During combat operations PROVIDENCE fired 19,109 rounds of 5"/38 and 6"/47 ammunition from her single 5"/38 mount and 6"/47 turret. Units supported included the FIRST and THIRD U. S. Marine Divisions and the SEVENTH Fleet Amphibious Ready Group. On many occasions it was impossible to obtain gun damage assessment, nevertheless the following known damage to the enemy was logged during 1967: Ninety seven VC/NVN KIA (BC), forty three KIA (PROB), one-hundred sixty one structures were destroyed and one-hundred seventy one were damaged, thirty nine bunkers were destroyed and twenty two were damaged, three bridges were damaged, thirteen waterborne logistic craft (WBLC) were destroyed and one was damaged, six gun implacements were destroyed and eight were damaged, twenty four caves were destroyed, two-hundred thirty meters of treeline/trenchline were destroyed and forty six secondary explosions were observed. The "Fighting Flagship" never missed a committment and is charging in to 1968 ever ready to do bigger and better things.
