#### Command History

#### U. S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Seventy-Four

U. S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion SEVENTY-FOUR was activated 28 April 1943, at the Naval Construction Training Center, Camp Perry, Williamsburg, Girginia. At that time Lieutenant Commander Fremont G. Elliott, CEC, USNR, took command of the Seabee Battalion which was soon to be highly acclaimed.

The battalion served her country well in the westward push to reclaim Japanese held islands in the South Pacific. The battalion constructed combat support facilities in such remote locations as Tarawa, Kwajalein, Okinawa and Berlin Island. For her outstanding achievements MCB-74 received the Navy Unit Commendation Medal before she was inactivated on 31 October 1945, on the island of Okinawa.

On 3 December 1966, the battalion was recommissioned at ceremonics held on board U. S. Naval Construction Battalion Center, Gulfport, Mississippi.

Commander G. W. Schley, CEC, USN, (now Cantain) took command. After a training period, the battalion deployed to Camp Haskins, South Danang, RVN in June of 1967. During this first deployment she distinguished herself by outstanding performance on such projects as constructing Ammunition Supply Point II and a massive heliport for the First Air Cavalry. The battalion returned to homeport in January 1968 for reoutfitting and retraining. In July.1968, MCB-74 commenced her second RVN deployment at Camp Shields, Chu Lai. During the early months of the deployment she received the coveted Navy "E" designating her "Best of Type" of the 14 Atlantic Fleet Seabee battalions. The battalion was also awarded the Navy Unit Commendation Medal.

On 2 October 1968, Commander Schley was relieved by Commander Joseph A. D'Emidio, CEC, USN. Under his command the battalion constructed concrete, arrons, barracks, POL facilities, hangars, ammunition supply point facilities, roads and a variety of other projects in support of the combat troops.

Three large details deployed near the DMZ to build SEA-huts and to crush rock for road ungrading. In February of 1969, the battalion again returned to Gulfport, Mississippi.

MCB-74's two Scabce teams provided technical assistance and spread good will in villages near Saigon. Team 7401 was awarded the Construction Battalions Pacific Detachment Excellence award for its accomplishments. It was micked from 14 other teams in Vietnam.

In July 1969, the battalion was derloyed to Quang Tri Combat Base only to be moved after a six-week stay.— Leaving a 220-man detail in Quang Tri to -more-

perform important road work, MCB-74 moved to Camp Hooyer Danang.

Companies were engaged in work on hospitals, ASP-1, ASP-2, cantonments, barracks, and installing utilities in several locations throughout the areq. Besides Detail Alpha in Quang Tri, several other details left the home base. Detail Echo constructed revetments at Cam Rahn Bay in record breaking time. Three detachments built catonments at Hill 37, 55 and 65. One of the biggest projects was the construction of the 730-foot Cau Do Bridge located two miels south of Danang.

Two Seabee Teams were detached from the battalion during her third Vietnam deployment. Team 7403 was located at Cau Doc, RVN, while 7404 went to Kusaie in the United States Trust Territory Islands in the Pacific.

During this deployment, the battalion received her third Navy Unit Commendation Medal for work during the devastating Hurricane Camille which struck the Mississippi Gulf Coast on 17 August 1969.

# A. Brief Chronology of Noteworthy Events

1.	1 AUG 69	Advance party of four officers and 105 enlisted	
		personnel arrived at Camp Rhodes, Quang Tri, RVN	i .

- 2. 16 AUG 69 Main body movement began from Gulfport, Mississippi to Camp Rhodes, Quang Tri.
- 3. 17 AUG 69 Hurricane Camille hit Gulfport, Mississippi, and surrounding Gulf coast. The remaining flights to Quang Tri, RVN, were delayed to assist rescue and emergency recovery operations.
- 4. 18 AUG. 69 Camp Rhodes, Quang Tri, RVN, officially turned over to NMCB SEVENTY-FOUR from NMCB ONE TWENTY-EIGHT.
- 5. 23 AUG 69 Final main body flights began from Gulfport, Mississippi, to Quang Tri, RVN.
- 6. 26 AUG 69 Came.under 122mm rocket attack at Camp Rhodes, with one round partially destroying "B" Company Shop. Second round landed approximately 50 feet behind outdoor movie area where 250 men were viewing slides of the destruction caused by Hurricane Camille. No injuries were received from this attack.
- 7. 28 AUG 69 RADM J. G. DILLON, COM3NCB, visited.
- 8. 2 SEP 69 Typhoon Doris struck Quang Tri Province with resulting damage to the combat base, Camp Rhodes included.

# B. Narrative History USNMCB-74 Fiscal Year 1970.

#### 1. COMMAND ORGANIZATION AND RELATIONS

On 3 December 1966, Naval Mobile Construction Battalion SEVENTY-FOUR was recommissioned under the command of CDR G. W. SCHLEY, CEC, USN. He was relieved by CDR J. A. D'EMIDIO, CEC, USN, on 2 October 1968.

On the first day of this history NMCB-74 was in homeport at Gulfport, Mississippi. Operational and Administrative control was with the TWENTIETH Naval Construction Regiment and Commander Naval Construction Battalions, U. S. Atlantic Fleet. During the deployment to Camp Rhodes, Quang Tri, Republic of Vietnam and to Camp Hoover, Danang, RVN Operational Control was transferred to THIRTIETH Naval Construction Regiment, THIRD Naval Construction Brigade and Commander Naval Construction Battalions, U. S. Pacific Fleet.

In July and August 1969, NMCB-74 was preparing for deployment to Camp Rhodes, Quang Tri, RVN. The main body began movement from Gulfport on 16 August 1969, but the last members were delayed due to Hurricane Camille which struck the Gulf Coast on 17 August 1969. The remaining members,

delayed in deploying for 1 week, to assist in off base rescue and restoration work. NMCB-74 was reunited by 25 August 1969 at Camp Rhodes, Quang Tri. (Chronology Item #3)

During this deployment, Battalion units were detached to several areas. Detail DELTA was sent to Danang to reconstruct Ammunition Supply Point One. A total of ninety-seven men from Delta Company made up this detail.

Detail FOXTROT, composed of 51 men was detached to assist on improve-

ments to Ammunition Supply Point Two at Danang.

Severe weather again, impacted upon NMCB-74 as Typhoon Doris struck

Quang Tri Province. (Chronology Item #8)

By 28 September 1969 the main body of NMCB-74 had redeployed to Camp Hoover, Danang, leaving the 200-man detail ALFA at Camp Rhodes, Quang Tri.

At Cam Ranh Bay, Detail ECHO constructed 7500 ft of Ammi Revetment for the Naval Air Facility from September thru November 1969.

Detail GOLF was sent to Ha Thanh Special Forces Camp to upgrade airfield facilities over a two month period commencing in February 1970.

Two Seabee Teams were deployed. One to Vietnam and one to the Trust Territory, Pacific Islands. Seabee Team 7403 deployed to Chau Phu City Vietnam with LTJG D. L. WILLAMAN, CEC, USNR as Officer-in-Charge. Seabee Team 7404, with LTJG P. F. HIMOVITZ, CEC, USNR, as Officer-inCharge, deployed to the Kusaie Island, Trust Territory, Pacific Islands.

As this fiscal year ended there were four (4) Seabee Teams in train-

As this fiscal year ended there were four (4) Seabee Teams in training. Teams 7405, 7406, with LTJG J. L. DELKER and LTJG K. L. SMITH as Officer's-in-Charge respectively. They will deploy mid-September. LTJG J. M. CULLEN is Officer-in-Charge of Seabee Team 7404 which will deploy early December. Seabee Team 7408 is lead by CMC J. H. HILBORN and is not scheduled for deployment at this time.

As of 30 June 1970, NMCB-74 had twenty-five (25) Officers and 784 enlisted personnel attached for duty. (Enclosure 4 for officers roster)

# 2. OPERATIONS AND ACTIVITIES

NMCB-74's third deployment to RVN since recommissioning, was to Camp Rhodes, Quang Tri, as established by COMCBPAC OPORD 0-69 and directed by COMCBPAC speed letter serial CB31B-055 of 5 May 1969. On verbal orders from Commander, THIRD Naval Construction Brigade, NMCB-74's main body re-deployed to Camp Hoover, Danang on 26 September 1969 and remained there for the duration of the deployment. (See enclosure 2 for deployment report)

#### a. Operational Statistics

The Deployment Completion Report, enclosure 2 annexed to this history contains facts and figures concerning statistics during deployment.

#### b. Construction Assignments

During the almost eight month deployment to Quang Tri and Danang, NMCB-74 was given a wide variety of projects mostly in support of the THIRD Marine Amphibious Force and FIRST Marine Division.

Among the most outstanding of NMCB-74's projects were the Cau Do Bridge, maintaining and upgrading of National Highway QL-1 from Dong Ha to Quang Tri, and Ammunition Supply Point #1. Annex E of the attached

Deployment Completion Report contains detailed information concerning these and the many other projects which NMCB-74 completed. The Deployment Completion Report also includes projects costs and labor statistics.

### 3. SUPPLY AND LOGISTICS

The P25A Organic Allowance was the basic supply and logistical support to the Battalion. This allowance had been processed thru the Supply Overhaul Assistance Program (SOAP) at Construction Battalion Center, Gulfport, Mississippi.

Material necessary for the construction projects was furnished by the THIRD Naval Construction Brigade, Danang, RVN. Being located in the Danang area was most helpful with materials and supplies. The Naval Support Activity and Force Logistic Command both provided excellent service.

NMCB-74 operated exchange 1026-03 which was an annex of Freedom Hill Army/Air Force Exchange.

# 4. CASUALITIES OF MEN AND EQUIPMENT

The only enemy inflicted wounds resulted when UTCN R. H. SQUIRE received minor shrapnel wounds in the back while on a detail at Hill 65. Other casualties are itemized in the deployment completion report.

# 8. COMMUNITY RELATIONS

During Hurricane Camille the immediate response of the Seabee's was one the people of Gulfport will never forget. Before and during the storm, members of NMCB-74 joined with other Seabee's and that began getting the people to safety and rendering any assistance possible. Afterwards, even though the Seabee Center was heavily damaged itself, the men went out into the different communities and began clearing roads, repairing utilities and helping the people in any way possible. Being trained in this area and having the equipment needed was a great aid to the community. Many individuals and groups wrote to thank the Seabee's for their immediate aid during the storm. Included in Annex A of the Deployment Completion Report is one such letter from the Gulf Coast Research Laboratory.

From their experience with Hurrinace Camille the Seabee's were ready and knew what to do and exactly what equipment was needed when Hurricane Celia struck. Their immediate response and their ability to go and do when they

were needed most will be long remembered by many, many people.

#### 9. CIVIC ACTION

Civic Actions programs were conducted at Quang Tri and at Danang. Many separate projects were accomplished. A summary is included in the Deployment Completion Report, Annex I.

### 10. AWARDS AND COMMENDATIONS

A letter from the President of the United States was received thanking the Seabee's for the part they played in the disaster relief after Hurricane Camille. (Annex A, pages 33 and 35)

The Navy Unit Commendation was awarded by the Honorable John H. CHAFEE for the "Exceptional Meritorious Service" that the Seabee's rendered after Hurricane Camille.

See Annex A, page 27, of the Deployment Completion Report for individual awards. This section also includes other numerous commendations from various commands.

The CHINFO Merit Award was presented to NMCB-74 for its familygram publication being one of the top four (4) fleet-wide.
