BIG 8 MOVES OUT

"Peacetime deployment and employment of Naval Construction Battalions emphasizes mobility and readiness," begins MCB Eight Operation Order 15-65, released at Davis-

ville on March 24.

"Accordingly," continues the Order, "the Battalion will move from CBC Davisville to the U. S. Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, in April 1965, for military training" late this week.

The Eighth Battalion leaves Davisville for two months in a training course composed of general military training, specialist courses, on the job training, and instruction for battalion officers and selected chief petty officers.

The advance party, under the command of LTJG Joseph L. Henley, left Davisville on April 2. A crew of 30 enlisted men, headed by Chief Jacque S. Bunting, transported a convoy of about seven vehicles to the Manine Corps Base.

The main party will leave the Davisville area this weekend by military aircraft.

Other personnel will travel to Camp Lejeune by privately owned vehicles.



When embarking on government transportation, officers and chief petty officers will carry one clothing bag, one suitease and one hand bag. Other personnel will carry one seabag and one hand bag.

LEJEUNE

Upon departure, Eighth Battalion Seabees will wear the green uniform with bloused trousers, foul weather jacket, and soft hat. The field marching pack will be carried, with the combat helmet (green cover out) attached to the entrenching tool.

Scaboes driving their private vehicles to the Marine Corps camp will leave Thursty in the uniform of the day or in civilian clothing. Uniform gear and field marching pack will be transported with the traveller. A property pass will be necessary for the field pack.

The operation order for the Camp Lejeune deployment requires a minimum uniform outfit.

The outfit consists of: four sets of green uniforms; one set of dress blues; two locks; six sets of underwear; one foul weather jacket; two pairs of field boots; appropriate civilian clothing; and required toilet articles. "Other uniform items," says the operation order, "are optional except that dungarees may not be carried."

A personnel inspection in Service Dress Blue uniform will be held at the camp on

or about May 28.

While the battalion undergoes training at Camp Lejeune, a group of three cchief petty officers and 22 mon, will remain at Davisville to perform the various services

required by MCB Eight.

This rear echelon will handle planning and estimating chores, maintain security of battalion spaces, and provide personnel services among their other assignments. The group will be headed by senior chief Frank R. Nagel, under the operational con-

trol of the Commander, Construction Battalions, Atlantic Fleet.

By Sunday, April 11, the entire battalion should be in Camp Lejeune. The advance party will have completed billeting and messing arrangements and the Eighth Battalion Scabees will probably begin the first of eight weeks in training on Monday, April 12.

MCB Eight commissarymen attending the field messing and cooking school at Montford Point were the hosts last Wednesday when the Commanding Officer and his party were invited for the noon meal.

The Eighth Seabees' chefs were in the field during the third week of the month-long school. CSl J. V. Cesarski, heading a group of five commissarymen and one steward, invited LCDR J. P. 



ARMED FORCES DAY by Mike Swanson

Last Saturday, Armed Forces Day, I wandered over to the New River Air Facility to see the exhibits and demonstrations put up by the quad-command of the Camp Lejeune Marine Corps Base.

when I got there, I found our own LTJG H. L. Merry and BUI Sid Rosensweig explaining a 106mm recoilless rifle, mounted on a jeep, to a group of visitors. The Seabee exhibit was one of about ten Marine Corps displays in Hangar 840. I was going to ask Rosy how many visitors had seen our display when I was interrupted by an explosion on the airstrip.

Trying to compare this with news photographs of action in Viet Nam, I felt momentarily helpless in the face of progress.

Taking one last look at the bottled rattlesnake, I walked out of the hangar into the sun and headed home.
