KEY FACTS

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COLLEGE KEY DATES

- ♦ 1849 Bedford College founded by Elizabeth Jesser Reid as the first college in Britain to make provision for the university education of women
- ♦ 1886 Royal Holloway founded by Victorian entrepreneur, Thomas Holloway, a patent medicine manufacturer, as one of the first colleges for the higher education of bright young women. Queen Victoria presides over the grand opening ceremony
- ◆ **1887** The first 28 students arrive in October
- ◆ 1900 Royal Holloway becomes part of the University of London enabling the award of degrees to women
- ♦ 1965 Royal Holloway begins to admit male undergraduates
- ◆ 1985 Royal Holloway College merges with Bedford College* and they relocate to the Royal Holloway campus

COLLEGE SIZE (PHYSICAL) & LOCATION

- ♦ College campus set in **135 acres** of parkland at Egham, Surrey.
- ♦ We are located **19 miles from London** and **7 miles from Heathrow** Airport.
- ♦ The College also has a central London base in Bedford Square

RELATIONSHIP TO UNIVERSITY OF LONDON

- Royal Holloway is one of the four largest multi-faculty colleges of the University of London*
 - The 'University of London' is a federal university comprising over 60 schools, colleges and specialist institutions which together form the largest university in England
- Membership enables our students to take advantage of UoL libraries and resources, intercollegiate teaching, ULU (Students' Union) and the UoL Careers Group, the largest careers service in Europe
- Royal Holloway also runs several Distance Learning Degrees via the University of London External Programme

1994 GROUP MEMBERSHIP

Royal Holloway is a member of the 19-strong 1994 Group so called because in 1994 they decided to form a group to promote small-medium sized research-intensive universities, to distinguish themselves from the Russell Group of large research-intensive universities also formed in 1994.

STUDENTS (STATISTICS)

- Royal Holloway has 7,345 FTE students from 120 countries in the Faculties of Science, Arts, and History & Social Sciences. (this figure is from 1st December 2006 count)
- ♦ Student numbers reflect an average annual increase of 6.4% over the last 5 year period
- Of Royal Holloway current student numbers, over 1571 are postgraduates on a variety of taught and research degrees
- Of Royal Holloway current student number approximately 1586 are international students. In additional there are 823 EU students, making a total of non-UK students of 2409 (33% of total population)
- Student growth to 8,600 has been incorporated in the College's five-year plan.
- ◆ There are currently 2326 student rooms in College halls of residences (and a further 400 rented rooms belonging to Brunel)
- ◆ The College has invested significantly to keep pace with its continued growth. Two new innovatively-designed Halls of Residence named 'Gowar' and 'Wedderburn' after past Principals were opened in 2004 to replace halls built in the 1960s. They accommodate 567 students
- Set to be completed in 2007 is year-round guest accommodation, offering over 22 suites ranging from standard to executive. In addition, more en-suite accommodation is being built to replace old halls of residence. The new accommodation will be a similar design to the Gowar and Wedderburn halls and will provide over 450 rooms for conferences in student vacations
- Students who firmly accept a conditional or unconditional offer of a place at Royal Holloway by the UCAS deadline of 31st May are prioritised for a place in a hall of residence for their first year
- ◆ International students may reside in College accommodation for three or four years. A proportion of final year undergraduates also live in Halls.

DEPARTMENTS & STAFF (STATISTICS)

♦ There are 18 Academic Departments and 1388 members of staff, including 534 Academic teaching staff (Academics and other related staff) plus a further 132 Research staff.

♦ The College is one of the largest employers in the borough and 42% of our staff live within 10 miles of the campus.

RESEARCH ASSESSMENT EXERCISE PERFORMANCE

- ♦ Royal Holloway was one of only ten university institutions across the country whose departments all earned top three ratings for research with scores of 4,5 and 5* in the most recent (2001) Research Assessment Exercise
- ♦ French, Geography, German and Music all received the top score, 5*, denoting world class research and all Science Faculty departments were awarded a 5 or 5*

Top 10 for Research

The results of the most recent **Research Assessment Exercise** (RAE, 2001) placed Royal Holloway 9th in an elite group of ten university institutions whose departments all earned the top three ratings for research, with scores of 4, 5 and 5*. <u>See RAE</u>

Student Satisfaction

The College was ranked in the top 5 for Student satisfaction in the first National Student Survey (2005). Unfortunately along with a number of other high profile institutions (Oxford, Cambridge, LSE etc) the College was not included in the 2006 survey based on the number of questionnaires completed.

INNOVATIVE RESEARCH

- Important advances in development of genetic vaccines with implications for treatment of HIV and in molecular cell biology for treatment of breast cancer
- Development of a DNA 'patch' to modify the faulty genetic code which causes muscular dystrophy
- Investigating the impact leadership and management can have in the area of health care, especially in regard to patient care.

- Pioneering research relating to hybrid metallic nanostructures
- ♦ International collaboration on the ATLAS project development of a particle detector installed at the Large Hadron Collider, an underground accelerator ring with 27 kilometres circumference, at CERN, Geneva.
- ♦ Lifespan Research investigating social and psychological factors influencing mental health
- Training and consultancy to industry and government for smart cards and other security applications
- Biodiversity conservation projects funded by the Darwin Initiative to improve sustainable development in South America and East Asia
- ♦ GM technology research in food crops to combat cancer and heart disease
- CHARM (Centre for the History and Analysis of Recorded Music) to promote the study of music as performance through recordings
- Development of machine learning theory, providing applications for the health sector and industry
- Groundbreaking discoveries dating human occupation of Britain back as far as 700,000 years

WIDENING PARTICIPATION

Royal Holloway encourages applications of all social, educational and ethnic backgrounds. The College is an active member of initiatives promoting fair access to academic opportunities for all, including Aimhigher and a number of compact schemes.

The College offers an exceptional range of bursaries worth up to £4,000 per year for well-qualified candidates applying for undergraduate study, together with an innovative Masters Scholarship scheme designed to alleviate debt for students who wish to progress to a taught Masters degree. Full details of these are provided in our Prospectuses and on the College website.

UK ACADEMIC ALLIANCES

- ◆ A £4 million unique alliance between St George's, University of London, Kingston University and Royal Holloway, University of London, offering new opportunities in biological and biomedical sciences, leadership and management education for health professionals and inter-professional practice and learning. The consortium will create a shared, highly advanced, electronic learning environment and communications network for students and staff across the three partners. These initiatives will support the growing need for a diverse and flexible workforce within the NHS and the public sector.
- ♦ Royal Holloway has strong alliances in the UK with the Royal College of Music; we jointly partner the University of London Institute, Paris with Queen Mary, University of London and have research links with the British Library and the V&A Museum.

The John Adams Institute for Accelerator Science is jointly hosted by the Physics Departments of the University of Oxford and Royal Holloway. It is a Centre of Excellence in the UK for advanced and novel accelerator technology, providing expertise, research, development and training in accelerator techniques, and promoting advanced accelerator applications in science and society.

INTERNATIONAL ACADEMIC LINKS

- Royal Holloway has forged many successful international collaborations, entering into formal agreements with Yale, New York University, University of Alberta, Hong Kong University, University of Korea and Tokyo's Keio and Waseda Universities to name but a few. These international partnerships will enable us to develop teaching programmes, student exchanges, research projects and business and enterprise initiatives.
- We have well over 50 agreements at the moment covering Socrates, Study Abroad, exchange and wider agreements. These include: Ritsumeikan University, Kyoto; Renmin University, Beijing; University of Sydney; University of Melbourne; University of Queensland; Arizona State University; National University of Singapore and Moscow State University.

UK ENTREPRENEURIAL ALLIANCES

◆ The College is also actively developing new partnerships with businesses in the hi-tech Thames Valley belt and Surrey region. As part of the Surrey Enterprise Hub, we channel research and consultancy directly from academics to industry; and we have received funding for the knowledge transfer agency, 'West Focus'. With seven institutions involved, this represents the largest university consortium of its kind in the UK. The College jointly established LCACE – the London Centre for Arts and Cultural Enterprise, a knowledge transfer agency for London's arts and cultural industries.

CONFERENCE & BANQUETING

- Royal Holloway provides an excellent conference and banqueting venue offering modern facilities in an historic setting
- ◆ The new Windsor Building (completed in September 2006) has an auditorium seating 400 and eight large seminar rooms. A short walk away is the large catering Hub which has a café bar, retail outlet and a servery area. To complement these conference facilities are the en-suite Gowar and Wedderburn Halls completed in 2004 to a very high standard.
- ♦ We cater for banquets, conferences during college vacations, training courses, wedding services and receptions

PICTURE GALLERY

♦ The Picture Gallery at Royal Holloway contains a **unique collection of 75 famous paintings** which give an insight into Victorian representation of contemporary life, exploration and romanticised mythology. Artists include: David Roberts, Millais, Frith, Fildes, Long, Landseer and Leader

The value of the collection is over £16.6 million

Between 1993 and 1995 a Turner, Constable and Gainsborough were sold (for a combined total of £21million) to establish a large capital fund to generate income to maintain the original Founder's Building and paintings

CHAPEL

The **College Chapel** was the last part of the College to be completed in 1886. The barrel-vaulted plaster ceiling on either side of the Chapel contains fine reliefs by Italian sculptor, Fucigina. Its ceiling was restored in 2000.

FAITH

- Royal Holloway has formed a Faiths Council. Seeking to link itself to all the mainstream faith groups, this body seeks to ensure that each faith has a voice at the College and to sponsor additional interfaith events to encourage dialogue and debate between the faiths.
- The Chapel is multi-denominational and is used during term time for Sunday services and morning prayers (Mon-Sat)
- ◆ The College also has a **Muslim Prayer Room** on campus and is working towards increasing these facilities with the local community.

THE CAMPUS (NATURAL ENVIRONMENT)

◆ The College occupies a campus set in 135 acres of parkland. There are many areas of woodland and open spaces – home to a variety of bird, animal and plant life – so our biologists, geographers and geologists have fieldwork opportunities in our own grounds

There are **over 200 species and varieties of shrubs** and **150 different trees**. The laurels, hollies and exotic conifers in parts of the grounds are remnants of Victorian plantings.

DEVELOPMENT PLANS

The College has invested £100 million in the estate during the period 2002-08. The main thrust of the Estate Development Strategy is to upgrade our facilities to meet current and future needs, without compromising the campus' existing character.

The recently completed **Windsor Building** is the College's largest investment in a general purpose building on the campus since the Founder's Building, completed 120 years ago. It provides the latest state-of-the-art teaching facilities for students and flexible space for conferences.

A number of major projects are underway:

School of Management Extension – Phase 1

The extension to the School of Management is conceived in two phases: the first to be undertaken now and the second at a later date. This proposal runs in line with School's anticipated further expansion and development and will accommodate a potential increase in general academic stock.

New Halls of Residence

Student accommodation on the Athlone, Cameron and Williamson site is currently being upgraded with a new 466 en-suite bedroom development, Butler, Tuke and Williamson Hall, built to the same specification as the recently completed Gowar and Wedderburn. The new residence will provide high-quality student accommodation that is also marketable during vacations. As part of this project the 'Athlone Turret' is being converted into high quality ensuite guest accommodation.

• Bourne Laboratories upgrade

This project will ensure the sustainability of the work of the School of Biological Sciences. The upgrade includes modernisation of the building's essential services, works demanded by changes in statute or regulation/guidance and the provision of comfort cooling.

New catering Hub

Athlone's existing kitchen and dining facilities have undergone complete refurbishment, to construct a restaurant to seat a minimum of 400 people, a café bar, retail outlet and a servery area.

Boilerhouse Renovation

Renovations include the provision of dressing rooms, general improvements and essential facilities for use as a drama and creative arts space, to meet the requirements for a public performance licence.

• Runnymede 1 Refurbishment

This was a substantial project, involving the refurbishment and/or replacement of fixtures and fittings in bedrooms, bathrooms and kitchens, to maintain the quality of the accommodation.

Huntersdale Upgrade

This enabled the premises to meet future space requirements.

Other projects have been identified as priorities:

Library Extension

An extension to the Bedford Library is planned, subject to the success of the fundraising campaign, which will rationalise the library provision and enhance our core learning provision and pedagogic support.

• Students' Union and Sports Facilities

The extension of these facilities will be necessary to accommodate future increases in student numbers.
