# SPECIAL FORCES IN THE WAR OF IDEAS

With the founding of the Center for Security Policy in 1988, a unique organization began performing a unique mission. Then, as now, the objective was to secure our country in the face of implacable foes and all-too-widespread confusion about their ominous intentions and capabilities.

Today, even more than two decades ago, we find ourselves in a life-and-death struggle with a totalitarian ideology bent on the destruction of freedom in this country and around the globe. We call it Islamofascism. Its explicit agenda is to compel Muslims and non-Muslims the world over to submit to an international theocracy under a repressive Taliban-style religious code known as Shari'a.

Unfortunately, the Islamofascists are made far more formidable and dangerous by the help they receive from statesponsors – both those who embrace their Islamist ideology (like Saudi Arabia and Iran) and by others who do not (notably, Vladimir Putin's Russia, Communist China and Hugo Chavez's Venezuela).


Ronald Reagan understood that totalitarian ideological movements have to be fought and defeated on many fronts – including the strategic, military and economic ones. Perhaps his most important insight, however, was the

necessity of waging and winning a war of ideas. Today's enemies compel us to wage such an ideological struggle with at least as much skill, discipline and tenacity as President Reagan employed to prevail in the Cold War.

The job of the Center for Security Policy is to help our government, countrymen and other freedom-loving nations conceptualize, conduct and succeed on this front of the current War for the Free World. In fact, as the following pages demonstrate, the Center's dedicated staff, associates and advisors constitute the *Special Forces* in this war of ideas – equipped with the experience, imagination, expertise, agility and drive not just to advance strategies for victory, but to get them adopted and implemented.

In particular, we devise and encourage the adoption of strategies for addressing regional and global challenges – including innovative and often pathbreaking initiatives employing energy security measures, economic and financial instruments, political warfare and statecraft, as well as, where necessary, the effective use of force.

We advocate "transformation" in offensive and defensive military capabilities – especially those required for power projection and defense of our

homeland – to meet the needs not only of today's military, but that of tomorrow, as well.


We work to preserve a critical ingredient of America's security – its sovereignty – by providing "second opinions" on defective treaties and international judicial rulings and by challenging institutions like the United Nations that frequently undermine, rather than enhance, the interests of the Free World.

We provide "quality assurance" on presidential and congressional policies, initiatives and personnel by fostering debates and informing decision makers.

Like the real Special Forces, we use "force multipliers" to increase the Center's impact in these and other areas.

# These include:

- Drawing on teams of experts from the national security, military and academic communities.
- Creating, mobilizing and leading coalitions to promote Centersponsored initiatives.
- Providing world-class, real-time commentary via the Center's extraordinary presence in the media (television, radio, print and Internet) at all levels – local, national and international.
- Identifying, recruiting and training talented **young people** to serve as the national security policy practitioners of the future.




# MAKING A DIFFERENCE

We take pride in the *tangible impact* these efforts are having in the War for the Free World. For example:

- We were instrumental in creating and informing the opposition that led to the termination of two attempted foreign government acquisitions of strategically sensitive U.S. assets. The Center was cited by Bloomberg News as "single-handedly" stopping Communist China's purchase in 2005 of oil giant Unocal. Shortly after the Center provided congressional testimony in opposition to the United Arab Emirates' bid to manage operations in some twenty-two American ports, the deal collapsed.
- The Center-sponsored Coalition for Security Liberty and the Law played a decisive role in securing congressional approval for renewal of the Patriot Act (see page 12)

- The Center's Energy Security Initiative was a critical catalyst to the "Set America Free Coalition" and to securing Presidential and bipartisan Congressional support for its key policy and technology recommendations.
- Our DivestTerror.org campaign helped stimulate action on the part of authorities in New York City, Louisiana, Missouri, Illinois and New Jersey concerned that their respective public pension funds were invested in companies doing business with one or more state sponsors of terror.
- The Terrorism Awareness Program of the Center's Islamist Project has provided briefings for over 300 CIA, FBI and local law enforcement personnel. These briefings offer analysis and tools

- needed to "connect the dots" about the myriad manifestations of Islamofascist operations in America including: the take-over of some eighty percent of the Nation's mosques by Saudi-funded financial and ideological organizations; the penetration by Wahhabi clerics of the U.S. prison system and military chaplain corps; and Islamist recruitment on college campuses and influence operations in Washington, D.C.
- We helped to put on the political map the issue of stealthy U.N. attempts to impose international taxes on American citizens, leading to the introduction of bicameral legislation aimed at blocking such egregious infringements on U.S. sovereignty and the major new step they would constitute towards supranational government.

# THE CENTER'S WORK PROGRAM

The Center addresses the most important security challenges of our time with a focus on developing practical solutions and seeking their adoption. We do so through eight projects and by our 'Special Forces' approach to addressing 'targets of opportunity.' These efforts are undertaken with imagination, tenacity and all the resources – intellectual (both those of the core staff and our 'force-multipliers'), financial and media – at our disposal.

# THE ISLAMIST PROJECT

"Today, an intolerant and violent extremist political ideology known as Islamofacism has taken hold throughout Muslim communities in France and much of Western Europe. Moreover, this fast-spreading strain is on its way to becoming the dominant face of Islam in the EU. It is profoundly anti-Western,...and marked by wholesale rejection of such fundamental European values as democracy, secularism, separation of church and state, human rights and modernity."

The Center has been concerned with the rising threat of Islamofascism for years before the 9/11 attacks made evident the danger it poses. Through the various programs and initiatives of the Islamist Project, we explore the sources and manifestations of this ideology and promote political warfare, economic and financial and other techniques for countering them.

In particular, the Center is working with our natural allies in this struggle – non-Islamist Muslims, who are as much at risk from the Islamofascists as are non-Muslims. In 2006, we launched "Muslims Speak Out" – an international outreach program designed to provide a public forum in the United States and overseas for calling attention to and empowering adherents to Islam who reject the repressive, totalitarian

ideology of the I s l a m i s t s. Launched with a conference in Paris on March

1 3th that was co-sponsored by France's *Institute pour la Defense de Democratie*, this initiative will feature monthly events and a web site devoted to promoting the views and activities of anti-Islamist Muslims.



### **ENERGY SECURITY PROJECT**

"The Center for Security Policy was among a coalition of right-leaning organizations that released an energy plan this year promoting plug-ins as one way to increase fuel efficiency in light of the instability of the Middle East. 'If you're thinking about this as an environmental issue first and foremost, you're missing the point,' Mr. Gaffney said. Curbing dependence on foreign oil, he added, 'is a national security emergency.'"

There is a "perfect storm" of national security, energy, economic and environmental conditions that compel the United States to begin immediately reducing its dependence upon unstable and hostile *foreign* sources of energy and cutting their cash flow. The Center is a driving force behind the "Set America Free" blueprint that would transform the transportation sector via diversified,

indigenously produced alternative fuels as well as the cars and trucks that can use them. The project also aims to reduce revenues and dual-use equipment and technology used by oil-producing terrorist-sponsoring states to support attacks on the U.S. and curb the access of such governments to the Western investment, equipment, technology and financing they enjoy today.

# THE CENTER'S WORK PROGRAM

# HOMELAND SECURITY PROJECT

The Center is contributing to the security of the American homeland and population in four areas:

- warning of and preparing our critical infrastructure against electromagnetic pulse (EMP) attack;
- ensuring that U.S. law enforcement and intelligence authorities are equipped with the knowledge (the focus of our Policing Terrorism Program, conducted in collaboration with the Manhattan Institute) and the tools needed to protect us, such as those provided by the Patriot Act (see page 12);
- promoting crisis simulation training for state and local officials needed to avoid on-the-job training in case of terrorist attacks or other emergencies; and
- protecting our borders and advancing security-minded immigration reform.

The Center also seeks to recognize and support "Heroes of the Homefront" – individuals and organizations that are making real contributions to the war effort here at home. (see page 23).

### **DEFENSE TRANSFORMATION PROJECT**

The Center champions U.S. exploitation of critical technologies to ensure America always enjoys the



military advantages that deter aggression – and assure victory if deterrence fails. This project focuses on understanding the nature of technologies

that are truly decisive and transformational and effectively advocating for their development and utilization by the United States, and keeping them out of the hands of foreign foes and competitors. The project supports policies, programs and the budgets necessary to provide enhanced global power-projection and defensive capabilities.

### **DIVESTTERROR.ORG**

"It just doesn't make sense for our trust fund money, taxpayer money, to be invested in companies that do business with countries that engage in terrorist activities against the United States-the terrorists who are fighting and killing our own sons, daughters, friends, and family members, fighting to undermine the very foundation upon which this country was founded and is based."

In 2004, the Center launched a campaign to deny state sponsors of terror the immense resources currently being provided – unwittingly – to them by Americans who invest in publicly traded corporations that do business with Iran, Libya, North Korea, Syria and Sudan. By

drawing on the lessons of the successful divestment campaign of the 1980s against apartheid South Africa, the Center is raising public awareness about the leverage American institutional and individual investors could bring to bear as part of the War for the Free World.

#### DEMOCRACY AND SECURITY IN ASIA PROJECT

"China National Overseas Oil Company Ltd. [shares] fell after Frank Gaffney, President of the Center for Security Policy, told the U.S. Congress that CNOOC's \$18.5 billion bid for Unocal Corp. is an 'ominous' move by China to dominate energy resources for the benefit of its economy and military."

Communist China poses a threat to both freedom and stability across Asia – and beyond – as it seeks to dominate strategic choke points, energy resources and other minerals, materials and technologies. This project seeks to call attention to and contend with China's ever-more-aggressive regional and global ambitions. The Center is working with the U.S.-China Economic

and Security Review Commission, Congress and others to develop strategies for countering the growing Chinese threat. This project also sheds light on and promotes policies to counter North Korea's threatening behavior and reinvigorate ties to the region's democratic countries – including notably, Japan, India, Australia and Taiwan.

# THE CENTER'S WORK PROGRAM

#### **HEMISPHERIC SECURITY PROJECT**

The Western hemisphere is fast becoming a major new front in the War for the Free World, thanks to a rising tide of radical leftist and anti-U.S. regimes in much of Latin America. In fact, Latin America is awash with increasingly serious challenges to this country's security, economy and society and to our vital interests in the region. These include: the resuscitation of Fidel Castro's dictatorship and his agenda for destabilizing democracies, possible by the oil wealth of the evermore-authoritarian Venezuelan regime of Hugo Chavez; the presence of Hezbollah and other terror networks in the "tri-border" region of Paraguay, Argentina and Brazil; the pro-Western

Colombian government's mounting troubles with its neighbors and their support of narco-terrorist guerillas.

Washington has, for too long, neglected this vital region, contributing to the emerging instability there and facilitating its penetration by Chinese and Islamist entities. The Center is helping to identify these threats and to provide ideas for defeating them.

# **U.S. SOVEREIGNTY PROJECT**

International organizations, treaties and tribunals have been increasingly employed as a means of diminishing and/or circumscribing U.S. sovereignty and our government's freedom to exercise it. The Center is defining the menace posed by such "asymmetric weapons" and leading coalition efforts to challenge and counteract their use at the expense of American security and interests.



The Center organized a press conference opposing the Law of the Sea Treaty in February of 2005 featuring Senator James Inhofe of Oklahoma and 20 public policy organizations.

# **'TARGETS OF OPPORTUNITY'**

In addition to the standing projects described on these pages, the Center's Special Forces also routinely tackle issues that require timely attention and competent action. Recent examples of this distinctive facet of the Center's work program include:

- Highlighting the success of and need for sea-based missile defenses and urging their immediate and widespread deployment;
- Providing congressional testimony on such subjects as shortfalls in the 2006 defense and homeland security budgets and controversial foreign investments involving Unocal and U.S. port facilities;
- Warning of the adverse strategic implications for the US and Israel of the latter's surrender of territory to Islamofacist terrorists;
- Addressing the fatal defects of the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty on the eve of its Review Conference; and
- Raising an alarm about the draft European Constitution's implications for U.S.-European ties.



# PRESERVING THE PATRIOT ACT

The Center Special Forces' ability to create, mobilize and lead like-minded individuals and groups was much in evidence in the success of its Coalition for Security, Liberty & the Law (CSLL) in educating the public and Members of Congress about the need for reenactment of the Patriot Act. This legislation provides vital tools to the law enforcement and intelligence communities. Ever since its enactment shortly after 9/11, however, the Act has been subjected to vicious, and often wholly disingenuous, assaults by critics of various political stripes and agendas.


Pressure from such quarters resulted in the filibuster in December 2005 of a bill needed to reenact provisions slated to "sunset" at the end of that year. With political cover provided by four of their Republican colleagues, Senate Democrats twice succeeded in blocking action on that legislation, prompting Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid famously to declare that, "We killed the Patriot Act."

With characteristic skill and effectiveness, this Center-sponsored coalition engaged at several points and in various ways to help preserve the Patriot Act. These included:

• Circulating three Open Letters to the congressional leadership in September 2004, December 2005 and January 2006 signed by dozens of leading legal authorities and security policy practitioners urging the reenactment of the Patriot Act. Among the letters' influential signatories were: former Attorneys General Edwin Meese, Richard Thornburgh, William Barr and John Ashcroft, former National Security Advisor William P. Clark, former Secretaries of Defense Caspar Weinberger and James Schlesinger, former Deputy Attorney General George Terwilliger, former Solicitors General Judge Robert Bork and Theodore B. Olson, former CIA Director R. James Woolsey, and former U.S. Representative to the United Nations Jeanne Kirkpatrick.

- Collaborating with former Attorneys General Meese and Thornburgh in a press conference at the National Press Club on January 25 aimed at explaining the urgent need to preserve the Act's threatened provisions and at correcting the many serious distortions of those provisions and their practical effects.
- Participating in separate strategy sessions on the Patriot Act and related

- national security issues with President George W. Bush and Attorney General Alberto Gonzalez.
- Sponsoring a television issue-advertising campaign featuring Debra Burlingame, sister of Capt. Charles "Chic" Burlingame, the American Airlines pilot of Flight 77 which was hijacked and then crashed into the Pentagon on September 11, 2001. The ads ran in the Washington market on February 2, 2006 during Fox's hit program, "24," and thereafter in markets in New Hampshire, Nebraska, Idaho and Alaska. Less than a week after the Coalition's ads began airing, the four Republican Senators who had joined the filibuster in December -John Sununu (NH), Chuck Hagel (NE), Larry Craig (ID) and Lisa Murkowski (AK) - reached an agreement with the White House clearing the way for reenactment.

We are proud to have as honorary cochairs of the NSAC Senator Jon Kyl, Republican of Arizona, and R. James Woolsey, a former Director of Central Intelligence under President Clinton leaders of extraordinary vision and courage in the War for the Free World. Former National Security Advisor to the President William P. Clark is the NSAC's honorary chairman emeritus.

Members of the National Security Advisory Council include many of America's most capable and accomplished national security practitioners (see pages 26-27). We take special pride in the fact that, as noted in the list on page 26, a number of them continue to serve the country with distinction and are, therefore, on leave from the Council for the duration of their time in government.

# MILITARY COMMITTEE

Among the Center's most important functions is its ability rapidly to provide informed and reliable information about the various emerging, dynamic and diverse threats to U.S. national security and interests—and the means by which they can most safely and effectively be addressed. An invaluable resource in this regard is the vast experience and expertise of the Center's Military Committee.

Founded in 1999 under the chairmanship of former Commandant of the Marine Corps Gen. Carl E. Mundy, Jr., the Military Committee assists the Center in engaging the military com-

munity, and those attentive to its views, as catalysts for renewing America's defense capabilities and adopting effective peace-through-strength policies to guide their use. The Committee's current chairman is Major General Paul Vallely, whose contributions to the national security have continued since his retirement from a distinguished military career not only through his leadership at the Center but also via his role as a prominent Fox News Military Analyst and co-author (with another Committee member, Lieutenant General Thomas McInerney) of the bestselling book, Endgame: The Blueprint for Victory in the War on Terror.

# 2004 GENERAL PETER PACE AND THE DEFENDERS OF FREEDOM



In October 2004, the Center paid tribute to the Defenders of Freedom - namely, the men and women of the U.S. armed services (active duty and reserve); officials of the executive, legislative and judiciary branches; those responsible for the security of our borders and homeland; the first responders; the law enforcement community; intelligence personnel; our allies; and industrial base. Debra Burlingame, sister of Capt. Charles F. "Chic" Burlingame who was the pilot of American Airlines Flight 77, the plane that was crashed into the Pentagon by terrorists on September 11, 2001. # IN MEMORIAM

### **CASPAR W. WEINBERGER**

On 28 March with the passing of former Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger, the Nation lost one of its most accomplished public servants and skilled practitioners of



the philosophy of "peace through strength." The Center for Security Policy, which recognized Secretary Weinberger's tremendous contribution to America's security by bestowing upon him its first "Keeper of the Flame" Award in 1990, mourns his loss at a time when his clarity of vision, steadfastness of purpose and tenacious commitment to principle are needed more than ever.

A decorated combat veteran of World War II and graduate magna cum laude of Harvard College and Harvard Law School, Mr. Weinberger went on to serve as Chairman of the Federal Trade Commission, Director of the Office of Management and Budget, and Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare.

It was as President Ronald Reagan's Secretary of Defense from 1981 to 1987, however, that "Cap" Weinberger made his most notable contributions to the Nation's well-being, with his leadership - indeed, with his personification - of the Reagan effort to rebuild America's military and to assume once again for the United States



the role of leader of the Free World. Undoubtedly, history will recognize that his stewardship in the modernization and strengthening of America's armed forces was indispens-able to the success of the Reagan strategy for destroying the Soviet Union and for

promoting freedom in every corner of the world.

The Weinberger legacy has been tangibly evident in another area, as well: America's extraordinary successes on the battlefield over the past two decades have been a direct result of the reinvestment in our forces and their hardware undertaken on Cap's watch. Had it not been for his determined advocacy and competent oversight, we may have been less able to draw upon the mainstays of our military power today and tomorrow - from the M-I main battle tank to the Bradley Fighting Vehicle to the B-1 and B-2 bombers to the V-22 tiltrotor to the Trident submarines to the Global Positioning Satellite system - to project power flexibly, precisely and decisively.

Secretary Weinberger will also be remembered for the seminal role he played in shifting the national paradigm from one of deliberate vulnerability to ballistic missile attack to one in which anti-missile defenses are part of a comprehensive homeland security posture. Thanks in no small measure to the groundwork laid by President Reagan and his cherished friend and loyal defense secretary, President George W. Bush recognized the need to deploy missile defenses and took the steps necessary to accomplish that goal. Most important of these was his decision to withdraw from the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty, an action Mr. Weinberger championed with characteristic vision, eloquence and tenacity for the better part of two decades, both in and out of government.

The Center for Security Policy mourns as well the loss this year of another key member of President Reagan's team, Lynn Nofzinger. It joins with all the other members of that community in extending to his family and that of Secretary Weinberger our deepest condolences and profound thanks.

### **MARGO D.B. CARLISLE**


On the same day Secretary Weinberger passed away, the Center for Security Policy lost one of the longest-serving members of its Board of Directors and a dear friend—and the Nation lost one of its most accomplished public servants: Margo D.B. Carlisle. While Mrs. Carlisle's lengthy career in Washington involved positions of great responsibility, they were largely out of the public eye. Throughout, she wielded enormous influence and contributed greatly to the commonweal, most especially in the security policy portfolio.

Particularly noteworthy was Mrs. Carlisle's role in various staff capacities in the United States Senate. These included: her tenure as Executive Director of the Senate Steering Committee under its then-Chairman, Senator James McClure, and as Director of the Senate Republican Conference and Chief of Staff to Senator Thad Cochran. She also served in numerous non-profit capacities, including as Executive Director of the Council for National Policy and as Vice President of Government Relations at the Heritage Foundation.

Margo also distinguished herself as a senior official in President Reagan's administration. She was the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Legislative Affairs under then-Secretary of Defense Weinberger. Like her boss, Mrs. Carlisle played an instrumental role in translating President Reagan's philosophy of "peace through strength" into the revitalization of America's armed forces and the destruction of the Soviet Union. She will be sorely missed.

# WAR FOOTING

Over the past seventeen years, the Center for Security Policy has produced literally thousands of Decision Briefs, papers, columns, op.eds. and longer articles on innumerable topics of importance to the defense of freedom, both in this country and around the world. Valuable as these timely contributions to the debate have been, until now, this enormous intellectual output has not been distilled into a coherent, book-length agenda for American policy.



With the publication in November 2005 of War Footing: Ten Steps America Must Take to Prevail in the War for the Free World, the Center and its associates have now offered such a program. The Center's President, Frank J. Gaffney, Jr., lead-authored the book with contributions from nearly three-dozen of our country's most thoughtful security policy practitioners.

War Footing offers a comprehensive assessment of today's international environment and the forces that will shape that of tomorrow. It explains the complex array of threats emerging in the course of this War for the Free World – first and foremost from Islamofascists and their state-sponsors, but increasingly from other regimes around the world who share the Islamist totalitarians' enmity for freedom, if not their ideology.

War Footing then lays out ten specific steps that Americans – as individuals, as communities and as constituents – can take to ensure our way of life and the safety and well-being of our children and grandchildren. These steps include specific recommen-dations about how to:

- Know the enemy
- Really support our troops
- Provide for our energy security
- Stop investing in terror

- Equip the country for war at home
- Counter the mega-threat: an electromagnetic pulse attack
- Secure our borders and interior against illegal immigration
- Wage political warfare
- Launch regional initiatives
- Wield effective diplomacy

Among the many distinguished contributors to War Footing are a number closely associated with the Center: the Honorary Co-chairman of our National Security Advisory Council, former CIA Director R.
