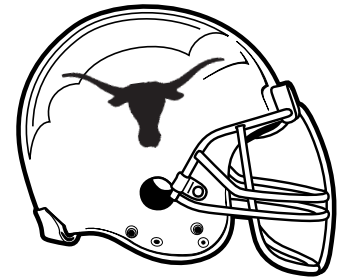

## 96TH ANNUAL SOUTHWESTERN BELL RED RIVER SHOOTOUT

**RANKINGS:** Texas remained at No. 5 in this week's *Associated Press* Poll and *USA Today/ESPN* Coaches Poll. UT has been ranked among the *USA Today/ESPN* Top 25 for 38 straight weeks. The Horns have been ranked among the nation's top five for six straight weeks — their longest streak among *The AP* top five since UT earned a top five billing for eight consecutive weeks in 1984.

**TELEVISION:** The Red River Shootout will be broadcast regionally on ABC Sports. Brent Musburger (play-by-play), Gary Danielson (color) and Jack Arute (sideline) will call the action.

**GAME DAY:** ESPN's Game Day show with hosts Chris Fowler, Kirk Herbstreit and Lee Corso will broadcast live from the Cotton Bowl on Friday and Saturday. It marks the second time the Game Day set has been on hand for a Longhorn game and its first appearance at the annual Red River Shootout.

**RADIO:** The game will be broadcast nationally on Westwood One Radio. Chuck Cooperstein and Tom Walsh will call the action. The Longhorn Sports Network and KVET (AM 1300/FM 98.1) broadcast each UT game on the 37-station network. Bill Schoening, Craig Way and Brian Jones will call the action. UT home games also are broadcast regionally in Spanish on the five-station Sendero Sports Network. Dr. Ruben Pizarro and Jose Luis Munoz call the action.

## SOUTHWESTERN BELL RED RIVER SHOOTOUT:

A classic matchup is in place as one of the nation's oldest and most-unique rivalries, the Texas-Oklahoma series, is set for its 96th renewal on Saturday (2:30 p.m. Central/ABC Sports) at the Cotton Bowl. The rivalry that pits the two Big 12 foes on a neutral field with the crowd split evenly is in its second year of sponsorship with Southwestern Bell and is officially tagged the SBC Red River Shootout. The 2001 matchup pits fifth-ranked Texas (4-0/1-0 Big 12) against defending National Champion and No. 3 Oklahoma (4-0/1-0 Big 12) in a Big 12 South Division showdown. The last time Texas entered the game with an undefeated record was 1985. That also marked the last time both teams entered the game with perfect slates. UT and OU both have entered the game with perfect marks 24 times in series history.

ated Press top five for the first time since 1984 and the eighth time in the history of the series. The series is even at 3-3-1 in the seven previous top five matchups. The higher ranked team has won three of those meetings while in 1984, No. 1 UT and No. 2 OU played to a 15-all tie. No. 2 Texas' 28-7 win over No. 1 Oklahoma in 1963 marked the only time a Longhorns-Sooners top five matchup was decided by more than a touchdown. The combined score of the six previous top five matchups has the Horns holding a slight 115-89 edge.

**TOP 25 TREND:** Both teams enter the game ranked among the Top 25 for the 26th time since *The Associated Press* Poll began in 1936. The series is even at 11-11-3 when both teams enter the game ranked among the Top 25. Breaking it down further, UT is 7-2-1 in Top 25 matchups when it enters the game as the higher ranked team and 4-9-2 when it is the lower rated team. Texas holds a 5-3-2 edge in the last 10 Top 25 matchups with Oklahoma. The Longhorns and Sooners each entered the game ranked among the nation's Top 25 in 11 of 12 meetings from 1974-85. Texas and OU each have entered the game ranked among the Top 15 on 19 occasions. The series is knotted at 9-9-1 advantage in those games. Breaking it down further, UT is 6-1-1 in those Top 15 matchups when it enters the game as the higher ranked team and 3-8 when it is the lower rated team.

**UNDEFEATED TEAMS:** Both Texas and Oklahoma are entering the game with undefeated slates for the first time since 1985 and the 25th time in series history. Prior to this season, the Red River Shootout has featured two undefeated teams in 1985, '84, '79, '78, '77, '75, '72, '71, '69, '63, '58, '50, '49, '47, '41, '40, '39, '36, '34, '30, '29, '15, '14 and '12. Texas has entered the game with an undefeated record 42 times while Oklahoma has come in unbeaten on 46 occasions. Those marks do not include years when the two teams faced-off in a season opener.

**SUPER START:** Texas has opened the season with four straight victories for the first time since 1983. That year, the Horns swept to an 11-0 regular season record before falling to No. 7 Georgia (10-9) in the Cotton Bowl.

**SEARS TROPHY ON DISPLAY AT RED RIVER SHOOTOUT:** The Sears National Championship Trophy will make a stop at Saturday's Red River Shootout. It will mark the trophy's first visit to the annual Texas/Oklahoma rivalry and its 65th all-time sideline appearance since 1993. UT has played one game with the hand-crafted Waterford Crystal trophy in attendance (1999 Big 12 Championship Game against Nebraska), while the Sooners will be playing for the sixth time with it on the sidelines. **MACK BROWN (FLORIDA STATE '74):** Texas' fourth-year coach has won 51 of his last 65 games (78.4%) and led his teams to a 85-29 (74.6%) record over the last nine years. He is 117-85-1 in 18 years overall. He has posted 11 straight winning seasons and led his squad to nine straight bowl bids. His 117 victories rank first among active Big 12 coaches and his nine straight bowl games is the longest among league coaches.

cated an equal distance from Austin and Norman, Okla. The stadium is split evenly among Texas and OU fans at the 50-yard line. Texas-OU is the second-oldest Longhorns rivalry and tied for the 23rd most-played rivalry in NCAA history. Only Texas A&M has met Texas on more occasions (107 times). Since 1900, the only years Texas and Oklahoma have not met were 1918, '20, '21 and 1924-1928. The series resumed in 1929 at the State Fair and has remained a fixture ever since.

**TEXAS-OU PARADE:** The annual Texas-OU Torchlight Parade is set for Thursday night at 8:30 p.m. at the West Mall on the UT campus. Head coach Mack Brown and the Longhorns squad will be on hand for the festivities at around 9 p.m.

**THE SERIES:** Texas and Oklahoma first met in 1900 in Austin with the Longhorns winning that contest 28-2. Since that meeting, the two teams have met 95 times. Texas holds a 55-35-5 series lead. The Longhorns are the only Big 12 Conference team that holds an all-time series lead over the Sooners. Although Texas won four straight from 1989-92, the Longhorns hold only a slight edge (4-3-1) over the last eight years. The Horns are 8-3-1 over the last 12 meetings and were 7-2-1 vs. the Sooners in the 1990s. That comes after the Sooners held a 5-4-1 advantage over the Longhorns in the 1980s. The rest of the series records by decade are: UT led 9-2-1 in the 1900s; OU led 6-3 in the 1910s; UT led 3-0 in the 1920s; UT led 6-3-1 in the 1930s; UT led 8-2 in the 1940s; OU led 7-3 in the 1950s; UT led 9-1 in the 1960s and OU led 6-3-1 in the 1970s.

**SERIES TRENDS:** Texas and Oklahoma are meeting for the 96th time in a series that dates back to 1900 ... UT leads the series 55-35-5 ... Texas has won three of the last four meetings and holds a 8-3-1 advantage vs. the Sooners over the last 12 years ... UT holds a 3-2 lead in Big 12 meetings ... although Oklahoma holds a 288-284 scoring advantage in the last 12 meetings, Texas has won eight of those contest ... this year's game is already sold out and will be the 56th straight Texas-OU sellout (75,587).

**SOONER TIES:** Mack Brown is one of the few head coaches who has seen the Texas-Oklahoma rivalry from both schools' sidelines. Brown was the offensive coordinator at Oklahoma in 1984 when No. 1 UT and No. 2 OU played to a 15-all tie.

**CONFERENCE FOES:** For the first time in 77 years, Texas and Oklahoma met as conference opponents in 1996. The Longhorns and Sooners first met as league foes when OU was a member of the SWC from 1915-19 and now have conference bragging rights on the line for the sixth year as members of the Big 12. Texas holds a 3-2 advantage in Big 12 games versus the Sooners while OU holds a 5-3 advantage in all-time conference games vs. the Horns.

**BIG-TIME RIVALRY:** There is no rivalry quite like the Texas-OU series which is being renewed for the 96th time this season. The series, which began in 1900, has been played in Dallas since 1912 and at the Cotton Bowl since 1929. Dallas' Cotton Bowl is lo-

**LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION:** ABC Sports is broadcasting this year's game, marking the 49th time the Texas-Oklahoma matchup will be televised. ABC will be carrying the game for the 10th time in the past 11 years. FOX Sports Southwest's telecast of the 1998 game snapped a string of seven straight Texas-OU contests carried on ABC Sports. Thirty Texas-OU games have been network telecasts. The first-ever television appearance came in 1948, when a Fort Worth station carried the game live. Excluding OU television probation years (1974-75 and 1989), the game is being televised for the 26th straight time (24 of 27 including blackout years).

**THE BATTLE LINES:** One of the unique characteristics of the Texas-OU rivalry is the colors. With the tickets divided equally, Crimson and Burnt Orange split the battle lines down the middle. OU claims the south horseshoe from midfield and Texas the horseshoe north of the 50. The Longhorns, serving as the home team will wear their orange jerseys and occupy the west side bench area with that role reversing next season. The Texas SID crew will handle the press box operations and stat crew.

**THE GOLDEN HAT:** To the victor goes the Golden Hat, a rotating trophy representing the winner of the Texas-OU contest. It's a gold cowboy hat mounted on a large block of wood, and it has been a part of the series since the State Fair of Texas donated it in 1941. The only change has been the actual color. When it first arrived, it was known as the "Bronze Hat" and was actually bronze. When that hat was reworked in the 1970s, it came out gold, hence it is now — officially — the "Golden Hat." Along with the Golden Hat there also is a governor's trophy exchanged between the governors of the two states.

**CONFERENCE COMPETITION:** Mack Brown is 20-5 (80.0%) in three seasons of Big 12 Conference play. That is a significant improvement from the 8-8 (50%) mark the Longhorns produced in Big 12 competition the two years prior to his arrival. In 85 years of league play, Texas is 362-163-14 (68.5%) against conference competition. That includes marks of 334-150-14 (68.5%) in the SWC and 28-13 (68.3%) in the Big 12.

## HORNS OPEN BIG 12 PLAY WITH DECISIVE WIN OVER TEXAS

**TECH:** Texas posted an evenly-balanced 433 yards of offense (209 rushing/224 passing) and held an explosive Texas Tech offense to 297 yards of offense as the Horns rolled to a 42-7 victory over the Red Raiders. The victory was UT's 11th straight home win, matching the Horns' longest home winning streak since they posted 11 straight home wins from 1982-84. Texas' offense efficiently worked down the field with QB Chris Simms, scoring TDs on six of 10 drives. The Horns had four scoring drives that covered at least 70 yards on nine or more plays and took at least four minutes off the clock. Simms completed 21 of 26 passes (80.8%) for 224 yards and one TD. He also rushed for a pair of TDs. Simms opened the game by completing 10 straight passes. WR Roy Williams hauled in a career-best 10 receptions (tied for No. 5 on the UT all-time single-game list) for 98 yards

including a 40-yard TD catch. TE Bo Scaife, who has caught 10 passes for 123 yards and one TD over the past two games, matched a career-high five receptions for a career-best 64 yards. RB Ivan Williams led the Longhorns ground attack, posting his second straight 100-yard game with 152 yards and two TDs on 26 carries. He has recorded 255 yards and four TDs on 45 carries over the last two games. Defensively, UT held a Texas Tech team that was averaging 416.5 yards per game (27th/NCAA) to 297 yards (37 rushing/260 passing) of total offense. Texas also held Tech, which was averaging 42 points per game (10th/NCAA), to just one TD.

**THE WILLIAMS':** Texas' trio of offensive weapons WR Roy Williams, RB Ivan Williams and OT Mike Williams all played key roles as the Horns drove 80 yards in 11 plays to jump out to a 7-0 lead on their first drive vs. Texas Tech. Roy caught five passes for 49 yards and Ivan rushed six times for 31 yards and Mike helped clear the way for Ivan's two-yard TD run on that drive.

**GAME NOTES:** Texas' victory was its 10th in its last 11 games ... UT won its 11th straight at home, marking the sixth time in school history, and the first time since 1982-84, the Horns have won at least 11 straight home contests ... the Longhorns previously won 11 straight at home from 1914-15, 1976-78 and 1982-84 ... the Texas offense topped 40 points for the 10th straight home game ... the Longhorns improved to 15-0 in conference opening games at home since 1969 ... Texas played in front of a sellout crowd for the eighth straight time (16th time in the last 18 home outings) ... the crowd of 83,081 was the ninth-largest crowd in Longhorns history ... the Longhorns were 5-for-5 on first-and-goal opportunities, making them a perfect 17-for-17 on the year (16 TDs/1 FG) ... of Kliff Kingsbury's UT opponent single-game record 40 completions (57 attempts), 21 (52.5%) went for five yards or less, including three for losses, and none were longer than 25 yards ... Simms completed his first 10 pass attempts of the game, and coupled with his final completion last week against Houston, broke the UT record of nine straight completions ... Roy Williams hauled in a career-high 10 passes for 98 yards, including a 40-yard score from Simms in the second quarter ... Sophomore RB Ivan Williams ran for a career-high 152 yards on 26 carries and he became the first UT sophomore to rush for 100 yards in back-to-back

**SIMMS, WILLIAMS SHARE DARRELL K ROYAL AWARD:** Junior QB Chris Simms and sophomore RB Ivan Williams shared UT's Darrell K Royal Offensive Player of the Week award following their performances in UT's 42-7 victory against Texas Tech on Saturday. Simms had a career-high 21 completions in 26 attempts for 224 yards and a 40-yard touchdown to Roy Williams in the second quarter. Simms, who completed his first 10 passes of the night, broke the UT record for consecutive completions (11). He also rushed for two scores, which marked the first time a UT quarterback rushed for a pair of touchdowns in a game since Peter Gardere in 1992 (at Texas Tech). Williams, who picked up his third consecutive offensive player of the week award, rushed for a career-high 152 yards (on 26 carries) and scored two touchdowns. Sixty-six percent of his yards (100) came after contact and he became the first UT sophomore to post back-to-back 100-yard games since Ricky Williams accomplished the feat in 1996. This year, Williams has rushed for 394 yards on 70 carries (5.6 avg.) and scored a team-best five touchdowns.

**ENTIRE DEFENSE EARNS MIKE CAMPBELL "ACROSS THE BOW" AWARD:** The entire Texas Longhorns defense picked up UT's Mike Campbell "Across the Bow" Defensive Player of the Week Award for its efforts in Saturday's Big 12-opening victory against Texas Tech. The Horns defense limited the Red Raiders offense to only seven points and 297 total yards (37 rushing/260 passing). Tech entered the contest averaging 42 points per game (No. 10 NCAA), 325 passing yards per contest (No. 1 Big 12/No. 7 NCAA) and 416.5 total yards per game. The 37 rushing yards allowed was the Horns 10th-best defensive effort since 1990. The Longhorns, who held the Red Raiders to 6-of-17 (35.3%) third down conversions and 2-of-7 (28.6%) fourth down attempts, also registered eight TFLs, two sacks, 12 QB pressures and 10 pass breakups in the 35-point victory. Tech QB Kliff Kingsbury, who connected on 40-of-57 passes for 260 yards, averaged only 4.6 yards per attempt and 21 of his completions went for five yards or less.

**JOHNSON, TRAHAN NAMED FRANK DENIUS SPECIAL TEAMS PLAYERS OF THE WEEK:** Freshman Derrick Johnson and junior Beau Trahan both earned UT's Frank Denius Special Teams Player of the Week award following the Longhorns' 42-7 victory against Texas Tech on Saturday. The pair helped UT limit the Red Raiders to a 13.4 kickoff return average (seven returns) in the 35-point conference-opening victory. Johnson, who led UT with 13 total tackles, registered one special teams tackle and forced a fumble on a third quarter kickoff that led to a touchdown three plays later. This season, Johnson is tied for second on the squad with six special teams stops (five solo). Trahan, who picked up his second consecutive Player of the Week honor, paced the Longhorns special forces with six solo tackles and he has accumulated 12 special teams stops (10 solo) this season. Through four games, Texas' opponents are averaging just 14.8 yards per kickoff return.

**INJURY UPDATE:** Texas did not suffer any significant injuries in the Texas Tech game. SLB Lee Jackson (turf toe) and DE O.J. McClintock (plantar fasciitis) did not play vs. the Red Raiders and are questionable for the Oklahoma game. WR Montrell

Flowers suffered a lacerated kidney vs. North Carolina and has been forced to give up football. WR Kyle Shanahan (leg), who missed the opener after suffering a major cut on his leg in early August, returned to action vs. North Carolina. McClintock, who suffered a major cut on his arm prior to training camp, returned to practice during the Horns bye week before suffering the plantar fasciitis injury.

**AP RANKINGS:** After finishing the 2000 season with a No. 12 final ranking in *The Associated Press* Poll, Texas entered 2001 with a No. 5 ranking — its highest preseason ranking since 1983. UT moved up to No. 4 after a 41-7 win over New Mexico State in the opener, but dropped to No. 5 after defeating North Carolina 44-14 and remained there after a 53-26 win at Houston and 42-7 victory against Texas Tech. Texas has been ranked among the top five for six consecutive weeks. That's the Horns longest stretch in the top five since 1984 when the Horns were ranked among the five best teams in the nation for eight straight weeks. Since 1984, the Horns previous longest streak among the nation's top five was two in 1990. UT has been ranked among the top 15 for 11 straight weeks. That's Texas' longest stint among the nation's top 15 since 1984, when the Horns spent 12 straight weeks listed among that group. UT has been ranked among the Top 25 for 14 straight weeks. The Horns have been ranked among the Top 25 for 35 of the last 36 weeks. Texas' 21 straight weeks in *The AP* Poll, which was snapped following a 28-14 win at Colorado last season, was the Longhorns' longest stint in that poll since 1994-96 when Texas made an appearance in the national rankings for 25 straight weeks. UT has been listed among the Top 25 in 42 of the last 47 weeks under Mack Brown. Texas spent seven straight weeks ranked among the nation's Top 15 to start 2000. The Horns matched the streak of seven consecutive weeks in the top 15 to end the 1999 regular season. That was the Horns' longest stint in the top 15 since 1995. UT was ranked among the nation's Top 25 for a school-best 113 straight weeks between 1968-76.

**USA TODAY/ESPN COACHES POLL:** Texas entered 2001 ranked No. 6 in the *USA Today/ESPN* Coaches Poll, and on the heels of a 53-26 win at Houston, moved up to No. 5 last week. UT remained at No. 5 after a 42-7 win over Texas Tech. The Horns

have now been ranked among that poll's Top 25 for 38 straight weeks. The Horns have earned a spot in 42 of the last 43 coaches polls. Since taking over a program that was 4-7 in 1997, Mack Brown has led UT to a spot among the *USA Today/ESPN* Top 25 in 45 of 57 weeks since 1998.

**SPIN CYCLE:** With the departure of possibly the best defensive tackle tandem in Longhorn history in two-time All-American Casey Hampton and All-Big 12 performer Shaun Rogers, Texas defensive coordinator Carl Reese has sought to revamp his defense with speed this season. Reese refers to his shifting of players from the defensive backfield to linebackers and linebackers to defensive line as the "spin cycle." Several of those moves are now on display in what could be the Horns' most aggressive unit in years. In order to add speed to the lineup, UT moved CBs Ahmad Brooks and Nathan Vasher to safety and shifted SS Lee Jackson to OLB. Reese and the defensive staff also moved LB Marcus Wilkins to end and shifted DE Maurice Gordon and LB Austin Sendlein to DT.

**NINES ARE WILD:** With a 9-3 record in 2000, the Longhorns have posted nine-victory seasons in Mack Brown's first three seasons at Texas. That marks the first time since 1981-83 that the Horns have posted three straight nine or more win seasons. It also marks just the fifth time in 108 years of Texas football that the Horns have registered a string of at least three straight nine-win campaigns. UT recorded a school-best four consecutive seasons with at least nine victories in 1961-64 and registered at least nine wins in 1968-70, 1977-79 and 1981-83. The three straight nine-win seasons puts Texas among an elite group of just nine programs (Florida, Florida State, Kansas State, Miami, Michigan, Nebraska, Texas, Virginia Tech and Wisconsin) that currently are riding back-to-back-to-back nine-win seasons. After posting back-to-back nine

or more win seasons at North Carolina prior to taking over at Texas in '98, Brown now has posted nine wins in five straight seasons. He joins Florida State's Bobby Bowden, Florida's Steve Spurrier and Kansas State's Bill Snyder among a group of just four head coaches that have a string of five straight nine-victory seasons.

**STINGY DEFENSE:** Texas, which went from ranking 85th nationally in total defense in 1997 to back-to-back top-10 finishes in total defense the past two seasons, has started where it left off in 2001. The Horns have limited their first three opponents to averages of 293.0 yards (92.2 rushing) and 13.5 points per game. UT held a New Mexico State offense that had registered 544 yards (407 rushing) vs. Louisville to 232 yards (169 rushing). The Horns held North Carolina to 211 yards of offense. After allowing the Heels to gain 152 yards in the first half, UT limited them to 59 yards in the second half (including minus five yards in the third quarter). UT held Texas Tech's offense that was averaging 416.5 yards per game (27th/NCAA) and 42 points per game (10th/NCAA), to 297 yards of offense and just one TD. Texas limited opponents to 278.3 yards per game and 4.0 yards per play in 2000. That was the Horns' top total defense season since 1991 (258.9 ypg/3.7 ypp). UT held three opponents to less than 200 yards of total offense last year. Among those efforts was the Horns holding Colorado to just 133 yards of offense — UT's top performance dating back to holding New Mexico to 66 yards of offense in 1988 (13 seasons prior). The three sub-200-yard defensive efforts matched the number the Horns recorded in 1999. Texas held two opponents to under 200 yards of offense in 1998. All totalled, the Horns have held eight opponents to 200 yards or less in four seasons under Mack Brown and defensive coordinator Carl Reese. Prior to their arrival in 1998, Texas had limited just six opponents to 200 yards or less in the previous 10 seasons. As a matter of fact, 1999 marked the first time since 1983 that UT held three opponents to less than 200 yards of offense. UT held five opponents under 200 yards in 1983.

## HORNS DEFENSE ON THE ATTACK

Texas' aggressive defensive attack has made dramatic improvement in the Mack Brown era (42 games). Under the guidance of defensive coordinator Carl Reese, UT's defense has put much more pressure on its opponents and improved in virtually every stat category.

**SAFETIES:** Texas, which went six years from 1992-97 without registering a safety, has coralled its opponent in its own end zone three times in the last 33 games. The Horns went 79 games from 1992-97 without registering a safety. Texas has posted a safety in three of the last four years. The only year since Mack Brown arrived in 1998 that the Horns didn't forced a safety was 1999.

**SHORT DRIVES:** In four games in 2001, Texas' defense has prevented its opponents from moving the chains on nearly 44 percent of their drives. In 53 possessions, Longhorns foes have been forced to give the ball up in three plays or less on 23 occasions (43.4%). UT forced North Carolina into a season-high 10 three-and-out drives in 19 possessions, while the Horns posted five three-and-outs in 11 drives against New Mexico State, four three-and-outs in 13 possessions at Houston and four three-and-outs in 10 drives against Texas Tech.

**DRIVING EFFICIENCY:** Texas has managed a number of time-consuming scoring drives this season. Of the 27 scoring drives in four games, 14 of them have consumed at least three minutes. The Horns also have scored 18 times (13 TDs/five field goals) in 38 drives (47.4%) that have started in their own territory. Texas' average drive in 2001 has been seven plays for 50 yards. That is a direct contrast from the Longhorns defense that has allowed their opponents to score just six times (all TDs) in 50 drives (12.0%) that have started in their own territory.

### MACK'S MAGIC Texas Turnaround (last 42 games)

Since taking over on December 4, 1997, as the 28th coach in Texas football history, Mack Brown has made a dramatic impact on the Longhorns program. Season ticket sales, fundraising efforts and fan support are at an all-time high. However, the marked improvement in the team's performance on the field is what's most impressive. Brown and his staff dramatically improved a struggling program that posted a 4-7 record in 1997. In the first year of the Brown era, Texas was 9-3, claimed the Cotton Bowl Championship (first New Year's Day bowl victory in 15 years) and finished the year ranked 15th nationally. In 1999, Texas was 9-5 (first back-to-back nine-win seasons since 1982-83), won the Big 12 South Division Championship, returned to the Cotton Bowl and climbed as high as No. 7 in the national polls. Last year, UT was 9-3, earned a spot in the Culligan Holiday Bowl and finished the year ranked No. 12 by both *The AP* and *USA Today/ESPN* — its top final ranking since 1990. And, in 2001, the Horns opened the season with their highest preseason ranking (No. 5) since 1983.

**GROUND DEFENSE:** Texas' ground defense has made dramatic improvements since Mack Brown and defensive coordinator Carl Reese took over in 1998. After taking over a unit that ranked 104th nationally and allowed 241.5 yards per game in 1997, Reese and company have guided the Horns to the nation's 17th-best run defense (105.7 ypg) in 1999 and the 12th-best ground defense (94.0 ypg) last season. UT's 94.0 yards allowed rushing per game in 2000 was the fewest allowed by a Longhorns squad since 1977 (91.1 ypg). The Horns have continued that trend to open the 2001 season. UT has allowed 92.2 rushing yards per game and just 3.3 yards per carry in four games. The Horns came up with a solid effort in limiting a New Mexico State ground attack that had posted 407 rushing yards in its opener vs. Louisville to 169 yards on the

ground. The Horns held Houston to 68 yards on 30 attempts. UT held Texas Tech to 37 yards on 11 carries. Texas has allowed just five 100-yard rushers over the past four seasons. In the three seasons prior to Brown's arrival, 26 backs rushed for at least 100 yards vs. UT.

**OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION:** In four seasons under Mack Brown and offensive coordinator Greg Davis, Texas' explosive offense has produced the top three passing seasons and three of the top 10 total offense seasons in school history. During that time, the Horns have registered 20 school records and eight 50-point games. Since Brown took over in 1998, UT has produced 10 of the 500-yard total offense performances (there are only 33 of them in the 109 years of Texas football) in school history. The Horns offense hit stride in 2001 at Houston with 534 yards of offense. Texas produced the top performance of the 2000 season with 637 yards of offense (No. 4 on the UT all-time list) at Kansas. The Horns registered 504 yards of offense vs. Oklahoma State (tied for 29th-best in UT history) as well. In 1999, UT posted 586 yards vs. Baylor (second-highest in the Brown era/15th-best in UT history), 558 yards vs. Stanford (22nd-best performance in UT history), 553 yards vs. Oklahoma (24th-best in UT history) and 504 yards vs. Texas Tech. Brown's first UT squad produced a school-best 692 yards vs. Rice in 1998. UT also recorded 584 yards vs. Iowa State and 580 yards vs. New Mexico State in 1998.

**PRODUCTIVE PERFORMERS:** Since Mack Brown and offensive coordinator Greg Davis took over the UT offense in 1998, Texas has produced its only 2,000-yard rusher (2,124, Ricky Williams, 1998), 1,000-yard receivers (1,087, Wane McGarity, 1998/1,188, Kwame Cavil, 1999) and 3,000-yard passer (3,357, Major Applewhite, 1999) in a season in school history. UT also has seen players record school single-season bests for rushing TDs (28, Ricky Williams, 1998), TD passes (21, Major Applewhite, 1999), receptions (100, Kwame Cavil, 1999), scoring (168, Ricky Williams, 1998) and total offense (3,211, Major Applewhite, 1999). The Longhorns freshman records for receptions (41, B.J. Johnson, 2000), receiving yards (809, Roy Williams, 2000), TD receptions (8, Roy Williams, 2000), passing yards (2,453, Major Applewhite, 1998) and TD passes (18, Major Applewhite, 1998) also have been set during the Mack Brown era.

**TEXAS' INCREDIBLE HULK:** A big, physical and athletic offensive tackle, senior Mike Williams played in the shadows of consensus first-team All-American and Outland Trophy finalist Leonard Davis (the No. 2 pick in the 2001 NFL Draft/Arizona Cardinals) in 2000, but this season he's positioned to compete for similar honors. The 6-6, 345-pound right tackle who protects quarterback Chris Simms' blindside, entered 2001 as a preseason All-American and as a member of both the Outland and Lombardi Trophy watch lists. He has lived up to those expectations in leading the Horns offense that ranks among the nation's top 30 in scoring (4th/45.0 ppg), total offense (25th/423.0 ppg) and rushing (28th/183.0 ppg). He has

posted 19 pancake blocks, 29 knockdowns and has not allowed a sack in the first four games this season. He also has teamed with RG Antwan Kirk-Hughes in clearing the way on six TD runs, 11 explosive plays (runs of 12 or more yards/screen passes of 16 or more yards) and seven third down conversions. He registered nine pancake blocks, five knockdown blocks and teamed with Kirk-Hughes in clearing the way for seven key plays (four third down conversions) in helping the Horns post 399 yards of offense (171 rushing) and score four TDs against New Mexico State. The Longhorns senior also helped clear paths for an offense that produced three 50-yard rushers (first time since 1994), 40:18 of possession time (most since 1982) and 15 third down conversions in 21 attempts (best percentage since 1986) in the opener. For his efforts, he shared UT's Darrell K Royal Offensive Player of the Game Award with Kirk-Hughes. He registered three pancakes and six knockdowns in helping Texas register 326 yards of offense (159 rushing/167 passing) in a 44-14 win over North Carolina. UT's senior tackle recorded nine knockdowns and five pancakes as the Horns roll up 534 yards of offense (193 rushing) at Houston. He also recovered a critical fumble at the Cougars 10-yard line with 15 seconds left in the first half at UH. Texas scored on the next play and took a 17-14 lead in that game. Against Texas Tech, Williams registered nine knockouts and two pancakes as the Horns rolled up 433 yards of offense (209 rushing) in a 42-7 win. He and Kirk-Hughes cleared the way for three TD runs and three explosive plays against the Red Raiders. Williams has allowed just one sack in 19 career starts and was tabbed preseason first-team All-Big 12 at the league's annual media days in late July. A rapidly developing tackle who boasts a 54-inch chest, he was a defensive standout as a prepster and split action on the offensive and defensive lines as a true freshmen in 1998. ESPN analyst Mel Kiper Jr. lists Williams as the eighth-best senior prospect for the 2002 draft.

**ON GUARD:** Williams isn't the only talented veteran protecting the blindside of Simms and clearing paths for the Longhorns backs from the right side. Senior OG Antwan

Kirk-Hughes, tabbed preseason first-team All-Big 12 at the league's annual media days in late July, is a third-year starter who has earned honorable mention All-Big 12 honors the past two seasons. The 6-3, 310-pound Kirk-Hughes battled through a shoulder injury in playing in 11 games last season and underwent offseason surgery to repair the injury. He sat out the spring season and returned as an offensive leader in having a healthy preseason. He has helped lead Texas' offense that ranks among the nation's top 30 in scoring (4th/45.0 ppg), total offense (25th/423.0 ypg) and rushing (28th/183.0 ypg). Kirk-Hughes has posted 21 pancake blocks, 19 knockdowns and not allowed a sack in the first four games of the season. He also has teamed with Williams in clearing the way on six TD runs, 11 explosive plays (runs of 12 or more yards/screen passes of 16 or more yards) and seven third down conversions. 26 straight games. The 6-4, 305-pound Anderson was one of 21 players named to the Dave Rimington Trophy (nation's outstanding center/sponsored by the Boomer Esiason Foundation) watch list earlier this year. He helped pave the way for UT to produce 399 yards of total offense (228 passing/171 rushing) vs. New Mexico State. Anderson also helped clear paths for an offense that produced three 50-yard rushers (first time since 1994), 40:18 of possession time (most since 1982) and 15 third down conversions in 21 attempts (best percentage since 1986) in the opener. He helped UT register 326 yards of offense (159 rushing/167 passing) in a 44-14 win over North Carolina. UT's senior center helped set the stage for the Horns to roll up 534 yards of offense (193 rushing) at Houston and 433 yards (209 rushing/224 passing) vs. Texas Tech. In 2000, he was tabbed Texas' Most Consistent Offensive Player after helping lead the UT offense to top 15 national finishes in points per game (38.6/eighth), yards per contest (439.0/14th) and passing yards per game (school-record 293.5/14th). Anderson also is an honor roll student who has earned two undergraduate degrees from Texas (corporate communications/government). He currently is working toward a graduate degree in the LBJ School of Public Affairs.

**MINISTER OF DEFENSE:** Senior MLB D.D. Lewis, who has started all 42 games (including bowl games) of his career, for the second straight year entered the season listed among the Butkus Award preseason watch list. ESPN NFL Draft analyst Mel Kiper Jr. lists him as the fourth-best senior inside linebacker prospect for the 2002 Draft. A third-team All-Big 12 performer in 2000, Lewis is an athletic former running back who moved to linebacker as a redshirt freshman and is training to be a minister. Lewis played a key role as the Horns opened the season by limiting a New Mexico State offense that gained 544 yards (407 rushing) vs. Louisville to just 232 yards (169 rushing). He registered four tackles, recovered a fumble and broke up a pass in that game. Lewis stepped up again, posting six tackles, one sack and a QB pressure in helping the Horns hold North Carolina to just 211 yards of offense (95 rushing). He had five tackles and forced and recovered a fumble vs. Houston. Against Texas Tech, Lewis registered eight stops (six solo) and a QB pressure. Lewis has 256 tackles, 32 tackles for loss, 13.5 sacks, 36 QB pressures, seven fumbles caused and a UT-record nine recoveries in 39 career games (stats do not include bowls). Last season, he shared the team lead with 78 tackles, led UT's linebackers with 15 TFLs and 4.5 sacks and recorded five fumble recoveries (tied for first on the UT all-time single-season list), two fumbles caused, four pass breakups and 12 QB pressures. Lewis highlighted his junior year by registering 11 tackles (his sixth career 10-tackle game), five tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks in helping the Horns limit Colorado to just 133 yards of offense. He led all UT LBs with five

sacks, 13 TFLs and 15 QB pressures as a sophomore. Lewis posted 77 stops (No. 10 on the UT all-time freshman list) as a redshirt freshman in 1998.

**DURABLE D.D.:** D.D. Lewis, who has started every game of his career (42, including bowl games), is set to start his 43rd straight game when he lines up against Oklahoma on Saturday. At that rate, he has a chance to make a run at former Longhorns OG Dan Neil's UT record of 49 career starts. Neil started every game of his career from 1993-96. DB Lance Gunn (1989-92) and LB Anthony Curl (1989-92) are tied for second on the UT career starts list at 45.

**SUPER JAM:** Arguably the nation's premier cornerback, senior Quentin Jammer passed on an opportunity to be a likely first-round NFL Draft pick to return for his final season at Texas in 2001. A tremendous athlete who combines sub 4.4 (seconds in the 40) speed with a 38.5-inch vertical jump and the strength of a linebacker, the 6-1, 200-pound Jammer entered 2001 as a preseason All-American and listed among the Thorpe Award's watch list. ESPN NFL Draft analyst Mel Kiper Jr. lists Jammer as the top cornerback and the sixth-best senior prospect for the 2002 draft. He has posted 18 tackles (16 solo), three TFLs, nine pass breakups and an interception in 2001. Jammer led a UT defense that opened the season by holding New Mexico State to eight of 16 passes for 63 yards and no TDs. Jammer was rarely challenged in the game, did not allow a reception in man-to-man coverage and posted two tackles. Jammer registered four tackles, two tackles for loss, three pass breakups and made a spectacular interception in helping the Horns limit North Carolina to just 10 of 30 passes for 116 yards. He posted six tackles and three PBUs vs. Houston. Jammer recorded six stops, a

TFL and broke up three passes vs. Texas Tech. He registered four bone-jarring highlight hits in that game.

**JAMMER'S CARRER:** In 38 career games (30 starts), not including bowl games, Quentin Jammer has posted 158 tackles, six interceptions, eight caused fumbles and 42 pass breakups (No. 5 on the UT all-time list). He allowed less than 10 completions and just one TD catch in leading a Longhorns secondary that ranked first nationally in pass efficiency defense (88.3 rating) in 2000. Jammer, who missed the 1999 season with a shoulder injury after starting at free safety in 1998, moved to cornerback in the spring of 2000 and went on to earn first-team All-Big 12 honors in his first full season at the position. He quickly became one of the Big 12's premier defensive stoppers, posting 43 tackles (34 solo), three interceptions (tied for second on the team), four caused fumbles (tied for team lead), a sack, two TFLs, one QB pressure and a team-high 20 pass breakups (No. 3 on the UT all-time single-season chart) as a junior. Jammer was tabbed Texas' Mike Campbell Defensive Player of the Week vs. Baylor last season after he intercepted a pair of passes and recorded three tackles and a sack as Texas held the Bears to nine of 33 passing for just 77 yards. He posted three PBUs and five tackles as the Horns held Colorado to just 78 passing yards — 165 yards below its average — in 2000 as well. Jammer caused two fumbles (one on a punt return which was recovered for a TD) and posted two PBUs against Houston en route to Big 12 Defensive Player of the Week honors (9/23/00).

**REDDING'S RISING STAR:** After moving from linebacker to defensive end and earning Big 12 Defensive Newcomer of the Year honors as a true freshman in 1999, Cory Redding made steady improvement en route to honorable mention All-Big 12 honors after posting a team-high 6.5 sacks and 22 QB pressures to go with 52 tackles and 17 TFLs last season. Now in his junior year, Redding is a defensive leader for the Horns and has helped UT get off to a good start by limiting its first four opponents to 293.0 yards of offense per game and 54 points (13.5 ppg). He has posted 17 tackles, three TFLs, a sack, seven QB pressures and returned an interception for a score in four games this season. Redding helped lead a UT defense that held New Mexico State's offense — which had gained 544 yards (407 rushing) vs. Louisville — to just 232 yards (169 rushing) in a 41-7 victory. He posted three tackles, one sack and three QB pressures in helping Texas limit North Carolina to 211 yards of offense (95 rushing) in a 44-14 win. Redding, who shared UT's Mike Campbell Defensive Player of the Game Award for his efforts, also tallied his first career touchdown when he dropped into coverage, snagged a Ronald Curry pass, sprinted 22 yards down the sidelines and somersaulted over Curry into the end zone for the first score in that game. He posted seven tackles, a TFL and a QB pressure as the Horns held Houston to just 68 rushing yards on 30 carries. Redding tallied five tackles and three QB pressures as the Horns held Texas Tech 297 yards of offense, more than 100 yards below its season total offense average. Tabbed a preseason first-team All-Big 12 performer at the league's media days in late July, Redding is listed among the Lombardi Trophy's watch list. In three seasons, the 6-5, 260-pound Redding, the 1998 *USA Today* Prep Defensive Player of the Year, has registered 95 tackles, 9.5 sacks, 29 QB pressures and 22 tackles for loss during his career. He has averaged nearly nine yards per loss on his 9.5 career sacks.

The 6-4, 215-pound WLB has already posted two 10-tackle games and leads the team with 37 tackles and seven TFLs. He also has three sacks (-22 yards). Johnson has moved into the lineup gradually before earning his first career start when the Horns lined up in a 3-4 defense vs. Texas Tech. He posted a team-high 13 tackles (nine solo) and two tackles for loss, while registering a sack and a PBU in that game and shared UT's Special teams Player of the Week award. Johnson posted six tackles (four solo) and a TFL in his first game and followed that performance with a team-best 10 stops (three on special teams), three TFLs and two sacks against North Carolina. a 12-play, 89-yard TD drive in the second half. That came one game after he was good on 17 of 33 passes for 182 yards and a pair of TDs in guiding UT to a 41-7 win over New Mexico State. After facing significant pressure and completing two of his first seven passes for 20 yards in the first quarter, Simms and the UT offense settled in and he completed 15 of 26 passes for 162 yards and a pair of TDs in that game. He led the Horns to scores on four of five drives in the second and third quarters, was sacked just once and connected with seven different receivers and running backs against the Aggies. Simms was good on seven of 10 passes for 72 yards on an 11-play, 80-yard drive (3:03 TOP) that was capped off with a nine-yard TD pass to Montrell Flowers that

gave Texas a 24-0 with 38 seconds left in the first half.

**DRIVING SCHOOL:** Chris Simms is off to a great start as the leader of the Longhorn offense. Not only does he have UT off to its first 4-0 start since 1983, but he has done so by efficiently directing the offense to points on 23 of the 45 drives (51%) he has directed. Of those 23 scoring drives, 16 of them have been touch-down drives. Texas has scored 129 points on the 45 drives Simms has directed or an average of 2.9 points per drive. That is a direct contrast from the Longhorns opponents which have scored on just eight of the 53 drives (15%) they have started. Over the last two games, Simms has guided Texas on 13 scores (11 TDs) on 22 drives (59.1%) or 3.6 points per drive.

**SIMMS CONTINUES TO HEAT UP:** Chris Simms has steadily improved while gaining experience as a full-time starter over the last seven games (6 wins, 1 loss). During that time, he has completed 118 of 204 passes (57.8%) for 1,752 yards (250.3 ypg) and 11 TDs. He also has run for three scores during that stretch. Simms completed 67 of 117 passes (team-high 57.3%) for 1,064 yards and eight TDs in 2000. In his final three starts as a sophomore (including the Holiday Bowl/bowl stats don't count toward regular season stats), Simms completed 43 of 75 (57.3%) passes for 868 yards and five TDs and averaged 49.6 yards per TD pass. He set a then-career high in completing 17 passes, threw for 245 yards and ran for a TD vs. Oregon in the Holiday Bowl. Simms

completed 16 of 24 (66.7%) passes for 383 yards (No. 4 on the UT all-time chart) and three TDs (no interceptions) in a 43-17 win over No. 22 Texas A&M to wrap up the 2000 regular season. He completed all eight of his passes for 234 yards (a UT passing yardage record for a quarter) and three TDs in leading the Horns on four scoring drives in the third quarter of that game. He was named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week after connecting on scoring strikes of 70 (to B.J. Johnson), 55 (to Sloan Thomas) and 20 (to Roy Williams) yards against the Aggies. Simms' 364 yards of total offense vs. A&M rank fifth on the UT all-time single-game list. That effort came one game after he completed 10 of 18 passes for 240 yards and two TDs in a 51-16 win at Kansas. He connected on a 65-yard TD strike, a 43-yard pass and a 38-yard TD to Roy Williams in the game. After failing to register points on the first two drives of the game, Simms guided the Longhorns to seven TDs and a field goal on Texas' next 12 drives at KU.

**SIMMS' CAREER NUMBERS:** Chris Simms has connected on 161 of 282 passes (57.1%) for 2,171 yards (No. 9 on the UT all-time list) and 16 TDs (No. 8 on the UT all-time list) for his career. A versatile signal-caller who also has displayed the ability to make plays with his feet, Simms has rushed for 10 first downs and 174 yards and three TDs on 33 (5.3 ypc) career rushing attempts (excluding sacks). His three rushing TDs in 2001 are the most by a UT QB in a season since Peter Gardere tallied four rushing scores in 1992. When you factor in his six TD passes this year, Simms has accounted for 54 points (13.5 pg), which ranks 24th nationally.

**GOING DEEP:** Including his 92-yard TD strike to B.J. Johnson at Houston — No. 4 on the UT all-time pass play list/No. 6 on the UT all-time scoring play from scrimmage list — Chris Simms has made several big pass plays among his 282 passing attempts in three seasons at Texas. In his last two games of the 2000 regular season alone, he connected on passes of 70t (B.J. Johnson/vs. Texas A&M), 65t (Roy Williams at Kansas), 55t (Sloan Thomas/vs. Texas A&M), 43 (Williams/at Kansas) and 40 yards (Williams at Kansas) and averaged 49.6 yards per TD pass on five scoring strikes. In three seasons, he has tossed 10 passes of 40 or more yards, averaged 33.8 yards per TD pass (38.1 yards per TD pass in 2000) and completed scoring strikes to nine different receivers. He is averaging 7.7 yards per pass attempt (2,171 yards on 282 attempts) or 13.5 yards per completion (161 completions) in three seasons. Simms is averaging one TD pass for every 17.6 attempt (one TD per 10 pass completions).

**TEXAS TRIO:** Texas' sophomore trio of B.J. Johnson, Roy Williams and Sloan Thomas form arguably the best receiving threesome in Longhorns history and one of the nation's top trifectas. Williams has 23 catches and Johnson has 17 receptions as the trio has posted 46 receptions for 595 yards (148.8 ypg) and three TDs in 2001. Williams paced the attack with 10 receptions (No. 5 on

the UT all-time single-game list) for 98 yards, including a 40-yard TD, as the trio posted 15 catches for 158 yards and a TD vs. Texas Tech. At Houston, Johnson paved the way with four catches for 124 yards (including a 92-yard TD catch/fourth-longest pass play in UT history) and a TD as the trio combined to post nine receptions for 198 yards. Johnson's five catches for 55 yards topped the group that combined for 11 receptions for 128 yards in UT's 44-14 win over North Carolina. Williams added four catches for 38 yards and Thomas posted a pair of receptions for 35 yards in that game. Led by Williams' five catches for 70 yards, the trio combined for 11 receptions for 120 yards in the Horns' season opener vs. New Mexico State.

**FAB FRESHMEN:** The trio of B.J. Johnson (41-698-3), Roy Williams (40-809-8) and Sloan Thomas (9-208-3) combined for 90 catches for 1,715 yards (19.1 ypc) and 14 TDs as true freshmen in 2000. The duo of Johnson and Williams — both of whom earned second-team Freshman All-America honors from *The Sporting News* — completed their first season atop the Horns' all-time freshmen receiving tandem list in receptions (81) and receiving yards (1,507/fourth on the overall UT all-time receiving tandem list) and ranked one-two on the school's all-time rookie receptions and receiving yardage lists. Johnson finished the season ranked first in receptions (41) with Williams close behind with 40. Williams' 809 receiving yards were the most by a freshman in school history with Johnson's 698 standing second. The tandem registered 13 of the top 15 freshmen reception games and the top four rookie receiving yardage games (five of the top 10 overall) in school history. Thomas (vs. Missouri) and Williams (at Colorado/at Kansas) each set the UT freshman record for TD catches in a game (2).

**CAREER CATCHES:** Texas' wideout trio of B.J. Johnson (58-949-4 TDs), Roy Williams (63-1,064-9 TDs) and Sloan Thomas (15-296-3 TDs) have combined to post 136 catches for 2,309 yards (17.0 ypc) and 16 TDs in 15 career games. Johnson (92t, 2001/71t and 70t, 2000) and Williams (96t and 65t, 2000) have posted a total of five receptions of 60 or more yards in two seasons. Add in Thomas (55t, 2000), and all three sophomore receivers have posted at least one catch of 50 or more yards. The trio has teamed to post 15 receptions of 40 or more yards during their careers.

**YAC ATTACK:** One of the strengths that makes the Longhorns' talented trio of receivers so difficult to handle is their ability to make yardage after the catch. Of the combined 51 catches for 633 yards that Roy Williams (23-255), B.J. Johnson (17-251) and Sloan Thomas (5-68) produced in the first four games in 2001, 39 percent of the yardage (200 yards) has come after the catch. Williams has produced 111 of his 255 yards (43.5%) after the catch and Johnson has garnered 78 of his 251 yards (31.1%) following the reception on the season. Thomas has 11 yards after the catch this year.

★ **ROY WILLIAMS:** As a true freshman, Williams earned Big 12 Offensive Freshman of the Year honors and posted two of the top three receiving yardage games by a freshman in UT history. He was tabbed a preseason first-team All-Big 12 performer at the league's media days in late July. He has posted 23 catches for 255 yards in four games this season. Williams currently ranks 29th nationally in receptions per game (5.7 pg). He registered a career-best 10 catches (No. 5 on the UT all-time single-game list) for 98 yards, including a 40-yard TD, vs. Texas Tech. That improved his career total to 63 receptions for 1,064 yard and nine TDs. Williams gained 25 yards on a reverse vs. North Carolina to up his career total to three rushes for 100 yards (33.3 ypc). The 6-5, 210-pound sophomore registered 180 receiving yards vs. Kansas and 175 receiving yards vs. Oklahoma State last season, both of which rank among UT's top five single-game receiving records overall. Williams' 809 receiving yards (No. 7 on the UT all-time list), eight TD catches (tied for No. 3 on the UT all-time list) and 10 total TDs were UT freshman records while his 40 receptions rank second only to

Johnson on that list. He also ran twice for 75 yards and two TDs. He ranked first among NCAA Division I-A true-freshmen receivers in receiving yards per game (809 yards/73.5 ypg), TD catches (8) and yards per catch (20.2). He ranked second nationally among true freshmen in receptions per game (36 receptions/3.6 rpg). Williams became the first freshman in UT history to register 100 receiving yards in their initial game, catching six passes for 105 yards vs. Louisiana-Lafayette in UT's 2000 season opener. His 96-yard TD catch (second-longest pass play in UT history) vs. Oklahoma State was a Longhorns freshman record and tied for the second-longest pass play in UT history. Williams tied UT's freshman record with two TD receptions at Colorado. Along with his season-high six catches vs. Louisiana-Lafayette, Williams has caught five passes (tied for No. 5 on the UT all-time freshman single-game list) twice and posted four receptions (tied for No. 9 on the UT all-time freshman single-game list) three times in 2000. His 14 points at Colorado (including a two-point conversion) rank second on UT's freshman single-game chart. He is tied for sixth on the UT all-time list with three career 100-yard receiving games.

★ **B.J. JOHNSON:** As a true freshman, Johnson set a UT freshman record with 41 receptions on the season. The 6-1, 190-pound sophomore also set single-game marks for receptions (9, vs. Baylor) and receiving yards (187, vs. Texas A&M) in 2000. His 698 receiving yards in 2000 rank second on the Horns' all-time freshman list. Johnson posted his third career 100-yard receiving game (tied for No. 6 on the UT all-time list) when he gained 124 yards on four catches, including a 92-yard TD catch (fourth longest pass play in UT history/sixth longest scoring play from scrimmage on UT record), at Houston. He has posted 17 catches for 251 yards in the Horns' first four games of 2001. Johnson also has caught a pass in

man reception efforts last season. His 162 receiving yards (No. 10 on the UT all-time list) vs. Baylor rank fourth on the UT all-time freshman list. His 63.5 receiving yards and 3.7 receptions per game ranked second nationally among true freshmen receivers. He was the only Longhorn who caught a pass in each of the Horns' 12 games last season. Along with his UT-record nine catches vs. Baylor, Johnson caught six passes (tied for No. 4 on the UT all-time freshman single-game list) once, five receptions (tied for No. 6 on the UT all-time freshman single-game list) twice and four passes (tied for No. 10 on the UT all-time freshman single-game list) twice in 2000. He recorded the fifth-longest reception by a freshman in UT history (71t at Stanford). Johnson is averaging 62 yards per TD reception for his career.

★ **SLOAN THOMAS:** Thomas saw less action as a true freshman but was equally as explosive. In eight games of action, the 6-2, 195-pound Thomas hauled in nine passes for 208 yards and three TDs. He averaged a team-high 23.1 yards per catch. He has posted six catches for 88 yards in the Horns' first four games of 2001, upping his career totals to 15 catches for 296 yards (19.7 ypc). Thomas had one of his most productive games as a freshman in a big game, catching two passes for 74 yards, including a 55-yard TD vs. Texas A&M. He caught a season-best three passes for 28 yards and matched the UT freshman single-game record with two TDs vs. Missouri. Thomas also registered a 45-yard catch vs. Baylor.

**TIGHT ENDS, TOO:** Sophomore tight end Bo Scaife has battled back from knee surgery to lead the Longhorns tight ends with 11 catches for 127 yards and a TD in 2001. He has registered 10 of those receptions for 123 yards and a TD in the last two games. He had three catches for 48 yards in limited action as a freshman in 1999. Scaife missed the entire 2000 season after undergoing reconstructive surgery on his left knee and was slowed as a true freshman in 1999 after knee surgery on his right knee as a high school senior. He shares time in the Longhorns lineup with classmate Brock Edwards who has added three catches for 13 yards and a touchdown in 2001.

**YOU GOTTA LIKE IKE:** Junior RB Victor Ike is an explosive offensive weapon who has scored by rush, reception and return during his career. He has posted 1,509 yards on 171 career plays (8.8 yards per touch). The 5-11, 200-pound back who made his name as a kick returner in 2000, has averaged 26.4 yards per kickoff return (23 for 607 yards) over the past two seasons. He recorded a 43-yard kickoff return and posted 93 all-purpose yards vs. North Caro-

lina and had a season-best 44-yard kickoff return vs. Texas Tech. He rushed for 53 yards in his first game as the Horns' starting tailback in the season opener vs. New Mexico State. Last season, Ike halted the nation's longest drought without a kickoff return for a TD (Johnny "Lam" Jones, 100 yards, vs. SMU, Oct. 28, 1978) by taking a kick back 93 yards for a score vs. Oregon in the Holiday Bowl. That snapped a UT 265-game streak without a kickoff return for a TD. Earlier in the season, Ike nearly snapped Texas' long drought without a kickoff return for a TD in taking back an Oklahoma kickoff 81 yards to the Sooner 17-yard line. That return set up a Longhorns touchdown. Ike led the Big 12 and ranked 12th nationally with a 24.8-yard per kickoff return average (20 for 495 yards) in 2000. He posted the second-longest pass reception by a UT freshman (80 yards for a TD) vs. N.C. State in '99, scored on a 30-yard run vs. Rutgers that year and had a 38-yard TD catch vs. Stanford last year.

**THUNDER AND LIGHTNING:** Texas' tailback unit features a combination of power, speed and versatility. Led by sophomore Ivan Williams, who has posted back-to-back 100-yard rushing games, Texas' thunder and lightning backfield tandem of Williams and true freshman Cedric Benson has combined for 580 yards and eight TDs on 114 carries (5.1 ypc). Williams has registered 255 yards and five TDs on 45 carries (5.7 ypc) over the last two games and he currently ranks 31st nationally in rushing yards per game (98.5 ypg). He tallied a career-best 152 yards and a pair of scores on 26 carries vs. Texas Tech. That came one week after he rushed for a then-career-high 103 yards on 19 carries (5.2 ypc) in his first career start at Houston. The powerful Williams tops the unit with 394 yards and five TDs on 70 carries (5.6 ypc). Williams earned the Horns Darrell K Royal Offensive Player of the Week award for his efforts in the last three games. Quick and elusive true freshman Cedric Benson is steadily developing as Williams' top backup. The three-time Texas 5A Offensive Player of the Year who led Midland Lee High to three straight Texas 5A state titles and rushed for a 5A record 8,423 yards and scored 127 TDs, Benson has rushed for 186 yards and three TDs on 44 carries. He posted a career-high 74 yards on 14 carries and scored his third TD of the season at Houston. Williams and Benson combined to produce 173 yards and a pair of TDs on 32 carries vs. Texas Tech and 179 yards and three TDs on 33 carries at Houston. Topped by Williams and Benson's 64 yards each, the trio of Williams, Benson and Victor Ike teamed to produce 181 yards and two TDs on 44 carries vs. New Mexico State. Benson's 64 rushing yards vs. NMSU rank fifth on the UT freshman rushing debut list.

**YARDS AFTER CONTACT:** Texas' bruising tailback Ivan "Diesel" Williams and elusive true freshman Cedric Benson have led a Longhorns ground attack that has battled for yardage in the first four games of 2001. Williams and Benson have combined to rush for 580 yards on 114 carries in the first four games. Of those 580 yards, 363 (62.6%) have come after initial contact. Williams has registered 258 of his 394 yards (65.4%) after contact, while Benson has produced 105 of his 186 yards (56.5%) after shaking loose from a defender.

**SPECIAL TEAMS:** Texas' special teams are off to a great start as the Horns have returned a punt for a score, forced and recovered two fumbled kickoff returns, blocked a punt for a TD, blocked a field goal, connected on seven of nine field goal attempts and made



19-of-20 extra points in four games this season. Despite breaking in new kickers, the Horns also have posted a net punting average of 35.5 yards and an average starting position on kickoffs of the 23.2-yard line. Texas ranks 10th nationally in punt returns (16.5 ypr). Sophomore Nathan Vasher, who set a Big 12 and UT record with eight punt returns for a school-record 153 yards including a 44-yard TD return (and a 59-yard return), ranks second in the Big 12 and seventh nationally with his 16.7 yards per return average. The Horns rank fifth nationally in kickoff returns (32.2 ypr). Junior Victor Ike is averaging 37.3 yards per kickoff return. The success in 2001 on the heels of a season that saw UT's special teams rate among the most successful in several years for the Longhorns. The Horns' opponents' average starting position on the 83 kickoffs in 2000 was the 20.9-yard line. Last season, Hodges Mitchell returned 36 punts for 427 yards for an 11.9 yards per return average (29th/NCAA). After ranking 108th nationally in punt returns (6.0 avg.) in 1999, Texas ranked 32nd nationally (11.2 avg.) in 2000. Victor Ike snapped a UT 265-game kickoff return for a TD drought when he took a kick back 93 yards for a score vs. Oregon. He also returned a kickoff 81 yards to set up a Longhorns touchdown vs. Oklahoma and averaged 24.8 yards per return (12th/NCAA) on the year. Ike, who also returned a kickoff 43 yards at Colorado, averaged 32.8 yards (No. 2 on the UT all-time single-game list) per return vs. Oklahoma. Texas ranked 10th nationally with a 22.9 yards per kickoff return average. That also was a dramatic turnaround from a unit that ranked 69th nationally and averaged 19.7 yards per return in 2000. UT's defensive effort on kickoffs in 2000 was impressive as well as it limited its foes to just 15.8 yards per kickoff return — its best since 1992.

**DUSTY DELIVERIN':** With the loss of its most accurate kicker in school history in Kris Stockton, one of the Longhorns' major concerns entering 2001 was the kicking game. Enter freshman Dusty Mangum, who along with three other kickers, walked-on in August to join a pair of returnees in a battle for the Longhorns' kicking choires. Mangum came out on top and hasn't disappointed. He made his first seven field goal attempts and is seven of nine on the year. Mangum's 1.75 field goals per game ranks first in the Big 12 and 13th nationally, while his seven field goals already rank fourth on the UT all-time freshman list. He also has made 19 of 20 PATs and leads the team and ranks 15th nationally with 40 points (10.0 ppg) in four games. The 40 points already rank fourth on the UT all-time freshman kick scoring list. In his debut at Texas, he tallied a UT freshman kicking debut record of 11 points vs. New Mexico State. Mangum made both of his field goal attempts (tying the UT freshman kicking debut mark/tied for No. 5 on the UT all-time freshman single-game list) and hit all five of his PAT attempts in the opener. He was tabbed the Big 12 Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts in that game. Mangum followed that up by making a UT freshman record-tying three field goals, including a 51 and 49-yarder, and three PATs to tally a freshman kick scoring record of 12 points (tied for No. 3 on the UT all-time freshman single-game scoring list) vs. North Carolina. The 51-yard field goal is tied for the fifth longest field goal by a freshman in UT history. He connected on a pair of field goals and tallied 11 points in Texas' 53-26 win at Houston.

**SCORING DEFENSE:** Texas' defense (including kick/punt coverage units), which accounted for 51 points (five INT returns/two fumble recoveries/one safety) in 2000, is off to a good start in 2001. After scoring a TD off of a blocked punt in the opener and returning an interception for a TD and registering a safety vs. North Carolina, Texas' "D" now has scored in 12 of the Horns' last 22 games. The Horns have tallied eight INT returns for TDs in the last 21 games. That is a dramatic turnaround from the stretch of 56 games without returning an INT for a score from 1995-99. UT also has returned four fumbles for TDs in the last 22 games. UT had a string of 50 straight games without a fumble return for a score (1995-99) snapped in 1999.

**RED ZONE SCORING SUCCESS:** Texas has been extremely successful when penetrating the "Red Zone" during the Mack Brown era. UT is off to a near perfect start in that area in 2001, having scored on 21 of 23 (18 TDs/three field goals) of its trips inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Texas also has scored on all 16 (15 TDs/one field goal) of its possessions on first and goal in 2001. Dating back to last season, the Horns have scored on 41 of its last 43 possessions in the "Red Zone." In 2000, the Horns scored on 47 (30 TDs/17 FGs) of their 51 (92.2%) drives inside the opponents' 20-yard line. UT also scored on 27 of its 29 (93.1%) possessions (20 TDs/7 FGs) on first and goal last season. In 1999, UT scored on 51 of 60 trips (85.0%) inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Of those 51 scores, 37 (25 rush/12 pass) were touchdowns. Texas was even more productive inside the opponents' 10-yard line, where the Horns tallied 23 TDs and five field goals in 28 attempts on first and goal. UT's "Red Zone" success is a continuation of what Mack Brown's squad accomplished in his first season at Texas. In 1998, UT scored on 39 of 46 trips (84.8%) inside the opponents' 20-yard line. Of those scores, 31 were TDs. Texas has scored on 158 of 180 trips (87.8%) inside the "Red Zone" under Brown.

**IN MEMORY OF: BRANDON COLE PITTMAN**

*January 26, 1980 — February 26, 2001*

The University of Texas football family suffered a tragic loss when junior defensive tackle Cole Pittman was tragically taken from us in a one-vehicle accident on U.S. Route 79 near Easterly, Texas, last spring. The accident occurred on Monday, Feb. 26, as Pittman, who was projected as a starter on the Horns defensive line, returned from his home in Shreveport, La., to join his UT teammates for spring drills. Texas' spring season was set to begin on Tuesday, Feb. 27, but was postponed until Monday, March 5, as the team remembered Pittman at his funeral in Shreveport and then in an on-campus memorial. Chance Mock, Cory Redding and Chris Simms were among the Longhorns who served as Pallbearers at Pittman's funeral and 1,200 people attended the on-campus service. Longhorns players will honor their fallen teammate by wearing a "CP" decal on their helmets this season. Pittman's locker in the Moncrief-Neuhaus facility remains as it did on the day of his passing. The University of Texas has established a scholarship in the name of Cole Pittman. The first \$25,000 contribution was made by UT Men's and Women's Athletics. In a game where the weather conditions were plagued by a steady, heavy rain, the Longhorns kicking game was the dominate factor in a 15-15 tie. Punter John Teltschik and kicker Jeff Ward, who jokingly put on a mock synchronized swimming show during two-a-day practices in the fall, must have known then their act would be needed. Ward's 32-yard field goal attempt as time expired was dead center through the north goal posts to net the deadlock and Teltschik kept the Sooners far away from the Texas goal with a 46.1 punting average, including a phenomenal 69-yarder that took the ball from the Texas 31 to the Sooner 20 (despite the touchback). Freshman Kevin Nelson rushed for 78 yards, including a 58-yard run that eventually led to the tying field goal. Todd Dodge hit Bill Boy Bryant for a 25-yard touchdown to open the scoring and Ward added a 40-yard field goal for a 10-0 halftime lead. But the Sooners got early third quarter field position and scored 15 third quarter points before a safety and Ward's field goal tied it in the closing minutes.
