Norval offers Leadership Ropes Course

IN AN EFFORT TO EXTEND elements of the Norval experience beyond the UCC community, Norval director, Bill Elgie and teacher Grant Linney have created a new youth leadership program that will be available to the public. The new program will focus on using the low and high ropes courses as tools for developing leadership, problem-solving and decision-making skills, cooperation, risk-taking strategies, relationship building skills, building trusting relationships and more.

Bill and Grant are clear on the outcome of the sessions – " The rewards for youth and adults alike come from meeting challenges head on and accomplishing what they thought was impossible."

In a typical six-hour program, participants might start with a warm-up session then move to problem-solving and trust-building activities. From there, students move to the actual ropes courses where they are instructed by experts and encouraged to try



climbing and then complete various elements of the course. At the end of each session, youth join a debrief session and discuss how to transfer learned skills into everyday living.

A committee has been selected which represents the breadth and diversity of the Upper Canada College community and is comprised of representatives from the Board, the Association, the Foundation, faculty and staff, parents, and alumni. The Board believes strongly that the involvement of these key elements of the UCC community will ensure the appointment of an individual who will be able to build upon the important strategic initiatives that the College has undertaken in the last few years.

Consultations are now in process with all faculty, staff, parent groups, Old Boys, students, members of the Association Board of Directors, members of the Board of Governors, members of the Foundation Board of Trustees, and others to invite comment on the issues, challenges and opportunities that UCC's next principal will face and suggestions as to the background, experience, and personal qualities that the College should seek in the candidates for the position.

Prep Centre for Learning opens new space

SINCE ITS INCEPTION, the Richard Wernham and Julia West Centre for Learning has had two sites on campus: one at the Upper School and another at the Prep. Until this fall, however, the Prep Centre for Learning staff have

worked in a temporary classroom while waiting for new "digs" to be made ready. On Monday, October 28, the Prep Centre for Learning formally opened the doors to its new, permanent location in the Howard Building (room H227). On hand for the celebratory reception were Centre founders and donors Richard Wernham and Julia West (parents of

Nicholas, 2002), Steve Johnson, head of the Preparatory School, Doug Blakey, principal, Mary Gauthier, director of the Centre for Learning and Dr. Susan Elliott, coordinator of the Prep Centre. A handful of Prep students were also present to demonstrate some learning exercises so the visitors could see the Centre in action and new signage was unveiled outside the entrance.

Dr. Elliott says of the new space, "We are thrilled that the new Centre's design allows for both group and individual work, and is so centrally located at the heart of the Prep buildings."

The Richard Wernham and Julia West Centre for Learning at the Prep is a resource for all Prep students and their parents. It is located on the second floor of the Howard Building, on the north side, just past the Wilder Library.

GERRY AND CARLA CONNOR, whose vision and generosity have created the Connor Visiting Chair for faculty development at Upper Canada College were honoured at a reception in principal Doug Blakey's office in early November. Also attending was Dr. Cecelia Reynolds, associate dean of OISE/UT who is the first-ever occupant of the Connor Chair.

The primary purpose of the Connor Chair is to

provide relevant, on-site assistance, training and development for teachers. Visiting scholars will be brought to UCC to work with faculty on an individual, team and large-group basis on educational issues broadly applicable to the College environment. This year, Dr. Reynolds will be working in conjunction with the Richard Wernham and Julia West Centre for Learning and UCC faculty to explore the benefits of


using research models in the practice of teaching.

Reflecting on his family's commitment to this program, Gerry Connor observed that with three sons here, he and his wife Carla were parents at the College over a span of 19 years. During that time, they came to appreciate that what makes UCC work is people, and especially teachers. Gerry says, "The extra time or special interest of an educator can have a profound impact on a student and from a parent's perspective it's the institution with the best faculty that's paramount." He and Carla wanted to find a way to thank the UCC faculty and give them something back that might assure consistently high standards. The Connors also believe strongly in the UCC commitment to be a "private school with a public purpose" and see efforts like the Chair as important enhancements not only to the internal UCC world but to the broader educational community as well.

The recent Old Boys' and Parents' surveys indicated that for many, electronic communications is becoming the most popular form of receiving and transmitting information. It is more immediate, easier to process and better transcends geography. (Imagine, parents and Old Boys who live in Calgary or Hong Kong will receive this edition – and all others – at the exact same time as readers in Toronto!) In addition, as UCC moves to become a "Green School", any effort to lessen paper use is positive. By sending you an electronic issue of Current Times, our use of paper and all the associated costs are reduced dramatically.

Is a print version still available?

Yes. While it's true that we would like — over time — to send out fewer printed copies of *Current Times*, please rest assured that we understand that some of you may still prefer to receive a print version. Indeed, this may be your only option. We want to be able to reach all of our Old Boys, parents and friends, no matter whether it's by regular mail or e-mail.

What do I do now?

By March, those of you for whom we have an email address will no longer receive a printed copy of *Current Times* and will instead get

only the online version. If this is fine with you, do nothing. Your printed copies will stop coming. If, however, you still prefer to get a printed copy, you must let us know by clicking on the appropriate icon on your electronic issue or by sending an email message to currenttimes@ucc.on.ca and indicating your preference. Please do not send a message if you want to continue getting the electronic *Current Times*.

If you want the online version but did not receive it this time, this means we don't have your email address! Simply go to the College's website at www.ucc.on.ca and click on "Old Boys, Parents and Friends". Once on the Association page, click on the banner that says "Visit the Upper Canada College Association E-Mail Directory" and follow the steps for adding your address to the directory.

Those of you who received this print edition and for whom we have only a mailing address will continue to get the print version.

IB Primary Years Programme Application

STEVE JOHNSON, HEAD OF THE PREP reports with pleasure that at the September Board Meeting and after a presentation by Sarah Craig, PYP coordinator and Rob Lloyd, head of Primary, the Board of Governors unanimously approved a resolution that UCC formally submit its application for Primary Years Programme authorization to the International Baccalaureate North America.

Dr. Johnson says "The success of the PYP at UCC is due in no small measure to the dedication and hard work of Prep faculty over the past five years and to them I offer my sincere thanks. The energy and enthusiasm they have brought to the numerous workshops, conferences and curriculum grants as well as into the classroom help make this a reality."

The Primary Years Programme application was submitted on October 1st and it is hoped that the approval process will be complete by July, 2003.

IN MEMORIAM

lan E. Finlayson '67

The College mourns the loss of Ian E. Finlayson '67 former vice chair of the Board of Governors, who died suddenly on November 1, 2002. Ian leaves his mother,

Marjorie, his wife, Marlo and his sons Campbell '99 and Fraser 2000.

After graduating from UCC where he was a member of Howard's, Ian went on to Amherst College and Columbia University.



lan Finlayson

A devoted volunteer and supporter of UCC, Ian and his family provided the funding for two classrooms at the College; a music room at the Upper School in memory of Ian's father, R. W. ("Bill") Finlayson '26 and a primary room at the Prep. In addition, the Finlaysons were responsible for the rebuilding and placement of the Peacock Arch at the entrance to the Prep after the Peacock Building was demolished in 1991.

Ian was a trustee of The UCC Foundation at the time of his passing.

Jay D. MacDonald

The UCC community is saddened by news of the death of master emeritus, Jay D. MacDonald on November 21, 2002. Mr. MacDonald passed away at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto. He was 86.

Mr. MacDonald came to UCC in 1945 to fill in for a few weeks as English master. He ended up staying for 30 years during which time he transformed the Little Theatre program. A highlight of his UCC career was the Little Theatre trip to Britain in the summer of 1951 when he and 34 boys toured in a production of *Our Town*. When Jay retired in 1975, he had successfully directed 60 theatrical productions at the College.

Old Boys remember Jay MacDonald fondly. As Palmer Swanson '55 put it, "Jay was not only Little Theater's driving genius, a first-rate teacher of English and literature... he was the best-dressed gentleman in Toronto!"

The Jay D. MacDonald Scholarship was

created in 2000 by David Walker and other members of the class of 1951 to honour Mr. MacDonald's contribution to UCC. David Walker remembers that former students of Jay's "felt that he had

made a difference in how they approached life. They valued him greatly for this".
