We have established an extensive care network consisting of pastoral class groups, peer support programs, behaviour management procedures and effective communication channels – all of which assist in the provision of a safe and happy learning environment for all members of our community.





At Marist Regional College we aim to achieve best teaching practice in an environment where each student values and enjoys learning. Our teaching program is well-resourced, giving staff the freedom to cater for individual student needs.

In Years 7-10 students undertake compulsory units in Religious Education, English, Mathematics, Science, Studies of Society and Environment, and Health and Physical Education. Students may also choose a variety of optional subjects from each of the key learning areas, including Languages other than English, the Arts and Technology.

Our senior curriculum caters for students with varied interests and abilities. We have a commendable record for academic success, with a high percentage of our Year 12 students qualifying for university entry each year. Our general and pre-tertiary academic program is complemented by a range of skills-based VET programs that provide flexible learning alternatives for those students not wishing to pursue a university education.






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Learning is about the development of the whole person and we have a well-deserved reputation for providing students with extensive sporting and cultural experiences – and acknowledge that participation in these activities plays an important part in many of our students' lives.

The college musical provides an opportunity to participate in a major theatrical production, and our students consistently perform well across all categories in eisteddfod drama and musical competitions. Other options include vocal and instrumental ensembles, bands and various special interest clubs. Marist Regional College is located in a magnificent clifftop setting, where our superb green sporting fields overlook the sparkling blue waters of Bass Strait. The college is conveniently located within walking distance of the Burnie CBD and numerous sporting facilities.

Our modern Learning Resource Centre, and computer and science laboratories provide access to the latest technologies designed to enhance, support and enrich teaching and learning in a progressive environment. The most recent addition to the school infrastructure is the Colin Theatre – a high-tech specialist facility used for interactive audio-visual presentations, drama and musical performances.

The McAuley Wing – home of the Year 7 curriculum – is set apart from the rest of the college to provide a more supportive and caring environment for students making the transition from primary to high school.
