Parish members brought their treasured Nativity sets to share with the rest of the congregation and the public in an afternoon of fellowship, discovery and a deeper appreciation of the story of the birth of Jesus.

The size of the sets ranged from a small bracelet charm to the largest one, requiring a special table, which was displayed in the nave of Holy Trinity Church. One display included the story from the point of the gifts brought by the Wise Men and had the offerings of frankincense, myrrh and gold in inlaid boxes along with information on the background of each.

A wide variety of workmanship, materials and interpretation was evident in the sets displayed: Christmas tree ornaments, an inlaid picture, tiny items from an Advent calendar, a snow globe creche and even a set of magnetic figures for the refrig-

Muslims mark start of new year

ATLANTA -- The Islamic new year arrived quietly for its first full day: no boisterous customs, no fireworks, no Dick Clark counting down the seconds in Mecca.

For Muslims - in Atlanta and abroad - the theme is reflection, not revelry.


Today invites contemplation - and the commemoration of the hegira, when the prophet Muhammad escaped religious persecution by traveling from Mecca to Medina, establishing the first Islamic state.

"When we end the year, we are grateful to God for blessing us to have lived that year, and we spend most of our energy and concentration on committing ourselves to give more, to be more productive, to be more decent, to accomplish more in the year that's ahead of us," said Imam Plemon El-Amin of the Atlanta Masjid of Al-Islam.

Shahir Raslan, a mechanical engineer from Newnan and spokesman for Masjid Al-Ihsaan, a mosque in Riverdale, said that in his native Syria, the new year was welcomed by lights in the streets. People visited each other, exchanging gifts.

In this country, he and his wife and four children will remember the importance of the new year by reading the story of the prophet Muhammad.

"A person can reflect, thinking of the unity of Muslims that was established as one nation, regardless of ethnicity and cultural differences," Raslan said.



"In Mecca during that time it would cost you your life and your property to say, 'I am a Muslim,' Raslan added.

He intends to emphasize the importance of religious freedom to his children.

Introspection is also the order of the day for Carla Aniagoh, an African diaspora professor at Spelman College, who used to live in Guinea.

"You reflect and look for self-improvement," Aniagoh

When she lived in Guinea, children dressed up and walked from house to house on new year's day, singing verses from the Quran. Adults would give the children money.

But since the Americanborn mother of two returned to the United States to live

two years ago, she has recognized the day in more low-key fashion.

Aniagoh said she might spend time with friends today from Senegal who live in metro Atlanta. They might cook lamb - "Lamb is always important for a celebration" - and ask each other's forgiveness for any offenses they may have caused during the year.

The reflections aren't resolutions as Westerners might conceive of them goals for personal betterment. Muslims practice their religion as a lifestyle and take stock with a view toward a better community.

"It is a self-evaluation of a person - [of] being a Muslim, [of] what she did last year. What was his shortcoming? What was his problem? He has to look

[at] the new year [as] his commitment to a better person and a better society,' said Mushir Siddiqui, a director of Al Madina Masjid in Norcross.

Imam Amjad Saeed of Masjid Omar in Norcross echoed the sentiment.

'We certainly remind our children of the importance of the Islamic calendar how did it start, and the important events that happened at certain times. We remind our generations about the history."

Despite the historical significance of Islamic new year, many Muslims will go about their daily lives.

"The new year is not one of the holidays where Muslims are enjoined to go to the mosque and make a special prayer," said Vincent Cornell, the Asa Griggs Candler Professor of Middle East and Islamic Studies at Emory University.

Sometimes the day serves as a reminder for financial responsibilities. Cornell said he uses new year's to pay zakat, the annual tithing required by Islam.

Some families might exchange cards and gifts. Asked if he thought the Islamic new year was taking on qualities of Western new year celebrations, Siddiqui laughed. "By my faith, by my beliefs, by my religion, I don't have to do all this to make [myself] happy. I can be more happy if I'll go and get money to send somebody in the world who needs it.'
