Accomplishments:

- 1. Forty students and four staff members, representing the West High School Business Academy, donated 7934 hours of service learning to our community. State Senator Joe Seng presented Presidential Volunteer Service Award medals to the recipients in a ceremony held on June 5th.
- 2. In State Contests, our Band received one Division I rating and two Division II ratings. The Orchestra earned a Division I rating. Our Vocal Music Large Group received a Division I rating. Five students, Carlee Weber, Elizabeth Nickell, John Stender, Justin Lanman and John Denkmann were honored with the opportunity to participate in All State.
- 3. Our ESL program moved this year toward an inclusion model of services for higher achieving students. Annually, our ESL students take an English Language Assessment Test known as the I-ELDA. WHS students showed significant growth on this exam this past year. Improvements ranged from 25-50% in four specific components of English: reading, writing, listening and speaking. Karin Hanson, Megan Baldry and Cheryl Brenner are teachers in that department.
- 4. After less than one semester in existence, the West High School Project Lead The Way, a national pre-engineering program, received National Certification status. This enables qualifying students to receive college credits for high school course work at the University of Iowa and Iowa State University for a nominal fee. Our two instructors, Jason Franzenburg and Duane Stahl, are again attending rigorous training sessions this summer. Katie Tunis, Michelle Brus and Shannon Lange received the "Teamwork Award" at the PLTW Student Symposium held in Iowa City.
- 5. Football, volleyball and boys basketball programs were recognized with the MAC Sportsmanship Award, sponsored by the Davenport Noon Rotary Club. It recognizes the sportsmanship demonstrated by fans, coaches and players and is awarded to one school for each of seven sports.
