The Trustees of Carers UK have pleasure in presenting their Annual Report for the year ended 31 March 2007.

Carers provide unpaid care by looking after an ill, frail or disabled family member, friend or partner. Carers give so much to society yet, as a consequence of caring, they experience ill health, poverty and discrimination. Carers UK is determined to secure improvements to the lives of carers. There are some 6 million carers in the UK. Of those, 1.25 million provide more than 50 hours a week of care.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Carers UK is a registered charity and limited company, operating under a Memorandum and Articles of Association. The majority of members of Carers UK are people who are or have recently been carers i.e. people whose lives are, in some way, restricted by the need to take responsibility for the care of another person.

### The Trustees

Carers UK is governed by a Board of Trustees, the majority of whom are elected by the membership at the Annual General Meeting. The number of Board members may be not less than 14 nor more than 21. At least two thirds of the members of the Board must be, or have recently been, carers. Board members are elected for a period of four years and must stand down for a minimum of a year after two consecutive terms of office. Each of the Nation Committees in Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales may appoint a member to the Board of Trustees. The Board may co-opt individuals with particular skills or expertise.

Carers UK has a formal induction process for Trustees. All new Trustees are provided with the constitution, the strategy and information about the organisation and its activities. New Trustees are invited to the Head Office to meet key staff who provide information about the day to day work of Carers UK. There is an annual Trustee Development meeting. In February 2007, the Trustee Development Day focused on developing a new strategic plan, from 2008, for the organisation. A skills audit helps identify gaps in expertise, which may be filled through co-options and specific training needs.

Carers UK has three standing committees in Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales. In addition, the Board has a Finance and Resources Committee, chaired by Ian Peters, the treasurer, a Remuneration Committee and a Constitution Working Group. During the year, the Trustees set up a new Fundraising Sub-Committee, chaired by Jeff Hayes, a co-opted Trustee, which reports to the Finance and Resources Committee.

### Staff

The Trustees approve the overall strategy of the organisation and delegate the operational management, development and administration of Carers UK to the Chief Executive, Imelda Redmond. During the year, the Senior Management Team comprised the Chief Executive, the Directors of the three Nation Offices, the Director, Finance and Administration, the Head of Communications, and the Head of Public Affairs. The Senior Management Team is responsible for the day to day running of the organisation, in line with the agreed strategy, and makes recommendations to the Board of Trustees.

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### **Objects of the Charity**

The principal objects of Carers UK as set out in its Memorandum and Articles of Association are:

- to alleviate the conditions of life amongst people who are caring or who have cared for elderly, sick, disabled, handicapped or otherwise infirm persons at home ("carers") and who are in necessitous circumstances, and of dependants of carers being dependants who are themselves in necessitous circumstances, and for that purpose to promote the material welfare of such carers;
- to relieve and alleviate, and to advance, promote, encourage and assist in the relief or alleviation of all kinds of mental and physical infirmity, sickness, disablement or handicap including mental illness attributable to caring, amongst carers and those persons for whom they are caring;
- to advance education concerning caring amongst carers and the public.

In early 2005, and after extensive consultation with members, the Board of Trustees agreed a strategy for the next three years.

### Strategy 2005 - 2008

Carers UK's vision is of a society where there is true equality for carers, where their role and contribution to their families and society are recognised, where they are fully empowered and where they are respected as equal and expert partners in the planning and delivery of care.

We want carers to have the same right as everyone else to an ordinary life – a fair level of income, access to support to protect their health and well-being and access to the world of work, leisure and education. We want carers to be actively involved in the design, development and delivery of services. We want carers to be recognised and involved as key partners in the provision of health and social care services.

### We achieve this by:

- campaigning for the changes that make a real difference for carers
- providing information and advice to carers about their rights and how to get support
- mobilising carers and supporters to influence decision-makers
- gathering hard evidence about what needs to change
- transforming the understanding of caring so that carers are valued and not discriminated against.

### **ACHIEVEMENTS**

It has been a year of significant achievements at Carers UK. We have secured new rights for carers and increased our reach and understanding of the issues carers face. We have moved carers up the political agenda in the UK and have had particular successes in Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales.

During 2006/07, Carers UK continued to implement the Strategic Plan 2005-2008, focusing our work on three areas:

A Fair Deal for Carers: Our campaigning umbrella that has five key areas.

**Carers Involvement:** This remains critical to how we work: carers inform our work at every level.

Working in Partnership: We recognise that we have a stronger voice when we work with other organisations.

### A Fair Deal for Carers

Our campaigning work has five strands - recognition for carers, poverty, ill health, employment discrimination and tackling social exclusion.

#### Recognition for Carers

Carers make a huge contribution to society yet have very little recognition or rights. Carers are angry that they do not have enough recognition of their role from the public and politicians and from health and social care professionals. In December 2006 Carers UK undertook a survey of its members asking them to rank issues in order of importance. Recognition was ranked of highest importance to the majority of the 3,000 carers who responded.

The new National Strategy for Carers was launched by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Gordon Brown, in February 2007 and is a great opportunity to improve recognition for carers so Carers UK is taking a proactive role to influence it. We are part of a GGovernment working group to shape the strategy and we have organised a series of events during Spring 2007 across the UK so carers can tell Ministers what they need.

- Our campaign to secure a Carers Champion was successful with the Welsh Assembly appointing John Griffiths AM, Deputy Minister for Health & Social Care. This is the first Ministerial level champion in the UK and was a groundbreaking victory.
- We work with our partners to raise the profile of carers in the public eye and help carers to seek advice, information and support. Our national awareness raising event, Carers Rights Day, in December resulted in an estimated 27,000 people receiving our advice on issues such as benefits, pensions and allowances.

### **Poverty**

Caring comes with a price. Many carers fall into poverty and suffer severe financial hardship as a direct result of caring. One in three people providing round the clock care struggles to pay basic food and utility bills, often affecting their own health and that of the person they care for.

- In November 2006 we launched a high profile campaign to highlight the impact that caring has on people's finances. Over 3,000 carers have told us of the impact that caring has had on their income.
- Many carers do not know what benefits they can claim. Carers UK continues to deliver a high quality
  advice and information service to carers and the public. During 2006/07 the number of enquiries
  dealt with rose by 5.5%. The demand for the service continues to outstrip the resources available.
- After much lobbying from Carers UK the Government announced a further investment of £3 million
  per annum for a national helpline. Carers UK intends to tender for this contract. Carers UK has been
  awarded a Big Lottery grant of £488,000 over 5 years for the existing advice and information service,
  starting in October 2007..
- Many carers go into old age in poverty. During the course of the year we have contributed evidence
  to the national debate on the reform of pensions. This has led to new pension rights for carers which
  recognise that caring is as important as paid work when deciding pension contributions. An
  estimated 160,000 people will benefit from this important change.

#### Health

Caring can seriously damage your health and wellbeing - exhaustion, a bad back, stress, worry and depression. A total of 620,000 carers providing continuous care suffer mental and physical ill health.

- Carers Week took as its theme the promotion of health checks for carers. Thousands of events focused on how to improve carers' health and access to health care. Many thousands of carers participated in the campaign to introduce health checks for carers.
- In Scotland and Wales we saw caring recognised as an issue to be covered by public health policy. Health is clearly identified as a discrete area in the NHS Carers Information Strategy (Scotland).
- During the year we have trained more staff from health backgrounds than in previous years.
   However, there remains a low level of awareness of carers' needs and contribution in many parts of the NHS.

### • Employment Rights

Carers wishing to work are often discriminated against because care services do not fit around their working lives and employers do not support flexible working. In a recent Carers UK survey 54% said that they had had to give up work to care. This can lead to financial hardship, poorer career prospects, social isolation and poor pension provision.

- During 2006/07 Carers UK launched a campaign called Make Work Work to bring about changes so that
  carers have real choices about balancing work and care. During the course of the year the campaign
  won its first major target: carers' right to request flexible working. Our lobbying persuaded the
  Government to widen the number of carers who will benefit from the new rights to flexible working.
  Around 2.6 million people will now benefit.
- Through the European Social Fund supported project, Action for Carers and Employment, we started our campaign to tell employees about their new rights and to help employers introduce flexible working. We have developed detailed packs for employers to help them support carers in their workforce and produced information aimed at carers. We have published a number of influential research reports including Who Cares Wins, More than a Job and Juggling More than Most. These reports are on our website www.carersuk.org.

We have been carrying out important work with partners in local authorities to look at how services
delivered to frail and disabled people can be improved to also take account of many carers' desire to
work.

### Fighting Social Exclusion

Caring can be very isolating. Carers can feel cut off from their former lives and find it hard to take part in the things everyone else takes for granted – seeing family and friends, pursuing interests outside their caring role. Carers UK's network of 70 branches run by volunteers and the 500 organisations who are associate members of Carers UK play a critical part in breaking down that isolation by organising local support groups, social events and breaks from caring. Specific initiatives taken during the year included:

- a series of talks with Trevor Phillips, chair of the new Commission on Human Rights. We have had his assurance that carers' rights will be addressed by the new body. We have also continued a close and fruitful relationship with the Equal Opportunities Commission and the Disability Rights Commission. We ran a successful launch of our report Whose Rights Are They Anyway? at the Scottish Parliament. Carers Northern Ireland has developed a Human Rights training programme for health and social care staff, and a practical checklist for staff protecting carers' human rights.
- continuing to focus our attention on the specific needs of carers from black and minority ethnic communities. We publish information in 10 languages and held a number of events specifically to consult and inform carers from black and minority ethnic communities.
- the launch of a new version of the Carers UK forum our online community where carers can talk to each other and offer support through the internet. Membership continues to grow and carers who are part of the community are making lasting friendships and tell us it is a lifeline.
- follow up to our Back Me Up campaign which was launched in 2005. Carers told us they felt trapped and
  isolated in their own homes, unable to travel far for fear of what might happen if an emergency occurred.
  Thanks to the campaign the Government announced an allocation of £25 million for carer emergency
  respite in England and the Welsh Assembly has committed an extra £1 million.
- the promotion of Learning for Living by Carers Scotland, throughout Scotland. Learning for Living is an
  online training course for carers designed by Carers UK with City and Guilds, to help carers develop
  skills and confidence.

### Carers' Involvement

Involving carers in all that we do is a critical part of the organisation's values. Over the past year we have focused on developing that engagement. We have sought to increase the number of carers we are in touch with both by growing membership and through new means such as email newsletters. We also seek to find new ways for those carers to engage with Carers UK – we continually seek to live up to our strapline - "the voice of carers".

- Our Equal Partners Project, to assist carers to bring about real change to local services and now has
  over 1,000 members. We have developed and run courses throughout the UK (together with our Carers
  Voices project in Northern Ireland) on how to influence policy change both at local and national level,
  helping carers improve their confidence and negotiating skills. We have published briefings on Human
  Rights, Employment Rights and Back Me Up.
- Usage of our website has grown in 2006/7 by 80% to 204,000 visitors in the year. The website provides
  many ways for carers to get involved with Carers UK such as taking part in surveys, contributing to our
  discussion forum, voting in online polls and by signing up to receive our monthly email newsletter.

- We gave carers the chance to shape the elections to the Welsh and Northern Ireland Assemblies and the Scottish Parliament. Carers Manifestos were developed in Wales, Scotland and London, based directly on consultations with carers. The end results were used by carers with candidates during election campaigns.
- The number of members of the organisation has increased by 5%. One exciting aspect of this year was the significant increase in carers engaging with the organisation through the website, email bulletins and survey work, etc. Our monthly email newsletter is now delivered to around 3,000 carers. During 2007/08 we will find new ways of recording this activity so that we can report on it in the next annual report.

### Working in Partnership

We have continued to work in partnership with other relevant organizations to take forward the agenda for carers. Our partners come from the voluntary, statutory and the private sectors. We work closely with the main carers organisations in the UK: Crossroads Caring for Carers, The Princess Royal Trust for Carers and Contact a Family, and with a group of European carers organisations.

- Carers UK continues to lead a consortium of charities to organise an awareness raising week Carers
  Week each year in June. Carers Week in 2006 was the largest ever. Over 5,000 carers responded to
  our survey and a record number of 7,000 events took place throughout the UK. Extensive media
  coverage was achieved and many people came forward for help and assistance.
- Carers UK has a network of 1,300 supporter organisations, including 70 branches and 500 associate members local carers organisations, disability organisations, employers and local authorities.
- Carers UK plays a leading role in Eurocarers which is an exciting new organisation, formally launched in June 2007, which currently comprises representatives of 18 organisations and research bodies from nine countries. Members have come together to influence policy within the European Institutions to ensure that the invaluable contribution of carers is recognised across Europe.
- Carers UK continues to lead the Action for Carers and Employment (ACE) partnership with local and statutory authorities, universities, businesses and voluntary organisations. Carers Northern Ireland has been a key partner in two Equal partnerships developing action for carers in employment in Northern Ireland. ACE's partnership work with Leeds University has led to us joint-publishing a series of influential research reports which can be downloaded from the website.

### **PERFORMANCE**

Carers UK's Trustees set key performance indicators (KPIs) across the organisation, and monitor achievements against those indicators. The Trustees also use KPIs to raise standards within the organisation. The overarching objective of Carers UK is to improve the lives of carers and our successes in the areas of campaigning and lobbying for legislative change and Government recognition of carers and carers' issues have moved us a long way forward.

### **Key Performance Indicators**

Set out below are the main KPIs and some additional comments on the organisation's performance against these:

- i) To persuade Government to increase benefits, improve pensions, offer tax breaks and tackle work barriers Partially Achieved
  - During the year we launched our campaign to improve carer's finances. The campaign 'Real Change Not Short Change' will run for two years. The legislation that gave carers the right to request flexible work was approved by Parliament. Significant gains were made in pensions for carers.
- ii) To raise awareness of the role and contribution of carers Achieved

  Media to work to maintain avenues for raising awareness, Carers Week and Carers Rights Day
  were of higher profile then in previous years with over 27,000 carers receiving advice and information
  on Carers Rights Day and a record 7,000 events taking place during Carers Week.

- iii) To increase the number of enquiries dealt with by 5% Achieved
- iv) To develop links throughout Europe and to secure funding for this work Achieved Carers UK secured funding to lead on the development of a European wide network of carers organisations. Eurocarers was registered as a charity in Luxembourg.
- v) To improve membership retention by 5% Achieved
- vi) To provide 200 days of training and consultancy on carers' issues Achieved

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

### General

Our finances remain on a stable footing. At the start of the year we had budgeted for a deficit on unrestricted activities. After 12 months of considerable activity, we had a small deficit on unrestricted funds. As in previous years, we benefited from unbudgeted legacy income. We showed a deficit on restricted funds, which was covered by restricted reserves arising from grants and donations received during the previous year. Liquid funds carried forward into 2007/8 meet the Trustees' reserves policy.

Total income for the year increased by £475,870 to £4,313,792. Grants from Government, other public bodies and trusts totalled £3,152,650. Our other main income streams are membership subscriptions of £110,171, legacies of £339,292, and donations and gifts from trusts, businesses and individuals £179,948. Major funders during the year included the Department of Health (core funding), the European Social Fund, which supports the Action for Carers and Employment project) and the Big Lottery (Participation). The Nation Offices, in Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales, received substantial grants from their statutory funders. Our income from training courses and conferences was £228,222.

Our total expenditure increased by £525,964, from £3,866,940 in 2005/6 to £4,392,904 in 2006/7. A substantial part of that expenditure related to Action for Carers and Employment activities, funded by the European Social Fund. Our network of over 70 branches continues to contribute substantially to the charitable affairs of the organisation. Branch income of £251,372 and expenditure of £279,734 is included in the statement of financial activities. The balance sheet includes net assets from the branches of £389,857. Our branches range from the very small with income of a few hundred pounds to the sizeable and very active. Several of our larger branches generate income locally in excess of £10,000 with the largest attracting income of £30,000.

### Policy on reserves

Unrestricted reserves total £754,990 of which £240,478 is general reserves, £291,085 is in a designated office fund and a further £223,427 in a designated legacy fund. Restricted reserves total £681,449 including branch reserves of £389,857.

The Trustees confirmed the reserves policy, which requires a minimum of three months' running costs on unrestricted liquid funds to meet the charity's commitments. Our liquid reserves at the end of the year are £463,905, which represents 4.27 months' unrestricted running costs.

The Designated Office Fund is a permanent fund which represents the net book value of the freehold land and building of the head office.

Under the legacy policy, which helps the organisation manage the unpredictability of legacy income, one quarter of the legacy income received in a financial year will be designated for the year after receipt and one quarter for the year after that. Of the £223,427 in the Fund, £155,053 is for expenditure in 2007/8 and £68,393 in 2008/9.

#### **Pensions**

Carers UK provides a Group Personal Pension Plan for its staff and contributes 5% of salary into the plan. Carers UK also provides a Stakeholder Pension Plan.

### **Risks**

The Board of Trustees has identified the major risks to which the charity is exposed and has put in place systems and procedures to manage those risks.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

The Strategic Plan for the organisation for 2005–08 is coming to an end. Work has already started on developing a plan for the next 3 years which will be finalised in early 2008 after consultation with members, carers and other stakeholders.

The European Social Fund project Action for Carers and Employment comes to an end during 2007/8. ESF funding has enabled Carers UK to develop and disseminate best practice for employers and employees. This funding has contributed to the costs of our media and public affairs work. Carers UK intends to apply for new ESF funds to support a new project once the criteria are made public. We are extremely grateful to ESF and to our external partners who helped make the project such a success.

We have applied to the Office of Scottish Charity Regulator for registration as a charity under Scottish law. Our registration depends on a small change to the Memorandum and Articles of Association which will be put to the Members at the Annual General Meeting in November 2007.

Our Key Performance Indicators for 2007/8 include

- \* To persuade Governments to increase benefits, improve pensions, offer tax breaks and tackle
- \* To raise awareness of the role and contribution of carers.
- \* To increase the number of enquiries handled by 5%.
- \* To develop links throughout Europe and to secure funding for this work.
- \* To improve membership retention by 5%.
- \* To provide 200 days of training and consultancy on carers issues.
- \* To tender for relevant Government contracts.

### **Premises**

Following the receipt of professional advice on the valuation of Glasshouse Yard and future maintenance costs, the Trustees approved plans to put the freehold land and building on the market and seek a replacement. The objective is to achieve a better and more cost effective working environment whilst contributing to the charity's unrestricted reserves. The Glasshouse Yard premises are included in the accounts as fixed assets at 31 March 2007 at the net book value of £291,000. The Statement of Financial Activities for 2007/08 will include the sale income and the cost of acquiring new premises. In June 2007, Carers UK sold the freehold land and building for £2.6m.

### **APPRECIATION**

The Board of Trustees expresses its gratitude to all benefactors who have made grants and donations throughout the year. While the donations are too numerous to mention individually we specially note the major grants in note 3 to the financial statements. We are also most grateful to those who named Carers UK as a beneficiary in their will.

Thanks are also due to all those members and other volunteers who give their time to support Carers UK nationally and locally. There are numerous individuals who serve on branch committees and otherwise help Carers UK improve the lives of carers across the UK.

Especial thanks are due to the Chief Executive and all the staff of Carers UK for their hard work and dedication on behalf of carers.

### **AUDITORS**

PKF (UK) LLP were re-appointed as auditors at the AGM in November 2006.

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF CARERS UK

We have audited the financial statements of Carers UK for the year ended 31 March 2007 which comprise the statement of financial activities, the balance sheet, the cash flow statement and the related notes. The financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charity and the charity's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

### Respective responsibilities of Trustees and auditors

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### (a) Basis of preparation of financial statements

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of investments, and in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act 1985 and Statement of Recommended Practice 2005 (SORP 2005) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued by the Charity Commission, and comply with the applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards.

### (b) Branches

The financial statements incorporate the results of the UK Branches of Carers UK. The income, expenditure and fund balances of these branches are all utilised locally by the branches and the combined results of all branches can be seen in note 16 to the financial statements and are reflected within the restricted balances of the charity. The results of the branches are aggregated from returns which have been submitted to Carers UK that are prepared and signed by the local Treasurers. The year end reporting date for the branches consolidated within the financial statements is 31 December 2006.

### (c) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Assets with a cost in excess of £5,000 are capitalized as fixed assets. The cost of fixed assets is written off over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Freehold land & buildings

- 4% per annum on cost

(Excluding land, which is included at a book value of £104,000)

### (d) Investments

Investments are shown at market value. Realised and unrealised gains and losses are shown separately in the Statement of Financial Activities. Investment income is accounted for on an accruals basis.

### (e) Incoming resources

Grants, donations and other voluntary income are accounted for on an accruals basis.

Legacies are credited to income only when the charity receives the funds unless there is certainty that the charity is entitled to receive a known amount at a given time. "Certain" means the estate has been through Probate and the charity knows the exact amount that is due.

Membership subscriptions received during the year that relate to a subsequent financial accounting period are carried forward as a creditor in the balance sheet and shown as subscriptions received in advance.

Activities for generating funds include corporate sponsorship and lottery proceeds.

#### (f) Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Cost of generating funds comprises fundraising and publicity costs which are incurred in seeking voluntary contributions for the charity.

Governance costs include those incurred in the management of the charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Support costs include the central functions and have been allocated across the categories of charitable expenditure, governance costs and costs of generating funds on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Finance costs are allocated on the basis of expenditure. Other costs are allocated on the basis of head count.

### (g) Legacy Policy

Of the total amount of legacy income received, 25% is allocated to current expenditure, 25% is allocated to the reserve policy and the remaining 50% is set aside for the following two years of operating costs.

### (h) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

# CARERS UK (Registered as Carers National Association) NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2007

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds IS charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each specific fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate funds.

### (i) Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the statement of financial activities on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

### (j) Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity in an independently administered scheme.

#### 2. LIMITED LIABILITY

The company is limited by guarantee, having no capital. Liability of each member is limited to 50p on winding up.
