## PRINCIPAL'S ASSEMBLY

Assembly opening with Clovis Carrive-Meyer (Y8) playing Allegro from Sonata No.5 by George Frederic Handel.

Dr Carter said that Clovis also performed this piece in the city of Ryde Eisteddfod last Saturday. He scored 83/100 and was given a Highly Commended in the 13-14 years Wind Instrument section. This score placed him fourth out of nineteen competitors and only four marks behind the first place competitor.

Dr Carter introduced three guests on stage, Mr Jonathan Sesel, President of the Board, Mrs Millie Phillips, one of the School's greatest supporters and her daughter, Mrs Sharonne Phillips (pictured below).

Mr Benjamin told the assembly about Mrs Millie Phillips' latest gift to the School of the online Encyclopedia Judaica. Dr Carter presented Mrs Phillips with a framed certificate and Polina Madorsky, Head Madricha, presented her with flowers.

Dr Carter welcomed back the Year 12 students who only have five weeks left of school.

Dr Carter praised the honesty of students again as another mobile phone was handed in, this time by Ben Eliya.

Mr Case presented certificates to the top performers in the Science International Competition. The full list of Distinction and High Distinction names is on page 5.

Monday night was the Night of Instrumental Music with 150 performers. Dr Carter said he was disappointed that he would not attend as he was delayed in Lismore because of severe storms.

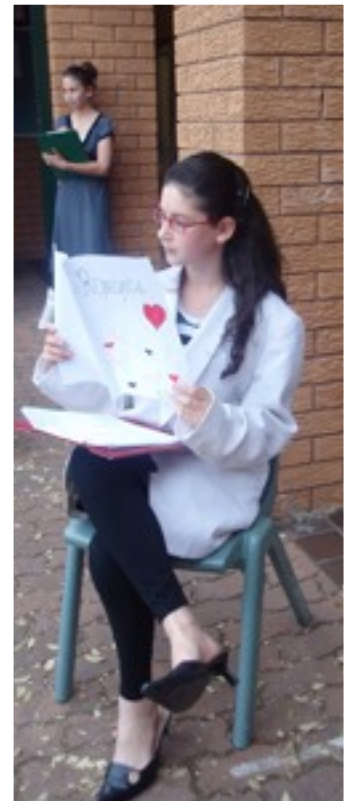
## CONCERT COMMITTEE

# YEAR 9 VISUAL ARTS

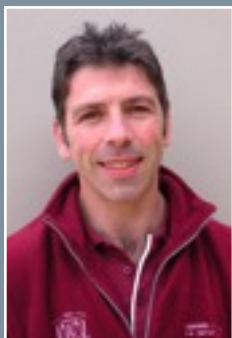

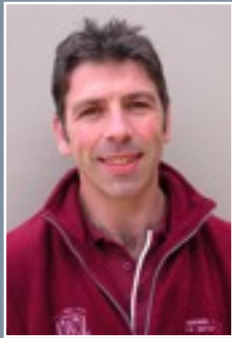

## CONSERVING WATER BY JOSHUA MOSES, YEAR 8 - PART 2

### OUTDOORS

We all want attractive yards, patios, and outdoor areas around our house or office. There are ways to achieve a satisfying effect by using water efficiently and saving on our bills. Some suggestions are:

- Check with your local nursery to determine drought-resistant plants and shrubs
- Use less lawn space and more decks, patios, rock gardens, ground covers, walkways and shrubs
- Group water-using plants together and drought-resistant plants elsewhere (called hydrozoning)
- Water early in the morning when evaporation is minimal
- Use mulch to keep soil moist
- Use sprinkler systems efficiently making sure the water goes to the plants, not the pavement to avoid runoff
- Install low-volume and directed sprinkler heads
- Use automatic timers that can be reset seasonally or turned off when rain is predicted
- Use hoses with shut-off valves
- Use a rake and broom to clean driveways and sidewalks—not water
- Use a drip system where possible for irrigation
- Raise the lawn mower blade to at least 3 inches – longer grass holds soil moisture better
- Use a commercial car wash that recycles water or wash your car on the grass
- Avoid ornamental fountains unless the water is recycled

# THE KORNMEHL CENTRE Emanuel Pre-school

On Monday morning we were very lucky to have the opportunity to watch a performance by Fred Reid and his son Todd – Aboriginal performers. He began by explaining the connection the Aboriginal people have to the land and how they only take what they need. He then decorated his face with white paint and we helped to count the spots. He explained how the didgeridoo is made by termites hollowing out the wood and he cleverly played the sound of the dingo, kookaburra and kangaroo hopping. After that the boys joined him for a kangaroo dance, following his movements carefully and the girls for an emu dance. Then the teachers had a go at being brolgas. Now that was a sight!



After the show, Todd drew some pictures for us and Fred explained the symbolism of the pictures e.g. the concentric circles representing the water holes and the curvy lines as the rivers. This inspired our drawings later on and we were able to paint the inside of Todd's platypus



and water hole and just enjoy the freedom of choice of colour and design. How wonderful to help children to open their minds to other cultures and beliefs. Fred also explained that the drawings are not created to show perfection but to convey a story in their lives and this is the ultimate goal in all the Aboriginal artwork. We also sang two Hebrew songs for Fred and Todd – David Melech Yisrael and Aveinu Shalom Alechem. The children explained to Fred the meanings of the word "Shalom." Fred and Todd stayed on after the show chatting and interacting with the children and observing them painting their art works. This was an unforgettable experience for everyone and a real lesson in breaking down barriers and learning about other cultures.

## Mitzvot

As we are now in the month of Elul it is wonderful to have Mr Adam Carpenter from the school come down and blow the Shofar for us each morning. The children find the call of the Shofar exhilarating and it truly awakens all their senses.



On the topic of Mitzvot, we have been talking to the children in the run up to Rosh Hashanah about being kind, helpful and caring and really watching out for each other. This is a time to reflect on past behaviours and find ways to say sorry. One way we can do this is by performing Mitzvot. Over the next few weeks the teachers will be observing the children closely and acknowledging them for these good deeds by presenting the children with "Kol Hakavod" certificates at Shabbat each week. 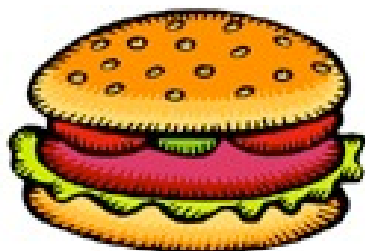
