### Principal's Report

#### REVIEW OF REPORTING

We apologize to all parents who encountered difficulties with the trial of our new online interview request system. Demand for Term 3 interviews has generally been much lower than experienced this year, perhaps indicating that students have been 'filtering' their parents' interest in the past. This is a sound reason to persist with, but improve, an online system that enables both teachers and parents to request interviews.

The online system has also provided us for the first time with some reliable data on the efficacy of our current reporting arrangements:

- Of 1327 families only 550 or 41% attended interviews
- On average parents requested 4-5 interviews
- Less than 5% of interviews requested by teachers were taken up by parents
- 25% of teachers were booked out within a few hours
- 40% of teachers were not fully booked on the night
- Requests for further contact ranged from 0-30 with the average being 5

The feedback from parents and staff was generally very positive with the new system having an 'equalizing' effect. Parents and teachers who had previously experienced difficulty gaining appointments reported an increase in interviews. Parents who previously had seen many teachers reported seeing less and some teachers were overloaded with requests. Other issues identified were:

- Some parents were unable to make any bookings if booking requests were logged very late
- Generally, teachers still did not see the parents they had requested interviews with
- There was less 'queue jumping' and parents attempting to see teachers without appointments

A more general problem was that many parents did not realise that the bookings they had requested may not be confirmed as teachers were required to exercise some discretion before confirming interviews if overloaded with requests. Some parents printed off their booking sheets prior to Wednesday as instructed and therefore were not aware that their booking requests had been changed.

Some teachers were also overwhelmed with requests for contact outside the interviews. This may mean that they will again need to prioritise who they can contact and may need to defer some contacts into next term.

It has not been understood that it has never been the intention of the current system that each teacher will be able to see the parents of every student. On average, MHS staff teach approximately 150 students. For a teacher to see every parent for 5 minutes would require 12.5 hours of interview twice a year for every member of staff. At present, staff are able to see 34 families only on each report evening.

It is clear that we need to take a different approach to reporting student progress and the trial of an online booking system forms part of a broader review of the MHS reporting system. We have recently completed both an online and hard copy parent survey of reporting to assist us in planning a better approach. 219 parents completed the survey distributed during the interviews. Their responses were:




Music festivities will continue throughout the week during lunchtimes, culminating with a 'battle of the bands' on Friday 16 October.

"On the 18<sup>th</sup> of August, 19 Indonesian exchange students from SMA IV Denpasar arrived at MHS for a 10 day exchange trip. The students from Indonesia were billeted by many generous MHS students currently studying Indonesian.

The trip allowed the two schools to mix language and culture in a laid back and relaxed environment. The host students and their billets visited several of Victoria's premier tourist attractions including Healesville Sanctuary, Melbourne Zoo, the Melbourne Museum and South Yarra Railway Station.

The weekend provided the host families the opportunity to take their exchange students to even more iconic Victorian tourist attractions, with the Indonesian students being taken to different places, including Eureka Tower Skydeck (and the EDGE,) Scienceworks, the Melbourne Aquarium, AFL matches, local and major markets (like Queen Victoria,) Lysterfield Lake and Grants Bird Feeding in Sherbrooke Forest.

The trip was extremely beneficial for both groups in developing each other's knowledge of each other's languages, and learning different things about each other's cultures. Some of the best things were learning phrases like 'dingin sekali, ya?' which translates as 'very cold, yes?' and 'kereta api ini sangat terlambat!' which means 'this train is very late!'. The trip also reassured many of the Year 9 students' belief in themselves when it comes to learning Bahasa Indonesia.

#### 1000 STEPS CHALLENGE - A GREAT SUCCESS

Last Sunday dawned cool and rainy – a good start, since no-one felt like running in 30 C heat. Rowers and parents started arriving from 8am and the anticipation was intense – would the record of 9 laps be broken? Would any parents seriously challenge the boys? The Challenge got underway at just after 9am, with 30 rowers from year 9 to year 12. The first few laps were fast and furious, with Kumaran Radhakrishnan lapping the field in no time. Soon those 1000 steps and the slippery, steep descent started to take their toll. #### TEENAGERS AND ALCOHOL - talking to your sons, part 2.

The following are suggested tips for parents wanting to talk to their teenagers about alcohol (or any other topical issues for that matter).

- Set an example you are happy for teenagers to copy parents and other adults are powerful role models that children copy as they grow older. Alcohol consumption is very much a part of the Australian lifestyle and parents who drink can teach children how to use alcohol in low-risk ways be modelling responsible use to their children.
- Be part of teenagers' lives make time for your teenager, know what's going on in their life, and help them to feel like an important part of the family. Be interested in what they are doing, regularly take time to do things (that they want to do) together and get to know their friends.
- Know the whereabouts of your teenager ask where your teenagers are going, who they will be with and when they will be home but do so in a friendly way. While direct supervision is more appropriate for younger children, monitoring teenagers' whereabouts and staying in touch with their daily lives is important. Ask your teenager to contact you if plans change and be prepared to check if teenagers are where they say they are going to be. Teenagers who think their parents will check on their whereabouts are less likely to take part in risky behaviours than teenagers who think their parents will not check.
- Listen show your teenagers you know how to listen. This will help them feel more comfortable about talking to you. Help them feel comfortable about telling you their problems. For example, ask them what they think about family decisions. This shows you value their opinions. Try to have discussions rather than give lectures. Asking for, listening to and talking about teenagers' opinions helps in this regard.
- Be prepared to hear things you may not agree with It is normal for teenagers to disagree with parents. If your teenager says things you do not agree with, acknowledge their right to have an opinion and explain why you disagree and what you would prefer them to think or do. Teenagers need to hear your views and know what you expect of them. This helps them to feel secure and provides them with information they may not have known. It also helps them to accept responsibility for their opinions and decisions.
- Be honest teenagers appreciate adults who are honest. It is important to be informed but don't pretend to know everything. Be prepared to say "I don't know but I will try to find out". Be honest and clear about where you stand so that your children will find it easier to be honest with you.
- Pick your moment choose the right time to discuss alcohol by looking for natural opportunities as they arise. This might be watching TV, reading over OURS, or when talking about someone at school.
- Stay calm if you find out that your teenager has been drinking without your permission, stay calm and think about what you want to say. Think about when you will discuss the issue – discussing it at 2am when people are tired may not be the best time. Never try to talk to your teenager about the issue if they (or you) are under the influence of alcohol. Focus on what it is that the teenager did that was wrong (eg, drank alcohol without permission, broke an agreed curfew, drank more than the limits you had set, failed to let you know of a change of plan, etc).
- Keep talking once you've had a discussion, it's important to have another. Always be willing to discuss alcohol. Check what teenagers think you have said - sometimes what teenagers have "heard" was not the message the parent wanted to say. You could ask "so what do you think I mean?" or "what do you think my opinion would be?"


