Preparation for Life

In its centenary year, the MHS community undertook an extensive review of its intended future directions. The resulting MHS 2020 plan has served the School well in directing its priorities over the past four years.

A key voice during that period of review was that of the students themselves. Through a series of discussion forums, the students identified the elements of the School, which in their view, were most important to maintain, as well as what needed to be done to improve the quality of education they received. The nature of this student input was sometimes unexpected and confronting.

MHS prides itself on providing a broad holistic education; a preparation for all of life's challenges and dimensions. Our students however have correctly pointed out that they receive little preparation for some of the most central and essential aspects of their future lives.

A recent survey of VCE students has revealed that next to none have received any preparation for their potential future roles as parents, family members or in sustaining positive personal relationships more generally. This raises complex questions about what the scope and limitations of a *preparation for life* should be.

It could in fact be argued that these

personal aspects of life should not fall within the jurisdiction of schooling at all. Certainly in a bygone era they would have been seen as more naturally the domains of family and faith. It is troubling, however, that so many students indicated that they had received no preparation for these essential aspects of their future lives either inside or outside school.

They were also overwhelmingly of a view that their schooling should



include some preparation for these important aspects of their future adult life. It is also true that surveys of our exit student indicate that this is the area that they felt the School prepared them least well for.

It could equally be argued that it may prove to be very difficult to provide an educational program across areas that are subject to quite divergent personal, cultural and religious beliefs and values. All schools, and especially secular and culturally diverse schools such as MHS, are quite adept in respectfully approaching a broad range of issues which touch upon sensitive personal and cultural values and beliefs. In fact attentiveness to cultural and

individual difference is one of the most unique assets of our School.

Preparation for Life was included as an explicit goal in the MHS 2020 strategic plan. To date the School has confined its work in this domain to some of the more prosaic aspects of adult life, such as citizenship and career education. It is my intention to ask the Council's Education and Welfare Committee to now explore this goal more expansively.

A work team that will include representatives from this Committee, relevant school staff and students from the new SRC Student Wellbeing portfolio group will be asked to research and evaluate existing programs and resources with the intention of introducing a pilot program for inclusion in the Year 10 end of year transition program. Parents and students will be provided with an outline of this program later this year.

YEAR 10 UNSATISFACTORY SEMESTER REPORTS

Year 10 students who have unsatisfactory reports (that is any Ns) will report to School in full uniform on the first day of the holidays, Monday 29th June, for an all day session on study skills, organisation, test and exam technique, and motivation. Students have until the end of the first week of term 3 to make arrangements with their subject teachers to complete assessment tasks or examinations, or both, to a satisfactory standard. If work is satisfactorily redeemed, then their MHS Diploma entries will be changed from N to S*. If all work is not completed to a satisfactory standard, then students will not qualify for a MHS Diploma when they graduate in year 12.

YEAR 9 - SEMESTER 1 REPORTS


